May I ask that each one of you familiarize yourself with the rules and regulations of the Order and the By-Laws of the Chapter of which you are a member.

Let us keep in mind that quantity is not always an indication of prosperity in an Order. Let us aim for both quality and quantity but if only one is available, let us make our Chapters conspicious for their quality.

The Ballot. Every member present must cast a ballot unless physically unable to do so, when they with the unanimous consent of the members present may be excused.

As a favor to me the Grand Instructors will instruct the Subordinate Chapters that their Officers must dress in white while attending the duties of their stations. Please cooperate with the Grand Instructors.

Grand Instructor, Sister Mary M. Clower, has been assigned to instruct Delaware Chapter No. 1, St. John's Chapter No. 4, Radiant Chapter No. 6, and Newark Chapter U. D. Grand Instructor, Sister Violet A. Rush, has been assigned to instruct Mizpah Chapter No. 2, Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, and Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8. Grand Instructor, Sister Josephine B. Miller, has been assigned to instruct Adah Chapter No. 5, Sussex Chapter No. 7, and Georgetown Chapter No. 9.

When these Grand Instructors are called upon to instruct they shall be seated in the East, and have complete charge of all rehearsals and Schools of Instruction.

I shall be glad to hear from you at all times, to have you call upon me for advice or such assistance as may be within my power to render.

#### Questions and Answers

Question 1. When a demit is granted to a Chapter member is there any law prohibiting this member from joining another Chapter?

Answer. No.

Question 2. Can an objection be made to the Secretary, or must it be made to the Worthy Matron?

Answer. Refer you to page 49, section 61, of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter of Delaware.

Question 3. Kindly advise me if the presiding Officer of any Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, holding the Secret Work, has the right to loan

this to any Officer except the Worthy Matron.

Answer. The Secret Work is in the possession of the Worthy Patron of the Chapter, and must not leave his possession. He may loan it for the purpose of studying for examination to any Officer of his own Chapter, while said Chapter is in session, but it must not go out of the Chapter Room, and must be returned to the Worthy Patron before the session is closed.

Question 4. Can we hold rehearsal at member's homes?

Answer. No.

Question 5. Must the Sentinel ballot?

Answer. All members must vote unless physically unable to do so, then by the unanimous vote of all members present they may be excused.

Question 6. On a private moonlight excursion could a wheel of fortune be used?

Answer, No.

Question 7. Two of our Trustees have demitted. I would like to know if it is necessary for this Chapter to hold a special election for new Trustees, or if it will be all right to let this matter go until the annual election. If a special election is not necessary will you kindly inform me what proceedings will be necessary in order to have our books, etc., audited at the close of the year?

Answer. A special election is necessary to fill these vacancies. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days

before the election.

Question 8. When an objection has been made to a petitioner after the ballot on same was favorable, and the money returned and petitioner so notified, how shall we proceed if petitioner returns fee at expiration of six months?

Answer. At the expiration of six months, the member who made the objection shall be notified, and if this objection is not renewed within thirty days, the petitioner is notified to return the fee, and to appear and receive the degrees, and in all respects has the same standing as before the objection was made.

Question 9. When you have a double class to initiate, after taking the first six through the Labyrinth and seating them on the side, do the Conductress and the Associate Conductress go back to their stations, or does the Associate Conductress go out without being told?

Answer. After the first six are seated, the Conductress will return to her station, the Associate Conductress will make her salutation and retire, using the guarded door, prepare the next class, and proceed in regular form.

Question 10. What is the standing of the following motions? A motion was made at a regular meeting and when voted on was lost. At the next regular meeting a motion was made to rescind this action, and when voted on was adopted.

Answer. When a motion is lost any further action except a motion to renew or reconsider is out of order. A motion to rescind is in order only on a motion which was adopted, and requires a two-thirds vote unless the members were notified, when a majority vote is necessary and can be made after any lapse of time. A motion to renew is in order only on a motion which was lost and in all other respects is the same as a motion to rescind. A motion to reconsider the vote is in order on any motion, but can only be made during the same session, and must be made by a member who voted on the prevailing side, and requires only a majority vote. If adopted, the original motion is before the Chapter the same as before the previous vote was taken.

Question 11. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland?

Answer. Yes.

Question 12. In handling a petition the Worthy Matron says, "if there are no objections the Secretary will read it." There seems a difference of opinion as to the exact meaning, and would like your decision.

Answer. In order to make the meaning clear, in the future use the wording. "If there are no objections to the petitioner, the Secretary will read it."

#### Recommendations

- As some Chapters at different times have asked if they can conduct
  a meeting where the Officers are not dressed in white, I therefore recommend
  that all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings.
- Have noticed that the Officers sometimes take with them to their stations, hand bags or similar articles, and as this detracts from the dignity of the station, I therefore recommend that no such articles be permitted at the station of any Officer.
- At times visitors who are not members of our Order are admitted to the Preparation Rooms and within the outer door guarded by the Sentinel.

They are within the body of the Chapter, and I therefore recommend that it be so considered, and that no one but members be admitted thereto, except candidates for degrees, until after the Chapter is closed.

- 4. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances, and I therefore recommend that no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner.
- 5. A number of persons have told me they do not attend Chapter meetings as they cannot afford to buy the various things that are offered for sale on those evenings, and remain away rather than be embarrased by refusing to buy. It was also taught to us at the beginning of the Eastern Star in Delaware that we should not sell anything in the Chapter Room. I therefore recommend that the sale of anything in the Chapter Room be prohibited.
- 6. At the session of the Grand Chapter one of the busiest committees is that on Jurisprudence, so to help them with their work, I recommend that the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, be in their hands not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.
- My attention has been called to some of the business transacted, and work done at Special Meetings, and as some of it was irregular, I therefore recommend that in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting, a duplicate shall be sent, at the same time, to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.

On March 27th a circular letter was received from the International Eastern Star Temple Committee, which was appointed at the last session of

Delaware Chapter throughout the year has stood by me, helping with loving thoughts and good wishes, and the many "thank you's" I have given is a part of the payment for the debt I can never repay. My beginning was there and ever since she has been kind, generous, and most wonderful to me.

Reception to Worthy Grand Patron, Brother E. B. Wilson, Grand Instructor, Violet A. Rush, and Grand Chaplain, Anna Belle Sauter.

Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, on the evening of April 26th, tendered

a reception to the above members of their Chapter who are Officers of the Grand Chapter of Delaware.

The Chairman of the Committee in charge of the arrangements was Sister Amy E. Meyer, the first Worthy Matron of the Chapter, and the second Grand Matron of Delaware, and included in the receiving line was the Grand Wife, Sister Bertha F. Wilson, the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Louise W. Green, and the Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons.

Flowers were presented, refreshments were served, and a splendid entertainment was given, a son and daughter of the Guest of Honor contributing a delightful portion of the music—Miss Marion E. Wilson at the piano, and Master E. Burton Wilson with the violin.

#### Good of the Order

At times our ambition and interest in our Order overcomes our judgment, and we all do little things that seem proper at the time, but which later we wish we had left undone or at least used some different method.

The parties approached, if they are strangers, certainly do not afterward have the impressions we would wish them to have of our Order, and compare us to organizations who make a practice of raising funds by public or promiscuous sale of tickets, and we lose prestige to that extent.

Let us endeavor to keep our Order from any thought or sound of commercialism, and confine all our activities to our members, families, friends, and acquaintances.

## General Grand Chapter

At about eleven P. M., Saturday, August the eighth, there gathered together at the B. &. O. Station, in Wilmington, nine members of the Order of the Eastern Star, who all boarded the special train known as the "Franz Special" for Toronto, Canada, where the Session of the General Grand Chapter was to be held from August 9 to 15, 1925.

A goodly number of the members from various Chapters were there to see us off and bid us a happy and profitable journey.

We arrived in Toronto about two P. M., on Sunday, and all the party

had reservation made at the King Edward Hotel, which was the headquarters for the General Grand Chapter. Here we met four members from Delmar, and our Delaware delegation was together at the same hotel.

We soon began to get acquainted with other delegations, renew old acquaintances, found old friends and made new friends from other jurisdictions.

Monday the committee arranged to have us see all the principal points of interest in Toronto, and had automobiles in plenty to take all, finally driving to Rameses Shrine Temple where refreshments were served. That evening the session opened in Massey Hall with a magnificent setting, the floral decorations being beyond description—gladiolas in profusion in all their rich colors, garlands of evergreens and evergreen trees, making a picture we will never forget—surmounting all was our beautiful Star, sixteen feet in diameter, illuminated with hundreds of electric lights, and under it the word "Welcome", also beautifully illuminated. The Committee on Decoration proved their love for the Order of the Eastern Star. The Committees worked two years to finance, design, and execute it.

The session opened by escorting the Union Jack and the Stars and Stripes to the East, everyone joining in singing "God save the King", then "America", then "Blest be the Tie that Binds"—an inspiring ceremony.

Tuesday at 10.00 A. M. the General Grand Chapter was called to order in its Eighteenth Triennial Assembly, by Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Ellie Lines Chapin.

Then came the Address of Welcome and the response. A distinguished member, a Past Most Worthy Grand Patron of Scotland, was then presented with a pennant of each jurisdiction in the General Grand Chapter, these pennants being presented either by the Grand Representative of Scotland, if present, or the Grand Matron of each State or Jurisdiction.

An inspiring talk on the Near East Relief was given by Sister Lillian Ascough, the National Director, and she presented to the General Grand Chapter a gavel made by the boys at Nazareth.

Sister Ascough also entertained all the Grand Matrons and Grand Secretaries at a Near East Relief breakfast, which was both enjoyable and instructive.

Wednesday. Trip to Niagara Falls, complimentary to Delegates given by the Toronto Chapters of the Eastern Star—a delightful day.

Thursday. 9.30 A. M.—Business of Assembly. 12.00 noon—Chimes rang our "America", a compliment to the American Delegation. 6.00 P. M.—Banquest at King Edward Hotel. 8.30 P. M.—Exhibition Drill, Patrol of Harmony Chapter No. 11, Toronto. 9.00 P. M.—Dancing and a general good time.

Friday. Business 9.30 to 10.00 A. M. At 10.00 o'clock the Election of

officers. Delaware was highly honored, Past Grand Matron, Sister Lily Schofield Riley, being appointed one of the tellers, and Past Grand Patron, Brother Harry T. Hickey appointed Worthy Grand Sentinel of the General Grand Chapter.

Brother J. Ernest Teare, of Ohio, was elected Most Worthy Grand Patron, and the R. T. King Chapter, of Columbus, Ohio, presented a Bible to be known as "The Traveling Bible", which was opened on the Altar, and after being used at this General Grand Chapter Session, was to start on a trip around the world. The journey being estimated to require ten years.

In the evening at the installation of officers, the installing officer was Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Nettie Ransford, who was remarkable in her work, having reached the age of eighty-seven years.

Denver, Colorado, was selected as the city in which will convene the Nineteenth Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star.

Some of the principal legislation enacted was: The General Grand Chapter earnestly requests all Grand Chapters to adopt a uniform Membership Card to be exhibited by members when visiting Chapters. The Star Book compiled by Cora Reynolds Franz, Past Most Worthy Grand Matron, was adopted. A committee of five to be appointed by the Most Worthy Grand Matron to revise in detail the ritualistic work of the Order, in conformity with all approved Landmarks and amendments, and to include such additional material as will clarify and enhance the beauty and work of the Order.

## International Eastern Star Temple Committee

Galveston, Texas, March, 1926

To the Worthy Grand Matron, O. E. S.,

State of Delaware.

In Re: International Eastern Star Temple.

My Dear Grand Matron:

I am writing to ask your aid in "putting over" a piece of work which I know will appeal to the better nature of every member of the Order, who has a keen conception and a broad vision of their higher and nobler paths of duty.

For more than a decade, the leaders of this great Order, who have been and are vitally concerned in its welfare, and who are striving to make of it an institution of world-wide influence for the betterment of mankind, have sought through the agency of General Grand Chapter, to construct a building at the nation's capital—a Temple if you please, which will provide a permanent workshop where the labors of its officers may be performed in a satisfactory manner, and the fine ideals arising therefrom may be more impressively carried to those vast uncultivated territories that lie beyond the seas.

At the sixteenth triennial assembly of General Grand Chapter which convened at Seattle in 1919, a committee of review was appointed, whose duty it was to study the question carefully and bring back its findings together with its recommendations, for consideration at the next triennial conclave.

Pursuant to their appointment and in obedience to the obligation resting

upon them by virtue of same this committee after three years of careful study and research, made known the result of its findings at the meeting held in Washington in 1922, and recommended without dissent, that a building such as above referred to, be erected in that City.

The committee's report, including its recommendation, was adopted by the seventeenth triennial assembly, and on motion duly made and seconded there came into being a standing committee to be known as the "International Temple Committee", whose duty it would be to devise ways and means, and to start a movement that would carry the proposed Temple project to successful conclusion.

The members of this new committee were not appointed until sometime after the committee came into being, but at this same session General Grand Chapter donated and appropriated the sum of \$25,000.00 as a starter for the movement, and during the three years following there was added to this fund by donations from Grand Chapters, subordinate Chapters, and members, approximately \$55,000.00.

At the eighteenth triennial session of General Grand Chapter held in Toronto last August, a new committee was appointed to succeed the first one that was created, and afterwards appointed, at the Washington meeting, and a renewed determination was expressed accentuating the necessity for such a building, with the hope and belief that sufficient funds could be raised among the membership in general, to make it an assured fact.

As Chairman of this last named committee, I am bringing to you my first appeal for support and aid in undertaking the work. I am making it direct to all Grand Matrons, realizing and believing that their's is the guiding hand that makes or breaks every movement that starts within their respective jurisdictions.

Since the Toronto meeting we have secured funds and binding pledges of around \$20,000.00; so that today we are in possession of approximately \$100,000.00. This money, aside from the first donation made by General Grand Chapter, has been largely supplied by Grand Chapters. I think the States of Florida, Georgia, and perhaps Rhode Island have contributed a sum equal to one dollar for every member within their borders. The District of Columbia has also done this; and that is the amount we would like to have from each Grand Jurisdiction. We need that much with which to construct a Temple that would meet our present requirements—and after all, it will not "pinch" many members if they will "chip" in a dollar to complete this glorious enterprise.

It will cost a million dollars to own such an edifice as we would like to have in Washington, and one which an organization like ours would be proud to possess. We have more than a million and a half members, and want every one of them to have some share in helping to bring the amount up to the needed

average. Some will give less than a dollar, but some ought to give more. Let it be remembered that this is in no wise a local matter, and that the burden should be taken up as one of pride and love for the Order; falling upon no exclusive territory, but borne alike by all our sisters and brothers, under whatever flag they may claim protection.

When completed, this splendid Temple in all its component parts, will be the central hub around which and from which will emanate those kindly and elevating influences and refinements which it is our wont to transplant to all those who will accept and receive them.

The capital of the nation is a clearing house, where the growth and progress of the world is registered as in no other place. All Orders and agencies that strive for the moral and intellectual advancement of the race have established permanent headquarters there. They are continually vieing with each other for a vantage point, from which to exhibit the merits of their profession to the peoples of the world. There the diplomats of earth are gathered, and from those commanding scenes they take back with them to their respective homes the only pictures they receive of what our country is and what it stands for. The very buildings which grace the confines of that most beautiful of all our cities, emblemize the spirit of our people in a way which nothing else can. Hence our desire and hence our will, to erect there a Temple of usefulness and beauty, that will not only reflect glory upon our Order, to those who come within its walls, but will serve to inspire men and women who in distant times and under other skies shall pray for freedom.

The International Temple Committee, joined by the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, and other officers of General Grand Chapter, commend this noble project to your careful consideration and action, in all the earnestness with which we know how to make an appeal. At best, I can only give you in a short letter like this, a feeble conception of what the building of this Temple will mean to the Order of the Eastern Star. In my judgment, it will open up immediately, new avenues, that lead to a field of world-wide expansion and usefulness for the Order.

This is "Golden Jubilee Year" for General Grand Chapter. Fifty years of service lie behind us; and with poor equipment at times, but with brave hearts and a yearning to do good because it is good, we have brought together in a common cause nearly two million of the choicest and most resolute men and women in this world. Having marched together thus far, and reviewing with pride our achievements of the past, let us plan wisely and reverently for the future. Arming ourselves with proper instruments, let us begin the work of the next fifty years with the same fortitude and confidence which characterized our forbears—always placing our footsteps upon the pedestal of righteous advancement, while "we do battle for the Lord".

Now, won't you please join me, and thousands of our members who are

supremely interested, as I know you are, in the future welfare of our Order, to put the Temple plan over during the "Golden Jubilee Year?" With your active help, we can do it—without it, we can do nothing. And remember this! It will give us a standing among the great organizations of earth, which this "Woman's Order" so richly deserves; besides furnishing a necessary place in which to carry on our great work, and store our records.

We need a dollar for each member in your jurisdiction. May I count on you to take up the work at once, with that in view? If yours is one of the jurisdictions that has given that much already, well and good. But, if not, I hope you will bring the matter before your next Grand Chapter for action, and in the meantime carry the message to your subordinate Chapters, and see that the members of each Chapter have it thoroughly explained to them, and have an opportunity to subscribe or make a donation to the fund. It would please me greatly to have a letter from you, giving full views concerning the proposition. You know the United States, Canada, etc., covers a large section of the world, and I want to keep in close and intimate touch with the situation in all parts, from now until the job is completed. The Committee will be pleased to render you any service at their command; or to answer any question that may be in your mind, relative to the proposed Temple.

From long experience in business matters, I have learned that to obtain the greatest degree of success, there must be "individuality" put into any undertaking. You are the one who possesses that "individuality" in your jurisdiction at the present time, and whom we sorely need to assume the task of laying the plans and harvesting the results that will arise from a campaign to collect funds for the Temple. You have the Committee's profoundest thanks and best wishes in advance for the success of your efforts. All collections will be turned over to the fiscal officers of your Grand Chapter, and then in turn remitted to Sister Minnie Evans Keyes, Right Worthy Grand Secretary of General Grand Chapter, to be deposited in the treasury under instructions given in the law creating this committee.

May Heaven's richest blessings be and abide with you, your Grand Officers, and members always.

# Approved Decisions of Grand Matrons and Patrons Decisions

The petition of a candidate was read, referred to a committee, and all Chapters were notified of same. This petition received a favorable report, was balloted upon and petitioner elected to receive the degrees of the Chapter. All Chapters were again notified, and the candidate was notified to present herself for initiation.

Notification was received from another Chapter that they held jurisdiction over this petition, to the extension of one month. What should be the legal action taken?

Notwithstanding the fact that the procedure regarding this petition was in regular form, due to the fact that by virtue of the other Chapter holding jurisdiction over the candidate as a rejected petitioner, I rendered a decision that the election be considered null and void. (See By-laws, page 45, Section 44). Julia Marr Story, 1922.

The question was asked if it were permissible to do crochetting or fancy work in the Chapter during the session.

My answer was no, it is not permissible. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session. Corinne N. Warren, 1925.

#### Recommendations

That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks found on page two of our ritual. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That a committee be appointed to purchase suitable badges to be worn by our Representatives to the General Grand Chapter. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That no member be allowed to vouch for any one unless they have sat

in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That the Bible shall not be closed at recess,—by doing so closes the Chapter. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls. Julia Marr Story, 1922.

That a committee of five (5) be appointed to prepare a tentative program for an Eastern Star Building, and to submit the same to this Grand Chapter at our next regular annual communication, together with an estimate of the cost of the building and additional furniture, and also increased running expenses. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a committee of three (3) be appointed to prepare a ceremony of opening and closing this Grand Chapter and to change the present form of introducing the Grand Officers when visiting subordinate Chapters. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patron's Jewels. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a committee of three (3) be appointed to draft a penal code to be used in this Grand Jurisdiction. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a contingent fund of \$50.00 be provided to defray the expenses of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron in making their official visits to subordinate Chapters. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

That a contingent fund of \$35.00 be allowed the Grand Secretary for necessary supplies. Harry F. Newlin, 1922.

I recommend that examinations for Grade B. Certificate be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record. Amy E. Meyer, 1923.

I recommend, therefore, that a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll book, Secretary's Cash book, Treasurer's Cash book, Ledgers, Record book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State. Amy E. Meyer, 1923.

I recommend that one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every

third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County. Amy E. Meyer, 1923.

I recommend that the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

May 26, 1923—Received a letter objecting to the manner of balloting on a petitioner. On investigation found that more than one black ball had been cast in the first ballot, and that the Worthy Matron had the Chapter vote to have a second ballot, which was clear.

Decided that second ballot was illegal, a new ballot may be taken at a regular meeting after six months had elapsed. No Chapter can vote to have a new ballot, only Worthy Matron can call for new ballot and then only when one black ball or cube has been cast. Lillie S. Riley, 1924.

May 5, 1924—On my official visit to Adah Chapter, found that a special meeting had been called by the Worthy Matron, at which time business other that that prescribed in our Laws for special meetings was transacted.
