Shortly after the close of the First Annual Session last May, I had sent to each Chapter in the Jurisdiction letters containing the recommendations of our Past Worthy Grand Matron and Past Worthy Grand Patron that were approved by this Grand Chapter, and requested the observance of them by all Chapters.

At a little later date I sent the following letter to all Chapters in the State: Dear Worthy Matron:

Believing that the work of our Order in this State can be best carried on through the closer binding together of the subordinate Chapters and the Grand Chapter, I ask you to appoint a Committee of three to compare the Bylaws of your Chapter with the Constitution, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter. If, upon examination, your committee finds your By-laws are not in accord with those of the Grand Chapter, have necessary amendments made in regular form and have copy of amended by-laws sent me for approval not later than October fifteenth next.

I recommend that at this time the annual dues of the Chapter be raised at least one dollar and having an extra dollar yearly for refreshments and entertainment.

It is my earnest hope that an Eastern Star Building will be bought and made ready for use by next Spring. To achieve this result we must have the will to have this Building or Temple, careful consideration of the plans for securing it and whole hearted intelligent cooperation on the part of the Committees and Members. There are at present building committees of varying numbers in the five Chapters in this City. Inasmuch as this Committee has

neither met nor acted for a period of about two years, I would recommend that the members of these building committees resign and the committees be discharged by vote of the Chapter. Thus the Worthy Matron will be enabled to appoint a committee which will be responsible to her and work in complete accord thru her with the other Chapters for a common end. If, in the opinion of the Worthy Matron, a member of this old building committee is deserving of reappointment, his or her discharge from old committee would not disbar her from reappointment. It is better for the undertaking as a whole to start afresh in each Chapter.

November 28, 1922. Requested waiver of jurisdiction over a ten mile radius from Delmar, Delaware in Maryland for Adah Chapter No. 5, Delmar Delaware, there being no Chapter within forty miles in Maryland. The Worthy Grand Matron of Maryland replied that she felt it would be a matter for the Grand Chapter in session to decide and that she would place the same before their next session beginning April 23, 1923. At the session of the Grand Chapter of Maryland, this request was lost in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee.

## Dispensations

December 5, 1922. Granted dispensation of Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, to dispense with meeting falling on Christmas Day, December 25, 1922. This day being a legal holiday, the building in which this Chapter meets would be without heat, elevator or janitor service, and the majority of the officers being mothers of young children who desired to be with them on this Day of all Days, I felt a greater benefit would be derived from omitting the meeting rather than having it, and I accordingly granted this Dispensation.

December 30, 1922. Granted permission to Worthy Matron of St. John's Chapter No. 4, to initiate a candidate if elected on their last meeting night as this Chapter has been suffering as a result of the black ball and only one petitioner elected during the year. The petitioner was elected and the Officers had the pleasure of initiating a candidate a second time before retiring from office.

#### Decisions

Question. "We have a petition pending in our Chapter. The petitioner is afflicted which caused her to use crutches. Would such affliction debar her from membership? If not and she is elected, could she be obligated and then observe the others take the degrees?

Answer. Yes to both questions.

Question. Will Chapter room be arranged the same for a public installation as we always have it?

Answer. Yes.

## Schools of Instruction

Schools of instruction were called for January 23, January 30, February 6, and February 13, 1923 in the City of Wilmington. Owing to the illness of the

Worthy Grand Matron and so many of the officers of the subordinate Chapters, we were unable to hold instructions on January 30th as planned. These schools were well attended by officers of all city Chapters and some of Caesar Rodney Chapter of New Castle, Delaware.

I acknowledge with grateful appreciation the assistance given Sister Rush, Grand Instructor, and myself at the schools held in Wilmington by Sisters Louise W. Green and Lillie Schofield Riley.

Together with my staff of officers, I made official visitation to the following Chapters:

May 7, 1923-Adah Chapter No. 5

May 8, 1923—Sussex Chapter No. 7

I found the work given in all Chapters but one was in accord with instructions given at schools held. The officers and members generally show a beautiful spirit of cooperation in the work and are earnestly endeavoring to keep our ritualistic work on a high plane and are eagerly interested in the uniformity of our ritualistic work.

There are no two sets of books alike in Delaware and I found it difficult to examine books easily.

I recommend therefore, that a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll book, Secretary's Cash book, Treasurers Cash book, Ledgers, Record book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.

I found some of these records were kept on loose papers; one Secretary read her minutes from loose sheets of paper, so that her minute book would need show no corrections and would be beautifully kept. Another secretary

made corrections in her minutes by erasure. I appreciated the pride these Secretaries had in this work, explained the necessity of original entry in a legal sense and instructed these practices be discontinued, minutes read from book, and corrections to minutes clearly shown.

One Worthy Matron took the contrary vote by calling for the left hand. Instructed this practice be discontinued.

I found Associate Conductress destroyed ballot in one Chapter. As none but first three officers may inspect the ballot, instructed that this practice be discontinued and ballot destroyed by Worthy Matron.

There being no objection to petition being received when announced by Worthy Matron, a motion to receive same and appoint committee unnecessary.

The ballot on a rejected petitioner having been protested in writing as not secret, the Chapter by unanimous vote requested it be declared illegal and retaken. Granted this request and petitioner having been again given the benefit of the ballot, was elected. I condemned this ballot box as not complying with our requirements of secrecy and ordered the Chapter to purchase a new ballot box of improved type.

It developed during the evening at this Chapter that the Charter was not present in the room. I stopped work in Chapter immediately and instructed the Charter be produced. Upon its being placed in the East, by virtue of my prerogatives as Worthy Grand Matron, declared the meeting legal and had the work completed.

I am happy to state I found as general rule the ritualistic work given in an earnest, sincere manner and the officers generally very proficient in their work.

We were received in all Chapters under an arch of flowers and beautiful and appropriate music lent a charm and dignity to the visitations and were encouragement and inspiration to the Worthy Grand Matron.

While being conducted to my position in line, Miss Conly sang very beautifully to the tune "I Love You Truly" the following words written by our Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Minnie E. Keyes:

## **New Grand Chapters**

#### Black Ball

Some of our Chapters have suffered from the wave of Black Balling which seems to have spread over the entire country. To my mind this is one of the evils arising from the World War through which we have just passed—as if another Pandora's Box was opened and humanity almost swamped by the evil spirits set free. However I am very happy to state that no black balls have been cast in Chapters which have suffered from this evil since the visitations of the Grand Officers, and it is my sincere hope that a spirit of harmony, fair dealing and loving kindness will prevail throughout our entire jurisdiction.

#### By-Laws

Approved amendment to By-Laws of Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3 and Radiant Chapter No. 6, raising their dues.

Approved amendment to By-Laws of Delaware Chapter No. 1, bringing their laws in accord with those of the Grand Chapter, and establishing an honorarium for their soloist.

I am withholding approval of By-Laws of Mizpah Chapter No. 2 until final action is taken by this Grand Chapter on amendment offered last session by Sister Hook.

## Job's Daughters and Rainbow Girls

I have received letters and literature from these leaders who are interested in development of organizations for girls which they are sponsoring, namely Job's Daughters and Rainbow Girls. The membership of Job's Daughters is built upon the Masonic Fraternity. The Rainbow Girls have as a basis of their Membership girls between the ages of 13 and 18 who are relatives of Master Masons or relatives of Eastern Star members or children or young girls

who are recommended by an Eastern Star member or a Master Mason. It seems to me that they being broader as far as the question of eligibility is concerned, the Rainbow Girls would be more appropriate to the State of Delaware. I believe in doing the greatest good to the greatest number. It is true that someone not of Masonic parentage has just as much good in them as have the daughters of either Masonic or Eastern Star members, and they may be just as worthy of our instruction, just as needful of our help as any child of any sister or brother, and we may be gathering into our folds those who stand for public education, for the supremacy of the Constitution of the United States of America, for the supremacy of the Christian religion, those who may by future relationships be eligible to membership in Our Order. And it seems to me that of the two, while Job's Daughters Bethels have been established in a great many Grand Jurisdictions, the Rainbow Girls have been well adopted also-the Rainbow Girls would be the choice for this jurisdiction-if Delaware at some time adopts or sponsors a girls organization. I do not recommend a decision at this time. I feel we are not ready to take up this work.

I recommend that one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County.

## General Grand Chapter

One of my happiest and pleasantest duties was to attend the Seventeenth Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter at Washington, D. C. November 14–19, 1922. Together with our Associate Grand Matron Sister Riley, P. G. M. Sister Story, and Sister Mary N. Hook, G. Instructor, I left Wilmington Saturday evening November 11, 1922. We were a happy and congenial party and soon found ourselves in Washington. We were taken to our Hotel, The New Willard, by Sister Story's brother Mr. Marr, and appre-

ciated the courtesy and help extended to us. From the very minute we were located it seemed, we continuously met sisters and brothers from all over the United States, Canada, Canal Zone, Alaska and Hawaiian Islands. There were many delegates at this hotel, this being Headquarters, and our raps could be heard at all times.

On Sunday afternoon we attended the special religious services at Calvary Baptist Church which is the Church home in Washington of the President and Mrs. Harding. The sermon was preached by the Pastor of the Church, Rev. William S. Abernathy—the subject "Now I know in part". This sermon made a wonderful impression on me and I have borne it in my mind throughout the year. I wish every member in Delaware could have heard it, I know many would have been benefitted by it.

Monday morning we registered ourselves as delegates and collected and exchanged badges with other delegates. I feel I have a beautiful collection of badges but Sister Riley has a larger one for she was busy working while I was sitting off in a conference. Monday afternoon we enjoyed an automobile sightseeing trip as guests of the Grand Chapter of the District of Columbia. Sister Buchanan, Worthy Matron of the Worthy Grand Matron's Chapter was our hostess, who afforded us a most instructive and interesting afternoon. Monday evening we attended reception held at the House of the Temple A. A. S. R. The receiving line was composed of the officers of the General Grand Chapter and Past Most Worthy Grand Matrons and Past Most Worthy Grand Patrons and they received us in the Supreme Council Chamber, the most beautiful room, I believe, I ever entered. Brother George J. Kurzenknabe, Worthy Grand Organist, gave an organ recital. The Worthy Patrons of 1922 served as ushers and a uniformed company from the Boys' Order of De Molay acted as guides. For the first time in its history the Eastern Star Flag floated over the House of the Temple. About seven thousand people through the Temple that evening. After leaving the Scottish Rite Temple we attended the Ball at the New City Club where we were able to meet so many of our Sisters and Brothers informally. Mrs. Catherine Chapin Blake, daughter of the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Brother Chapin and Miss Star McDaniel daughter of the Most Worthy Grand Patron were the guests of honor. We returned to our hotel, tired but happy after a full and varied day.

The Seventeenth Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter was called to order at ten o'clock Tuesday morning, November 14, 1922 by Sister Emma C. Ocobock, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, who instructed the Worthy Grand Marshal to invite the Most Worthy Grand Matron and other officers to enter the General Grand Chapter room. When the officers entered the room they were beautifully greeted by Sister Ocobock and while they stood on the floor photographs of the Assembly were made. I have one with me and will be glad to show it to any here who are interested. Addresses of welcome were given by Most Worshipful Grand Master Charles Cyrus Coombs on

behalf of the Grand Lodge A. F. A. M., Mr. Thomas Bradley, President of the Washington Board of Trade, on behalf of the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, Mrs. Flora E. Campbell, Worthy Grand Matron on behalf of the Grand Chapter O. E. S. of the District of Columbia. Responses made by Dr. Will W. Grow R. W. Associate Grand Patron, Mrs. Cora R. Franz, R. W. Associate Grand Matron.

Sister Campbell presented to the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron a bouquet of red roses one from each of the twenty-eight Worthy Matrons of the District of Columbia after placing among them a pure white chrysanthemum. The Past Most Worthy Grand Matrons and Past Most Worthy Grand Patrons were introduced and welcomed by the Most Worthy Grand Matron and the response was made by Sister M. Alice Miller, P. M. W. G. M.

After the Assembly singing Auld Lang Syne, the General Grand Chapter was called from labor to refreshments. The Most Worthy Grand Patron presided at the opening of the afternoon session while the Connecticut delegation consisting of 23 Past Grand Matrons and Patrons escorted the Most Worthy Grand Matron to the East each carrying yellow chrysanthemums. Sister Hitchcock, Worthy Grand Matron of Connecticut presented these chrysanthemums to the Most Worthy Grand Matron together with a gold bracelet ser with sapphires, very graciously, and we learned Sister Chapin has risen from the station of Ruth. Hartford Chapter at this time presented the Most Worthy Grand Matron with a silver platter. Visitors from New York and New Jersey were announced, introduced and given seats in the East. The officers of the three new Grand Chapters, Delaware, Manitoba and Quebec were welcomed by the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron. The ceremony of presenting the Flags followed and our own Stars and Stripes were borne by our Past Worthy Grand Matron Sister Story. The British Flag was borne by Sister Wood, Worthy Grand Matron of Manitoba, the Hawaiian Flag by Sister Miller, Past Matron of Leahi Chapter No. 2 Hawaii, Cuba's Flag by Sister Shepard, Worthy Grand Matron of the Grand Chapter of Quebec. These Flags were presented at the altar, received by Sister Conkling P.M.W.G.M. and then placed in the East. Delegates from subordinate Chapters under the jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter were received and welcomed after which the Most Worthy Grand Matron read her report. This report is too lengthy for me to attempt to give here, but I have copies of it and will gladly pass out to any who would like to read it. The business of the Assembly proceeded in regular form, the reports of the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Most Worthy Grand Grand Patron, Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Right Worthy Grand Treasurer being distributed to proper committees for approval. day evening a most impressive and beautiful Memorial Service was held for those who had passed on during the past three years. Wednesday evening there was given an exemplification of Ritualistic Work under the direction of Committee on Work and lectures of the Grand Chapter O. E. S. of the District

Thursday morning at ten o'clock the election of officers was of Columbia. Sister Chapin appointed your Worthy Grand Matron a teller and your Worthy Grand Patron a collector of ballots. During the election the various committees reported in to the Assembly and action taken on their reports. This was a most strenuous day. Being a teller, I was a bit more fortunate than the rest of our delegation, for each teller was supplied with small package of chocolate. We were in session without recess from half past nine in the morning until quarter past five that afternoon, when we were called off for fifteen minutes for refreshments. We assembled again shortly and worked until about six when we were called off until eleven o'clock that night. A most delightful banquet was tendered the official family of the General Grand Chapter and delegates. The Grand Chapter of the District of Columbia presented me with a ticket for an escort and I was most happy to take as my guest our own Grand Secretary, Sister Keys. Because of the pressure of business, we left the banquet hall before the completion of the program and were called to order shortly after eleven o'clock that evening at Convention Hall. The principal business of evening was the consideration of the report of the Most Worthy Grand Patron and especially that portion of it which related to extraneous degree organizations. It was an evening which tested the loyalty and steadfastness of every delegate present. Speakers for the adoption of the report used less than three quarters of an hour's time in presenting their arguments. The remainder of the time was given over to those who insisted in building the White Shrine of Jerusalem upon the Order of the Eastern Star. Every opportunity to talk was given them, the Most Worthy Grand Matron was most courteous, fair and generous. The vote was taken about five o'clock in the morning and the Most Worthy Grand Patron was sustained by a large majority. It was to me a wonderful sight to look around that hall and see the many, many grey and white heads in that audience sitting through that trying session waiting to cast their votes to assure the supremacy of the Order of the Eastern Star and its Landmarks. When the vote was declared, Sister Nettie Ransford arose in her seat and in a quavering voice began to sing the Doxology. all arose and joined her. It was a beautiful ending of a trying session. We were called off at about 5.25 that morning. We returned to our hotels and met again at 8.30 at the Ellipse south of the White House to begin our pilgrimage to Mt. Vernon.

The Grand Chapter of Virginia entertained the delegates this Friday the 17th. Sister Keys was again my guest, Sister Riley preferring to remain in our room to rest after our strenuous Thursday. The day was beautifully clear and calm and a sense of quiet was over all which was to me restful and soothing. It seemed hard to realize that we had passed through a rushing busy week. We wandered through the wonderful old home, so beautiful and carefully preserved, sauntered around the grounds and drank in the beauty of the winding river and surrounding hills. Addressess were made by Miss Deahl Walsh, Worthy Grand Matron of Virginia, Most Worthy Grand Matron Sister Ellie Lines

Chapin, Mr. Charles H. Callhan, Deputy Grand Master of Masons in Virginia and a Historical sketch by Col. Harrison H. Dodge, Superintendent of Mount Vernon. At the conclusion of these addresses, we attended at the Tomb of the Father of Our Country where the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron and their families were admitted and Sister Chapin placed a beautiful wreath upon the grave. We regretfully left this wonderful shrine but were in a measure consoled when we reached Alexandria where we were served a delicious luncheon which we enjoyed to the last crumb—chicken salad, Virginia ham and rolls, coffee and wonderful big cream puffs filled with whipped cream and topped with cherries.

After leaving the Hall of the Chamber of Commerce where this repast was served we visited the Washington-Alexandria Lodge over which George Washington presided as Worshipful Master and as I stood in this room, and inspected the furnishings which were standing the test of time, it was brought to me anew-how brief is our earthly life-yet how momentous and eternal its issues! We paid a brief visit to Christ Church, the Church home of Washington and then left Alexandria for Arlington, where and emblematic wreath was placed by the Most Worthy Grand Patron upon the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Fort Meyer was our next visit on the program where we witnessed a most wonderful Cavalry drill and to me the most wonderful item of the program was the taking of the jumps through blazing hoops by the horses. I had never seen that done before. We returned to Washington at 5.30 that afternoon and made ready for the evening session. The Anniversary program celebrating the forty-sixth anniversary of the organization of the General Grand Chapter was given this evening followed by installation of Officers. Delaware is honored by having Sister Story placed on the Necrology Committee. Sister Story presented to Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Chapin, a sterling silver compote in the new Persian design for the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and your Worthy Grand Matron presented a like gift to Past Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother McDaniel.

Saturday the Grand Chapter of Maryland entertained us most delightfully at Annapolis. We were taken to the Naval Academy and upon reaching this historic city were conducted through the various departments even through the wonderful kitchen in charge of Filipino boys. It was a real education to me to just glimpse through these magnificent buildings. We visited the beautiful marble tomb of John Paul Jones and later enjoyed a splendid drill on the parade grounds. We enjoyed lunch abundantly served by the Grand Chapter of Maryland in the Gymnasium of St. John's College and where we were cordially welcomed by the president of the college. After lunch we were taken to the State House where Governor Albert C. Ritchie addressed the delegates. We were privileged to wander through the rooms and inspect the wonderful trophies of which Maryland is so justly proud. Tea was served in the Masonic Lodge Room where Annapolis Chapter O. E. S. holds their meetings. Weary

but happy we turned homeward. Sister Buchanan's car took us to our Hotel in Washington as we, hastily gathering our belongings together, checked out supperless for home.

We had one more courtesy accorded us which I would like to mention and that is on Wednesday noon we had the pleasure of greeting our President Warren G. Harding. He had time to greet but four hundred members and the visitors from Delaware were fortunate in being included in that number, we owing our privilege to the fact that the Grand Chapters were formedalphabetically.

As I recall the principal legislation enacted was raising the honorarium of the R. W. Grand Treasurer to \$150.00 per year payable in quarterly installments and the R. W. Grand Secretary to \$4000.00 per year payable monthly. Changing the labyrinth march, now in effect; approving the construction of an International Eastern Star Temple and transferring \$25,000.00 to the Temple building fund; adoption of a resolution supporting the Towner – Starling Bill, acceptance of the Engle Collection of books which covers the history of our Order, adoption of recommendation that standing committee be appointed to study plans for constructive educational policy; granting certain chapter in Alaska to withdraw their allegiance from the General Grand Chapter and transferring it to the Grand Chapter of Washington; upholding the Landmarks of our Order and disapproval of extraneous degree organizations; Endorsement of work of Near East Relief; acceptance of book of Digest of Decisions of the General Grand Chapter 1876-1919 Compiled by Brother Walter F. Meier, Worthy Grand Patron of Washington.

I am sure I speak for all when I say we thoroughly enjoyed all musical numbers which added so much to the pleasure of this session and extend my sincere thanks for their efforts in our behalf.

To the incoming Worthy Grand Matron I wish to say, the best wish that I can offer her as a token of my appreciation of her friendship and loyal support, is that she may know in the fullest extent by the acts of her officers, the loyalty she herself has ever shown her Grand Matron.

The year's record is before you. What has been accomplished, has been accomplished by the united efforts of all who have had the love and good of our order at heart. The following lines by Douglass Malloch have helped me during the year.

## COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER

JANUARY 25, 1923.

TO THE WORTHY GRAND MATRONS, OFFICERS, MEMBERS AND TO ALL CHAPTERS UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER.

#### GREETINGS:

There seems to be some discussion as to action taken by the delegates at the Seventeenth Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter, concerning the White Shrine of Jerusalem.

This is a matter of so much importance that it seems advisable to send out to each member a plain statement of facts.

The report of the Most Worthy Grand Patron read at the Assembly contained the Circular Letter and Bulletin which were sent out by the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron in 1921 and also the Letter sent to the Supreme White Shrine of Jerusalem in 1922, requesting that Organization to change the basis for its membership.

These Official communications are familiar to all.

After the Most Worthy Grand Patron had read his report it was referred to the Committee on Jurisprudence, which Committee reported as follows:

To the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star:

Your committee on Jurisprudence has carefully considered that portion of the report of the Most Worthy Grand Patron referred to it, and we recommend the approval and endorsement by this General Grand Chapter of the Bulletin issued by our Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand

Patron on June 8th, 1921, to the Order at large and the recommendation contained therein, that each Grand Chapter pass legislation on the question of extraneous degrees.

Brother Sam P. Cochran moved the adoption of the report; the motion was seconded by Sister M. Alice Miller, P. M. W. Grand Matron, and was carried.

This report, while brief and consisting of only a few simple words, is far reaching in its import. The delegates, by a rising vote,

First:—Approved and endorsed these Official communications and the recommendations contained therein.

Second:—The Jurisprudence Committee recommended that each Grand Chapter pass legislation on the question of extraneous degrees.

Third:—The delegates by their vote showed their approval of the request made to the White Shrine of Jerusalem that it change its basis of membership and eliminate the name of the Eastern Star entirely from all connections with that Order.

The reply from the Supreme White Shrine of Jerusalem made to the foregoing request was as follows:

"The Supreme Shrine cannot recognize your request until it has been passed upon by the General Grand Chapter."

The members of the White Shrine of Jerusalem have been quoted as saying that "when the request was made to the White Shrine of Jerusalem by the General Grand Chapter at a Triennial Assembly, asking them to separate themselves from the Order of the Eastern Star, they would take immediate steps to do so." The approval of the Circulars and Letters sent to the Supreme White Shrine at its last session making such request now places the matter squarely before them as an official request of the General Grand Chapter.

Your newly elected Most Worthy Grand Matron and Patron being in full sympathy with the action of the General Grand Chapter and having been upheld by the delegates in the sending out of information regarding extraneous degrees are sending this communication and urging all Grand Chapters to pass the legislation suggested in the report of the Most Worthy Grand Patron read at the Seventeenth Triennial Assembly, until such time as the White Shrine of Jerusalem has changed the basis for its membership and ceased using the name of the Eastern Star in any manner whatsoever.

An official request will be sent to the Supreme White Shrine by the present Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron renewing the request made by our predecessors in office, with the earnest hope that it will be complied with.

Then we shall be able to carry on our work, for with peace in our own ranks we shall be able to promote peace elsewhere and make the influence of our Organization felt in countries where at present it is needed.

Each Grand Secretary is requested to read this communication at the first session of their Grand Chapter, and we trust all Grand Chapters will show their loyalty to the General Grand Chapter and to our beloved Order by passing legislation against ALL Extraneous Degrees.

Greetings:

In sending out my first official communication a feeling of Fraternal love and pride fills my heart. Our hopes for the Order are the same and I feel a personal interest in the welfare of each member. To know that one is an "Eastern Star" binds our hearts more closely.

The responsibilities I feel in taking up the work of my office makes it seem imperative that we all get busy at once and not let the days go by with little accomplished.

Since we met last November in Triennial Assembly I have been inspired by a visit to Porto Rico where I found the loyal sisters and brothers of that little island outdoing many of our Grand Jurisdictions in their charitable and benevolent work; feeding the children in the schools and working with the Masonic Brothers in providing for the health and happiness of all. It encouraged me to believe that by the united efforts of each member, understanding fully our Obligation and its responsibilities, we might fulfill our highest ambitions. With all this in mind I feel it my duty to call your attention to the important legislation enacted at our last Assembly and to urge your co-operation in every possible way for its successful accomplishment.

First: The building of a National Eastern Star Temple to take its place among the great memorials erected in our nation's Capitol and to give the Order of the Eastern Star standing and prestige in the eyes of all the world.

Second: The plan to assist the young men and women of our Order to procure an education which will fit them to take up the duties and responsibilities of life and also to carry on the work which we have begun.

Third: To instill in the heart and mind of each member a sense, not only of their individual responsibility as a part of this great organization, but the privilege which they enjoy in bringing to a culmination all plans for the uplift and betterment of the world.

Fourth: To urge each Grand Chapter to recognize and adopt one of the following Organizations for young girls: The Order of Job's Daughters or the Order of the Rainbow.

This should be done to prevent any discord which might arise in having both Orders started in one Jurisdiction. We think this matter should be brought to the attention of Grand Chapters as soon as possible.

Fifth: To request each Grand Chapter through its Worthy Grand Matron to continue the plan of making contributions to the Near East Relief by having all funds collected by Secretaries of Chapters who will send it to their Grand Secretary. She in turn making a record of all money sent her and forwarding the same each month to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary who will give proper credit to the Chapters for their contributions, and forward the amount to the Headquarters of the Near East Relief. Each Grand Chapter will receive an official receipt. In this way our Grand Chapters and the General Grand Chapter can get full credit for this benevolent work. The need of funds for Near East Relief is more urgent than last year. Women and children are dying by the thousands for lack of food and attention.

We cannot sit coldly by and not give at least a part of our sustenance to those of God's Children, who are in dire distress, we should divide our crust to save a life and gain a Star in our crown. Let me urge that this matter be looked after thoroughly and promptly by the Worthy Grand Matron and other officers.

Sixth: To do your utmost to bring about the separation of the White Shrine of Jerusalem from the Order of the Eastern Star that our efforts may be united in all that pertains to the work of our Order.

The Special Committees on the National O. E. S. Temple and Educational Plan are devising ways and means to promote this work. Instructions will be sent to all and it is the wish of your Most Worthy Grand Matron that when the next Assembly shall convene we may have laid the cornerstone of our Temple and secured sufficient funds to begin its erection.

Letters from officers and members telling of their interest and success will be greatly appreciated. Then I shall have greater courage to do all in my power to bring honor and glory to the Order of the Eastern Star.



# Report of Committee on Penal Code

### PENAL CODE

This Grand Chapter shall have original jurisdiction to enforce its Constitution and Laws, to hear all appeals from Subordinate Chapters and its members; all charges and matters of controversy between Chapters or a Chapter and its presiding officers and to determine such cases where justice and the welfare of the Order demand such a course.

Whenever charges are preferred against a member of this Grand Chapter growing out of his official conduct, the Grand Matron on receipt of same shall cause a true copy to be served on the accused, and, if, after investigation she finds the charge or charges to be without sufficient foundation she shall report accordingly to the next session of the Grand Chapter; but if the Grand Matron shall find the charges to be well founded she shall forthwith suspend the accused from all his or her privileges as a member of the Grand Chapter and notify him or her to appear at the next meeting of the Grand Chapter and answer to the charges against him or her. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron of a Subordinate Chapter shall be amenable to the Grand Chapter for official or moral misconduct only during the office of said Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron.

In all cases where charges are made and trials held in this Grand Chapter, the method of conducting such trials and the degree of punishment to be determined shall be according to the rules and methods prescribed for Subordinate Chapters.

- A breach of good morals, or a violation of the laws of the state or of the United States, is an offense against the principles of this Order and should be dealt with promptly.
- Any member who disobeys the order of the presiding officer, or in any manner disturbs the harmony of a Chapter must be held strictly accountable therefor, and upon a repetition of the offense dealt with in such manner as the Chapter may determine.
- 3. A member of a Chapter may be suspended for non-payment of dues by the following procedure:
- (a) Notice shall be served upon the delinquent to appear at a stated meeting and show cause why she or he should not be suspended.
- (b) If the delinquent fails to appear, or, appearing, fails to show good cause for such delinquency, she or he may be suspended by a majority vote of the members present.

- (c) Upon the payment of accrued dues by a member suspended for non-payment of dues, she or he shall be reinstated without vote of the Chapter.
  - 4. The four penalties recognized are:
    - (a) Reprimand
    - (b) Suspension for a definite time
    - (c) Suspension indefinitely
    - (d) Expulsion
- 5. No Member can be tried for any crime whatever, except upon written charges and specifications, signed by the person or persons making them. Twenty days' notice shall be given of the time and place of the trial.
- 6. All members will be given notice of the time and place of trial; but the name of the accuser or accused shall not be mentioned in said notice.
  - 7. The Conductress must in all cases represent the Chapter at any trial.
- 8. After trial and conviction, such member may be punished in accordance with the penalties prescribed in No. 4.
- 9. The provisions of Nos. 5 and 6 shall not apply to the suspension of members for non-payment of dues.
- 10. A member of any Chapter has the right to prefer charges, but in no case can this right be extended to one who is not affiliated with a Chapter.
- (a) Charges against a Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron for any offense not growing out of a discharge of her or his official duties must be made in writing to the Worthy Grand Matron, stating the charge or specifications; if approved by her, she shall fix a time for trial, and notify the Chapter.
- (b) A copy of the charges and specifications shall be sent to the Secretary of the Chapter, with instructions to serve a copy upon the accused. The Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron shall preside at the trial.
- (c) In all things relating to the trial of a Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron by her or his Chapter, except as otherwise specified in these rules, the same proceedings must be had as in the trial of other members.
- 11. Charges shall be presented at a regular meeting, read in open Chapter, and spread upon the record. The presiding officer shall then set a time for trial, and order the Secretary to serve a true copy of the charges upon the accused, and notify her or him of the time set for trial. (See Forms 1 and 2).
- 12. The Secretary shall serve notice upon the accused, either in person or by mail, (See Form 2); twenty days shall elapse before the accused is brought to trial.

- 13. Charges shall specify with reasonable certainty the character of the accusation and the time and place of its commission, including the names of witnesses.
- 14. Satisfactory information from a Masonic Lodge in which a member holds membership shall be deemed sufficient evidence upon which to base a charge.
- 15. The attendance of witnesses on either side, when members of the Order may be enforced by summons, to be issued by the Secretary when ordered by the Worthy Matron or Chapter.
- 16. At the time set for trial, if the accused fails to appear in person or by counsel, or has absconded before notice is served, the presiding officer may continue the case to some future time, or appoint a competent member to appear for the accused and hear and decide the case as though the accused were present.
- 17. Should the accused appear and plead guilty to the charge and specifications, no further evidence is necessary, and the Chapter shall at once proceed to fix the penalty.
- 18. Upon the trial of a Sister, at the request of a majority of the Sisters present, the Brethren shall retire, and upon the trial of a Brother, at the request of a majority of the Brethren present, the Sisters shall retire. None but members of the Chapter are permitted to be present, unless acting as counsel or witness.
- 19. Any affiliated member may act as a counsel for the accused or the  $\!\!$  Chapter.
- 20. All charges must be heard and decided by the Chapter; in no case shall this be left to a committee.
- 21. The accused shall be a competent witness, but shall not be required by the Chapter to give evidence unless she or he shall offer to testify.
- 22. When a witness is a non-resident, and cannot attend in person before the Chapter, her or his evidence may be taken before a Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron, certified by the Secretary under the seal of the Chapter in whose jurisdiction the witness may reside, both the accuser and the accused having due notice of the time and place of the testimony.
- 23. The evidence of members of the Order who may not be able to attend the trial, and of persons not members of the Order, shall be taken in writing by a committee appointed by the presiding officer, of which the accuser and the accused shall have notice.
- 23 (a). At the time and place appointed the committee shall proceed to take the evidence of such witnesses, and after reading to each her or his evidence in the case, request her or him to sign the same. The evidence thus taken shall be read before the Chapter at the time of trial.

- 24. The presiding officer shall decide as to the admissibility of testimony offered, and all points of law and order that may be raised.
- 25. In all trials the evidence given must be reduced to writing and preserved by the Secretary.
- 26. The rules of evidence shall be, so far as applicable, the same as in courts of law. Affirmation shall be required of witnesses.
- 27. Charges may be withdrawn by the accuser at any time before vote is taken, by unanimous consent of the Chapter.
- 28. After the evidence shall have been presented, and the plaintiff and defendant, or their counsel, have had an opportunity of being heard, the defendant and accuser—if not Conductress—shall retire, and the Chapter shall proceed to take a separate ballot upon each specification; first, whether the accused is guilty or not guilty, as charged.
- (a) A two-thirds vote of the members present shall be required for conviction, wanting which conviction fails.
- (b) If defendant is found guilty, penalty shall be fixed, commencing with the highest grade, until one of the penalties prescribed in Rule 4 is determined upon.
- (c). A two-thirds vote of those present shall be required to determine the grade of punishment.
- (d) Neither the vote to convict nor to fix the grade of punishment shall be re-taken.
- 29. Should definite suspension be decided upon, the time must be fixed upon motion, but the longest time must be voted upon first.
- 30. Should the Chapter refuse by a two-thirds vote to inflict any penalty, after having voted on each grade, the Secretary shall, within three days, certify the fact to the Worthy Grand Matron, who may arrest the charter of the Chapter.
- 31. The Chapter that tried and suspended or expelled a member, may grant a new trial in the following cases:
- (a) Upon the presentation of new evidence which would to a reasonable certainty, cause a change in the sentence imposed by the Chapter.
- (b) When the findings of a Chapter are contrary to the evidence, law and usage, and the penalty imposed is excessive.
- (c) Application for a new trial must be made in writing, and contain a statement of the causes upon which the application is founded.
- (d) Such application must be presented within ninety days after the trial was had, or within ninety days after the accused is informed of the action of the Chapter.

(e) Application for a new trial shall be addressed to the Chapter. In all cases where a new trial is granted, the same rules shall govern as in the first trial.

We herewith submit the Penal Code for the Grand Chapter of Delaware.

Brother Alfred M. Clower moved the reading of the minutes of the last Session be dispensed with in as much as they had been printed in the proceedings, and that they be approved and accepted. Seconded by Brother Walter Sawdon.

By order of the Grand Matron, the Grand Marshal declared the Grand Chapter called from labor to refreshment until 10 A. M.

By order of the Grand Matron the Grand Marshal declared this Grand Chapter called from refreshment to labor. 11.30 A. M.

The Grand Matron of Pennsylvania, Sister Margaret B. Alexander was presented at the Altar and escorted to the East, given Grand Honors.

# Report of Board of Instructors

To the Officers and Members of Delaware Grand Chapter O. E. S.: Sisters and Brothers:

The Board of Instructors elected for Chairman, Brother Harvey F. Smith; and for Secretary, Sister Violet Rush for this Grand Chapter year, as per Constitution.

Held four schools of instruction for the subordinate Chapters of Wilmington and instructed the work per Ritual under the direction of the Worthy Grand Matron. Visited Chapter rehearsals and all of the Chapters in the State.

Issued 17 B. Class Certificates to the Worthy Matrons and Patrons of all Chapters before their installation as per Constitution, and 2 A. Certificates.

This Board feels that the work is becoming more uniform throughout the State by having this Board working under the direction of the Worthy Grand Matron and would recommend that the Worthy Matrons and Patrons elect secure their B Class Certificates from the Board of Instructors at least three days before their installation as they cannot be installed unless they hold this certificate as per Constitution, also those anticipating an elective office in this Grand Chapter that calls for an A Certificate securing same as they also cannot hold office as per Constitution without this certificate.

Wishing that the success of this Board and Grand Chapter may continue to grow more and more each year.

  - 4. It teaches its MEMBERS the IDEAL MAN is a MASON.
- 5. BOOK of JOB is a DRAMA, a LESSON of LIFE, taken from the Bible, recognized as the Standard Literature by our Universities.
- 6. The FAIREST DAUGHTERS in all the LAND. (42 Chapt., 15th Verse).
- 7. It TRAINS girls for LARGER RESPONSIBILITIES of CITIZEN-SHIP and LEADERSHIP made necessary by the ENFRANCHISEMENT of WOMEN.
- 8. It REQUIRES a MASONIC RELATIONSHIP with Benefits and Responsibilities without being Sponsored by a Masonic Lodge or O. E. S. Chapter.
  - 9. TRAINS girls to help themselves and HELP OTHERS.
- 10. CULTIVATES an AMBITION for GOOD MUSIC, LITERATURE and EDUCATION.
  - 11. It is a DEMOCRATIC organization controlled by councils.
- 12. UNIFORMITY in GRAND JURISDICTIONS assured by a SUPREME COUNCIL.
- Each Grand Jurisdiction raises an EDUCATIONAL FUND for those needy MEMBERS who are WORTHY, with the help of the members themselves.

- 14. VALUABLE LAWS were added October, 1922.
- 15. ULTIMATE AIM is ESTABLISHMENT of a school for HIGHER education.
- 16. Basing Membership on the Eastern Star was dropped May 1921, because of the Pending Resolution in the General Grand Chapter.

# Object of the Order

The purpose of this organization is to band together girls, hereinafter designated, for spiritual and moral upbuilding, to seek knowledge, to teach love of God, love of Country, love of Home and Family and a reverence for the Teachings of the Holy Scripture.

# Eligibility

Girls from the ages of 13 to 18 who are the daughters and sisters of Master Masons in good standing, or those who were in good standing at the time of their death. (The present law also admits grand-daughters and nieces, but there is an amendment to the Constitution which may exclude them after the October Annual Meeting in 1923. This amendment will not exclude girls who come in prior to the passage of the amendment.)

### Education

- (a) We have a Council of one or more members, known as the Educational Guardian Council, at schools and Universities where girls reside and attend school away from their homes.
- (b) Each Chartered Bethel stages two programs a year, known as Educational Fund-Raising Programs, one-half of which goes to the Bethel and the other half to the Educational Committee of the Grand Council of that State and is loaned to worthy members of the order who desire University or Vocational training. This fund is handled subject to the direction of a Council of the Supreme Body and according to the laws of the organization.
- (c) The Bethel Council may receive donations for the Educational Fund which will be turned over to the proper State Officer for Educational purposes. These funds are loaned without interest.

# Supreme Guardian Council

The Supreme Body is composed of ten officers and an Advisory Supreme Guardian Council, who supervise the affairs of the organization.

### Grand Guardian Council

In new states a Deputy Guardian is appointed until a Grand Guardian is appointed or elected. As soon as five Bethels hold Charters, a Grand

Guardian Council is organized for that State, Province or Territory, who direct the affairs of the local organizations which are known as Bethels. The Supreme Guardian Council assumes control of a State, or Territory until it has its own Grand Guardian Council.

### Bethel Guardian Council

Five or more persons of proper Masonic relationship, four of whom must be women, may organize a Bethel. Before they organize a Bethel, their appointment must be confirmed by the Guardian of that State.

### Bethels

Each Subordinate Body is called a Bethel. (Bethel means a Holy place). It requires twenty eligible girls, who make application by signing a petition of membership (unless they are already members of the Order.) Each member petitioning for a new Bethel must sign her name, age and address on an application for Dispensation and each member of the Bethel Council must witness the application for Dispensation and send the same to the Grand Guardian or Deputy Guardian of the State for approval. The Grand Council of the State then issues the Dispensation. In states where there is no Grand Council, the Grand Guardian sends the application to the Supreme Secretary.

# Dispensations

Each application for Dispensation must be accompanied with a fee of fifteen (\$15.00) dollars. If no Dispensation is granted, the fee is returned.

#### Charters

A Charter will be issued by the Supreme Guardian Council on recommendation of the Supreme or Grand Officer who inspects the Bethel and finds it proficient in the work and entitled to receive one. A fee of fifteen (\$15.00) Dollars must accompany the application for Charter.

# Supplies Furnished

The following supplies are sent as soon as a Dispensation is issued: 22 Rituals, 25 Music Rituals, 2 sets of Ode Cards, Nos. 1, 2 and 3. A Roll Book, Secretary's and Treasurer's Books, one set for the Bethel members and another set for the Bethel Guardian Council. A set of Floor Marches, 100 Petitions for Membership, Crowns for the three presiding officers, and six copies of the Constitution and Laws.

The initial expense of opening a Bethel U. D., is less than \$50.00.

# Additional Bethel Supplies

Each Bethel must provide itself with a meeting place, bible, gavel, flag, gowns as described in the Annual, which can be made by the members themselves if they choose, mortar board caps for the choir, etc.

### Annual Proceedings of 1922

Practically all questions which concern this organization, are answered in the Annual Proceedings, which contains a copy of the laws as revised October 14th, 1922.

### Report of Building Committee

This committee met soon after the close of the last session to plan a program which might result in securing a building or home for the Eastern Star Chapters in this City.

As a result of several conferences, the Worthy Grand Matron wrote each of the Chapters in the City, asking them to have old building committee members resign or discharged and appoint committees of three to work in accord with the committee of the Grand Chapter.

Various sites were inspected and reported to committees, but no action taken. On their last meeting night in June, all Chapters voted to authorize their Worthy Matrons who were appointed on the building committee of the Grand Chapter to unite with the Worthy Grand Matron and incorporate under the laws of Delaware, and voted permission to the Worthy Grand Matron to withdraw money set aside in building Funds to be accounted for by shares of stock at five dollars per share.

On the eighth day of July nineteen hundred twenty-two the Delaware Order of the Eastern Star Building Corporation was formed;

"To advance, promote and maintain the educational, benevolent and social interest of the Order of the Eastern Star, in the State of Delaware; to erect, maintain and operate a Temple for the use of the several Chapters of the said Order, in the State of Delaware, for the conferring of degrees and the entertainment of the members of the said Chapters and their families.

To purchase or otherwise acquire, to hold, own, mortgage, pledge, sell, assign and transfer, or otherwise dispose of, to invest, trade, deal in and deal with goods, wares and merchandise, and real and personal property of every class and description; and in particular lands, building, mortgages, shares, stocks, debenture securities, concessions, and any interest in real or personal property whatsoever.

To enter into, make, perform and carry out contracts of every kind, for any lawful purpose, without limit as to amount, with any person, firm, association or corporation.

To draw, make, accept, endorse, discount, execute and issue promissory notes, bills of exchange, warrants and other negotiable or transferable instruments.

To issue bonds, debentures or obligations of this corporation from time to time, for any of the objects or purposes of the corporation, and to secure the same by mortgage, pledge, deed of trust or otherwise.

To purchase, hold and re-issue the shares of its capital stock."

The total authorized capital stock of this corporation is One Hundred
Thousand Dollars divided into twenty thousand shares of the par value of
Five Dollars each.

Of said stock, Forty Thousand Dollars being eight thousand shares shall be designated "Class A" stock, and the balance, Sixty Thousand Dollars being twelve thousand shares, shall be designated "Class B" stock.

The "Class A" stock may be held only by a regularly constituted Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, located in the City of Wilmington, New Castle County and State of Delaware or by such officers of said regularly constituted Chapters as may be especially empowered to represent them, but no such Chapter shall be privileged at any time to hold more than one Thousand Shares of said "Class A" stock.

The "Class B" Stock may be issued at, when and to whom the Board of Directors may by a majority vote decide; but the holders of "Class B" stock shall not be entitled to any voice or vote in the management of the affairs of the corporation; the exclusive voting power shall be vested in the holders of "Class A" Stock.

A moving Picture benefit was held in November 1922, all chapters participating and as a result \$693.42 was added to our fund. The Treasurer of the Corporation will give financial reports of the funds of the corporation.

Your committee finds that a site for building will cost about twenty-thousand dollars. A new building of first class construction, containing a lodge room approximately 65 feet square; on the first floor would be offices, rest rooms and rooms that could be used for cards, in the rear an auditorium for holding dances and social affairs. The completed building, including site and furnishings, to cost in the neighborhood of \$70,000.

The necessity for acquiring an O. E. S. building is being more plainly shown to us as time goes on and it will be a great event in our history and a great stride forward when we have an O. E. S. Temple.

This estimate of carrying charges is based on a building costing \$50,000, on a lot costing \$20,000. It is probable that the assessed value of this property

would be about 80 per cent. of the total cost or \$56,000. The carrying charges on such a building would approximately be:

No repairs are counted in this estimate for the reason that the building would be new. The amount charged for the use of the hall is small and is

about one-half the amount which is charged for the use of the New Century Club Building. The amount charged for use of lodge rooms is also small. It might be possible to increase both to a considerable amount but the calculation is based on the idea of making the place popular with the people by giving reasonable prices at the beginning.

Sister Jennie M. Hill, moved report be adopted, seconded by Brother Harry T. Hickey.

The following Amendment was offered:

Article 3, Section 1, Under Rules and Regulations.

Strike out clause No. 8 which reads "for home fund, 25 cents".

The Worthy Grand Matron made the following statement:

"This being an amendment to the rules and regulations governing the Grand Chapter, if adopted by two-thirds vote of delegates present tonight, is enforced from this time on. It is not necessary to read it at the next session before its adoption."

Brother C. Herbert Neutze moved the adoption of the amendment.

Sister Ruth A. Neutze asked the Worthy Grand Matron to explain just what this 25 cent home fund means.

Worthy Grand Matron, "I thought all understood this when it was unanimously adopted by all the delegates present at that time. This 25 cents is the beginning of a fund for an Eastern Star Home in Delaware. It is our one start for a worthy charity and an incentive. We are organized to care for the sisters, wives, widows, mothers and daughters of Master Masons, but particularly the sisters and mothers of Master Masons. They are not admitted, as my understanding goes, to the Masonic Home. The brother Masons care for their wives and children but no provision is made for their mothers or sisters, and it is the object of the Order of the Eastern Star to look after these relatives of Master Masons and members of our own organization. That is the purpose of the 25 cents home fund and it seems to me would be taking a step backward if we adopted this amendment, and I do most earnestly hope that it will not be adopted at this Session or any other Session."

Brother Neutze called for question on the motion.

On motion the amendment was killed.

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Amy E. Meyer made the following statement:

I wish to acknowledge at this time the valuable assistance and advice given your Building Committee by Mr. Samuel H. Baynard, Jr., of the Del-

Brother Harry F. Newlin moved this report be accepted and spread on the minutes of Grand Chapter, Seconded by Brother Harry T. Hickey.

Worthy Grand Matron: "I would like to tell the sisters and brothers that the proceedings of the Grand Chapter, the first proceedings, is a very full and complete record of the organization of the Order of the Eastern Star in this State. It opens with the organization of Delaware Chapter and continues through the organization of the Grand Chapter. It is a full record of the institution of the Grand Chapter, of the first session held one year ago at this time, and contains also a copy of our constitution, rules and regulations governing both this Grand Chapter and the subordinate chapters. It also contains the photographs of our very well loved Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Chapin, and Past Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother McDaniel, our own Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Keyes, and our First Worthy Grand Matron, and First Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Secretary, Grand Treasurer, first Board of Instructors and a group of the first set of Grand Officers. These proceedings are for sale to the membership. There are a limited number to be offered and the price is 65 cents per copy. I am sure that every one would appreciate this as a memento and history of the Order in this State. You may secure your copy from the Grand Secretary. Before going into the installation of officers, I am going to ask Sister Keyes to talk to us."

# Address of Right Worthy Grand Secretary Sister Minnie Evans Keyes

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sisters and Brothers: To have a joy is to share it, happiness was born a twin and so I have come back to Delaware to enjoy with you the second homecoming of the faithful followers of the Eastern Star of Delaware. I am sure I need not tell you I have wanted to come, for I have always planned to be with you at this session, and I shall go away carrying still higher regard for this Grand Chapter. You have passed much good legislation, you have not taken a backward step. I am pleased to see such an interested group of members here this evening. As we go about this great United States of ours, we find perhaps a larger membership than you have but there are none more true-hearted than the members of the Eastern Star of Delaware.

"I am pleased to find that you can discuss these problems and that you let the majority decide. That is the only way to do. For ages past men have gathered together to discuss problems, whether for the selfish interest of a few or the greater good of all. When you legislate, legislate for the best interests of all and then throw aside and forget all personal opinion and work for the other fellow's plan if he is successful, either to show him that he is wrong or to show yourself that he is right. In the long years of experience I have had,

I have been on the minority side many times. If the things do not go my way, I go the other fellow's way. You can safely do this in every matter that comes before you for discussion.

"There are a great many things I would like to say to you but the hour is late. I had this afternoon laid out to bring tonight something which would not have been of much use to you, but to look at, and that was a Chinese Bible sent to me by International Chapter No. 1 from Peking, China. They used the Chinese Bible when they were instituted and have members of nobility in that chapter, so I was very proud to receive it. I have not read it through, and can hardly find the 23rd Psalm, but it is there. They are also going to send me a set of jewels for my very own.

"I have been much interested indeed in your sessions. I believe in Delaware the Masonic fraternity looks upon you with a great deal more regard than you anticipate. They are observing you and watching you carefully and I think the work you are doing in furnishing a room in the Masonic Home is not going by unnoticed. Carry on this work, furnish a room in it. if you can thereby establish a precedent for listening and thinking of what the Masons are doing. Work just a step behind them in all they are undertaking. Your seed will fall upon fertile soil. I have had experience in the home problem. I was Vice-President in Michigan and I thought we should have an orphanage to take care of our children. Brother Smith said your Eastern Star Home might not materialize in his time. He may not be a very old man when you have started a small home in Delaware. Just a modest dwelling on the outskirts of your city here. Some little place where perhaps four or five mothers or sisters can be cared for. Perhaps they can do their own work if you will furnish them coal and groceries, and you have started a home for the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware. Do not plan for great buildings, little things are the things that count and when you find some dear old sister who cannot take care of herself, buy a little home or rent a place, and you have a home in Delaware.

"Over in Michigan we have an orphanage. When I was Grand Matron in 1912 I started a promotion for an orphanage in Michigan. When we adopted our laws, we said that no mother should have to commit suicide in order to make her children orphans to have them put into a home. I talked about it all over Michigan. In just five years from that day I was made Chairman of a committee to select and purchase grounds and a home. We bought twelve acres of land, a beautiful old house. We spent \$30,000 to put it in shape, and today we have 23 children in that home, 23 little souls that we are guiding and making good citizens of, who look to us for care and support and for love, which is every child's due. We were fifty years old in Michigan before we had a home. We tried to do something big and waited and waited, but finally got started, and now we are going strong, for this year we have spent \$35,000 on that home in building playrooms and sleeping porches. Great

joy will fill your heart when you have once started a home where some soul is being cared for. You could raise \$1.00 per capita for a home in Delaware when once you stop to think how far-reaching it is. Your deeds will rise up and be greater in Delaware for you have better laws than any Grand Chapter I know of unless it be Winnipeg and Quebec, so I am proud of what you have done today.

"Just a word about your work last night. I was very much interested in what was said this afternoon by your Worthy Grand Matron. I feel you have accomplished something today in adopting a standard of work. should all do them alike. You have in Delaware a Board of Grand Instructors. Today you have said to them 'You will instruct every chapter and officers in Delaware in the work the same as you have been doing in the past year and for three years we will make no changes in the work.' We know you are going to have uniformity of work. When that time has expired and someone thinks perhaps something should be changed in the work they will present a resolution, it will be demonstrated and if you like it, you will adopt it. Then you will go on for another length of time. Your instructors are those who have studied the work carefully. Those of the past have been of the very best quality. I urge upon you, Worthy Grand Matron, think seriously about this always, co-operate with your Grand Instructors, so that when your Grand Matron comes to visit you she will not have to say that the officers did not do the work just as they should. Rather, she will say 'I see you have observed well what our Grand Instructors have told you.' It is her duty to call your attention to any errors or corrections in your work. I have seen the work done in many chapters in Delaware and no one need apologize for the work in the chapters. It is hardly fair to ask a sister to take a Star point in the Grand Chapter if she has never held it. I can remember that I went back a few years ago to my Grand Chapter and was asked to fill Esther's station and I never was so scared in my life. I had been Adah, and I knew I could do that but I had never done Esther's work. One dear old sister said I did not say it right, and I don't believe I did.

In every chapter, you do not need expensive paraphernalia. You need honest hearts that can interpret this work. Our memory often fails us, but it needs team work and practice, and so in order to put on your work letter perfect, although I have never seen it done yet, but I know the mistake will be mistake of memory and not of your hearts.

There are chapters in other states where the officers do not understand that these characters which represent our order are taken from the holy scriptures. When you read about Adah, Ruth and Esther we do not recall and read the history of these daughters. I regret to say in these jurisdictions they seem to try to say the work just as fast as they can.

Now my sisters, I urge you to study well the lives and the history of these heroines. In some jurisdictions when the officers come out I have been

hurt because when they tried to vision Ruth with her hands full of barley and Martha, and Electa, I hope you will not laugh, because it hurts, but I have seen these officers portray these parts in what I call ball gowns, gowns with no sleeves and not appropriate at all. With this in mind we have thought about preparing some suitable robe. In bible times every man, woman and child wore a loose gown. I had five of those gowns made and brought them with me and used them last evening. One evening a chapter in Washington, D. C., put on the work with all seventeen officers wearing those gowns. It was a beautiful sight. You can more easily visualize Ruth, Esther and Martha when they have on appropriate gowns. They also wore head-bands on each of which there are tassels. On the veil there is a fringe. It all corresponds with the gowns worn in the days when these heroines of our order lived on the earth. That is why I brought them to interpret the work a little more closely. I am sorry I could not have had the whole set of robes here for you. I am going back to Washington, and I am going to be very proud of Delaware.

"In June I am going to Quebec and I will tell them some of the legislation you have passed and tell them what Delaware is doing.

"You missed a rare treat on Tuesday evening if you were not present. There was a splendid address given by a brother in the evening of our reception. It was wonderful and spoken right from the heart. I urge you to go back to your chapters inspired and helped. You do not yet realize what a Grand Chapter is in Delaware, but you will as time goes on and you will appreciate more and more these brothers who have given of their time to come here and assist you in your deliberations.

"I was glad Sister Alexander was here to tell you about Pennsylvania. I wish for you the best this whole world affords, that is peace and harmony, the reward of earnest effort and the satisfaction that comes to every person of having done their best. No person can be so lowly but what they can say, I have done my best, I will renew my obligation, I will pass on, and when I lie my head upon my pillow tonight I shall be prepared to meet my God. I shall be glad when I can come again."

# Address of Worthy Grand Patron

With a membership of nearly 1,500,000 it has surpassed everybody with the exception of the Masons, who lead them all, and the Independent Order of Odd Fellows. To have been selected to one of the highest offices within the gift of this splendid organization, to be made an officer of any kind in this wide-awake body of nearly 1,500,000 earnest women and men, for the women must always lead in the Eastern Star, is an honor out of the ordinary for anyone. I assure you that I appreciate it, that I will do my best for the advancement of the Grand body which has honored me, as well as for the advancement of the Eastern Star in any place or any time. I thank you."

## Junior Past Worthy Grand Patron Made the Following Remarks:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Past Worthy Grand Matron, Brothers and Sisters, I am glad to say that I have reached the point where I am one of the past. I have had a delightful year. It is quite true that I have not been able to accomplish much. I have, however, made an earnest effort beginning with Clayton and going directly down the State. I wish to say tonight that I feel grateful to all the Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons, the officers and members of the Eastern Star for the kind manner in which I have been received during the past year, which has been one glorious year, and I feel sure that the same treatment will be accorded the present Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron that was given to my Worthy Grand Matron and myself.

I thank you."

Brother Neutze at the request of Sister Keyes was asked to retire and present the First Worthy Grand Patron of Delaware in the East.

Sister Keyes: "Sister Story and Brother Newlin, to me has been delegated the duty of presenting you with the jewels of your stations as Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron of Delaware. Sister Riley, I have most thoroughly enjoyed our association these past two years, they have been ever pleasant, without friction, and I have found in you a loyalty to your superior officers, whoever they might be, in the Grand Chapter or in the General Grand Chapter. You have ever at all times and under all circumstances effaced yourself that the dignity of the work and the dignity accorded to those who were preceding you might not be impaired. May you have the pleasure of realizing during this year all the loyalty, all the dignity pertaining to your office, all the good, all the joys and happiness and privileges of the Worthy Grand Matron. # FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENCE

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers, and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware:

In submitting my report as Fraternal Correspondent, I bring to you gleanings from forty-eight Grand Jurisdictions.

It has been a wonderful mind journey, from the frozen North to the sunny South, from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans. I have also taken a trip (by airplane of course) and enjoyed a visit to the Grand Chapter of Scotland and have found displayed everywhere that beautiful spirit of fraternity which is so dear to the hearts of all Eastern Stars, for "There's neither East nor West border, nor breed nor birth, when Eastern Stars stand face to face, though they come from the ends of the earth'."

"I wish that space would permit me to give you in full an account of the splendid reports, the eloquent and inspiring speeches, the wonderful addresses by distinguished Masons at the opening of many Grand Chapters; as it will not be possible for me to do this, I can only give you what is of general interest.

"In all jurisdictions 'Old Glory' has been an honored guest. In Nevada and Ontario the 'Stars and Stripes' and 'Union Jack' were displayed side by side.

"Your Flag and my Flag, safely it holds, Your land and my land, within its folds'."

Delaware, the Baby Grand Chapter of the United States, extends a loving welcome to the two new Grand Chapters organized in June 1922, one at Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, and one at Sherbrooke, Province of Quebec, Canada.

Beautiful Memorial Services were conducted for those of our members who have passed through the shadows, to a "Life of Endless Day."

In many jurisdictions, Homes have been established or funds have been started for that purpose. Several jurisdictions have a fund for the education of the Home children which will fit them to take up the duties and responsibilities of life, and also to carry on the work which we have begun.

The Order of the Eastern Star made a splendid response last year to the appeal for the orphan children of the Near East. As a result of our efforts, the lives of hundreds of children were saved. This year the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Cora R. Franz, has requested that this benevolent work be continued, as the need of funds is more urgent, even than last year

Growing out of a desire to inform girls of the teen age that Masonry has had a distinct part in the building of American principles and ideals, and that it has been nobly assisted by the Order of the Eastern Star, the Order of the Rainbow for girls was organized in McAlester, Oklahoma, on April 6, 1922, with seventy-six Charter members, being sponsored by South McAlester Chapter No. 149, Order of the Eastern Star. In one year they have secured sponsorship from 128 different organizations, who are willing to stand back of the Order in their towns and cities.

Job's Daughters is another organization for young girls, and has made splendid progress in the less than three years of its existence; at the Second Annual Session held October 12, 1922, twelve chartered and twenty-nine U. D. Bethels, covering a vast range of territory were reported. They now have active Bethels in the following states: Nebraska, Illinois, Kansas, Michigan, Oregon, Missouri, Iowa, Minnesota, Maryland and New Mexico. Several petitions for Dispensations for Bethels in other States have been received. The Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Franz, urges each Grand Chapter to recognize and adopt one of these Organizations to prevent any discord which might arise in having both Orders started in one Jurisdiction.

The special Committee on the National O. E. S. Temple and Educational Plan are devising ways and means to promote this work, and it is our earnest hope that when the next Assembly shall convene we may have laid the cornerstone of our Temple and secured sufficient funds to begin its erection.

Thus the influence of our Order is ever widening and deepening and the beautiful rays of our Star are reaching out in all directions.

It has been a joy and a privilege to have reviewed the various Proceedings and to have served my Worthy Grand Matron during her term of office even in a small way.

I also wish to express my thanks and appreciation to our Grand Secretary, Sister Keys, for the promptness with which I have received the Proceedings.

# Twenty-second Annual Session

Montgomery

November 14, 1922

Worthy Grand Matron, Mrs. Margaret D. Southerland.

Worthy Grand Patron, Mr. Ben. M. Jacobs.

The Grand Chapter of Alabama, convened in the Grand Lodge Room, Masonic Temple at 10 o'clock, A. M.

The absence of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron, and Associate Grand Patron, being noted, Past Grand Matron, Alice Goins assumed the chair and requested Past Grand Patron, Geo. A. Beauchamp to assist her.

There not being a constitutional number of Chapters represented, Grand Chapter adjourned to meet on Wednesday evening November 15, at 7 o'clock,

### Wednesday Evening, 7 o'clock

The Grand Chapter was convened, but in the absence of a quorum, it was resolved by those present that the Grand Chapter be called to meet in annual session in the Masonic Temple at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning November 21, 1922, and it was further resolved that the Grand Secretary issue proper notices for the same.

### Tuesday Morning, November 21

Grand Chapter called to order by Past Grand Patron, Geo. A. Beauchamp.
There being a constitutional number of Chapters represented, the Grand
Matron proceeded with the opening of the Grand Chapter.

Alabama was honored by the appointment of Mrs. Amy A. Carle, as Worthy Grand Adah of the General Grand Chapter. The Worthy Grand Matron requested that she be brought to the East, where she was introduced, presented with an arm cluster of roses by the Grand Matron on behalf of the Grand Chapter of Alabama and given the Grand Honors. A splendid cut of Sister Carle appears on one of the front pages of the proceedings.

Mrs. Eloise C. Balmer, P. G. M., of Louisiana, was presented, welcomed and given the Grand Honors.

The Worthy Grand Matron reports much cause for encouragement. The Order has increased in membership, contributions to the Home have been generous, much enthusiasm in Subordinate Chapters and many new ones. She suggested the names of twenty-five to Sister Grand Matrons for appointment to represent other Grand Jurisdictions near Alabama and has made seventeen appointments as official representatives of Alabama in their Grand Jurisdictions. She issued 30 dispensations and refused 2. Installed the officers

of 12 Chapters. Held 31 schools of instruction. Was formally presented to the Grand Lodge of Alabama by the Most Worshipful Grand Master. Was made an Honorary Member of 7 Chapters, made 5 decisions and 6 recommendations. Has attended all but two of the Masonic Home Board meetings and expresses her thanks and appreciation for assistance from Grand Officers and members of the Chapters of the State of Alabama.

The Grand Patron has issued 25 dispensations for new Chapters and reorganized 1. The Boys' Dormitory at the Masonic Home was completed and furnished, and is but another evidence of the Eastern Star's desire to aid and assist our Masonic brethren. The Home has been a source of pride to every member of the Star.

Owing to business engagements, he found it impossible to attend the General Grand Chapter Assembly held in Washington, D. C., last November, but was ably represented by Sister Osborn.

The Grand Secretary reports that the corner stone of the O. E. S. Building at the Masonic Home was laid on January 23, 1922, the total cost of the building and furniture was \$34,302.69 all of this amount has been paid except \$1500.00.

In response to a call made for the Near East Relief, \$469.13 was received-Fellowship Forum subscriptions were \$132.00. Christmas Fund \$209.00. Morris Day Fund, \$4791.66. Mayor J. A. Trotti gave the address of welcome for the city, Mr. Henry Meyer, W. M. of Lake Charles Lodge, No. 165, F. & A. M. extended greetings, Dr. Paul Quilty, W. M.

Calcasieu Lodge No. 400. In the absence of Mr. George T. White, Eminent Commader, Malta Commandery No. 12, Mr. Edwin F. Gayle extended the welcome from that great body. Owing to the unavoidable absence of Grand Master, Ira Sylvester, Judge Prentiss B. Carter brought greetings from the Grand Lodge of Louisiana, F. & A. M. Response was made by Mrs. Georgia May Love, Associate Grand Matron.

The Grand Chapter convened in regular session in the Masonic Temple, at 10 o'clock A. M., May 10. The Junior Past Grand Matron presiding, invited the Grand Officers into the Chapter room. All Grand Officers were present except the Grand Sentinel. A constitutional number of Chapters being represented, the Worthy Grand Matron opened Grand Chapter in ample form.

The sum of \$500.00 was donated for the relief of the flood sufferers, to be placed in the hands of the incoming Grand Matron to be used by her where it is most urgently needed.

The Grand Matron in her address says that she has earnestly tried to remember that in the exercise of authority we should be governed by unselfish loyalty to the welfare of others. She pays a loving tribute to those who have been called to their Eternal Home, and extends loving sympathy to those who have been called upon to part with loved ones. She granted 7 dispensations and refused 4. She visited every chartered Chapter in the State except one, she also visited 4 of the U. D. Chapters. She reports a great demand for Rituals, 810 having been furnished to various Chapters. The Card Index system is used in this Jurisdiction. There are 111 chartered Chaptes, 15 U. D. Chapters. Membership is 10,957, net gain, 1,938.

This Grand Chapter assesses its members 10 per annum for a Relief Fund. Sister Adams, Jr. P. Grand Matron installed the Grand Officers, assisted by Sister King, Grand Marshal and Sister Mashburn, Grand Chaplain.

### MAINE

### Thirtieth Annual Session

The Thirtieth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter convened in Masonic Hall, Tuesday morning, May 23, at 10 o'clock.

All Grand Officers were present, the Grand Secretary having reported a constitutional number of Chapters represented, the Grand Chapter was opened in Ritualistic form.

An eloquent address of welcome was extended by the Grand Matron to Longfellow's "beautiful town that is seated by the sea." Many distinguished guests from Sister Grand Jurisdictions were also welcomed, given Grand Honors and seated in the East. The Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons were welcomed by the Grand Patron. Sister Nina V. A. Talbot, Grand Matron, and Brother Wilmot S. Ames, Grand Patron of 1897-98 were given an especial welcome as they were the Grand Matron and Grand Patron twenty-five years ago. They were escorted to the East and presented with flowers. The Grand Matron extended congratulations on their Silver Anniversary.

The Grand Matron reported the chain of Grand Officers unbroken, but announced that two Past Grand Patrons had passed away during the year. During the session the Grand Patron paid a special tribute in their memory.

One School of Instruction was held by the Grand Matron, at which an exhaustive study of the Constitution, Ritual and Secret Work was taken up. Every Chapter received an official visit, she personally inspected the home Chapter of every Deputy but one, and in this instance the Grand Patron was her Special Deputy. Fifty-two Chapters were inspected by herself. She reports the general condition of the Order throughout the Jurisdiction as excellent. She installed the Officers in 18 Chapters. When attending the Grand Chapter Sessions of New Hampshire and Massachusetts every courtesy was extended her.

The Grand Patron constituted 4 Chapters and instituted 3. The Grand Treasurer reports cash on hand of \$7,750.63, disbursements, \$4,571.58. Balance in General Fund, \$3,179.05.

There are 179 chartered Chapters and 3 U. D. Chapters in this jurisdiction, membership, 28,155, increase in membership, 2,537.

The Constitution, Rules and Regulations were revised at this Session.

The Officers were installed by Past Grand Matron, Sister Emma B. Howe, who ably performed the ceremony.

# Twenty-fourth Annual Session

A Special Session of the Grand Chapter was held on Tuesday, August 2, 1921, at 8.00 P. M., Baltimore, for the purpose of considering the future action toward the White Shrine of Jerusalem. Nineteen Chapters were represented, and after thoroughly discussing the question, White Shrine members were given 60 days to withdraw from that Order or be subject to the penalty of expulsion from the Order of the Eastern Star.

Five Special Sessions were called to grant Charters to Chapters under dispensation, fifteen Chapters received Charters.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Session was called to order at 10 o'clock, A. M., by Sister Margaret Megenhart, First Grand Matron of Maryland.

Twenty-nine Chapters responded to the roll call, fourteen being not represented. Grand Chapter was then opened in full form, all Grand Officers being present except two. Eight Past Grand Matrons and three Past Grand Patrons were escorted to the East and given Grand Honors.

Sister Minnie E. Keyes, R. W. Grand Secretary of the General Grand Chapter, was welcomed, escorted East and given the Grand Honors, she afterwards addressed the Grand Chapter in her own splendid manner, telling us of the wonderful growth of our Order, she says, "Things we represent are emblems of beauty and if we do live close to our Obligation, and teach to others the lessons of these five heroines of our Order, the blessing will be ours."

There were also distinguished visitors from the District of Columbia, and one Sister from Nebraska.

As the Grand Representative of Maryland, it was my great pleasure to accompany my own Grand Matron, Sister Julia M. Story, to this Grand Chapter Session, and the cordial welcome and generous hospitality (for which Maryland is famous) extended us, will ever be a beautiful memory. Maryland is very dear to me, for it is my native State. "Maryland, my Maryland."

The Grand Matron made many official visits, and visited many Chapters unofficially, she averaged 5 nights a week in the Chapter rooms during the

The Grand Treasurer reported \$12,832.89 in the Hall Fund, \$911.69 in the Reserve Fund and \$3,174.20 in the Home Fund.

This Grand Chapter has a Relief Committee, whose object is to aid unfortunate members of the Order. A Barn Dance and Rummage Sale, netted about \$600 for this branch of the work. Subordinate Chapters have Committees for the same purpose, and judging from their reports, they are doing splendid work. A voluntary collection of over \$150 was taken among the delegates for an injured Brother, and the Grand Chapter added enough to make the amount \$300.

The retiring Grand Matron, Sister Williams installed the new Grand Officers in a very impressive manner.

Sister Reviol, newly installed Grand Matron, and Brother Duval, newly installed Grand Patron, thanked the Grand Chapter members for the honor conferred upon them in well chosen words.

As Sister Willimas and Brother Mueller were leaving the East, Sister Celeste Ferguson sang, "The End of a Perfect Day."

Thus ended one of the best Sessions in the history of the Grand Chapter of Maryland.

The evening preceding the Grand Chapter Session, the Matrons and Patrons Association of Massachusetts observed its twenty-fifth anniversary

with a dinner, reception, entertainment, and dance, and was one of the most brilliant which the organization has ever held, about 500 being in attendance, including representatives from all parts of the State.

At noon of the first day, 28 Past Grands with 5 of their better halves gathered around the festive board to break bread together at the Parker House.

She visited 36 Chapters officially, and was represented in 143 Chapters by Deputy Grand Matrons. The Grand Patron says that service has been the keynote of his year's work, "He profits most who serves best." Early in the year he was requested to meet with the Orphanage Board and was made a member of the Building Committee for the new addition to O. E. S. Villa. It has been a pleasure to serve on this Committee, because here he has had an opportunity to perform one of the great duties of our Order, to care for the dependent children of our sisters and brothers. He instituted 10 new Chapters, assisted the Worthy Grand Matron in constituting Pilgrim Chapter. He recommends a Budget System and a uniform receipt for dues for every Chapter in this Jurisdiction.

The Grand Treasurer, Sister Jennie M. Newell, reports cash on hand, \$13,225.47, Orphanage Fund, \$31,271.30; O. E. S. Relief, \$15,000; O. E. S. Building Fund, \$7,962.00.

Sister Ellie Lines Chapin, Most Worthy Grand Matron, who was present during the entire session, addressed the Grand Chapter, and by her gracious manner and beautifully expressed sentiment, won the admiration and love of the Grand Chapter members. She was presented with a beautiful silver centre-piece, a receptacle for flowers.

Sister Gertrude N. Parkhurst, Past Grand Matron, presided during installation ceremony. She was assisted by the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Ellie Lines Chapin, who installed the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron. The Grand Officers were literally showered with flowers, and Chapters and personal friends vied with each other in bestowing beautiful gifts.

The Fifty-sixth Annual Session of the Order of the Eastern Star of Michigan passed into history with peace and harmony abounding.

Brough once said: "I would seize this flotsam of service, I would hang it upon the wall of Hero's symbolical temple, and I would carve upon the walls of that temple these words: 'She who lives for self lives a life lower than the flowers that fade and die as the autumn leaves, but she who lives for others lives forever', 'that whosoever would be greatest among the queens of the earth, must be the servant of all." And finally, a welcome was given by the Hostess Chapter. The Associate Grand Matron, Mrs. Lillie M. McCullough, made fitting response.

The Sixteenth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter was held in a beautiful Masonic Temple which had recently been completed in the city of McComb, at a cost of \$100,000. Grand Chapter was opened in full Ritualistic form. The National Flag was placed in the East by the Grand Chapter's three "little Mary's". All sang "America" during this ceremony.

Guests of Honor were Brother Paul H. Murphy, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Mississippi, F. & A. M., and Sister Lotta M. Armistead, Worthy Grand Electa of the General Grand Chapter, were escorted to the Grand East, and welcomed by Past Grand Patron, David R. Weston. Thirteen D. D. Grand Matrons, and 25 Grand Representatives responded to roll call.

Brother John Mason told of the early history of the Eastern Star in Mississippi. This Brother organized the first three Chapters in the State.

The Grand Matron has endeavored to impress upon the members that the five points of our Star represented five phases of human life, the every day life, and urged them to illustrate in their lives the lessons taught by the heroines of our Order. Nineteen Chapters were constituted and 22 new Chapters were instituted. By-Laws to 15 Chapters were approved. Officers were installed in 6 Chapters, 11 dispensations were granted, and the Grand Matron was elected to Honorary Membership in 38 Chapters. Changes recommended by her, in the Deputy System, were adopted by the Grand Chapter. Deputies must now undergo a written examination and secure a certificate of proficiency before being eligible to appointment. Her experience this year has convinced her that Schools of Instruction were a necessity in each district at least once a year and she conducted 11 Schools of Instruction, she also assisted the Deputies in others. In visiting the Chapters, she traveled over 5000 miles by rail and over 2500 miles by auto; she visited 116 Chapters She appointed 17 Grand Representatives, and recommended the appointment of 17. Three circular letters were sent to the Subordinate Chapters. She made 2 visits to the Masonic Home, she also visited the Boy's Farm Home at Columbus.

The Worthy Grand Patron issued dispensations for the formation of 29 Chapters. He reports the past year has been one of phenomenal growth in membership—the largest in the history of the Order. The net increase for the year 1921 is approximately 2500, and the total membership is now 10,305. He makes 3 recommendations; he also recommends that the Grand Chapter adopt some definite plan of work for the Masonic Homes. In conclusion he says, "The recollection of this honor can never be effaced from my memory, nor the grateful acknowledgement due you from my heart.

The Grand Secretary, Sister Myra C. Eaton, reports that the year has been a prosperous one financially as well as in growth of members. The total receipts were \$18,841.17, being an increase of \$2,167, over receipts of last year. \$210.50 was donated to the Near East Relief, \$131 was sent to the Masonic Farm School for chairs, and \$106 to the Natchez Orphans Home, and \$547.05 for blankets and bedding. She was authorized to furnish official badges to all Grand Representatives of other Grand Jurisdictions. She says that if words could express her appreciation to each one, it would be these:

"You are not as old friends or as new, But as Sisters and Brothers, tried and true."

An impressive Memorial Service was held in memory of those who had passed away during the year. A beautiful floral emblem, "The Gates Ajar" which was used in the service was placed on the grave of a Brother who had recently passed away.

Sister Myra C. Eaton, P. G. M., presented the Past Grand Matron's and Past Grand Patron's jewels to the outgoing Grand Matron and Grand Patron.

Many beautiful gifts were presented to the Grand Officers.

#### MISSOURI

# Forty-eighth Annual Session

The evening before the opening of the Session was devoted to a social function in honor of the Grand Officers, and was a wonderful event, the entire evening had a touch of refinement, which could be felt throughout the well rendered program.

The Forty-eighth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter was opened in subordinate form, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, October 10, in Moolah Temple, all Grand Officers being present.

The Grand Conductress presented for introduction the following distinguished Guests: Sister Josephine Hobson, Past Grand Matron of Iowa,

Sister Anna Dreher Dudderar, Past Grand Matron of California, and Brother R. T. Hynson, Past Grand Patron of Arkansas, and Sister Anna Winston Smally, Associate Grand Matron of Montana, was also presented aand welcomed.

The Grand Matron presents a very interesting report. She especially commends the work of the Distret Deputy Grand Matrons, and considers a good District Deputy invaluable to a Worthy Grand Matron, and to the District. There are 59 District Deputies in this Grand Jurisdiction. She appointed 17 Grand Representatives, and recommended the appointment of 13. She constituted 27 Chapters and commissioned proxies to constitute 16. She approved the By-Laws and amendments to By-Laws of 54 Chapters. She installed the Officers of 47 Chapters. She visited 92 Chapters, held 41 Schools of Instruction which were of much benefit to the officers and members. she urges the members to a better attendance at these schools, as they are held for their benefit alone. She wrote many personal letters besides four circular letters. As a result of two of her letters, Christmas and St. John's Day, in both of which she urged all to contribute to the Home Fund, \$5,031.91 was received from the St. John's day letter and \$4,415.05 was received from the Christmas letter. In conclusion she says: "I have traveled many miles in happy service to this Grand Chapter. I have on all occasions met with . most cordial and loving attention."

In his address the Grand Patron says, "A matter of great interest to all. is the fact that Masonic recognition is becoming steadily established. I have found co-operation and support of the Masonic Lodges throughout the State, and it is most gratifying to note the congeniality existing between the Masonic Fraternity and the Order of the Eastern Star of this Grand Jurisdiction." Twenty-seven new links were added to the chain during the year, 22 Chapters were instituted by the Grand Patron personally, and 5 by proxy. In company with the Grand Matron, he had the pleasure of assisting in the constitution of 6 Chapters and in the installation of 36. He attended 5 Schools of Instruction. One of the greatest events of the year has been the raising of necessary

funds for the new Masonic Temple, the Home of the Masonic Grand Lodge, and the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. When completed this Temple will be a monument to Masonry.

The Grand Secretary, Sister Genevieve F. Wyatt, P. G. M., submits her Tenth Report. Every Chapter sent in an annual report. Two Chapters have a membership of over 1000, and 18 Chapters have over 500 members. The net gain in membership was 6,685. St. Louis has 43 Chapters with a combined membership of 14,214. Total number of Chapters, 525.

The Grand Treasurer, Sister Estelle D. Walker, reported a balance on hand of \$51,142.52.

Sister Nettie Ransford, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter, and Past Grand Matron and Grand Secretary of Indiana, was presented by the Grand Conductress for introduction, welcomed by the Worthy Grand Matron, escorted to the East, and accorded the Grand Honors. Uniform white silk gowns were worn by the officers and the scene in the spacious new Shrine Temple was one of unsurpassed beauty and will long remain a standard to be emulated by the other Chapters of the jurisdiction.

After the newly elected officers had been installed, jewels were presented to the retiring Grand Matron and Grand Patron by C. W. Pomeroy, P. G. P.

No further business appearing, Grand Chapter was closed in ample form, peace and harmony prevailing.

An auto bus was purchased for the comfort of the Home folks, an elevator was also installed so that invalids may be taken to the ground floor in wheel chairs. New York gained 14,078 members in the year 1921. Total membership is 102,092. or lower in the aims and achievements, because of our actions. It befits us to make each day a carefully written page of worthy aspirations and noble deeds, which we can recall without shame."

The Grand Secretary, Sister Annie M. Pond, reports the income for the year from all sources as \$139,371.27 and disbursements of \$103,751.68 leaving \$35,619.61.

The Grand Lecturer, Sister Crook, says, "We must do more for initiates than to teach them Ritual, Law, and History. We must develop in them a desire to live the principles of our Order, if we wish the future history of the Order to be one for good."

The Grand Historian, Sister Louise Reid, presented a splendid report of the Order in New York and elsewhere. She says: "While we have a record of many Presidents who were Masons, namely, George Washington, Andrew Jackson, James K. Polk, James Buchanan, Andrew Johnson, James A. Garfield, William McKinley, William H. Taft, Theodore Roosevelt and Warren G. Harding, she can find only one instance where the First Lady of the Land was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star, and she was Mrs. McKinley, who was an ardent admirer of the Great Sisterhood, which never became ordinary nor common."

The Grand Historian Emeritus, Brother Alonzo J. Burton, presented his report in which he says: "Scottish Rite Masons will spend \$350,000 to develop a welfare and educational center on a site adjoining the present Scottish Rite Cathedral in Minneapolis. Plans now being drawn indicate that the project will give Minneapolis one of the most complete cathedrals in the United States, as well as executive offices, schoolrooms, and an auditorium scating 2,000 persons." (A wonderful report).

Beautiful gifts were presented to the retiring Grand Matron and Grand Patron. Other gifts were presented all of which were graciously acknowledged.

The Grand Officers were installed in their several stations by M. W. Joseph Halter, Grand Patron, assisted by M. W. Clara S. Heisenbuttle, Grand Marshal, and R. W. Spahn Everson, Assistant Grand Marshal.

The adoption means to write letters to them, and remember them on their birthdays and any other time they wish. It makes the guests happy indeed.

The Grand Secretary, Sister Mary C. Weatherly, reports a membership of 3,876, net gain, 736; 7 Chapters have an enrollment of more than 100 members each and 3 Chapters have more than 200 each; the largest Chapter Greensboro, No. 14 has 290 members.

The Grand Treasurer, Sister Emma B. Siler, reported receipts for the year, \$12,991.43 and a balance of \$3,834.34 in the Treasury.

More than \$4,500 was donated to the Near East Relief cause, 256 Chapters having responded to this plea. She had a wonderful year, she has gleaned from many sheaves and gathered much.

The Worthy Grand Patron began his report as follows: "My tent is folded, my year is ended. I shall not steal away, but, bravely and fraternally, press onward." He worked unselfishly for the upbuilding and uplift of the Order. As a just reminder he attended 287 meetings, traveled 13,353 miles wrote 4,739 letters, visited those who were ill in hospitals and homes and those who suffered and were in want, to the number of 672, Honorary membership 40 plus, instituted 19 Chapters, inspected 17.

The Grand Secretary, Sister Bessie Fargo Boice, presents her eighth annual report, showing a net gain in membership of 6,747. Balance on hand in the various funds are: General, \$82,538.38; Memorial, \$2,996.17; Endowment, \$18,975.22.

The initiatory work of our Ritual was exemplified by the Grand Officers, degrees being conferred upon 2 candidates.

The usual jewels were presented to the retiring Grand Matron and Grand Patron and beautiful gifts were received by the Grand Officers, all responded with thanks. The seventh annual banquet and meeting of the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons Association, was held on October 24, at 2 P. M. A "Round Table" discussion gave much pleasure and profit to all present.

The Eastern Star built a Chapel on the Masonic Home grounds which cost \$11,508.26, which is a splendid monument of lasting endurance to the kindly thoughtfulness of this Grand Body in providing a place of worship for the Home family.

The Grand Secretary reported a net gain in membership of 4,919 during the year. Fifteen thousand three hundred and forty-five dollars and fifty-five cents was received during the year.

The Grand Treasurer's balance was \$19,671.77.

Sister M. Alice Miller, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, acted as installing Officer. Beautiful gifts and flowers in profusion were presented to the outgoing and incoming Officers.

The Seventh Grand Session convened in the Horticultural Building, Lansdowne Park, Monday evening.

The Grand Officers were escorted by the Ottawa Ladies Patrol. As the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron reached the East a large electric "welcome" flashed forth. The Worthy Grand Matron was presented with a beautiful bouquet of sweet peas and roses.

The Union Jack and Stars and Stripes were escorted to the East. As the Grand Matron received the two flags in the East, she intertwined the Union Jack and Stars and Stripes. Cordial welcoming addresses were given by Mayor Plant of Ottowa, Past Worthy Matron, Della Kennedy and Selma W. Mason, to which Associate Grand Matron, Sister E. E. Rockwood, responded.

The Sixth Annual Session of this Grand Chapter convened in the Masonic Temple on Wednesday morning, May  $10\mathrm{th}$ .

She made 167 official visits, attended 39 of the 40 Schools of Instruction, approved Amendments and By-Laws of 44 Chapters. granted 161 Special Dispensations, organized 2 new Chapters, made 4 visits to the Masonic Homes, wrote nearly 6000 letters, and traveled 18,433 miles in the performance of her duties. She has been made an Honorary Member of 11 Chapters and expressed her appreciation of this mark of esteem and pledged to each Chapter her loyalty. She had the privilege of attending the Grand Chapter of Arkansas. Every courtesy was shown her and she was made an Honorary Member of their Grand Chapter. In conclusion she says: "We have given unreservedly of our best and whatever have been our failings, may they serve as beacons of warning, whose kindly light shall guide those who may follow. that out of the wrecks of the irrevocable past our reward shall be a glorified Star."

The Grand Patron reported much unrest, not only in our own ranks, but with the Masonic fraternity as well. He objects to putting one cent toward the proposed O. E. S. Temple to be erected at Washington, D. C. His reason for doing so was that we could invest that money in other places with a much greater reward. It is the hope of many of the members that they will be in a position financially to maintain a Home for the children of deceased members, as well as for the old and indigent.

Three hundred and thirteen members of Subordinate Chapters have "crossed over" since the last session of the Grand Chapter. Especially has this Grand Jurisdiction been bereaved by the loss of Past Grand Matron, Sister Laura F. Seaman, who passed away after months of suffering. An impressive Memorial Address was given by Mrs. Mary E. Brower.

"They have but journeyed to a better shore, Unknown to anguish, bitterness and strife; They calmly wait, their loved ones lingering here, To meet and greet them in celestial life."

The Grand Secretary, Cassie C. Leonard, reports total membership, 53,019. Total number of Chapters, 660. Net gain, 3,773.

The Grand Treasurer, Miss Willie I. Pearson, reports cash, \$41,772.56.

Treasurer Board of Trustees, M. T. Bell, reports total, \$211,415.61, divided as follows: O. E. S. Home Building and Maintenance Fund \$161,946.36; O. E. S. Endowment Fund, \$49,469.25.

A resolution was passed giving authority to Subordinate Chapters to sponsor the Order of the Rainbow for girls.

A resolution was offered by the Most Worthy Grand Patron, Dr. Alfred C. McDaniel, providing that no Eastern Star member should hold office in any Subordinate Chapter who is affiliated with an Order which takes the O. E. S. as a basis for membership or uses the name of the Order of the Eastern Star in any manner whatever. This resolution was adopted.

A sufficient amount having accumulated to build an Eastern Star Home in Texas it was voted to procure building plans, and to erect a building, not to exceed \$150,000. After much discussion the site donated by Mr. and Mrs. Sam P. Cochran was decided upon.

Past Grand Matron, Flora A. Penix, acted as Installing Officer.

Past Grand Patron, W. H. Mercer, handed down the gold headed cane which is passed on from one Grand Patron to his successor.

After singing, "God Be With You Till We Meet Again", and prayer by the Grand Chaplain, this very successful session closed.

### UTAH

## Seventeenth Annual Session

Salt Lake City

The Grand Chapter Session convened in Masonic Temple at 10.00 o'clock A. M.

This was the first time in its history that all Grand Officers were present at the opening of the Session.

An appropriate poem entitled "Old Flag" was beautifully rendered by Sister Lillian C. Kennedy.

Past Grand Matron, Sister Willie Clay Keyes, cordially welcomed the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. Fourty-four Grand Representatives were also welcomed. We note that Delaware's Grand Representative was among the number.

The Grand Matron says that she has not accomplished great things, but has endeavored to inspire enthusiasm for the high ideals of our Order, and to urge all to live daily by our obligation. She has been confronted, from time to time by evidence, that sufficient care has not been taken in the selection of competent officers. But 5 Chapters, in her judgment were doing excellent work. In most of the smaller Chapters a lack of knowledge of the laws of the Order caused discord and strife. She installed the officers in 6 Chapters, appointed 31 Grand Representatives and recommended the appointment of 21 Grand Representatives. She made 12 official visits, granted 6 Dispensations and issued 1 circular letter.

The Grand Patron instituted 1 Chapter, accompanied the Grand Matron on 4 of her official visits, which he enjoyed very much and regrets that he was not able to visit all of the Chapters. His advice for the "Good of the Order is excellent; he suggests that each Subordinate Chapter appoint a committee to instruct new members in the secret work as soon as possible after their initiation, that special emphasis should be placed on loyalty of members to the Officers, that the Ballot must be kept inviolably secret and discreet silence respecting the transactions of the Chapter should prevail at all times.

The Grand Secretary, Mrs. Frances G. Shields, reports 16 Chapters in the Jurisdiction, 8 Chapters have a membership of over 100 each and 3 Chapters have a membership of over 300. The net gain in membership during the year was 205. A budget of \$1,619.90 was allowed for the Grand Secretary's office, and all but \$24.18 was expended. Total amount in all funds, \$3,147.46.

The Grand Lecturer Sister Roxana G. Seaton, made 53 visits and gave instruction at many Schools of Instructions. Her experience has been that if you want knowledge, you must toil for it; and if pleasure, you must toil for it; "Toil is the law, and when one loves his work, his life is a happy one." She has given close study to the needs of the Order, and hopes for years to be able to lend to this work her best endeavors.

An Eastern Star Board of Relief co-operates with a Masonic Board of Relief in taking care of wives and daughters of Masons. Total receipts of the year for this cause amount to \$270.50, and the disbursements were \$200.39.

The newly elected Grand Officers were installed by the retiring Grand Matron, Sister Higson, in her usual pleasing manner.

The retiring Grand Matron was presented with the emblematic jewel by Brother Vicks, retiring Grand Patron, who expressed his pleasure in having been her co-worker for the year just past.

Prayer was offered by the Grand Chaplain, after which the Grand Marshal proclaimed the Grand Session closed.

This Golden Grand Session, convened in the Masonic Temple, June 7th, 1922.

The Assembly was called to order by Past Grand Matron, Mrs. Olive J. Stowell. The Grand Officers entered in a simple march, and assumed their stations. Then followed the presentation of "Old Glory" and the Vermont Flag.

Fourteen Past Grand Matrons and nine Past Grand Patrons, nine D. D. Grand Matrons, four D. D. Grand Patrons and Representatives from 75 Subordinate Chapters, were reported present by the Credential Committee.

Cordial "welcomes" were extended, to which suitable responses were given of such cheerfulness that all looked forward to a pleasant and profitable Session.

The Ritualistic Work of Fifty Years ago, was given by Ascutney Chapter No. 2. The Officers entered, dressed in the style of Fifty Years ago, and as they entered, the Lotus Quartet sang, "Just Fifty Years Ago". During the ceremony, music which was printed in the Ritual of that time was sung. A group picture of the officers appears in the Proceedings.

The Grand Matron's slogan for the year was "Be Loyal to Your Convictions of Right and Duty." She appointed 10 D. D. Grand Matrons, attended 10 District Meetings, visited 19 Chapters, assisted the Grand Patron in the constitution of 4 Chapters, and in the institution of 4 Chapters; installed the officers in 4 Chapters. Many waivers of Jurisdiction were granted by her. She has truly enjoyed receiving letters, but admits that it has kept her busy the year through trying to answer them. She makes 5 Decisions and 7 Recommendations. The Grand Officers were installed by Past Grand Matron, Sister Phyllis M. Burditt, who is also honored with the office of Worthy Grand Warder in the General Grand Chapter. During the installation ceremonies the Lotus Quartet

gave selections all of which were received with appreciation, and these added greatly to the impressiveness of the occasion and to the pleasure of those assembled.

Beautiful gifts and flowers were presented to the Grand Officers. This meeting will be remembered as one of the largest and most successful in the history of this Grand Jurisdiction. No further business appearing, the Grand Chapter was closed in ample form.

The Grand Chapter was called to order promptly at 1 o'clock Thursday, June 15.

Grand Chapter opened in regular form. As the Grand Matron was seated Mrs. Leila Thatcher of University Chapter No. 83, sang an especially composed verse.

The Grand Marshal was directed to escort Sister Emma P. Chadwick R. W. A. G. Conductress of the General Grand Chapter, to the Grand East. This distinguished guest was welcomed and presented with flowers. As she was being conducted to the East, Sister Thatcher sang:

"There's a Star that's always shining, With a smile that's friendly, too, She is known as Emma Chadwick, Do we love her? Yes, we do; Right Worthy Associate Grand Conductress, No better could be found; We adore her in Grand Chapter, And she's loved the whole State 'round."

The colors were presented by Justus Wiley, a veteran of the Civil War, and the Tribute to the Flag was given by the Grand Patron. This was followed by the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner," after which all joined in the salute.

All of the newly installed Grand Officers received an abundance of nature's choicest flowers from their respective Chapters and from their friends. The Chapter room was transformed into a bower of beauty and loveliness such as only these "messengers of love" can produce. Many valuable gifts were received by the Grand Officers. After prayer by the Grand Chaplain, Sister Gattis, through the courtesy of Sister Miller, closed the Grand Chapter.

The Grand Officers were installed by Mrs. Dollie M. Strickler, with Mrs. Joanna Bishop acting as Grand Marshal and Miss Bessie Barbor as Grand Chaplain. Many beautiful gifts were presented to the retiring and incoming Grand Officers.

"Old Glory" was borne to the East by the Grand Marshal, escorted by the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress, after which the salute to the Flag was given, and all joined in repeating the Pledge of Allegiance.

The usual addresses of welcome and responses were given. Twenty-nine Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons were presented and given Grand Honors; they were cordially welcomed by the Grand Matron.

The Associate Grand Matron of the Grand Chapter of Montana, Sister Anna Smalley was presented, escorted to the East, and accorded the Grand Honors; she was cordially welcomed by the Grand Patron.

The Grand Matron, in her address reports a busy year. There were 10 Chapters constituted, granted 30 Special Dispensations, ten of which were to ballot and initiate the same evening. One of the most favorable signs of healthy growth is that a number of Chapters requested an official visit for inspection.

An impressive Memorial Service was held under the direction of the Associate Grand Matron, Sister Viola Heyter.

# Twenty-fifth Annual Session

This Grand Chapter appropriately celebrated its Silver Anniversary at this Session.

Sister Anna Bristol, who presided as Grand Matron when the Grand Chapter met in Rawlins in 1902, called the Grand Chapter to order. After the Grand Matron and Grand Patron had been escorted to the East, Sister Clara Dickey Dickinson, Past Grand Matron, on behalf of the Past Grand Matrons' Association, presented to Sister Bristol a sheaf of red roses.

The Flag was borne to the East by the Grand Marshal; a pledge to the colors was given and "America" was sung by the members present, after which the Grand Chapter was opened in Ample Form.

A special welcome was extended by the Grand Matron to all pioneer members of the Order in Wyoming who had received the degrees by communication before Chapters were organized and to those who were members at the time of organization of the Grand Chapter in 1898, and are now enrolled as active members in Subordinate Chapters. As this Honor Roll of 125 names was called, those present responded and by invitation of the Grand Matron, were assembled in the West, while the old song "Auld Lang Syne" resounded through the Temple; they were afterwards welcomed by Sister Carrie Fisher McLaughlin, P. The Grand Matron had the pleasure of being the honored guest of Sessions of the Grand Chapters of West Virginia, New York and Ohio. She visited the office of the Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Keyes in Washington, D. C., and in the evening attended a meeting of Bethany Chapter No. 24, the occasion being the official visit of the Grand Matron of the District of Columbia, and her staff of Officers. She also visited Chapters in several other States, and in all places she has been received and honored in a manner becoming her station.

The official duties of the Grand Patron were few outside of routine acts. One new Chapter was instituted and the Grand Patron was deputized to visit and instruct this Chapter. He reports peace, harmony and fraternal love prevailing in every Chapter of this jurisdiction.

The Grand Secretary, Sister Inez M. Robinson, submits her Twenty-first Annual Report. All Chapters reported and paid per capita tax within the prescribed time, and for the first time in many years no reports were returned to Secretaries for correction. Oak Leaf Chapter leads in point of members, having 458. Ft. Casper leads in the number of members initiated, having conferred the degrees upon 35 candidates. The receipts of the year amounted to \$3,520.41, and the expenditures were \$3,258.93. Membership, 5092. Chapters, 36. Especially, has the Grand Secretary appreciated the faithful and cheery subordinate Secretaries. Together with the Grand Matron and Grand Patron they all labored in happy accord with but one thought in mind—the advancement and brightening of our Star in the firmament of Wyoming and the success of their Silver Anniversary Session. She concludes her report with the following: "They fail, and they alone, who have not striven."

This Grand Chapter endorsed the Order known as "Job's Daughters," and Sister Mechling was later appointed Guardian of this Order for Wyoming.

A most welcome and distinguished visitor was present on the last evening of the session when Brother Frank A. Holliday, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Wyoming, A. F. & A. M., appeared in the Grand Chapter room and was the signal for a rousing applause. While the Grand Lodge and the O. E. A parting of the ways, when the retiring Grand Matron bids farewell to her associates of the year, is always fraught with a tinge of sadness. On this occasion the Grand Matron in a beautiful little ceremony and well chosen words presented to each one of her Grand Officers a fragrant rose. The Installation of Grand Officers followed. Gifts were presented to retiring and incoming Officers.

There being no further business to come before the Grand Chapter, after singing "God Be With You Till We Meet Again," the Twenty-fifth Session of this Grand Chapter was declared closed.
