My own Chapter of 200 members owns their own hall.

In speaking of Virginia: I happen to be Representative of Virginia. I had the pleasure of visiting their Home. It is partly completed. It is beautifully situated and I am sure they will be very proud of it when it is completed. Sister Campbell, of course, can tell you about the District of Columbia. I am sure you will all make the same attempt we are making toward buying a home

or a hall. If I can give any advice, that is, if you value experience, you will not wait until you have a certain amount of money and build a beautiful temple, but you will take whatever funds you can gather and buy and sell and get a larger place and own a home long before you can gather up the money, because the rent you are paying out will pay for your home or your hall. We made that mistake. In Maryland we are 27 years old and we are just now trying to build a temple. You are just starting out. If you wish to take that advice I think you will be happier in the end.

I think this is the third attempt I have made to reach the Grand Chapter Session of Delaware. This time I felt as though I wanted to come. I was not sure I would have any one to come with, but when Sister Tovey told me she was coming I said I would come too.

I was thinking as I sat here I expect you are the smallest Grand Chapter. I had the privilege last year of visiting the three largest—The Michigan Grand Chapter, the Illinois and Missouri Grand Chapters and I found the same cordial welcome among the Stars in those large jurisdictions as I find in these small jurisdictions. The Stars shine bright wherever we go.

I bring you greetings from the District of Columbia. We are not very large ourselves and do not have very much land we call our own. Still we have 35 Chapters. Personally I do not like large Chapters. I think a small one is much more like a home body and things are much more pleasant and in a small Chapter everybody has to keep busy. Large Chapters have cliques.

Our principal activity is our Home. We have a splendid Home. We have 39 children and 56 old folks so you can see our work is splendid. We have just given out a contract for a dormitory. The old folks have been housed in the

same place with the children. We have given out a contract for a building which will cost us \$90,000; also a contract for a central heating plant which will cost \$50,000. The one great activity we have had in getting money together has been a wonderful field day. We are preparing for a field day in June of this year, a baseball game given by members of the Shrine and members of the Grotto. Last year it netted a sum total of \$25,000. We make it a field day for families to get together.

We are a very happy jurisdiction there. We have our trials and tribulations, but we go sailing along and try to live up to our obligation in every way.

Worthy Grand Matron, I had the pleasure of visiting Mizpah Chapter last evening. While they were in a hurry and used the short form, I would like to compliment you and Mizpah Chapter upon the solemnity and beautiful manner in which the Altar was attended. I do not know that I was any more impressed at any Chapter Session than I was last evening and I feel sure that if Delaware Chapters attend the Altars in that beautiful manner that Delaware Chapters cannot help but prosper. As a parting thought I would like to give you these little words:



ADDRESS OF SISTER MINNIE E. KEYES

Right Worthy Grand Secretary of the General Grand Chapter

Right Worthy Grand Secretary of the General Grand Chapter:

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Guests, Sisters and Brothers:

Again, as this afternoon, I must express my great pleasure at being with you on this occasion, and only regret that I could not be with you last evening. As I explained this afternoon, I was arranging to send my mother to Michigan for the summer and it was impossible for me to leave. She left on the 11:30 train and I left on the 12:50.

You have a very good Grand Chapter in Delaware. I have had quite an experience recently with Grand Chapters and I think I know a good Grand Chapter when I see one. On the first day of May I attended the Grand Chapter of the District of Columbia. We had a good session. April I visited the Grand Chapter of Maryland. Then on the 13th day of May I went down to Richmond and attended the Grand Chapter of Richmond. They too, had a very inspiring session. They are taking advantage of all the opportunities and striving to make our Order more beautiful. So you see I have had quite a round of Grand Chapters, but I did not, any of the time, lose sight of the time or the fact that I should come down to Delaware and enjoy this session with you. It is the first time I have been away from you for so long. I have been away for a whole year. I wanted to come for your installations in January, but because of my mother's condition I was not able to leave home. As your Grand Matron has said, I have heard from her occasionally, always keeping in mind that I should be here on this occasion.

I have enjoyed your reports. It shows a spirit and desire to do the right thing in the right way, and that is the spirit that should prevail.

I enjoyed Brother Redmile's report of the new Chapter in Newark I congratulate them upon having one to teach them the lessons of the Order in the right way. There are a great many ways of instituting chapters, just as there are a great many ways of doing our work, and I am sure Brother Redmile did it just right and made them feel that they had a responsibility; that there was work for them to do.

Since I saw you last we have done many things. I attended the Golden Jubilee of the Grand Chapter of Illinois. There were over two thousand delegates there. The first evening they put on a pageant from the very beginning of the Order of the Eastern Star. Over five hundred people participated. From there we went to the Golden Jubilee of Missouri. They, too, had an historic pageant. In both Grand Chapters you will find they are working hard to make the Order worth while—caring for the aged, the poor and the children.

Then I came back to my own Grand Chapter in Michigan. Last year they said that they raised \$75,000 for an addition to our Orphanage and this year \$100,000 for a fund to loan worthy boys and girls to carry them through their educational work. Some of them get perhaps a year or two of college and are unable to finish. We are able to loan them amounts ranging from \$250 to \$500 a year, which they pay back when they get through college. I found my State interested in education.

From Michigan I came to Ohio, which meets the same month. We were very highly entertained in a most wonderful hall with most wonderful lighting effects. They put on a beautiful tableau of a very inspiring and high order. Every one got the vision of the Star in the East. I felt that I would like to renew my obligation that I had taken at the Altar.

We felt honored by the presence of the Grand Master. Ohio Masons have always been friendly to the Eastern Star. The Grand Master came to this meeting and he said something which I had never heard before; that there was no use anyone's saying that the Order of the Eastern Star was not Masonic, for it was. It was made from the gist of the most sacred things, the family and the home. On this occasion the Grand Chapter of Ohio presented to the Grand Lodge of Masons \$50,000 with which to purchase a strip of land which entirely surrounded their Home. It was just at a time when almost anyone might pick up this land and the Masons did not have the funds with which to buy it, so the members of the Eastern Star appropriated \$50,000 and presented to the Masons to purchase this land.

Maryland, as you know, is a small jurisdiction and it is an older Grand Chapter. The Masons in Maryland had never recognized the Order of the Eastern Star. And so, last year, we were privileged to hear a report from the Home Committee of the Grand Chapter of Maryland. They had accumulated about \$15,000, which they had earned through a long term of years. The Grand Master had planned to build a Home and so they presented to the Grand Lodge and Grand Trustees all the funds they had, without any strings. The Grand Master came to this Meeting and he said no matter what any one had done, Maryland was not influenced, and he believed every tub should stand on its own bottom, and he congratulated and recognized the Order of the Eastern Star. This has given a great deal of courage to the members in Maryland. This year Maryland has a wonderful report about their Home in

Baltimore, just exactly what you need in Wilmington, a place that belongs to you for the Order of the Eastern Star. They have worked hard and long and they are just now being successful. I received a check for 38 cents for \$10 which I had given to purchase a bond several years ago. I tell you this because Maryland is a small Grand Chapter and just the same kind of people as you are here, and so as you have heard of these funds of the Home Building Committee, I hope that you will keep that little fund intact.

Now the General Grand Chapter has been growing too. We have organized a Chapter in Tampico, Mexico. We also have a new Chapter in Nova Scotia.

I know you need a temple and I presume we will have to wait, but I feel sure that the members in Delaware will be interested in this Memorial Temple, and we hope that when the time comes you will give that a thought, too, not because you belong to Delaware No. 1, but because you belong to that army of the Eastern Star. This I ttle Chapter in Tampico sent me \$25 last week. All the Chapters in Alaska have contributed \$1 per capita. Now we have accumulated quite a bit of money and when we get to Toronto we hope to have quite a fund. The Grand Matron and Patron of the District of Columbia endorsed the work of building this temple and proposed that in four years they pay \$1 per capita. They said why not have it all paid in before the 30th of June? So we expect to have \$1 for each member in Washington.

We find a great interest in this Triennial Session. It is the vacation time of the year. Toronto is a great convention city and we are planning for an Eastern Star Special—the Cora R. Franz, which will leave from the City of Washington. We hope when it reaches Baltimore that all these good sisters from Baltimore will get aboard and a good many from here will go. It will cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$70 for the round trip. Your Grand Matron has appointed Brother Redmile and Brother Hickey as a committee, and in about a week we shall have letters sent to them, telling about this trip.

Sisters and Brothers, it is hard and difficult for Officers in the Grand Chapter to put on initiatory work. I was pleased with the dignified way in which you did your work. I am glad to know that you have your Instructors and are holding up the standards of the work and having proficiency tests, for whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well. It is the mistakes of the heart that count.

I bring you greetings from the General Grand Chapter Officers. Sister Chapin has just been made Grandmother again and Dr. McDaniel has lost his daughter—by marriage.

Now Sisters and Brothers let us look to the legislation and cherish for each other that deep affection which should exist for the members of the Eastern Star, not only in Delaware, but everywhere.

Report of Committee on Unfinished Business

Worthy Grand Matron:

Your Committee on unfinished Business begs to report we find the following amendment presented by the Jurisprudence Committee at the 1924 session of this Grand Chapter and which adopted by Grand Chapter at that time is now due for a second reading and action.

Amendment-Article 4, Section 8

Section 8. Beginning with the Grand Chapter Session of 1922, no person except Grand Treasurer, Associate Grand Patron, Worthy Grand Patron shall be installed as an elective officer in this Grand Chapter, and no member of the Board of Grand Instructors can serve unless she or he holds a certificiate of proficiency from the Board of Grand Instructors in the secret work, initatory work, of the Ritual, the Constitution, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and fundamental Parliamentary Laws.

H. T. HICKEY S. I. STEIN

Sister Amy E. Meyer moved that report of Committee on Unfinished Business be accepted, spread upon the minutes and amendment adopted. Seconded by Sister Julia M. Story.

Sister Amy E. Meyer: This was an amendment offered by the Juris-prudence Committee last year, reporting on recommendation by our Junior Past Worthy Grand Patron. It was the decision that the brothers serving as Associate Grand Patron and Worthy Grand Patron be excused from ritulistic work. It seemed to us to put the burden on the brothers of this Grand Jurisdiction, and that is why the amendment was recommended.

Brother Harry F. Newlin: What does it say, Shall be installed? Does it mean examined or installed?

It says no person except Grand Treasurer, Associate Grand Patron, &c., shall be installed in a Grand Chapter. No member of Board of Grand Instructors can serve unless he or she shall hold a certificate, &c.

Brother Alfred M. Clower, Junior Grand Patron: The recommendation to No. 4 clause that the Associate Grand Patron, Grand Instructors, etc., be allowed six months to take their examination means that they could be installed tonight and allowed six months to take their examination. If they failed in that examination put someone else in their place. I claim that if only one person takes the examination it is mandatory on this Grand Chapter to vote for one person only. Any delegate to the Grand Chapter is entitled to office and can be elected to office, and that was the idea to overcome any tendency in regard to any candidate who wanted to run for office. The Jurisprudence Committee have changed that and brought in another recommendation. They have left out Associate Grand Conductress and Board of Instructors, whichever is elected, to overcome that recommendation.

Brother Clower: When I put that recommendation in it was meant to allow them to be installed tonight if they were elected. It is up to this Grand Chapter this year to vote for that to make it a law. They have cut the other out entirely.

Sister Meyer: We have not cut it out entirely. When this Grand Chapter adopted this Constitution and By-Laws it adopted it with the thought of raising the standard of work and proficiency in the State of Delaware. At the time of adoption in 1921 we decided then by unanimous vote of the delegates present that no Grand Officer in the State of Delaware or member of the Board of Grand Instructors except Grand Treasurer could be installed as an active officer until they held a certificate of proficiency of Class A grade of the Grand Chapter. That has proven wise and is still in effect today. We have seen in just the few years we have been organized that it is not fair to ask the brothers to take as full an examination as is required of the sisters. The Worthy Grand Matron must know the ritualistic work; she must understand fully the Constitution and laws, since she is the authority in the State: she is the Grand Chapter during its recess. Its authority is vested in her. It is not invested in a brother. Our brothers are busy men. Our brothers are not called upon to make decisions or put on the ritualistic work. The law takes care of that. Why put the burden of this examination on the brothers? The recommendation, as I understand it as approved by the Jurisprudence Committee, if it is in conflict with the Constitution of the Grand Chapter, is not a law. Brother Clower's recommendation is in conflict. Brother Clower contends that no one can be elected unless they possess a Grade A Certificate. The Grand Chapter of Delaware may elect whomsoever they please, and according to the recommendation approved by the Jurisprudence Committee, they may be installed that night, but have six months to qualify. There is no reason why they must be installed, so why raise the question on an election?

Brother Clower: Worthy Grand Patron, that is all right in regard to Sister Meyer's way of looking at it, but it does not satisfy me. The Jurisprudence Committee thought they would not put in what was meant in that recommendation. I say the sisters of this Grand Chapter have as much right as the men. Give them six months to learn their work. They know if they learn it in six months they are going on. That was the intention of that recommendation.

Sister Meyer: I think, Worthy Grand Patron, it would make a great deal of confusion to elect an Associate Grand Conductress and then go around in six months and find out she has not learned her work.

Brother Newlin: If the Associate Grand Conductress does not qualify within six months how are you going to know it? On the other hand, if a sister is elected to Associate Grand Conductress in this Grand Chapter and she does not think enough of her Chapter to learn her work in six months she should not be passed on. The same way with the Conductress. Class A Certificates I think cover so many in parlamentary procedure? Who is going to be the judge of whether a person is 100% in parliamentary procedure. Who is going to be the judge as to how they shall qualify? Otherwise, I think the resolution is all right.

Brother Clower: This Grand Chapter elects a Board of Instructors and they have to take their examination from them. They can take that within six months after election. I claim that any one who goes through the chairs as Worthy Matron is not a green officer. She is able to conduct and transact the business.

Brother Howard: I move we adopt the report of the committee.

Brother Robert S. Wood: If we pass this resolution then we cannot install the elected officers today. That seems nonsense to me. I think this is the proper time to install. I think the resolution should be defeated. They can stop any one from going forward. There is not a person in this room who can give any ritualistic work 100 per cent.

Sister Meyer: This new amendment does not say that they cannot be installed. It does not change the original law very much. This changes the original but very few words. It just eliminates the Grand Treasurer and Associate Grand Patron. This would not affect any one who was elected today, because every one who had the majority of votes all had for more than a year this Class A. examination. This law was adopted in 1921 and has been in effect since that time. We are relieving the brothers of the necessity of taking Class A. examination.

Motion Carried.

We have followed the work of the Worthy Grand Matron during her entire year of office and earnestly commend and congratulate her for the sincerity of her efforts to maintain the dignity of the Order of the Eastern Star in this Jurisdiction.

We do not approve of the dispensation granted December 6th, 1925 to Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8. We do approve of the dispensation to dispense with the regular meeting falling on Christmas Eve but a regular meeting cannot be held on any other date than that stipulated in the By-Laws of the Chapter.

I cannot find words to appropriately express my appreciation of your having given to me the highest office which is in your power to give to a man, so I shall have to ask you to accept on faith my word that I do appreciate it fully and I thank you for the confidence expressed in your action.

This has been a bright session, Eastern Star sail has been so well stirred, and the crop of resolutions and recommendations so thoroly and graciously thrashed out and so many splendid addresses have been made that I fear there is little that I might say to you that would brighten your vision of the work or extend your Eastern Star Horizon.

There are just three ideas that recurred to me however during our deliberations, which mean much, I think to our success as an organization, and I want to leave them with you for what they are worth. The first is ever present with us as individuals, it has been with me always—from necessity if for no other reason, and it is equally always with us as an organization, i. e. work. There is but little that we get in this world unless we work for it and there is equally little that is worth having or that can be properly appreciated that is not earned.

The second is one in which I could never claim any marked degree of proficiency, but it is quite as essential to our progress and well being, is salesmanship. What does it profit if we conceive a plan, or produce with our thought and labor something which is of inestimable value to our fellowmen if we are not able or willing to sell the idea—to convince others of its real worth.

The third is Service—service to others, to our chapters, not with the thought of gain for ourselves—but with the simpler thought of being of some worth-while help to those with whom we come in contact day by day. In unselfish service we find our greatest joy. So let us work, and serve for the best as we see it and lend our hands and hearts in real service for all.

Our baby grand chapter has had a fruitful year, one of Concord and the retiring officers have records of which to be proud, we realize fully the pace which they have set for us, but with your help and their advice we hope to "Carry On,"—again I thank you.

Sister Minnie Keyes asked that Sister Mary Warren, mother of Junior Grand Matron, be escorted to the East and then asked her to pin the jewel on Sister Corinne N. Warren. Past Grand Matron, Sister Warren expressed her pleasure in receiving the jewel and thanked the Officers and members for their loyalty and support during the year.

Sister Margaret J. Redmile was escorted to the East and Sister Keyes asked her to pin the jewel on Brother Redmile. Brother Redmile also expressed his pleasure in receiving the jewel and told how he had enjoyed the work of the past year.

Numerous gifts were presented to the Present and Past Officers from relatives and friends.

The Grand Secretary stated there was no further business to come before the Grand Chapter.

The Grand Marshal, by order of the Grand Matron and in the name of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, declared this Grand Chapter closed at 11:30 P. M., to meet the third Wednesday in May, 1926.

Approved Decisions of Grand Matrons and Patrons

Decisions

The petition of a candidate was read, referred to a committee, and all Chapters were notified of same. This petition received a favorable report, was balloted upon and petitioner elected to receive the degrees of the Chapter. All Chapters were again notified, and the candidate was notified to present herself for initiation.

Notification was received from another Chapter that they held jurisdiction over this petition, to the extension of one month. What should be the legal action taken?

Notwithstanding the fact that the procedure regarding this petition was in regular form, due to the fact that by virtue of the other Chapter holding jurisdiction over the candidate as a rejected petitioner, I rendered a decision that the election be considered null and void. (See By-laws, page 45, Section 44). Julia Marr Story, 1922.

The question was asked if it were permissible to do crochetting or fancy work in the Chapter during the session.

My answer was no, it is not permissible. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

Recommendations

- No. 1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks found on page two of our ritual. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 2. That a committee be appointed to purchase suitable badges to be worn by our Representatives to the General Grand Chapter. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 3. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 4. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 5. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 6. That no member be allowed to vouch for any one unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

- No. 7. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess,—by doing so closes the Chapter. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 8. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 9. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware. Julia Marr Story, 1922.
- No. 10. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That a committee of five (5) be appointed to prepare a tentative program for an Eastern Star Building, and to submit the same to this Grand Chapter at our next regular annual communication, together with an estimate of the cost of the building and additional furniture, and also increased running expenses. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a committee of three (3) be appointed to prepare a ceremony of opening and closing this Grand Chapter and to change the present form of introducing the Grand Officers when visiting subordinate Chapters. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patron's Jewels. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a committee of three (3) be appointed to draft a penal code to be used in this Grand Jurisdiction. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a contingent fund of \$50.00 be provided to defray the expenses of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron in making their official visits to subordinate Chapters. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a contingent fund of \$35.00 be allowed the Grand Secretary for necessary supplies. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

I recommend that examinations for Grade B. Certificate be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record. Amy E. Meyer, 1923.

I recommend therefore, that a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll book, Secretary's Cash book, Treasurers Cash book, Ledgers, Record book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State. Amy E. Meyer, 1923.

I recommend that one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County. Amy E. Meyer, 1923.

I recommend that the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the

East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

May 26, 1923—Received a letter objecting to the manner of balloting on a petitioner. On investigation found that more than one black ball had been cast in the first ballot, and that the Worthy Matron had the Chapter vote to have a second ballot, which was clear.

Decided that second ballot was illegal, a new ballot may be taken at a regular meeting after six months had elapsed. No Chapter can vote to have a new ballot, only Worthy Matron can call for new ballot and then only when one black ball or cube has been cast. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

May 5, 1924—On my official visit to Adah Chapter, found that a special meeting had been called by the Worthy Matron, at which time business other than that prescribed in our Laws for special meetings was transacted. Declared the meeting illegal, and legalized the business transacted at the meeting. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

I would recommend the Matrons and Officers of the different Chapters to start their meetings on the time prescribed in their by-laws. Alfred M. Clower, 1924.

That the Associate Grand Patron be exempt from examination in work pertaining to Worthy Grand Matron. Alfred M. Clower, 1924.

That public installations be discontinued. Alfred M. Clower, 1924.
