HISTORY OF ORGANIZATION

OF THE

GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE

It is no more a dream that the State of Delaware has a Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. It is now a reality, planted in good soil and with visions of a bright and prosperous future. For many years the Eastern Star had been a subject of discussion and anticipation by the Daughters, Widows, Wives, Sisters and Mothers of Master Masons in our little Diamond State, apparently waiting only for some one to kindle the fires of enthusiasm. This duty found a resting place in the personage of Mrs. Julia M. Story who for several years had been a member of Augusta Chapter No. 6 of Mannington, West Virginia. I might add that Sister Story's parents were also members of the same Chapter and she will ever cherish tender memories of her dear father who assisted in the pleasant duties at her entrance and initiation into the order. The initial step in behalf of Delaware was apparently taken upon the meeting one day of Sister Story with Col. Enoch Moore and after the usual greetings Sister Story unravelled her pet scheme to the Colonel who in turn gave it hearty and warm approval. The subject again however became latent and so remained for several years or until Sister Story had assembled her forces at the call of a meeting in the home of Col. Enoch Moore, Eighth and Washington Streets on the evening of February 2nd, 1914. The meeting was far beyond the fondest hopes. More than fifty (50) women and men responded to the call, each anxious and willing to be numbered among the first to lay the foundation for the order in Delaware. It was truly a grand success. The Chapter was formed and by a rising vote it was agreed unanimously to name the new organization Delaware Chapter No. 1, Order of the Eastern Star. During the meeting the following officers were unanimously elected.

On March 10th, 1914 in Heptasophs room, Masonic Temple, Delaware Chapter No. 1, Order of the Eastern Star of Wilmington, Delaware was instituted by Mrs. Rata A. Mills, Most Worthy Grand Matron, Order of Eastern Star; George A. Pettigrew, Deputy of the Most Worthy Grand Patron. The ceremonial work was performed by Excelsior Chapter No. 38 of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. 128 Charter Members marked the commencement of Delaware Chapter. Such a beginning has few if any equals, and possibly never excelled. Also nine (9) petitions received on the opening night. After a harmonious and enthusiastic meeting the Chapter closed and refreshments were served.

Julia M. Story, the founder of the Eastern Star in Delaware—the first Worthy Matron of the first Chapter in the first City of the first State and the first Worthy Grand Matron of the first Grand Chapter in Delaware, can truly be called the mother of the Eastern Star in our little Diamond State. She has ever been faithful to her trust—has given her best. Her service to the order will be as an invisible, yet perpetual monument to her memory.

She was a soul of honor everywhere That to ignoble actions scorned to bend True to her trust in friendship's faith she ne'er Forgot a favor or forsook a friend. A Grand Chapter for Delaware was a thought dear to the heart of all Matrons and Patrons past and present, who were interested in the advancement of our beloved Order.

At a meeting of the Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association held at the home of Sister Lillie Schofield Riley, November 11, 1920, a motion was made by Sister Riley, Worthy Matron of Radiant Chapter No. 6, seconded by Brother Frank L. Howard, Past Patron of Delaware Chapter No. 1, that we make application to the Most Worthy Grand Patron of the General Grand Chapter, Dr. Alfred C. McDaniel, for the forming of a Grand Chapter in Delaware.

In due time a letter was received by Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, Secretary, from the Most Worthy Grand Patron and a special meeting of Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association was held at the home of Sister Celia K. Pierson, President, December 29th, 1920, for consideration and action on this letter. All present Matrons and Patrons were invited to attend this meeting. The following are extracts from Dr. McDaniel's letter:

"I want Delaware to have a Grand Chapter just as soon as your Chapters wish it, and think they are ready to take care of it; but there are certain things for you to do to convince me that it is time for a Grand Chapter to be organized. We have no printed blanks on which to make application for a Grand Chapter. Please allow me to make the following suggestion:

When you petition for a Grand Chapter, please send to me at the same time, a copy of your proposed Constistution, Rules and Regulations for the government of the Grand Chapter; and a form of By-Laws for the government of the subordinate Chapters under the new Grand Chapter."

Much valuable advice and many helpful suggestions for this work concluded this letter.

After careful consideration and much discussion, a motion was made and carried that a "committee be appointed to formulate reasons for the Association's wishing a Grand Chapter in Delaware and to submit same to the subordinate chapters to be voted on by the Chapters, they to report the result of the vote to the Association."

Accordingly Sister Celia K. Pierson appointed the following Committee: Sisters Julia M. Story, Nellie W. J. Drake, Amy E. Meyer, Mattie Pyle Horn, Elizabeth Leach and Brothers A. Victor Hughes, Harry T. Hickey and William H. Miller.

This committee reported at the next meeting held March 23, 1921, that the following letter had been sent to all the Chapters in Delaware and replies were read from Delaware No. 1, Adah No. 5, Radiant No. 6, Sussex No. 7, advising in each case that they had voted unanimously for a Grand Chapter in the State.

Letter

February 22, 1921

DEAR SISTERS AND BROTHERS:

The Past Officers of the Order of the Eastern Star feel the time has come to have a Grand Chapter in Delaware. Eight Chapters are working with a membership of over 1,000 people and by having a Grand Chapter in our State many perplexing questions can be more quickly and satisfactorily decided as the people of this jurisdiction are familiar with local conditions and by prompt decisions, the Chapters will be assured of peace and harmony, thereby upholding our pledges made to the General Grand Chapter and live closer to the laws and principles of the Order, that the light of the Eastern Star may shine with greater lustre in our lives and as a Grand Body to work for the good of the Order.

Quoting from our Most Worthy Grand Patron, Dr. Alfred C. McDaniel's letter:—"Have your Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association send a notice to each of your Chapters, setting forth whatever reasons you have to offer to the Chapters that Delaware should now have a Grand Chapter and ask them to give notice to their membership that the question will be considered by the Chapter at their regular meeting. Then after they have decided the question by a majority vote ask them to certify the results to your Association with the signatures of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron and Secretary over the seal of the Chapter.

If two-thirds of the Chapters have voted for a Grand Chapter, then send to me all the original replies from the Chapters, whether for or against, and a copy of the letter which you sent to the Chapters; together with an official application for a Grand Chapter made by your Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association, decided upon at a meeting after replies from the Chapters have been received; said meeting of your Association having been held after a five days written notice has been sent to each of your members and to all Past Matrons and Past Patrons of your Delaware Chapters, whether they have identified themselves with your Association or not.

I expect to recognize as eligible for voice, vote and to hold office in the Grand Chapter all Present and Past Worthy Matrons and Present and Past Worthy Patrons, if present."

We are sending this letter in accordance with Dr. McDaniel's instructions for your decision. Hope your Chapter will give this subject earnest attention and awaiting your early reply, we extend to you Fraternal Greetings.

Sister Celia K. Pierson appointed the following committee to draft a tentative Constitution and By-Laws for our prospective Grand Chapter:-Brother A. Victor Hughes, Chairman, Sisters Louise W. Green, Amy E. Meyer, Mattie Pyle Horn and Elizabeth Leach and Brothers Harry F. Newlin, Harry T. Hickey and William H. Miller.

Sister Amy E. Meyer, newly installed President of the Assoication, appointed Sister Celia K. Pierson an additional member of the Committee to act in an advisory capacity as a Past Officer.

On May 4th a special meeting of the Association was held together with present Matrons and Patrons of the Chapters of Delaware to take action on the tentative Constitution and By-Laws for the government of the proposed Grand Chapter, and to make formal application for a Grand Chapter.

Brother Hughes, Chairman of the Committee submitted the tentative Constitution, Rules and Regulations as drawn by the Committee, and after being well discussed, a motion was made by Brother C. Herbert Neutze, seconded by Sister Mattie Pyle Horn that the Constitution, Rules and Regulations submitted by the Committee be adopted and forwarded to the Most Worthy Grand Patron.

Brother C. Herbert Neutze then moved, and Brother Frank L. Howard seconded the following motion. "In the name of and by direction of the Past Matrons and Past Patrons and Present Matrons and Present Patrons of the Chapters of the Order of the Eastern Star of Delaware present, we hereby make formal application for a Charter for a Grand Chapter for the State of Delaware. This motion was adopted and signed by the following:

A copy of the tentative Constitution, Rules and Regulations and copy of the letter sent to all the Chapters in Delaware, and replies to same together with the formal application for a Grand Chapter signed as above were sent to Dr. McDaniel, by the newly elected Secretary, Sister Lillie Schofield Riley. All Chapters in Delaware voted to have a Grand Chapter.

After carefully reviewing the Constitution submitted to him, Dr. Mc-Daniel, M. W. Grand Patron, asked that a meeting of all present and Past Matrons and Patrons be arranged for June eleventh. Accordingly there assembled in the Julia M. Story Chapter Room, Odd Fellows Building, Wilmington the following representatives from six of the eight Chapters.

Dr. McDaniel introduced to the Sisters and Brothers, Brother Philip A. Jerguson, Past Grand Patron of Massachusetts and Worthy Grand Sentinel of the General Grand Chapter who gave an interesting short talk on the work the Most Worthy Grand Patron was trying to do.

The Constitution submitted did not appeal to Dr. McDaniel as being the best that Delaware could have and he therefore suggested that a small committee be appointed from the floor to work with him to draft one which would more fully meet the needs of this Jurisdiction.

Accordingly Brother A. Victor Hughes, Sisters Julia M. Story, Amy E. Meyer and Brother Harvey T. Smith were nominated and unanimously elected, the secretary being authorized to give the casting vote.

Dr. McDaniel spoke of a letter which was to be sent out shortly by the General Grand Chapter to all Chapters of the Order of the Eastern Star concerning Extraneous Degree Organizations, the most prominent being the White Shrine of Jerusalem and the Amaranth. He discussed this matter quite fully and frankly and after an open discussion by Sisters and Brothers present, the following motion was made and carried: "I move the adoption of a clause in the Constitution of the Grand Chapter of Delaware prohibiting members of the Order of the Eastern Star in this State from affiliating with such Extraneous Degree Organizations using the Order of the Eastern Star as basis for their membership under penalty of forfeiture of any elective office in this Grand Chapter or any Subordinate Chapter."

The following day was devoted by Dr. McDaniel and the committee to drawing up a new Constitution, Rules and Regulations which more nearly met the requirements of the Most Worthy Grand Patron.

This Constitution, Rules and Regulations was brought before the Present and Past Worthy Matrons and Patrons at meetings held during the summer months, and after being adopted by them was forwarded to Dr. McDaniel for his approval. This was voiced in a letter received by the Association late in September and on October 8th, a special meeting of all officers, present and past, was called for the purpose of discussing plans for the organization of the Grand Chapter. It was decided that the Executive Committee of the Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association and all Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons act as a General Committee of Arrangements for the Organization of the Grand Chapter of Delaware. Sister Amy E. Meyer was elected General Chairman of this Committee and Sister Lillie Schofield Riley, Secretary.

The Committee secured the use of the Julia M. Story Chapter room for the Monday day and evening Sessions, the Chapter opening and closing in short form and transacting only extremely necessary business in order to accommodate those organizing the Grand Chapter. Mizpah Chapter No. 2 gave the use of their room in the same manner on Tuesday for day and evening sessions, the newly elected first board of Grand officers being installed in that room. The Daughters of Rebecca served delicious lunches in the banquet hall Monday and Tuesday to all who were attending the sessions, Sister Julia M. Story being in charge.

Realizing that this was the last Grand Chapter to be organized by the General Grand Chapter in the United States, the General Committee of Arrangements caused to be printed and mailed invitations to this important event in the history of the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware to all General Grand Chapter officers, all Past Most Worthy Grand Matrons and Patrons, and all Worthy Grand Matrons and Worthy Grand Patrons. Responses to these invitations were read at the session of the Grand Chapter.

Stausebach were appointed by the General Chairman to prepare a program to be used the evening of the Installation of Officers. Sister Mattie Pyle Horn arranged a delicious Roast Chicken Dinner at McConnell's for the members of the Grand Chapter to be, General Grand Chapter Officers and other distinguished guests.

The final meeting of this General Committee of Arrangements was held at the home of the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Julia M. Story, November 23, 1921, Sister Amy E. Meyer, Presiding.

Reports of the various sub-Chairmen were read and accepted and letters of thanks and appreciation were sent to Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3 and Mizpah Chapter No. 2 for the use of their rooms; to Sister Elizabeth Williams, Worthy Grand Matron of Maryland for the use of the Grand Chapter Jewels, and to George Carson Boyd for the use of one and one-half dozen palms.

The eight chapters in the State contributed \$210.00 toward the expenses of the Organization of the Grand Chapter, and after all bills were paid, the balance \$58.99 was given to the Grand Chapter.

There being no further business, the work we were elected to do having been completed, the Committee upon motion adjourned sine die.

ORGANIZATION

OF THE

GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR

The convention for the formation of a Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star in the State of Delaware, opened at ten o'clock A. M., on Monday, November 14th, 1921, in the City of Wilmington. Most Worthy Grand Patron, Alfred C. McDaniel, of the General Grand Chapter, presided, and made the following appointments:

Sister Minnie E. Keyes, Right Worthy Grand Secretary, to act as Secretary of the Convention.

(Sister Jean G. Hubert, acting as Assistant).

Sister Ruth A. Neutze, Conductress of Delaware Chapter No. 1, to vouch for the eligibility of those present.

Sister Jane E. Robinson, Secretary of Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, to act as Warder.

Brother Philip A. Jurgeson, Worthy Grand Sentinel, of West Medford, Massachusetts, to act as Reading Medium for consideration of the proposed Constitution and By-Laws.

Brother Frank L. Howard, Past Patron of Delaware Chapter No. 1, made the opening prayer, which was most appropriately expressed.

The following guests were escorted to the East, introduced, and given Grand Honors.

Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Ellie Lines Chapin, escorted by Sister M. Etta Keys, Worthy Matron of Delaware Chapter No. 1, Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Minnie E. chosen from the Past Matrons and Past Patrons of Delaware, in conference with the M. W. G. P. Doctor Alfred C. McDaniel, was then considered, section by section, and with few changes and addit ons which were noted on the manuscript, and which will appear on the printed copies, was adopted.

Articles 1, 2, and 3, with their various sections, and article 4, sections 1 and 2, were read and adopted when the convention adjourned until one-thirty o'clock. A delicious luncheon was served in the building by the ladies of the Rebecca Lodge. Promptly at one-thirty o'clock the convention was called to order by the Most Worthy Grand Patron. Roll call by the Secretary showed twenty-eight delegates present. Section 3, of Article 4, was taken up and the various sections under that article, acted upon. At this time, Past Grand Matron, Sister Cora P. Mayberry of the District of Columbia, was escorted to the East by Sister Josephine E. Miller, Worthy Matron of Sussex Chapter No. 7, introduced and given Grand Honors. Further consideration of the constitution was resumed, and the remainder of the constitution acted upon.

Following this, the consideration of the rules and regulations for the government of the Grand Chapter, were read, discussed, acted upon section by section, and adopted.

Then followed the consideration of the Rules and Regulations for the Government of Subordinate Chapters, which continued until convention was called off for dinner to resume work at eight-fifteen that evening. The evening session was called to order by the Most Worthy Grand Patron, and the roll call showed thirty-six voting delegates present as follows:

The convention adjourned to meet at two P. M. Tuesday, November 15th, following a luncheon which was again served by the ladies of the Naomi Lodge of Rebeccas.

Tuesday afternoon, two P. M., the meeting was called to order by the Most Worthy Grand Patron. Sister Louise Green, Past Matron of Delaware Chapter No. 1, vouched for all present as members of the Order. The presence of other distinguished guests made the occasion more enjoyable, and at this time Sister Eleanor D. Frohman of Ohio, was escorted to the East by Sister Celia K. Pierson, where she was introduced and given Grand Honors. Sister Margaret Alexander, Associate Grand Matron of Pennsylvania, escorted by Sister Laura V. McKay, was cordially welcomed and introduced. Sister Minnie A. Korb, Grand Chaplain of Maryland, and Sister Georgia L. Geddes, of Baltimore, were escorted by Sister Amy E. Meyer, Brother Joseph Alexander, Worthy Patron of Covenant Chapter, O. E. S. of Philadelphia, Sisters Kate L. Lynch and Anna L. Loos, Past Matrons of Chester, Pennsylvania, were escorted by Sister Mattie Pyle Horn. These guests were welcomed and introduced by the Most Worthy Grand Patron. Delightful and inspiring remarks were made by the Grand Matron of Ohio, who was obliged to leave at this time. She drew a comparison between the eight chapters in Delaware

That the Grand Trustees in conjunction with the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary be empowered to have the printing and other necessary expenses paid."

The Grand Matron elect, the Grand Patron elect, the officers elect, and the members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, declaring that there was no further business to be considered, the Most Worthy Grand Patron called a recess to prepare for the ceremony of installation. CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

OF THE

GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE

ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR

ORGANIZATION
of the
GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE
Order of the Eastern Star

WILMINGTON, DELAWARE, NOVEMBER 14, 1921

This convention is called by the Most Worthy Grand Patron of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, Brother Alfred C. McDaniel, and is composed of Present and Past Worthy Matrons and Present and Past Worthy Patrons of Delaware Chapter No. 1, Mizpah Chapter No. 2, Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, St. John's Chapter No. 4, Adah Chapter No. 5, Radiant Chapter No. 6, Sussex Chapter No. 7, and Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8, Order of the Eastern Star, all of which Chapters are located in the State of Delaware.

The purpose of this convention is to organize the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star. The above named Chapters have been legally constituted and chartered by the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, and it is hereby understood and agreed that the Grand Chapter of Delaware now about to be organized is to accept and recognize the above Chapters as such, and to allow each of them to retain their present original charter, issued by the General Grand Chapter, names, members and locations as their authority for existence and work under the newly organized Grand Chapter of Delaware.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I.

Name

SECTION 1. This Grand Chapter shall be known as the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star.

• SEC. 2. Seal. It shall have a seal consisting of a dotted circle within a ring; between the ring and circle shall be the words, "GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE, ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR. Organized November 14, 1921." In the center of the circle shall be a five-pointed star with the letters F-A-T-A-L between the points of the star. The star shall enclose a pentagon in the center of which shall be the Coat-of-Arms of the State of Delaware.

ARTICLE II.

Qualifications for Membership in the Order of the Eastern Star

Section 1. Affiliated Master Masons, their wives, daughters, legally adopted daughters, mothers, widows, sisters and half-sisters, who shall have attained the age of eighteen years, are eligible to membership in the Order of the Eastern Star.

- SEC. 2. No Eastern Star member shall be eligible to any office or committee appointment in any subordinate chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction or in this Grand Chapter who is, or shall hereafter become a member of any order, organization or society which takes membership in the Order of the Eastern Star as the basis or prerequisite for their membership, or uses the name of the Order of the Eastern Star in any manner whatever, and that any member of this Grand Jurisdiction who hereafter joins any order, organization or society which takes Eastern Star membership as the basis of its membership or uses the name of the Order of the Eastern Star in any manner whatsoever, shall be expelled from the Order of the Eastern Star. The above shall not prevent any person who is now an officer in any subordinate Chapter from completing the term for which they have been installed.
- SEC. 3. Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons, and Past Matrons and Past Patrons Associations are not in conflict with the spirit or intention of the above laws; provided, that such associations limit their activities to unadvertised social entertainments for their members only, and do not engage in any charitable or financial work, because such activities are the prerogatives of the Chapters of the Order of the Eastern Star. These associations shall not ballot for membership because any Matron or Patron having retired from the

presiding offices of the Chapters, or Grand Matrons and Grand Patrons of this Grand Chapter are automatically eligible to membership. These associations being purely social should not have ritualistic ceremonies; but only such initiation as is informal and mostly impromptu for the purposes of entertainment.

ARTICLE III.

Powers and Prerogatives of the Grand Chapter

SECTION 1. This Grand Chapter declares its allegiance to the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. It will use only the Ritual. Signet and Labyrinth promulgated by the General Grand Chapter and will conform to its Constitution and Laws and will make an annual assessment of two cents per capita for the support of the General Grand Chapter, if requested by that body to do so; but this Grand Chapter being supreme in all matters pertaining to its internal affairs, in so far as they do not conflict with Ritual. Constitution and Laws of the General Grand Chapter, has the sole right to superintend and govern all Chapters of the Order within the State of Delaware. It has the power to grant Charters, for forming and holding new Chapters, and to extend and revoke the same; to censure, or suspend Chapters; to enact laws, rules and regulations, issue edicts, and amend or appeal the same; to discipline Chapters for wilful violation or infringement of the Ritual or of the Constitution, regulations, edicts, or proprieties of this Grand Chapter; to decide appeals from subordinate Chapters or members; to assess and collect from the several constituent Chapters such fees and sums as these laws require, or as this Grand Chapter may from time to time order; and to exercise all the rights of sovereignty within the limits of its jurisdiction, subject to the Ritual and the provisions of its own Constitution. All powers not specially delegated to subordinate Chapters are inherent in and reserved to this Grand Chapter.

The above shall not be retroactive.

ARTICLE IV.

Qualifications for Office

Section 1. The Officers of this Grand Chapter shall consist of a-

- Sec. 2. There shall also be a Board of three Grand Instructors and a Board of three Grand Trustees.
- SEC. 3. The membership of this Grand Chapter shall consist of the foregoing officers who hold until their successors have been elected and installed; the above Boards; all Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons as shall have presided over a duly constituted Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, provided they are affiliated with some subordinate Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, all Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons and all Associate Matrons while in office who have been installed (or their legally appointed proxies) of chartered Chapters, under this Grand Jurisdiction. The Associate Matrons cannot appoint proxies or hold any office or any committee appointment in this Grand Chapter. The Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons and proxy's official characters must be certified to by their respective Chapters under seal.
- SEC. 4. Each officer and member of this Grand Chapter must be an affiliated member of a subordinate Chapter under this jurisdiction. With the loss of such membership shall cease her or his office and membership in this Grand Chapter.
- SEC. 5. The only persons entitled to appoint proxies are the Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of subordinate Chapters within this jurisdiction.
- Sec. 6. A proxy must be an affiliated Present or Past Matron or Present or Past Patron or Associate Matron of the same Chapter whose officer or officers she or he represents.
- SEC. 7. The first eight officers above named shall be elected annually. The Grand Matron shall appoint all other officers. The members of the first Board of Grand Instructors and Board of Grand Trustees shall be elected for terms of one, two and three years, respectively. After the first election these board members shall be elected for a three-year term. (Term of three years).
- SEC. 8. Beginning with the Grand Chapter Session of 1922, no person except Grand Treasurer shall be installed as an elective officer in this Grand Chapter, and no member of the Board of Grand Instructors can serve unless she or he holds a certificate of proficiency from the Board of Grand Instructors in the secret work, initiatory work of the Ritual, the Constitution, Rules and Regulations of this Grand Chapter and fundamental Parliamentary Laws.
- SEC. 9. All members of this Grand Chapter shall be eligible to any office within its gift, except as otherwi e provided; and provided that no member may be elected or appointed to fill two Grand Chapter offices, except as a Special Deputy, Fraternal Correspondent, or on a special committee.

ARTICLE V.

Meetings

Section 1. The Annual meeting of this Grand Chapter shall be held in the City of Wilmington on the Third Wednesday of May at two o'clock, P. M.

SEC. 2. Special Meetings. Special Meetings may be called by the Worthy Grand Matron, with the concurrence of the Worthy Grand Patron, at such time and place as in their judgment the interest of the Order may require; provided that every Chapter in this Grand Jursidiction shall be notified at least fifteen days prior thereto, and no business shall be transacted at such meetings except that specified in the "call". The Worthy Grand Matron, with the concurrence of the Worthy Grand Patron, may call a meeting of the Grand Chapter instanter in cases of extraordinary emergency.

ARTICLE VI.

Representatives and Proxies

SEC. 1. Past Worthy Matron and Past Worthy Patrons have one personal vote each. A Worthy Matron who is also a Past Worthy Matron has one vote. A Worthy Matron who is a Past Worthy Matron and holds the proxy of the Worthy Patron has two votes. A Worthy Matron holding the proxy of the Worthy Patron has two votes. A Past Worthy Matron who holds the proxies of both the Worthy Matron and the Worthy Patron has three votes. The same rule applies conversely to the Worthy Patron and Associate Matron. No one shall cast more than three votes. Representatives of Chapters in arrears for dues shall not vote unless so ordered by two thirds vote of the delegates present in the Grand Chapter. No Chapter under Dispensation shall have the right of representation in this Grand Chapter until after the Grand Chapter votes to give them a Charter, after which the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, and Associate Matron, if present, shall have all the privileges of membership in the Grand Chapter, not in conflict with these laws.

ARTICLE VII.

Quorum

Section 1. Representatives, or their proxies regularly appointed, of five Subordinate Chapters under the Jurisdiction of this Grand Chapter, and one of the first four elective officers, shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VIII.

Election and Installation of Officers

SECTION 1. The election of Officers of the Grand Chapter shall begin at 2 o'clock P. M., Thursday of the meeting week. The election shall be by a

majority vote on a separate, secret written ballot, and if there are more than three candidates for the same office, the name of the one receiving the lowest number of votes cast shall be dropped after third ballot is announced. Blank ballots shall not be counted. If the votes tie for the two lowest candidates then all shall be voted on again, unless one candidate has received a majority of all votes cast. No nominations for candidates for office shall be made.

- SEC. 2. The installation shall not take place until after all other business of the Grand Chapter has been completed and may be either public or closed, as the Grand Chapter may decide.
- Sec. 3. No officer shall officiate in her or his station until regularly installed, and no regularly installed Grand Officer shall be deprived or relieved of any of the prerogatives or duties of that office without her or his consent, except in case such officer has been suspended by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron.
- Sec. 4. **Installing Privileges.** It shall be the prerogative of the retiring Worthy Grand Matron to install all of the incoming Grand Officers, or to delegate this duty to some General Grand Chapter Officer, or to some Present or Past Worthy Grand Matron or Present or Past Worthy Grand Patron.

ARTICLE IX.

DUTIES AND PREROGATIVES OF GRAND OFFICERS

Worthy Grand Matron

SECTION 1. The Worthy Grand Matron shall possess all the powers and prerogatives conferred by the Ritual, land-marks, laws and usages of the Order, viz:

- (1) She shall open and preside at all sessions of the Grand Chapter, or request the Worthy Grand Patron to preside.
- (2) She shall appoint all committees on behalf of the Grand Chapter unless otherwise provided.
- (3) She shall be a member ex-officio of the Board of Grand Instructors, and shall see that the Ritual, laws, rules and regulations of the Order are strictly enforced, and its dignity maintained under any and all circumstances.
- (4) She shall have direction and supervision over all the Grand Officers with the exception of the Worthy Grand Patron, in the discharge of their respective duties in accordance with the Ritual and this Constitution and Laws, and may require the advice and assistance of any or every Grand Officer at any or at all times.
- (5) She shall sign all voucher checks drawn on the Grand Treasurer in accordance with these laws.

- (6) She shall decide all questions of law, custom or usage, submitted to her by any of the Grand Officers, or Elective Officers of Subordinate Chapters or Chapters under seal or of any member appealing from a decision of the Chapter, and report same to the Grand Chapter; and until the next session of the Grand Chapter such decisions shall have the force of law, but not longer, unless approved by the Grand Chapter.
- (7) She shall, in conjunction with the Worthy Grand Patron, sign all Charters for subordinate Chapters, and the Charters shall be delivered by the Worthy Grand Matron or her Deputy at the time the Chapters are constituted.
- (8) She shall have the power to grant special dispensations for all purposes which in her judgment may seem expedient or correct and in accordance with these laws, except to Chapters under Dispensation.
- (9) She may convene a Subordinate Chapter at any time, preside therein in person or by Deputy, inspect its proceedings and work, and require conformity to the Ritual, laws, rules and regulations of this Grand Chapter; provided, that no Chapter shall be convened on Sunday except for memorial or funeral purposes.
- (10) She may suspend the Worthy Matron, the Worthy Patron, or any other officer from office in a subordinate Chapter, withdraw or suspend the charter of a Chapter, or withdraw the Dispensation of a Chapter under Dispensation, only with the written advice and consent of the Worthy Grand Patron; but in all cases where an officer is suspended or disciplined, or a charter arrested, or a dispensation withdrawn, she shall report fully her reasons for such action at the next Annual Session of the Grand Chapter. Such suspension shall not extend beyond her term of office unless the Grand Chapter shall so direct. She shall report all her official acts and make all necessary recommendation to the Grand Chapter for its approval or disapproval.
- (11) During the recess of the Grand Chapter she shall exercise its executive powers, and her authority shall be supreme in all matters as set forth in our laws; she may call upon the Worthy Grand Patron for assistance or advice at any time.
- (12) She may appoint such Special Deputies as in her judgment are needed for the growth and extension of the Order, or whose appointments may be required for the proper transaction of the business of the Grand Chapter, or of subordinate Chapters, including the appointment of deputies to preside at trials, when deemed expedient by her or when requested to do so, provided such special Deputies are voting members of this Grand Chapter. In the appointment of such Special Deputies she shall definitely prescribe their powers and duties, which shall not be in conflict with this Constitution and these laws, and their commissions shall expire after said duties have been performed. A special Deputy may act without having a certificate from the Board of Grand Instructors except they cannot organize or instruct Chapters.

- (13) She may appoint Grand Representatives for Delaware near other Grand Chapters, and recommend the appointment of Grand Representatives from other Grand Jurisdictions near the Grand Chapter of Delaware. The first set of Grand Representatives shall be appointed for one-third of the Grand Chapters for one year, the second set for one-third of the Grand Chapters for two years, and the third set for the last one-third of the Grand Chapters for three years and after that for a three year term. Only voting members of this Grand Chapter are eligible to appointment as Grand Representatives.
- (14) She shall be provided with an official seal with which she shall authenticate all official documents issued by her. Any document not so authenticated shall be deemed her individual and not her official act. Such seal shall be the Badge of her office surrounded by the words "Worthy Grand Matron of Delaware," and shall be sufficient authentication of circular letters sent to Chapters by the Worthy Grand Matron.
- (15) She shall receive no salary, but such sum as may be deemed necessary shall be appropriated at each Grand Chapter Session to defray her traveling and office expenses. She shall make an itemized report annually to the Grand Chapter of her expenses.
- (16) In all cases where the Worthy Grand Matron leaves the State she shall place her office in the hands of the Associate Grand Matron. In case both are absent at the same time the office shall be placed in charge of the Worthy Grand Patron, who shall possess all the powers and perform the duties of Worthy Grand Matron during the absence of such officers.

Worthy Grand Patron

SEC. 2. The Worthy Grand Patron shall assist and advise the Worthy Grand Matron in the discharge of her duties. He shall preside at the Grand Chapter sessions whenever called upon to do so by the Worthy Grand Matron; and in the absence of both the Worthy Grand Matron and Associate Grand Matron, he shall call the Grand Chapter to order and appoint some Past Worthy Grand Matron present to act as Worthy Grand Matron pro tem. He shall sign in conjunction with the Worthy Grand Matron all charters granted and issued to Chapters by the Grand Chapter. He shall individually issue all dispensations to institute new Chapters, and institute same either in person or by a deputy who must be a Present or Past Patron, and render all decisions for chapters while under dispensation. He shall discipline insubordinate Chapters, officers or members only with the written advice and consent of the Worthy Grand Matron. If both the Worthy Grand Matron and Associate Grand Matron are absent from the State, he shall perform the duties of the Worthy Grand Matron. He shall have a Grand Patrons seal, to consist of the badge of his office surrounded by the words "Worthy Grand Patron of Delaware," and affix same to all official documents.

Associate Grand Matron

SEC. 3. The Associate Grand Matron shall assist the Worthy Grand Matron and in case of her absence or disability shall discharge the duties of the Worthy Grand Matron. In case of the death of the Worthy Grand Matron she shall become Acting Worthy Grand Matron for the remainder of the year; this however does not create her a Past Worthy Grand Matron. She shall be the Fraternal Correspondent, and shall review the Proceedings of other Grand Chapter and report to this Grand Chapter all matters of interest. For her compensation and expenses she shall receive such sums as the Board of Grand Trustees and the Grand Chapter approve annually.

Associate Grand Patron

SEC. 4. The Associate Grand Patron shall assist the Worthy Grand Patron, and in case of his absence or disability shall discharge the duties of Worthy Grand Patron. In case of the death of the Worthy Grand Patron he shall become the Acting Worthy Grand Patron for the remainder of the year; this however does not create him a Past Worthy Grand Patron.

Grand Secretary

- SEC. 5. (1) **Proceedings.** The Grand Secretary shall record all the transactions of the Grand Chapter proper to be published, and shall superintend such publication, which shall be made within ninety days after adjournment of the Grand Chapter; provided, that the retiring Worthy Grand Matron and retiring Worthy Grand Patron shall be empowered to superintend the editing of the Proceedings of their term of office, assisted by the Grand Secretary.
- (2) Care of Property. The Grand Secretary shall receive, duly file and safely keep all papers, books, documents, paraphernalia and other properties of the Grand Chapter, unless otherwise provided in these laws. Grand Officers shall have possession of the Jewels of their office during their term of service, shall give to the Grand Secretary a receipt and be held financially responsible for same.
- (3) Correspondence. She shall, under the direction of the Grand Chapter and the Worthy Grand Matron, conduct all correspondence of the Grand Chapter, including the issuance of circulars, memorials, invitations, programs and notices of special meetings to each Chapter, Grand Officer, Past Worthy Grand Matron and Past Worthy Grand Patron in this Grand Jurisdiction.
- (4) **Seal.** She shall keep a seal of the Grand Chapter and affix the same with attestations to all instruments emanating from the Grand Chapter.
- (5) Receipts and Disbursements. She shall collect all moneys due the Grand Chapter and keep a correct account thereof in books prescribed for that purpose. She shall make monthly remittances of all funds to the

Grand Treasurer taking her receipt therefor, and report at each annual meeting a detailed account of all moneys received during the year, with a statement showing whence derived, together with the receipts of the Grand Treasurer. She shall issue voucher checks on the Grand Treasurer, which voucher checks shall also be signed by the Worthy Grand Matron and Grand Treasurer.

- (6) **Reports.** She shall report at each annual meeting of the Grand Chapter all Chapters in arrears for dues, or which have failed or neglected to comply with any of the provisions of this Constitution with respect to matters coming within the duties of her office.
- (7) Supplies. She shall purchase and keep on hand such supplies as are needed by the Grand and Subordinate Chapters, paying for the same by a voucher check, signed by the Grand Secretary, Worthy Grand Matron and Grand Treasurer. She shall sell all such supplies to subordinate Chapters in the name and for the benefit of this Grand Chapter, except that not later than January first of each year she shall furnish free to each Subordinate Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction duplicate forms upon which to make returns of the year's work, and blanks upon which to report to her the names of the officers installed annually, said returns to be in the hands of Grand Secretary not later than February 15th of each year, and also furnish free of charge to the Board of Grand Instructors all necessary blanks and certificates for members who pass examinations. She shall examine all returns and see that they are correct or made so if possible.
- (8) **Bond.** She shall execute and file with the Chairman of the Grand Trustees within thirty days after installation, an official bond, to be furnished by a solvent and satisfactory guaranty company authorized to transact business in Delaware, in such sum as the Grand Trustees may from time to time require, conditioned upon the faithful discharge of the duties of her office, as prescribed by the Constitution; the premium for said bond to be paid by this Grand Chapter.
- (9) Office. She shall maintain a suitable office, equipped with every facility to transact the business of the Grand Chapter. The office shall be furnished under the direction of the Grand Trustees and be conveniently located in the home city of the Grand Secretary, unless this Grand Chapter by vote shall order it to be located elsewhere. The expense of furnishing and if necessary the rent, shall be borne by this Grand Chapter.
- (10) Identification and Receipts for Dues in Card Form. She shall furnish the Chapters with identification and receipts for dues in card form, which shall be printed in different colors yearly, for which Chapters shall pay the list price.
- (11) Meetings. She shall attend all meetings of the Grand Chapter Officers and Committees, when requested to do so by the Worthy Grand Matron, with the books and necessary papers belonging to her office.

(12) Salary. The Grand Secretary shall receive as full compensation for her services such sums as the Board of Grand Trustees recommend and the Grand Chapter approve annually. Such compensation is to include the entire amount expended for services in the Grand Secretary's office during the year. This Grand Chapter shall pay five (\$5.00) dollars per day to a competent stenographer for her services during the session of this Grand Chapter, said stenographer to be a member of the Order in good standing.

Grand Treasurer

- SEC. 6. (1) Bond. The Grand Treasurer shall execute and file with the Chairman of the Board of Grand Trustees within thirty days after her installation, an official bond, to be furnished by a solvent and satisfactory guaranty company authorized to transact business in Delaware, such company to be approved by the Board of Grand Trustees and the bond to be in such sum as the Board of Grand Trustees may from time to time require; conditioned upon the faithful discharge of the duties of the office as prescribed in this Constitution. The premium for said bond to be paid by this Grand Chapter.
- (2) Monies, Receipts and Disbursements. The Grand Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the Grand Chapter from the Grand Secretary. She shall give a receipt for all moneys paid to her and keep an accurate account thereof in appropriate books. She shall pay all voucher checks drawn upon such funds and under such regulations as the Grand Chapter may direct and these laws provide.
- (3) Meeting and Reports. She shall report at each annual session a detailed statement of all receipts and disbursements, with proper voucher check for the latter, and a statement of the finances of the Grand Chapter. She shall attend meetings of the Grand Chapter Officers and Committees, whenever required by the Worthy Grand Matron, with books and papers pertaining to her office, and also, when requested by the Worthy Grand Matron, shall attend with the books and papers, upon any committee which may be appointed to act with relation to the fiscal concerns of this Grand Chapter.
- (4) **Depositing Funds.** She shall deposit all funds coming into her hands in one or more National or State Banks, or Trust Companies, to be approved by the Grand Trustees in the name of the "Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star Grand Treasurer." All voucher checks issued on said bank, or banks, or trust companies, in payment of bills shall be signed by her as Grand Treasurer, and also signed by the Grand Secretary and the Worthy Grand Matron.
- (5) Salary. The Grand Treasurer shall receive as full compensation for her services such sums as the Board of Grand Trustees and the Grand Chapter approve annually.

Closing Books of Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer

Sec. 7. The Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer shall close their books on the 30th day of April each year, and all business transacted after the above period shall be applied to the incoming Eastern Star year.

Board of Grand Instructors

- SEC. 8. (1) It shall be the duty of the Board of Grand Instructors to elect annually from their members a Chairman and Secretary, to visit each Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction and instruct its officers and members in the correct performance of their duties.
- (2) They shall issue to any member of this Grand Jurisdiction who passes a satisfactory oral examination a certificate of proficiency in two classes as follows:
- (A) In the Landmarks, Opening and Closing Ceremonies, the Secret Work, Initiation as per Ritual, Constitution, Rules and Regulations and Fundamental Parliamentary laws.
 - (B) Proficiency in Secret Work only.

Board of Grand Trustees

- SEC. 9. The Grand Trustees shall examine the books and accounts of all the Grand Officers and Committees. They shall report the actual conditions of the finances of the Grand Chapter, consider all propositions and resolutions affecting the revenues and expenses of the Grand Chapter and report thereon with such recommendations as in their judgment will be for the financial benefit of the Grand Chapter, and perform such other duties as are provided for in this Constitution and Laws.
- (2) They shall select suitable depositories to be used by the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer for the Grand Chapter funds.
- (3) The chairman of the said Board shall be the custodian of the bonds of the Grand Secretary and the Grand Treasurer.
- (4) They shall each year before the Grand Chapter session purchase Past Worthy Grand Matron and Past Worthy Grand Patron Jewels to be presented to said officers upon their retirement as a token of the Grand Chapter's appreciation of their services rendered. This jewel shall be designed by the first Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and Chairman of this Board and shall always thereafter be of these same designs, provided that the first Worthy Grand Matron's Jewel shall cost not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and the Jewel of the first Worthy Grand Patron shall cost not to exceed thirty-five dollars (\$35.00).

Remaining Grand Officers

SEC. 10. The remaining officers shall perform such duties as are appropriate to their several stations, or which may be assigned to them from time to time by the Worthy Grand Matron.

Exemplification of Work

SEC. 11. The Grand Officers shall on the first night of the annual meeting exemplify the work of conferring the degrees on a member of the Order.

ARTICLE X

Secret Work

- Section 1. This Grand Chapter shall use the Ritual, Secret Work Signet and labyrinth promulgated by the General Grand Chapter.
- SEC. 2. Must not be written. The Secret Work must not be written and must not be read during the conferring of degrees.
- SEC. 3. The degrees cannot be conferred outside of the regular Chapter room unless by dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, nor as a side degree.
- SEC. 4. The obligation at initiation must be given by the Worthy Grand Patron, the Worthy Patron, or any affiliated brother of the Order.
- SEC. 5. Any member of the Order can procure a Ritual from the Secretary of the Chapter. Only members of this Order should be in possession of the Rituals and they must never be placed in the hands of others.

ARTICLE XI

Returns

Section 1. Abstract. Each Chartered Chapter shall have prepared by its retiring Secretary immediately after the election of its officers each year an abstract of the work of the Chapter for the year ending December thirty-first. This abstract shall show the names of all the members, the number initiated, dimitted, suspended, expelled or deceased, setting out the names in alphabetical order, making a distinction in sex and between women by prefixing Miss or Mrs.

The above abstract shall be handed to the installing officer on the day of installation, whose duty it shall be to have a list of the officers installed, written on the face of the same, which shall be certified to by the installing officer as correct, and be forwarded to the Grand Secretary by the incoming Secretary of the local Chapter; and it shall be unlawful for any person to install the officers of any chartered Chapter unless such abstract has been pre-

pared as aforesaid. The Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron elect shall not be installed into office until the installing officer is satisfied they are qualified by showing a Certificate of Proficiency, in the Secret Work, from the Board of Grand Instructors.

- SEC. 2. Money Forwarded. The incoming Secretary of each Subordinate Chapter shall forward to the Grand Secretary with the above mentioned report, all money due the Grand Chapter, up to and including December 31st of each year, according to the rates hereinafter specified.
- SEC. 3. Penalty for Failure. Any Chapter failing to make such reports and pay Grand Chapter dues for two consecutive years, shall forfeit its charter by a majority vote of the Grand Chapter, and it is hereby made the duty of the Grand Secretary to report such delinquents to the Grand Chapter at each annual meeting.

ARTICLE XII

Instituting New Chapters

- SECTION 1. Number required for New Chapter. New Chapters shall be instituted with not less than twenty charter members; and not more than thirty; provided, that no new Chapter shall be formed in any town or city where one or more Chapters exist, except on petition of not less than twenty affiliated members of the Order living within the jurisdiction of said Chapter.
- SEC. 2. Naming Chapters. No Chapter shall be named after any living person and the first Chapter organized in a town or city shall be named for that town or city.
- SEC. 3. Numbers of demised Chapters. The number of a demised Chapter shall only be given to a revived or newly organized Chapter in the same town or city.

ARTICLE XIII

Chapters Under Dispensation

- Section 1. Rights. Chapters under Dispensation shall have all the rights of chartered Chapters, except representation in the Grand Chapter.
- SEC. 2. Liabilities. Chapters working under dispensation shall pay to the Grand Chapter the specified amount of per capita dues to the Grand Chapter on the Charter member list and on the initiated and affiliated members, provided the Chapter from which they are dimitted has not paid their per capita for the current year.
- SEC. 3. Forfeiture of Charter Membership. A petitioner for a charter must be present at the time the chapter is instituted, or shall forfeit such right and her or his name shall be erased from the charter list.

SEC. 4. If Charter is Not Granted. In case a charter is not granted, a member of a Chapter under dispensation is entitled to a Grand Dimit as elsewhere provided in these laws. Said Grand Dimit to be valid for only one year.

ARTICLE XIV

Fees

SECTION 1. The minimum fee for initiation in this Grand jurisdiction shall be five (\$5.00) dollars, but each chapter may provide in its By-laws for any larger amount that it may wish.

ARTICLE XV

Amendments

SECTION 1. Manner. No Amendment to this Constitution either by alteration or addition shall be made unless in the following manner.

- SEC. 2. First Hearing. The amendment proposed must be presented in writing at an annual meeting, and after being heard, discussed and if so ordered, amended, and if it is then approved by a majority of the votes present, it shall be entered on record and printed in the Proceedings as amended.
- SEC. 3. Second Hearing. At the next annual meeting it shall be read in full and if so ordered amended, and if two-thirds of the members present and voting vote in its favor, the amendment shall be recorded as part of this Constitution.

Repealing Clause

SECTION 1. All constitutional provisions not included in this Constitution are hereby repealed.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF THE GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE, ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR

ARTICLE I.

Meetings

Section 1. Stated Annual Sessions. At the stated annual session of the Grand Chapter the Worthy Grand Matron shall take the chair at two o'clock P. M.; see that the Grand Stations are properly filled and open the Grand Chapter in regular form, after having ascertained that there is a quorum present.

- SEC. 2. Announcement of Committees. The Worthy Grand Matron shall immediately after the opening of the Grand Chapter fill all vacancies and announce the following standing committees:
 - (1) Credentials
 - (2) Unfinished Business
 - (3) Chapters Under Dispensation and Charters
 - (4) Jurisprudence
 - (5) Grievances and Appeals
 - (6) Necrology

filling vacancies arising from death, absence or otherwise, from the members present; each committee to consist of three members. Credentials, Jurisprudence, Grievances and Appeals shall serve for a term of three (3) years; the Worthy Grand Matron elected in 1921 shall appoint the original three (3) members of these committees; one for one (1), two (2), and three (3) years respectively, one member shall retire each year, and the incoming Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint her or his successor; the committee shall then elect its own chairman for that year. All appointments on above committees shall cease at the close of the Grand Chapter, except Credentials, Jurisprudence and Grievances and Appeals.

- SEC. 3. Eligibility. Any member of the Grand Chapter shall be eligible to appointment on any committee, except that an interested or aggrieved member shall be disqualified to act upon the committee on Grievances and Appeals, or Jurisprudence in her or his own particular case.
- SEC. 4. Right of Challenge. An interested party can challenge an appointment on the Grievances and Appeals Committee and on the Jurisprudence Committee before the Grand Chapter.
- SEC. 5. Naming Standing Committees. The newly installed Worthy Grand Matron shall before closing of the Grand Chapter name the new member or members of the following committees:
 - (1) Credentials
 - (2) Unfinished Business
 - (3) Chapters Under Dispensation and Charters
 - (4) Jurisprudence
 - (5) Grievance and Appeals
 - (6) Necrology
- Sec. 6. **Due Respect to be Paid.** After the Grand Chapter is opened, the officers, members and visitors shall pay due respect to the presiding officer and no one shall be permitted to enter or leave the Grand Chapter without the permission of the presiding officer.

- SEC. 7. **Disposition of Business.** The following shall be the regular order of business at sessions of the Grand Chapter, subject to variations or suspension by the presiding officer or by order of the Grand Chapter.
 - (1) Announcement of Committees
 - (2) Report of Committee on Credentials
 - (3) Worthy Grand Matron's Address
 - (4) Worthy Grand Patron's Address
 - (5) Report of Grand Secretary
 - (6) Report of Grand Treasurer
 - (7) Report of Board of Grand Instructors
 - (8) Report of Board of Grand Trustees
 - (9) Report of Committee on Unfinished Business
 - (10) Report of Committee on Chapters Under Dispensation and Chartered Chapters
 - (11) Report of Committee on Jurisprudence
 - (12) Report of Committee on Grievances and Appeals
 - (13) Report of Committee on Fraternal Correspondence
 - (14) Report of Committee on Necrology
 - (15) New Business, Amendments and Special Committees
 - (16) Resolutions
 - (17) Election
 - (18) Installation
 - SEC. 8. **Resolutions.** All resolutions shall be in writing, signed by the mover, and shall be read and filed with the Grand Secretary, then submitted for the consideration and decision of the Grand Chapter.
 - SEC. 9. Returns, Petitions, etc. All returns, petitions and documents, shall be referred to appropriate committees, which shall report thereon in writing, signed by a majority of the committee.
 - SEC. 10. May Speak But Once. No member shall speak more than once on the same subject without permission from the presiding officer.
 - SEC. 11. Division of the Question. Any member may call for a division of the question by yeas and nays. A majority vote shall determine all questions, except as otherwise provided. Unless otherwise ordered, the voting shall be by raising the right hand. Any member of this Grand Chapter may appeal from the decision of the chair and said decision may be overruled by a two-thirds vote of the members present.
- SEC. 12. Motions Must be Seconded. All motions shall be seconded, and stated by the presiding officer, before they shall be open for discussion. They shall be put in the order in which they were made. In filling blank

spaces, in motions, in resolutions or appropriations, the largest sum or quantity, or the longest time proposed, shall be voted on first, and others in descending numerical succession. Every member speaking on a question or making a motion shall have her or his name announced.

- SEC. 13. **To Reconsider.** A motion to reconsider, refer to a Committee, for the order of the day, for the previous question, to call on or to close shall be decided without debate, but the presiding officer shall explain the question or request some member to do so. A motion to reconsider must be proposed by some one who voted on the prevailing side.
- SEC. 14. **Business Must be Disposed of.** All business and reports must be disposed of before the Grand Chapter is closed, except such as may lie over by virtue of the Constitution and Laws.
- SEC. 15. **Rights of Dimitted Members.** Dimitted members of the Order shall be allowed to visit the Grand Chapter, but shall take no part in its proceedings.

ARTICLE II.

Duties of Committees

- Section 1. **Credentials.** The Committee on Credentials shall report the names of all Grand Officers, Past Worthy Grand Matrons, Past Worthy Grand Patrons; also the name of each Chapter representative present and entitled to a seat and vote in the Grand Chapter, with the name and number of the Chapter represented; also the names of all Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons who have only one personal vote. This committee shall meet at 10.00 A. M. on the day of the opening of the Grand Chapter. The Credentials Committee shall furnish each delegate an appropriate attendance card to be punched by the Grand Warder, and taken up by her at the opening of the Thursday afternoon session and transferred to the Grand Secretary.
- SEC. 2. Unfinished Business. The Committee on Unfinished Business shall examine the minutes of the previous annual session and report all unfinished matters of business, and see to it that said business is properly brought before the Grand Chapter for consideration.
- SEC. 3. Chapters Under Dispensation and Chartered Chapters. This Committee shall examine the proceedings of organization and the records of each Chapter under Dispensation and note all matters contrary to these laws and report same to the Grand Chapter with recommendations; they shall carefully examine the returns of all chartered Chapters, note any errors found therein and any informal or illegal proceedings and report same to the Grand Chapter with such recommendations as they may deem proper.
- Sec. 4. Jurisprudence. The Committee on Jurisprudence shall consider and report upon the decisions of law and usage made by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and also all questions of law and

usage presented to the Grand Chapter. All By-Laws temporarily approved by the Worthy Grand Matron and all other By-Laws presented by Chartered Chapters, and Chapters under dispensation, must be approved or changed and approved by this committee, before being presented to the Grand Chapter for final adoption.

- SEC. 5. **Grievances and Appeals.** The Committee on Grievances and Appeals shall consider written and oral testimony on all matters on controversy or grievance sent up on appeals, and make recommendations thereupon to the Grand Chapter for action.
- SEC. 6. Necrology. The Committee on Necrology shall read the names of members of this Grand Jurisdiction who have died during the year, together with the names of Grand Officers and Past Grand Officers of Sister Grand Jurisdictions, and Officers of the General Grand Chapter whose obituaries have been received by the committee. The Chairman of this committee shall deliver a suitable memorial address. The above procedure, together with one or two sacred songs and prayer shall constitute the memorial service of the Grand Chapter, and shall be conducted at the close of the Wednesday night session.
- SEC. 7. Grand Representatives. Grand Representatives near this Grand Chapter, or Sister Grand Jurisdiction, shall as soon as they receive their commissions, qualify themselves for their duties as follows: They shall make themselves familiar with the conditions of the Order in the respective jurisdictions which they represent, and be able to report on same to the Grand Chapter if required by the Worthy Grand Matron to do so.

ARTICLE III.

Revenues

SECTION 1. How Derived. The revenues of the Grand Chapter shall be derived from the following sources:

- (1) For each dispensation for a new Chapter, including charter when granted, together with six Rituals, one official seal, one signet, one order book, one warrant book, six small Bibles, twenty-five petitions for membership, one dozen petitions for affiliation, one minute book, one secretary's cash book, one treasurer's cash book, one ledger, three copies of the Constitution, three copies of the Legal code, one dozen dimits, and one copy of the last Proceedings \$60.00
- (2) For each copy of the Ritual, 50% above cost price.
 (3) For every dispensation for special purpose - 1.00
- (4) For affixing the seal of the Grand Chapter to any document not heretofore provided for - - - 25
- (5) For each Grand Dimit - - 1.00

ARTICLE IV

Expenditures

- Section 1. Accounts. Every account against the Grand Chapter shall be in detail, and show upon its face each item comprising the whole bill.
- SEC. 2. **Motions Involving Expense.** Any motion or resolution involving the appropriation or investment of money shall be referred to the Grand Trustees, and report made thereon before final action is taken.

ARTICLE V.

Expense of Grand Officers to the General Grand Chapter

SEC. 1. **To Whom Allowed.** This Grand Chapter shall pay the actual expenses of the Worthy Grand Matron then in office to the Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter, if in attendance thereon, and who has been elected and installed. If she is unable to attend then a proxy in the following order: Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron, Associate Grand Patron.

ARTICLE VI.

Amendments to Rules and Regulations

- Section 1. No amendments to these Rules and Regulations, either by alteration or addition shall be made unless in the following manner.
- SEC. 2. First Hearing. The amendment proposed must be presented in writing at an annual meeting and after being heard, discussed, and if so ordered amended, it may then be finally adopted by a two-third vote of all delegates present.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE GOVERNMENT OF SUBOR-DINATE CHAPTERS IN DELAWARE

ARTICLE I.

Meetings

SECTION 1. (1) The meetings of a Chapter are stated or special.

(2) Stated meetings are those held at the time prescribed by the By-Laws of the Chapter, and at such meetings all general business such as balloting for candidates for the degrees or affiliation; granting dimits; conferring degrees; election of officers and the discussion of all questions relative to the interests of the Chapter, shall be transacted.

- (3) Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Worthy Matron and such business as trials, conferring of degrees, installation of officers, funerals, and memorial services or ceremonials and observances, shall be transacted; due notice having been given to all resident members in a "call" which shall state the purpose or purposes of the special meeting. No business shall state the purpose or purposes of the special meeting. No business shall be transacted at a special meeting other than that specified in the call. No Chapter shall be convened on Sunday except for funeral or memorial services.
- (4) It is not necessary to open or close the Chapter for the purpose of publicly installing officers, conducting funerals or holding public memorial services.
- Sec. 2. Authority. Every Subordinate Chapter must have a charter or a dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron, attested by the Grand Secretary under the seal of the Grand Chapter; and no Chapter shall be deemed legal or regular without such a document. This shall not apply to the eight Chapters now working under charters granted by the General Grand Chapter. A charter cannot be surrendered while seventeen members desire to retain it. The charter of a Chapter may be forfeited for ignoring or disregarding the legal authority of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, or Grand Chapter, as is provided in Article IX, Section 10 with the written advice and consent of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron; for failure to meet for six months; or for failure to pay dues for two years. When a charter is arrested or when a Chapter demises all money in treasury, the jewels, charter, records, and all other property of such Chapter shall become the property of the Grand Chapter, and must be sent at once to the Grand Secretary's office. It shall be the duty of the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron to see that the Secretary forwards promptly such properties to the Grand Secretary.
- SEC. 3. Officers. The elective officers of a Chapter shall consist of a Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Secretary, Treasurer, Conductress, Associate Conductress, all of whom shall be elected annually by ballot by a majority of the members present at the first regular meeting in December. The appointive officers are Chaplain, Marshal, Organist, Adah, Ruth, Esther, Martha, Electa, Warder and Sentinel, who shall be appointed by the Worthy Matron-elect. No member shall be installed into office who is more than one year in arrears for Chapter dues.
- Sec. 4. Installation. All officers shall be installed on first regular meeting in January or as soon thereafter as possible. A public installation may be held before the first regular meeting in January without a special dispensation; but a dispensation must be secured to publicly install officers on any later date. Officers legally hold their positions until their successors are elected and installed, or until their offices are declared vacant by the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron.

Vacancies

- SEC. 5. Elective Officers. Vacancies in the elective offices can only be filled pro tem at each meeting. Vacancies in the appointive offices can be filled by the Worthy Matron at a regular meeting.
- SEC. 6. **Appointive.** The Worthy Matron may appoint an officer who is present to fill another station, but the minutes must record the officer present, though acting pro tem in another station.
- SEC. 7. Who May Preside. When the Worthy Patron is present and both the Worthy Matron and Associate Matron are absent, any Past Matron may be requested by him to preside. If no Past Matron be present, any sister may be called upon. It is the duty of a member occupying a chair pro temto retire if the regular officer enters the Chapter.
- Sec. 8. Visitors in Vacancies. The Worthy Matron may ask visitors from other Delaware Chapters to fill vacancies in officer's stations but such members shall not vote.
- SEC. 9. Refusing to Serve. If an elective officer refuses to be installed, the Worthy Grand Matron may grant a dispensation to hold an election to fill the office. An elective officer cannot resign after being installed.
- SEC. 10. In case an elective officer leaves the jurisdiction of the Chapter the Worthy Grand Matron can, if circumstances warrant, declare the office vacant and grant a dispensation to elect a new officer, such election to take place ten days after written notice has been given to the members by the Secretary of the Chapter, except the office of Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron, which cannot be declared vacant. The Associate Matron fills the office of Worthy Matron.

Membership

- SEC. 11. Who May Be Admitted. No person shall be admitted as a member of a Chapter by initiation except affiliated Master Masons, their wives, daughters, legally adopted daughters, mothers, widows, sisters and half-sisters. Female petitioners shall be not less than eighteen years of age. No person shall be a member of more than one Chapter at the same time, except in case of honorary membership.
- SEC. 12. Marriage to a Profane. The mother, daughter, or sister of an affiliated Mason who is married to a man who is not a Mason is eligible to receive the degrees.
- SEC. 13. Residence of a Mason. A Master Mason belonging to a Lodge in another State can join a Chapter in this State if he is an affiliated Master Mason, and has resided in this jurisdiction the required length of time.

- SEC. 14. Forfeiture of Membership. One who has been initiated in this Order can only be deprived of membership by suspension or expulsion by a Chapter after trial; provided, that the suspension or expulsion of a brother from a Lodge of Master Masons, deprives him of all the rights and privileges of membership in this Order until satisfactory evidence of his reinstatement by said Lodge has been presented to the Chapter and noted in its minutes.
- SEC. 15. Does Not Affect Female Relatives. The membership of a Mason's female relatives in the Chapter is not affected by his suspension or expulsion.
- SEC. 16. Can Not Be Admitted. Master Masons can not be admitted unless they have been regularly initiated members of the Order in a duly constituted Chapter.
- SEC. 17. Children. Children over two years of age shall not be admitted to the Chapter room during meetings or rehearsals.
- SEC. 18. Proof of Good Standing and Vouching. If there be no one present who can vouch for visitors, by reason of having actually sat in a Chapter with them, they shall be taken to the anteroom, the test oath separately taken and a full examination gone through with by a committee appointed by the Worthy Matron.
- SEC. 19. Visits by Dimitted Members. Dimitted members or former members of demised Chapters, who hold Grand Dimits, can visit a Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction but one year.

Dimits

- SEC. 20. How Granted. Elective Officers of Chapters who have been installed cannot dimit. All other members have the right to dimit if they are clear on the books. A dimit shall be granted only on written request signed by the sister or brother desiring it. A Dimit having been granted by the Chapter, cannot be reconsidered.
- SEC. 21. Members of Demised Chapters. Members of demised Chapters in other Grand Jurisdictions who are without dimits and who wish to join a Chapter in this State, should apply to the Grand Secretary of the Grand Chapter within whose State their Chapter was located for a dimit or certificate.
- SEC. 22. Former Members. Former members of demised Chapters, either chartered or under dispensation, who were in good standing at time of demise may secure Grand Dimits from the Grand Secretary upon payment of \$1.00 each, and furnishing proof of such good standing. Former members of demised Chapters who stood suspended for non-payment of dues at time of demise, may secure Grand Dimits from the Grand Secretary upon the payment of \$5.00 each, and furnishing satisfactory proof of former membership.

Such persons may affiliate with any Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction within one year from the date of dimit. Every applicant for affiliation shall visit a Chapter before presenting a petition for membership therein. No dimit shall be considered legal unless countersigned in the handwriting of the holder. There is no time limit to a dimit issued by a subordinate chapter.

- Sec. 23. **Lost Dimit.** A member who has lost a dimit may apply to the secretary of the Chapter which granted same and the Secretary shall issue a duplicate, and shall collect a Chapter fee of \$1.00 for same.
- Sec. 24. Not Installed. A member who has been elected to an office but not installed, may dimit.
- Sec. 25. Chapters Under Dispensation. A member of a Chapter under dispensation is entitled to a dimit, if not filling an elective office
- SEC. 26. Dimit to Join New Chapter. When members of a Chapter, or Chapters, join in a petition for a New Chapter, and the petition is granted, they are dimitted without further action of their Chapter or Chapters, provided they present documentary evidence under seal of their Chapter showing them to be clear on the books of the former Chapter and that they were present when the new Chapter was instituted. Upon the institution of the New Chapter the Secretary thereof must notify the old Chapter, or Chapters, of their members withdrawal.

Fees and Dues

- Sec. 27. Initiation Fee. No Chapter within this Grand Jurisdiction shall confer the degrees for a less sum than five (\$5.00) dollars.
- SEC. 28. Dues. Subordinate Chapters may charge such monthly or annual membership dues as they may decide upon. A Chapter may by a majority vote of those present, remit the dues of any member. Any member who neglects or fails to pay dues for a period of one year shall be notified by the Secretary, and if not paid within one year thereafter may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Chapter. When all back dues have been paid or remitted, such member is restored to good standing without further action of the Chapter.
- SEC. 29. **Fees Returned.** The fee for the degrees shall be returned to any petitioner who does not present herself or himself for initiation within one year from date of election and such election shall thereafter be void.

Petitions and Residence

Sec. 30. **For Initiation.** Petitions for initiation shall be made in writing, signed by the applicant and recommended by two members of the Chapters. They shall be presented at a regular meeting, referred to a committee of three, and lay over until the next regular meeting, and reported upon unless further time is granted by the Chapter. Petitions of women for degrees must show

that the applicant has attained the age of eighteen, and must show how, and to what Master Mason they are related. Applicants for initiation shall have resided six months in the State and three months in the jurisdiction of the Chapter. Applicants for affiliation shall have resided three months in the State, and may affiliate with any Chapter in the State.

- SEC. 31. **Investigating Committee.** The committee to which a petition is referred must be composed of three, two sisters and one brother.
- SEC. 32. Cannot be Considered. A petition cannot be considered unless accompanied by the initiation fee, and cannot be withdrawn after having been read to the Chapter. The ballot must be spread on all applications for degrees and affiliations.
- SEC. 33. Ready for Ballot. A Petition is not ready for the ballot when two of the committee have reported, unless one of them be the brother, as he alone can vouch for the Masonic standing of the applicant. If the brother on the committee fails to report, the Worthy Matron may appoint another brother who may report at once.

BY-LAWS

- SEC. 34. Inherent Right. Every Chapter shall have the right to make its By-laws and regulations; provided such By-laws and regulations shall not conflict with the Constitution and the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and Ritual of the Order. After adoption by the Chapter, the By-laws shall be submitted to the Worthy Grand Matron, and upon approval by her, shall become and remain effective until the next session of the Grand Chapter, when the Worthy Grand Matron shall refer them to the Jurisprudence Committee, who in turn will report them, with any needed changes and recommendations, to the Grand Chapter for final action. By-laws of chartered Chapters and Chapters under dispensation may be presented directly to the Jurisprudence Committee while in session at the Grand Chapter. All amendments or additions to Chapter By-laws shall be treated in like manner.
- SEC. 35. Worthy Matron. The Worthy Matron shall preside at the meetings of the Chapter, except when degrees are being conferred, or may request the Worthy Patron to preside; see that the laws are strictly observed; appoint all committees, and see that the officers faithfully perform their duties.
- Sec. 36. Worthy Patron. The Worthy Patron shall have a general supervision over the affairs of the Chapter, advise with and assist the officers; preside and assist in conferring degrees. A Chapter meeting may be held without a brother present, provided the degrees are not conferred or the ballot spread.

- SEC. 37. Associate Matron. The Associate Matron shall perform the duties appertaining to her office, and in the absence of the Worthy Matron, assume her duties.
- SEC. 38. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a correct record of the meetings of the Chapters, collect all moneys due the Chapter and pay the same to the Treasurer; shall notify the Secretaries of Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction of all applications for degrees and all rejections for degrees, and perform all the duties pertaining to the Secretary's office. The Secretary shall forward the returns of the Chapter to the Grand Secretary on or before the fifteenth day of February of each year. A failure to do this will forfeit the vote of such Chapter in the Grand Chapter unless excused by a two-thirds vote.
- SEC. 39. Remaining Officers. The remaining officers shall perform the duties indicated by their titles, or as directed by the Chapter.
- SEC. 40. Outgoing Officers. Reports of all outgoing officers and committees of the Chapter shall be submitted at the first meeting after the installation.
- SEC. 41. Approval of Minutes. The officer presiding at the time of the approval of the minutes of the Chapter signs them, whether she be the regularly installed officer or acting pro tem.

Jurisdiction

- SEC. 42. **Between Chapters.** When more than one Chapter is located in any city, town or village, jurisdiction over candidates for initiation shall be concurrent in all respects. In all other cases the jurisdiction of Chapters shall extend to a point half way in a direct line between the city limits of the nearest Chapters in all directions.
- Sec. 43. **Time Limit of Election.** When a Chapter elects a party to receive the degrees, and the party moves out of the territorial jurisdiction of said Chapter before receiving the degrees, said Chapter shall retain absolute jurisdiction over said applicant, unless waived, for six months.
- SEC. 44. Over Rejected Applicant. When a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year.
- SEC. 45. Application for Waiver. Any Chapter may apply to another for waiver of jurisdiction in cases where the applicant requests such Chapter to do so; if the applicant has not been rejected in the Chapter requested to give waiver, then a majority vote shall grant the waiver. If the applicant has been rejected in the Chapter that has jurisdiction, then one black ball shall refuse the waiver.

Conferring Degrees by Courtesy

SEC. 46. Procedure. It shall be constitutional for a Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction to confer degrees of the Order by courtesy for a Chapter in another Grand Jurisdiction under the following conditions:

The Chapter for which the degrees are to be conferred, shall under seal of said Chapter, request the Worthy Grand Matron of that Grand Jurisdiction to have the degrees conferred, and that Worthy Grand Matron under her official seal, shall make a like request of the Worthy Grand Matron of this Grand Jurisdiction, and she in turn under her official seal, shall request the Chapter to confer the degrees. If a Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction wishes the degrees conferred in another Grand Jurisdiction the above procedure shall be reversed. The fee for initiation shall belong to the Chapter for which the degrees are conferred. All such initiations must be immediately reported to the Chapter making the request, through the offices of the Worthy Grand Matrons of both Grand Jurisdictions.

A Chapter of this Grand Jurisdiction may confer degrees by courtesy for another Chapter of this Grand Jurisdiction, when requested to do so, under the seal of the Chapter wishing the degrees conferred. It is not necessary for such request to come through the Grand Matron's office when both Chapters are within the jurisdiction of the Grand Chapter of Delaware. The Secretary of the Chapter conferring the degrees shall promptly notify the secretary of the Chapter making the request when the degrees have been conferred. The fee belongs to the Chapter for which the candidate is initiated.

Number to be Initiated

- SEC. 47. Number of Candidates to be Initiated. Not more than six (6) candidates can be initiated in one class, but as many classes as desired by the Chapter may be initiated at the same meeting. The Ritualistic ceremony of Initiation must be given to each class separately up to the Worthy Patron's lecture, when the class may be seated, and later finish with all the candidates initiated at that meeting.
- SEC. 48. Shall Use. Subordinate Chapters shall use only such Rituals for the work of the Order as are authorized by the General Grand Chapter.
- SEC. 49. Chapter Courtesy. Members are not allowed during the meeting of the Chapter to pass between the altar and the Worthy Matron's station save as explained in the Ritual.
- SEC. 50. Purchase of Supplies. Chapters shall purchase Rituals and all other needed supplies from the Grand Secretary.

Charters

SEC. 51. How Filled Out. All Charters for new Chapters will be engrossed by the Grand Secretary after the close of each Grand Chapter session, and delivered to the Worthy Grand Matron, who will constitute the Chapter either in person or by Deputy.

Opening the Chapter

- SEC. 52. What Necessary. The presence of a charter or dispensation, the Holy Bible opened at the Second Chapter of Saint Matthew, together with either the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, or Associate Matron, and six other members of the Chapter, are necessary to open a Chapter for the transaction of business.
- SEC. 53. Business. The business transacted in a Chapter is not legal unless the Chapter has been opened in due form.
- SEC. 54. Hour of Meeting. Any meeting held at an hour earlier than that named in the By-laws of a Chapter for stated meeting, is a special meeting at which no business can be transacted except the conferring of degrees, or such as may be specified in the "call" for such meeting, and which must not conflict with these laws.
- SEC. 55. Salutation. The salutation sign shall be made to the Worthy Matron, but if she be engaged, to the Worthy Patron.

Ballot

SEC. 56. How Conducted. The Ballot upon petitions for degrees, affiliation or dimits, can only be taken at a regular meeting. Every member of the Chapter present at a meeting where a ballot is taken must vote, unless excused by unanimous consent of the Chapter. Members are not allowed to retire during the ballot unless excused by the presiding officer.

The Associate Conductress shall have charge of the ballot box under the direction of the presiding officer. She shall carry it to every member present, or may place it on the altar as directed. No discussion of a candidate shall be allowed in open Chapter. Every candidate must be elected by a separate ballot. Petitions for initiations and affiliations cannot be balloted on together.

The ballot must be secret, and no one shall be permitted to examine it but the first three officers. Any member who shall report to any person not a member of the Order the name of a rejected candidate, shall be subject to reprimand by the Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron in open Chapter; or to trial and if convicted, to reprimand, suspension or expulsion from the Order; and that no one may plead ignorance of this rule, it shall be so stated to the Chapter by the presiding officer after each rejection.

- SEC. 57. Without Black Balls. A ballot box with less than six black balls or black cubes is not legal.
- SEC. 58. **Number Necessary.** One black ball or black cube shall reject for initiation or affiliation.
- SEC. 59. Reconsideration. No ballot can be reconsidered after being declared from the East. An unfavorable report by the investigating committee does not reject. A ballot is necessary in all cases. The rejection of an applicant holds good for only one year.

Rejected Candidates

- SEC. 60. Revealing Names. The names of members present during the balloting when a candidate is rejected, shall not be revealed to any person not a member of the Order.
- SEC. 61. **Objection.** A person who has been elected to take the degrees can be stopped by a member of the Chapter filing an oral or written objection with the Worthy Matron, who announces to the Chapter that objection has been made. The Secretary records same in the minutes. The Worthy Matron shall not reveal the name of the objector nor the reasons given.
- SEC. 62. Application For Degrees and Affiliation. A candidate for degrees having been rejected cannot be proposed again until six months after rejection. Any candidate for affiliation rejected in a Chapter shall have her or his dimit returned and the Chapter shall not have jurisdiction over said candidate. The candidate may apply at once for affiliation in any Chapter in the State which has been visited by the applicant.

Instructions To Chapters On Reception Of Officers and Members

- SEC. 63. (1) Affiliated Members. After signing the By-laws, a newly-affiliated member, being announced by the Secretary, shall be introduced to the Chapter and welcomed by the Worthy Matron.
- (2) Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons, Past and Present, Visiting Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons, or Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons, may be announced by the Conductress or Associate Conductress, after which they shall rise and be escorted outside the labyrinth to the East, introduced and then seated in the East.
- (3) The Board of Grand Trustees and The Board of Grand Instructors shall be taken to the Altar by the Conductress, introduced to the Worthy Matron, then escorted to the East, and there introduced to the members by the Worthy Matron, and afterwards seated in the East.
- (4) **Grand Representatives.** Grand Representatives near this Grand Chapter of other Grand Jurisdiction shall, when attending Grand Chapter sessions, be conducted to the East by the Grand Conductress by way of the

altar, given the Grand Honors and reconducted to their seats. They shall not, however, be accorded Grand Honors when visiting Subordinate Chapters.

(5) Present Grand Officers, (Excepting Worthy Grand Matrons and Worthy Grand Patrons) shall be introduced at the Altar by the Conductress, then escorted to the East, welcomed by the Worthy Matron, and seated in the

East.

- (6) Past Worthy Grand Matrons and Past Worthy Grand Patrons. Past Worthy Grand Matrons and Past Worthy Grand Patrons shall be conducted to the altar by the Conductress, and there introduced by full title, then escorted to the East, the Chapter standing. The Worthy Matron will present them to the Chapter, the Grand Honors will be given, and they will be seated in the East.
- (7) Worthy Grand Matrons and Worthy Grand Patrons. The Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron shall be reported in waiting by the Warder to the Associate Matron, who shall announce their presence in the ante-room to the Worthy Matron. The Worthy Matron will direct the Conductress and Associate Conductress to retire and introduce the Grand Officers, and upon their entrance the Chapter will be called up and remain standing until the reception is completed. The Conductress and Associate Conductress will conduct the Grand Officers to the Altar and there introduce them to the Worthy Matron, who will direct that they be presented in the East, where the Worthy Matron will welcome them, introduce them to the Chapter, after which Grand Honors will be given. The Worthy Matron will tender the gavel to the Worthy Grand Matron, or in her absence to the Worthy Grand Patron, who will preside or otherwise be seated in the East. The Chapter will be seated.
- (8) General Grand Chapter Officers. General Grand Chapter Officers shall be received the same as Worthy Grand Matrons and Worthy Grand Patrons except that the Marshal shall meet the Conductress, Associate Conductress and distinguished guests in front of the Associate Matron's station and escort them to the altar. After the guests have been introduced at the altar the Marshal shall escort the procession to the East with due ceremony. After reception and introduction there by the Worthy Matron, the Marshal, Conductress and Associate Conductress shall retire to their respective stations.
- SEC. 64. Amendments. The Grand Chapter shall have full power and authority to make amendments, alterations and additions to any portion of these Rules and Regulations in the same manner and form only as prescribed in Article XV, Sections 1, 2 and 3 of the Constitution.

I was very much interested in a small Chapter which I visited in the mountains. I noticed on entering how dark the room was for the candles were all on the Altar, and a crowd of people were standing about it. I found that there were members in that Chapter who could neither write nor read. Some members had to come six miles to attend a Chapter meeting, but to attend the meetings meant more to them than any thing else in the world. One or two of those who could neither read nor write were officers and the other officers were teaching them their work. A few years afterward at one of the Grand Chapter Sessions one of those women represented very creditably that little Chapter as its Worthy Matron. Can we, who have so many other interests appreciate what the Order means to those where there is very little social intercourse?

Another Chapter which was very interesting to me was a Chapter in Jacksonville, Tennessee, which is just a few miles from Nashville. Jacksonville sprang up during the war, being the location of one of the big powder plants. It was found that among the employees and soldiers there were a number of Masons, and so they got together, secured a room in which to meet, and started a Lodge. Finally they had a Lodge, Chapter, Council and

an Eastern Star Chapter which met in the same room. The men had decorated the room themselves and it was beautiful. About the wall for a frieze they had put the three emblems and the star. In the centre of the floor they had put our star. The draperies for the Altar and for the pedestal in the East had the Masonic emblem on one side and the star on the other. When the lodge met they turned the draperies on one side and when the Eastern Star Chapter met the draperies were turned on the other side, and the floor was left bare, but when the Lodge, Chapter or Council met a rug was put on the floor. This little Eastern Star Chapter was named "Old Hickory Chapter." I think this showed the wonderful spirit which exists between the two organizations.

We must help the Masons in their work. In so many states now the Masons have a fund for higher education, so that the children who are entrusted in their care can have a college education if they so desire. The Knight Templars are taking up the educational question also. Just think what a great work this is.

I am glad to have you with us. You are now our baby Grand Chapter but I want to tell you you won't be the baby Grand Chapter long for in June we institute a Grand Chapter in Manitoba and then one in Quebec. We want to do good work so that we will be a great credit to that organization from which we derive our eligibility. I wish you God speed in this meeting.

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Story responded to the Most Worthy Grand Matron's address by saying, "We will all profit by our Most Worthy Grand Matron's advice and talk. We will always be the baby Grand Chapter in the United States."

The Grand Matron ordered the Grand Marshal to declare this Grand Chapter called from labor to refreshment to resume order at 7.30 P. M.

The petition of a candidate was read, referred to a committee, and all Chapters were notified of same. This petition received a favorable report, was balloted upon and petitioner elected to receive the degrees of the Chapter. All Chapters were again notified, and the candidate was notified to present herself for initiation.

Notification was received from another Chapter that they held jurisdiction over this petition, to the extension of one month. What should be the legal action taken?

Notwithstanding the fact that the procedure regarding this petition was in regular form, due to the fact that by virtue of the other Chapter holding jurisdiction over the candidate as a rejected petitioner, I rendered a decision that the election be considered null and void. (See By-laws, page 45, Section 44).

The question was asked if it were permissible to do crochetting or fancy work in the Chapter during the session.

My answer was no, it is not permissible.

Recommendations

- No. 1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks found on page two of our ritual.
- No. 2. That a committee be appointed to purchase suitable badges to be worn by our Representatives to the General Grand Chapter.
- No. 3. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.

- No. 4. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.
- No. 5. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination.
- No. 6. That no member be allowed to vouch for any one unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.
- No. 7. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess,—by so doing closes the Chapter.
- No. 8. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door.
- No. 9. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.
- No. 10. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls.
- No. 11. Members desiring to affiliate with a Chapter, should petition the Chapter. The petition will be received at a regular meeting, assigned to a committee for investigation, to report at the next or future regular meeting. On receipt of the report the ballot will be spread and if clear the petitioner upon securing a demit from his or her Chapter and depositing the same with the Chapter in which he or she has been elected becomes a member of the Chapter.

If you would take the time to think what kind of a person it must be who would write an anonymous letter, one who is afraid to come out in the full light and say the things that are in his or her heart, but rather hides in the darkness and refrains from signing their name, you would know that a person doing a deed such as this is a coward, and is not worthy of being allowed to mingle with those who are trying to do good and live up to the teachings of our beautiful Order. Let me urge that our members disregard all such communications, as they are entirely beneath our notice.

I wish to thank Mizpah Chapter No. 2 for the courtesy extended to the Grand Matron, Grand Patron and distinguished visitors, the evening preceding the Grand Chapter Session.

Chairman:—Worthy Matron, Sisters and Brothers:—It is indeed a beautiful privilege to pause for a little while in the midst of our business deliberations, and pay a loving tribute to those who but yesterday were in their accustomed places, and to-day have answered the call of Him whose honor our beloved Order is established, and who are now enjoying the blessedness that comes to those who have had the trustful faith of Martha.

This time is not lost. We need to be reminded again and again of the transitoriness of life. Such pauses in the midst of the pressure to business and whirl of social affairs tend to sober and constrain us to part with the dross and become as pure gold in the sight of a Holy God.

It gave me a thrill of pride to find in the proceedings of some Grand Chapters meeting after November the official notice sent out by the General Grand Chapter of the Constitution of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and to find the names of our Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Grand Secretary listed with those of other Grand Jurisdictions. It brings home the fact that we are a Grand Jurisdiction.

Every where the Flag was given due recognition and in some Grand Jurisdictions Old Glory and Union Jack were placed side by side in the Grand East and through them a splendid lesson in patriotism and fraternalism is taught for after all "we are one Country on the map."

The home question has been of importance in all States; 39 having Masonic Homes, 28 Grand Chapters assist in the maintenance of Masonic or Eastern Star Homes; 4 States have strictly Eastern Star Homes, Iowa having the only Eastern Masonic Home entirely independent of Masonic support. Kentucky having established a Masonic Widows and Orphans in 1871, is now raising a Million Dollar fund for a new Masonic Home. A number of jurisdictions have hospitals and a few contribute to a fund for this purpose. Quite a few Grand Chapters have an Educational Fund giving Home children opportunities for a higher education. Tennessee presented a fully equipped school building to their Masonic Home for use of Home children. Oklahoma is the first State to complete an O. E. S. Chapel.

Our Order has made a wonderful growth during the year and now has over 10,000 Chapters with about a million and a quarter members. Michigan has the oldest Grand Chapter and New York the oldest Subordinate Chapter. Delaware is at this time the "Baby Grand Chapter" but we expect that new Grand Chapters will soon be instituted in Manitoba and Quebec.

Wentworth on Manning Street. was erected in 1670. There are many other old places that would interest you to see and hear about, giving you a glimpse of the long ago, most notably the Moffatt-Ladd House, owned by the Colonial Dames, the John Paul Jones House, belonging to the Portsmouth Historical Society and the Thomas Bailey Aldrich Home, all of which are open to the public for exhibition purposes."

Many distinguished guests and Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons were received and given Grand Honors.
