The Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, convened in its Ninth Annual Session in the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium, Wilmington, Delaware, May 21, 1930, at two o'clock in the afternoon.

Sister Lillie Schofield Riley, Worthy Grand Matron in 1923-1924, who had been invited to call the Session to order, was escorted to the East by the Grand Marshal.

By order of Sister Riley, the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and other Grand Officers were invited to enter the Grand Chapter Room. Upon being escorted to the East and given Grand Honors, the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron were addressed by Sister Riley:

"I deem it an honor as well as a pleasure to be the one to speak the first words of greeting at this the Ninth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware.

Another year has passed since last we met in Annual Session. Another page has been recorded in the history of our Grand Chapter. Time alone will disclose the full benefits derived from that record.

Worthy Grand Matron, during the year assigned you as our leader, you have labored faithfully and well. You have conscientiously interpreted and enforced the laws and effectively carried forward the work to its present high standard, giving instruction and counsel which will be of lasting benefit to the Chapters. You have proved yourself worthy of the title.

Worthy Grand Patron, you have given to this Order your best endeavor. By your dignified bearing and sterling qualities, you have gained the respect of the membership of this State, and I congratulate you on a successful administration.

Worthy Grand Matron, it is my sincere wish that this session may be one of harmony and good will. May you legislate with wisdom and justice to all and at its close may it be said of you 'well done.'

It is with pleasure that I pass to you the Gavel."

May 16th. Appointed the Grand Officers and Standing Committees required by the Constitution together with Special Committees required by the Grand Chapter, as listed in the 1929 Proceedings.

May 27th. Sent my first Official Letter to Subordinate Chapters.

June 6th. Directed Grand Secretary to send flowers to funeral of Past Grand Electa, Sister Fannie V. Hickman.

June 7th. Attended meeting of the Board of Grand Trustees at the office of the Grand Secretary.

June 7th. Sent official reprimand to Sister --- as directed by the Grand Chapter.

June 24th. Attended a meeting of the Jurisprudence Committee called by the Worthy Grand Matron in response to the many objections made to the disregard of legislation establishing a status for Honorary Membership in this

Jurisdiction, at the last Session of our Grand Chapter.

June 26th. Notified the Grand Secretary of the decision of the Jurisprudence Committee that the action of this Grand Body in making Honorary Members was contrary to legislation enacted during the Session and directed that all reference to this illegal action be omitted from the printed Proceedings.

October 16th. Conducted a School of Instructions for Subordinate Chapter Secretaries of New Castle County.

October 22nd. School of Instruction for Secretaries of Chapters in Kent and Sussex Counties, to be held in Georgetown, was cancelled because it was inconvenient for the Secretaries to meet on this date.

October 31st. Sent Official Letter No. 2 to Subordinate Chapters.

November 10th. Directed Grand Secretary to send letter of sympathy to Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, upon the death of their Associate Matron, Caroline M. Butler.

November 14th. Attended organization meeting of the Board of Grand Instructors at the office of the Grand Secretary and made the following assignments:

Delaware Chapter No. 1, Wilmington, Radiant Chapter No. 6, Wilmington, Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8, New Castle, to Sister Bertha M. Smith for Instruction.

Mizpah Chapter No. 2, Wilmington, Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, Wilmington, St. John's Chapter No. 4, Wilmington, Newark Chapter No. 10, Newark, to Sister Jane C. Zebley for Instruction.

Adah Chapter No. 5, Delmar, Sussex Chapter No. 7, Seaford, Georgetown Chapter No. 9, Georgetown, Kent Chapter No. 11, Harrington, Frankford Chapter No. 12, Frankford, to Sister Bessie M. Warrington for Instruction.

Directed Grand Secretary to send notice to the Chapters that the new Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart would be sent out upon receipt of the old copies now in their possession.

Directed Grand Secretary to exchange the new Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart for the old copies now in possession of the Grand Instructors. Requested the Grand Secretary to notify the Chapters of the assignment of their Grand Instructor.

November 30th. In reply to a letter from Mizpah Chapter No. 2, requesting that I allow them to retain their present Grand Instructor for the balance of this Grand Chapter year, I sent them an official letter calling attention to the fact that the assignment of Instructors for last year terminated with the Grand Chapter Session in May and the officers of each Chapter had received instruction in their duties, as required of the Instructor by the Grand Chapter before that time, and that the assignments for this Grand Chapter year were in my judgment for the best interests of the Order.

December 4th. Directed Grand Secretary to send letter of sympathy to Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8, upon the death of their Worthy Matron, Bessie R. Hewlett.

December 6th. Assisted in conducting an Eastern Star service at the funeral of Sister Hewlett, Worthy Matron of Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8.

December 12th. Directed Grand Secretary to omit from the printed Book of Instructions that portion explaining the sign of Martha as being an interpretation of the Secret Work.

Having noted that the Official Seal furnished Georgetown Chapter No. 9, at the time of their Constitution, was not in accordance with the requirements of their By-Laws as approved by this Grand Chapter, I directed Grand Secretary to furnish said Chapter a proper Seal without charge and request the return of the one now in use.

February 6th. Appointed Sisters Anna B. Sauter, Mary M. Clower, and Brother Walter E. Sawdon, to serve as a Special Constitution and By-Laws Committee, to outline and submit to the Grand Chapter all necessary changes in the Constitution and By-Laws, Rules and Regulations, Ceremonies for Instituting and Constituting Chapters, that they may conform to the Ritual, and to submit such amendments as in their judgment seem advisable.

March 29th. Having been informed that the Seal had been forwarded to Georgetown Chapter No. 9, I officially declared all letters, reports, etcetera, of Georgetown Chapter No. 9, issued to date, bearing the irregular Seal to be official, and so notified the Chapter.

March 29th. Directed Grand Secretary to send a Labyrinth Chart to each of the two Chapters that could not locate an old Chart to return in exchange for a new one.

April 4th. Received letter from the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy. This I am referring to the Jurisprudence Committee without comment.

April 23rd. Conducted School of Instruction for Secretaries of Subordinate Chapters in Kent and Sussex Counties, in Georgetown.

April 24th. Received official letter from Brother Robert S. Gallaher, Worthy Grand Patron, recommending that a Charter be granted to Five Points Chapter, U. D.

April 25th. Received letter from Sister Irene W. M. Bauer, Chairman of the Committee on Necrology, stating that it would be impossible for her to serve on the Committee.

April 28th. Sent letter to the Chapters of Kent and Sussex Counties, suggesting that the matter of the territorial jurisdiction assigned the Chapter be discussed before the Chapter and that their delegates be instructed to familiarize themselves with said territorial lines, so that they may be intelligently discussed at this Session of the Grand Chapter.

April 28th. In response to an appeal in behalf of Adah Chapter No. 5, I sent the following letter to the

Grand Chapter of Maryland, Order of the Eastern Star. Fraternal Greetings:

It is a familiar fact to those who are acquainted with the geography of the town of Delmar, that it is about equally divided between the Grand Jurisdictions of Maryland and Delaware, and because of the small population, the material for Chapter membership is comparatively limited. Since the Constitution of a Chapter in Salisbury, if the possible membership take advantage of the territorial jurisdiction, it will reduce the probable growth of our Delmar Chapter by about fifty per cent.

With the presentation of these facts, in the name of the Grand Chapter of Delaware and in behalf of Adah Chapter No. 5, Delmar, Delaware, I am pleased to submit for your consideration a request that the Grand Chapter of Maryland grant to the Grand Chapter of Delaware, for Adah Chapter No. 5, jurisdiction over that portion of the town Delmar that is located in the Grand Jurisdiction of Maryland.

Your favorable consideration will be greatly appreciated.

May 4th. Directed Grand Secretary to summons the Officers and members of Five Points Chapter U. D. to be present at the Session of the Grand Chapter, Wednesday evening, May 21st, 8.00 o'clock, for the purpose of being Constituted and receiving a Charter.

May 8th. Sent copy of my Report to each member of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Checks Signed

During the year I have signed Grand Chapter Checks drawn on the Treasury, numbers 266 to 325 inclusive.

Official Letter No. 1

May 27th, 1929

To the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron and Members of the Constituent Chapters of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star.

Fraternal Greetings:

Deeply appreciating the honor you have conferred upon me in entrusting the welfare of the Order in this Jurisdiction to my administration for the ensuing year, I wish to assure you that I shall ever regard the confidence you have thus expressed as a sacred trust.

Entering upon the official duties of Worthy Grand Matron, I realize the great responsibility resting upon me, but with faith in your loyalty and cooperation, I shall strive to maintain the highest standard of helpfulness and efficiency.

OFFICIAL VISITS

It is my desire to pay you an official visit before the close of this year, and to inspect the different phases of your work. While appreciating the splendid social activities that have been given in the past in honor of Worthy Grand Matrons at the time of their official visits, and which I have had the pleasure of enjoying on many occasions, I feel that these can be eliminated to a great extent and this time devoted to the advancement of the Order.

GRAND INSTRUCTORS

There seems to be some misunderstanding in our Chapters as to the duties of the Grand Instructors.

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Grand Instructors . . . to visit each Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction and instruct its officers and members in the correct performance of their duties." (Art. IX, Sec. 8, Constitution).

Resolution:—"That some member of the Board of Grand Instructors visit each Chapter at least twice a year. Should Chapters desire the attendance of any member of the Board for rehearsals or otherwise, more than that number of times, then the Chapter so desiring such service shall pay the traveling and other expenses when necessary, of the member of the Board so attending." (Adopted by Grand Chapter 1927—Proceedings, page 58).

Instruction in the Opening March is not to be considered a part of the official duties of the Grand Instructor. From the new Ritual, page 16: "The Chapter is at liberty to elaborate the figures as it may desire, provided, the above position is assumed by the officers at the close of the march." There-

fore, the march is optional and should be left to the discretion of the Worthy Matron. A Grand Instructor who assists in this phase of the work, does so as a personal favor and not as an official duty.

All Chapters are hereby admonished not to sacrifice the Ritualistic for the optional.

HOUR OF OPENING CHAPTER

The By-Laws of each Chapter designates the hour at which it shall convene. The Worthy Matron at the time of her installation is admonished to set an example of good order and punctuality. Members who are obliged to wait long after the appointed hour of opening the Chapter, before it is called to order, naturally become discouraged, lose interest and the attendance at the Chapter suffers.

Printed blanks for reporting the hour at which the Chapter opened are being sent to each Chapter. A blank signed by the Worthy Matron and Secretary should be filled out by the Secretary after each meeting and mailed to the Grand Secretary promptly.

We are a small Jurisdiction and let us set an example for being "100% on time." The record compiled from these time blanks will be reported at the next Session of the Grand Chapter and special recognition will be given those Chapters who have a 100% record—beginning the first Stated meeting in June 1929 and including the last Stated meeting in April, 1930.

SUPPLIES

"Supplies" shall be interpreted to mean:—All paraphernalia and supplies required by the Ritual or Constitution, Rules and Regulations for use in Chapters and should be purchased from the Grand Secretary. "She shall sell all such supplies to subordinate Chapters in the name and for the benefit of this Grand Chapter." (Excerpt from Art. IX, Sec. 5, (7) Constitution.)

SECRETARIES OF SUBORDINATE CHAPTERS

In order to establish a uniformity in the Office of Secretaries of subordinate Chapters, it is the plan of your Grand Matron to hold two Schools of Instruction for Secretaries, in the early Autumn. One in Wilmington for Secretaries in New Castle County and one for Secretaries outside New Castle County, place to be decided later.

ILLEGAL MEMBERSHIP

The Grand Chapter of Delaware in Annual Session, 1929, was called upon to decide one of the most serious questions that has ever been presented for decision—That of the legality of membership of a person who has been initiated into our Order, without the required relationship to an affiliated Master Mason.

The decision of the Grand Chapter was to the effect that membership in our Order acquired without the relationship set forth in Art. 2, Sec. 1, of our Constitution is illegal.

I have authentic information that an illegal membership is held in another

Chapter in this Jurisdiction. I therefore:

DIRECT any Member knowing of such illegal membership in a Chapter SHALL report the same to the Worthy Matron of the Chapter, who shall, after verifying the information, order the person dropped from membership, initiation fee and dues to be returned to such person.

The Worthy Matron shall further order the Secretary to make red ink notation—"Illegal. Refer to decision Grand Chapter 1929" in the margin of the Minute Book wherever record of action on such petition appears.

The Worthy Matron shall further direct the Secretary of the Chapter to notify the Worthy Grand Matron of such action and the circumstances of the illegal membership.

CONCLUSION

Let us ever be mindful of our obligation, exemplifying in our lives the lessons taught by the heroines of our Order, that we may maintain a cordial relationship with the Masonic Fraternity, to which we are bound by the dearest of ties, and uphold in every way the high principles and proud heritage of that greatest of fraternal organizations, which stands for the Fatherhood of God and the Fellowship of Man.

Official Letter No. 2

October 31st, 1929

To the Officers and Members of Subordinate Chapters:

Sisters and Brothers:

The time of the Annual Election of the Chapter Officers is rapidly approaching, and with its advent, by vote of the majority of members present, you will select your officers for the ensuing year. Forgetting personal prejudices and feelings, let the welfare of your Chapter be your guide.

Annual Election—Notice of the Election and payment of dues should be sent to each member by the Secretary. Printed notices or notice blanks

should be ordered from the Grand Secretary in time to mail them to the members at least ten days before the first Stated meeting in December.

Ballots for the election should be of the style approved by the Grand Chapter and are also supplied by the Grand Secretary.

Associate Patron—An Official Letter was recently sent out from the Office of the Grand Secretary informing you of the necessity of amending your By-Laws to include in your elective officers an Associate Patron. All amendments to By-Laws must be sent to the Grand Matron for approval after having been adopted by your Chapter as prescribed in your By-Laws. A number of the Chapters have not complied with this requirement. Please see that this is done.

Installing Privilege—It shall be the prerogative of the retiring Worthy Matron to install the incoming Officers or to delegate this duty to some Grand Chapter Officer or to a Past or Present Worthy Matron or a Past or Present Worthy Patron.

This is to correct the impression of many of our members that the Worthy Matron must invite the Worthy Grand Matron to install.

"No member shall be installed into office who is more than one year in arrears for dues."

Petition Blanks—I find a number of Chapters using Petition Blanks which are not in accord with the Grand Chapter requirements. All Chapters using such blanks will order new ones from the Grand Secretary at once and upon receipt of same will destroy the obsolete blanks on hand.

Installation of Grand Officers

June 20th. At the stated meeting of Newark Chapter No. 10, with the assistance of Sister Alice D. Allbrittain, Grand Marshal, Sister Mary L. Gallaher, acting Grand Chaplain, and Sister Leth McMullin, acting Grand Organist, I installed Sister Alice D. Truitt as Grand Chaplain.

September 25th. At the stated meeting of Frankford Chapter No. 12, assisted by Sister Alice D. Allbrittain, Grand Marshal; Sister Alice D. Truitt, Grand Chaplain, and Sister Hilda S. Baker, acting Grand Organist, I installed Sister Levessa E. Cannon as Grand Martha and Sister Ella Carmine as Grand Warder.

Official Visits

Outstanding in the year's work is the memory of my Official Visits to each Chapter in the State. I have been cordially welcomed everywhere and royally entertained in many homes.

I greatly appreciate and kindly acknowledge your fraternal attitude in all things for the Good of the Order. It has been an inspiration to me and I am happy to record that I have experienced no heart aches but have found during the entire year a steadfast loyalty and harmonious cooperation with my administration throughout the Jurisdiction.

Until this year the visits of the Worthy Grand Matron have been made between January and our Annual Session in May, making this a period of unceasing activity, leaving the time between May and December with little for the Grand Matron to do other than the ordinary routine, which, because of the size of the Jurisdiction, takes comparatively little time.

This change has made it possible for me to perform my official duties throughout the entire year rather than in four months. While the change made it necessary for the Chapters to have two Official Visits in 1929, I believe it will be not only a help to the Grand Matrons in the future but the Officers will be doing their best work instead of their first for official inspection.

My aim has been to inspire an underlying spirit of fraternal fellowship and a desire to put into practice in our daily living the basic principles of our Order, as well as to "stress the importance of the strict observance of our forms, rules and regulations," and to give the Chapters, so far as in my power, some "instructive attention" as directed by this Grand Chapter.

The Chapters were visited as follows:

June 10th—Newark Chapter No. 10. June 25th—Delaware Chapter No. 1. September 25th—Frankford Chapter No. 12. October 2nd—Kent Chapter No. 11. October 11th—Radiant Chapter No. 6. October 15th—Mizpah Chapter No. 2. October 21st—Adah Chapter No. 5. October 28th-Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3. November 1st-Georgetown Chapter No. 9. November 7th-Sussex Chapter No. 7. November 14th-Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8. November 22nd-St. John's Chapter No. 4.

Irregularities

I have found a number of irregularities in Chapters visited and have called attention to same, requesting that they be corrected. That others may profit by these mistakes, I am making mention of them:

(1.) One Secretary, in order to have the minute book in perfect condition, wrote the minutes on loose leaves, re-writing them in the minute book after they were approved by the Chapter.

(2.) In one Chapter, the By-Laws were not in the By-Laws Book for

the signature of the members.

(3.) One Secretary signed the report on petitions for members of the Investigating Committee who were absent.

(4.) Sister Officers wearing colored shoes and hose instead of the required "all white."

- (5.) A Chapter establishing stations on the floor for the offices of two color bearers.
- (6.) A Grand Instructor accepted an appointment as "coach" in a Chapter assigned to another Grand Instructor. This is, in my judgment, not only opposed to Eastern Star law and usage but a breach of fraternal courtesy.

(7.) The members of Chapters being called up in the Initiatory Cere-

mony, when the candidates were brought into the room.

(8.) In a Chapter a petition for the degrees was received without the relationship being properly filled in by the petitioner.

(9.) Members retiring from Chapter while in session without permission of the presiding officer.

(10.) I have received a number of official letters from Chapters that do not bear the Chapter seal.

(Irregularities acted upon seriatum and accepted as such.)

Installations

A very important ceremony is the Installation of Officers, when the government of our Chapters, and in a great measure the prosperity of the Order in each jurisdiction is placed in the hands of new officers. I greatly appreciate the courtesy extended me by the Worthy Matrons of the following Chapters, who invited me to install the officers for them:

January 2nd-Newark Chapter No. 10.

January 3rd-Georgetown Chapter No. 9, except Marshal and Organist. January 6th-Adah Chapter No. 5.

January 7th-Mizpah Chapter No. 2.

January 8th-Frankford Chapter No. 12.

January 9th-Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8.

January 10th-Radiant Chapter No. 6, except Esther.

January 10th-St. John's Chapter No. 4, except Secretary.

January 14th-Delaware Chapter No. 1.

January 15th—Kent Chapter No. 11, excepting Associate Patron and Sentinel.

I was assisted in all these installations by Sister Alice D. Allbrittain, Grand Marshal and in many by Sister Alice D. Truitt, Grand Chaplain, Sister Ella Carmine, Grand Warder and Brother George Hirlinger, Grand Sentinel. In the absence of these Grand Officers I was pleased to appoint Sisters and Brothers of the Chapter or other Grand Officers to serve as Grand Officers pro tem.

At the installation of officers of Newark Chapter No. 10, a very unique situation confronted me as installing officer. Sister Anna E. Gallaher was to be installed Worthy Matron, and realizing it was a rare opportunity, I was pleased to invite my Worthy Grand Patron to install his daughter as presiding officer in her Chapter and to accept his invitation to act Grand Marshal for her installation.

Dispensations Granted

December 27th—I granted a special Dispensation authorizing Kent Chapter No. 11, to hold their Annual Meeting and Installation of Officers on January 15th, 1930, instead of January 1st, the date of their first stated meeting. Fee \$1.00.

January 20th—I granted Dispensation authorizing Radiant Chapter No. 6 to install Lavinia McDaniel as Esther at their stated meeting January 24th, 1930. Fee \$1.00.

February 5th—Granted Dispensation authorizing Georgetown Chapter No. 9 to install Mary E. Phillips, Marshal, and Ida May Green, Organist, at their stated meeting February 7th, 1930. Fee \$1.00.

March 19th—Granted Dispensation authorizing Kent Chapter No. 11 to install Sidney B. Dolby, Associate Patron, and William E. West, Sentinel, at their stated meeting March 19th, 1930. Fee \$1.00.

January 16th—Sussex Chapter No. 7 installed Edith Steward, Treasurer, and Addie Herrant, Ruth, without Dispensation authorizing same. All officers were reported as having been installed at their Annual Meeting, January 2nd, in their annual returns, which was signed by the Installing Officer.

All Dispensation fees have been sent to the Grand Secretary.

Schools of Instruction

February 10th-School of Instruction for Chapters in Wilmington was

held at 2.00 P. M. and at 7.45 P. M. in the room of Julia M. Story Chapter at 900 Washington Street. The evening session was held in connection with the stated meeting of the Chapter.

February 11th—At 10.30 A. M., 2.00 P. M. and 8.00 P. M., Instructions were given in Odd Fellows Building, 10th and King Streets. The morning session was conducted by Mrs. Floy E. Booth, Parliamentarian for the State Federation of Women's Clubs, and was devoted to a drill in Parliamentary Procedure as applicable to the conduct of Chapter business.

The Sessions the first day were of a general nature, including Instructions in the handling of petitions, balloting, opening with a quorum, examination of a visitor, objection to a visitor, etc., and explanation of the difference in procedure when a new ballot is requested and when a preference in the ballot is requested.

The evening School was held in connection with the stated meeting of Delaware Chapter No. 1, and the Instructions both then and in the afternoon were mostly devoted to the Ritualistic ceremonies, particularly to the Initiatory work.

The Officers of each Chapter occupied the various stations during these Schools with necessary vacancies filled by installed officers of other City Chapters. The attendance was exceptionally good and the general interest very gratifying.

Schools were conducted in the rural Chapters as follows:

February 17th-Adah Chapter No. 5, at their stated meeting, 8.00 P. M.

February 19th—Kent Chapter No. 11, at 2.00 P. M. and at their stated meeting at 8.00 P. M.

February 20th—Sussex Chapter No. 7, at their stated meeting at 7.30 P. M.

February 21st—Georgetown Chapter No. 9, at 2.00 P. M. and at their stated meeting at 8.00 P. M.

February 26th—Frankford Chapter No. 12, at 2.00 P. M. and at their stated meeting at 7.30 P. M.

March 20th—Newark Chapter No. 10, at their stated meeting, 8.00 P. M.

April 10th—Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8, at their stated meeting at 8,00 P. M.

The work of the Officers and the general interest of the members in these various Chapters was most gratifying and a pleasing recompense for my efforts to establish a uniformity of work throughout this Grand Jurisdiction.

I was ably assisted in giving Instruction by the members of the Board of Grand Instructors.

When conducting these Schools, I learned that in some Chapters the Rituals and copies of the Constitution and By-Laws have been loaned to

officers and not returned to the Chapters. I instructed that the officer or member to whom any Chapter property is loaned should be required to sign for same and be held responsible to the Chapter to the extent of the purchase price of such property.

I submit the list of required property as follows:

- 1. Charter.
- 2. Six Rituals.
- 3. One copy of S. W.
- 4. One copy of Labyrinth.
- 5. One signet.
- 6. One Official Seal.
- 7. Six small Bibles.
- 8. Three copies of the Constitution and Laws of the Grand Chapter.
- Required Chapter Account Books and forms as supplied by the Grand Secretary—for use of the Secretary and Treasurer.
- Paraphernalia and furniture as required by the Ritual and Grand Chapter.

The Chapters Instituted under this Grand Chapter have received six Rituals and those Instituted under the General Grand Chapter received but three. Since no required number of Rituals for the use of subordinate Chapters has ever been stipulated by this Grand Chapter, I did not change this number but instructed the Chapters in accordance with the time of Instituting whether they should have three or six Rituals as Chapter property, and that the Chapter Seal should be placed in the books belonging to the Chapter as a mark of identification.

School of Instruction for Secretaries

In accordance with notice sent in my first official letter, arrangements were made to hold two Schools of Instruction for Secretaries—one in Wilmington on October 16th, for Secretaries in the City and New Castle County, and one to be held October 22nd, in Georgetown, for Secretaries of Chapters in Kent and Sussex Counties.

Because it was inconvenient for a sufficient number of Secretaries to attend the School in Georgetown, arrangements for this date were cancelled. In view of the fact that four of the five Chapters elected new Secretaries at their annual election, further arrangements were delayed until these newly elected officers had gained some knowledge of the duties of the office, and this School was held on April 23rd, in Georgetown Chapter Room.

In conducting both these Schools, the assistance of Sister M. Etta Keys, Grand Secretary, was greatly appreciated. All Secretaries with the exception of two, were present and I feel that all derived a definite benefit from the general instruction and discussion of the Chapter work.

In order to have a complete record of Rituals in this Jurisdiction, the Secretaries were instructed to keep a separate Ritual account, showing the number of Rituals sold by the Chapter and to whom they were sold.

Book of Instruction

After several years of earnest effort on the part of the Committee appointed to draft a Book of Instruction for use of Subordinate Chapters in this Jurisdiction, the Book has been edited and distributed by the Grand Secretary.

The editing of this book required patient and persistent attention on the part of your Grand Matron and Grand Secretary and we feel that our time was well spent. We regret that there are two errors, one in the position of officers in the prayer circle, page 17, and the word "candidate" second line, page 18, should have been "candidates."

The section "To open with a Quorum" was included in accordance with motion adopted by the Grand Chapter, that this "be left in the hands of the incoming Grand Matron, with the privilege of having same printed in the Book of Instructions," and I hope it meets with your approval.

The Worthy Matrons who have used it diligently have found it unnecessary to call upon the Grand Instructor more often than required by this Grand Chapter. This fact was impressed upon me most forcibly by our "baby" Chapter down the state when I went there for School of Instruction. They had not had a Grand Instructor since the new Ritual went into effect and I am pleased to state that their work on that occasion has not been surpassed by any of the older Chapters, and instruction in the interpretation of the Ritualistic work was necessary on only one or two minor points.

Requests have come for definite instruction in a few instances not covered by the Book of Instructions and I will note these as follows:

The Associate Conductress carries the ballot box to the Associate Matron, Associate Patron, etc., for their ballots.

The Conductress does not arrange the altar after balloting. In opening the Bible, she may allow room for the ballot box. Otherwise, the Associate Conductress will place the open Bible in position to allow for the box and allow it to remain so after the balloting is finished.

Should it be necessary that a sister or brother be requested to guard the door while the Sentinel ballots, the sister or brother does not give the salutation sign but must return when the Sentinel retires after balloting.

Alarms. When the Worthy Matron directs the Warder to attend the alarm, she responds to the alarm in proper manner and closes the door to report. If directed to admit members or visitors she opens the door again without the raps. The attending of alarms is not finished until the orders of the Worthy Matron are fully obeyed.

Ritual Page 19. When the Worthy Matron directs the Examining Committee to retire with the Visitor and the Marshal to escort them—the Committee will procure a Bible, assemble in the West—the Marshal will go directly to the visitor, offer her right arm, escort her to the West and when the Committee is ready the Marshal will proceed to the door with the visitor, followed by the Committee.

Labyrinth. The Labyrinth in our Chapter rooms shall be a pentagon, the angles of which (as designated by the station pedestals) shall be not more than six feet from the altar. In Chapter rooms that are too narrow to use the regulation Labyrinth, permission shall be granted to use a Labyrinth as near a pentagon as possible.

Balloting. It is the prerogative of any member to request a re-spread of the ballot, in case a mistake has been made in casting a ballot or any irregularity is noted in the conduct of the ballot—provided the request is made BEFORE the result of the ballot is declared by the Worthy Matron.

Should such a request be made, the Worthy Matron immediately directs the Associate Conductress to bear the box east, and destroys the ballot, and proceeds as with a new ballot on the same petition.

Should a member request a preference in the ballot, the box is borne west and east for inspection, but is not declared, and is prepared for the ballots of those who have not balloted. When all have voted, it is again borne west and east and the result of both inspections declared.

Independent Grand Jurisdictions. At the Tri-Annual Assembly of the General Grand Chapter held in Denver in 1928, resolutions were adopted regarding New York and New Jersey as follows:

"That no request may be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy, upon a Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one authorized and promulgated by this General Grand Chapter.

That the right of visitation by members, regardless of rank, who have been initiated by any Ritual other than the one authorized by the General Grand Chapter shall be limited to a seat as a casual visitor, with no further rights or courtesies, such as grand honors, formal introductions, seats in the East or rights of the floor."

I have informed our subordinate Chapters of the action of the General Grand Chapter and in as much as this Grand Chapter has taken no action in this matter, instructed that the policy of the General Grand Chapter be followed during my term of office.

Further instructions were given that special care should be exercised in requiring membership credentials before admitting visitors purporting to be brothers from these jurisdictions, since Master Masons are permitted to visit their Chapters without becoming members of the Order.

Proficiency Examination. The outline for examinations in the Constitution, Rules and Regulations, drafted for use of the Grand Instructors in giving examinations for Class A certificates, being very indefinite, I have drafted an examination in the form of a definite list of questions on these laws, and recommend that they be printed in the Proceedings.

Illegal Membership

In compliance with the instruction sent out in my first official letter, regarding "illegal membership", on October 31st I received a letter from Chapter informing me that a member of that Chapter was affected by the decision of the Grand Chapter, that the instructions of the Grand Matron had been complied with and the person dropped from membership.

By-Laws of Subordinate Chapters

In complying with the recommendation of the Jurisprudence Committee adopted by this Grand Body, "that the incoming Grand Matron take steps to see that all subordinate Chapter By-Laws are in conformity with legislation enacted in Grand Chapter Session since May, 1923," I directed the Grand Secretary to request each Chapter to forward to me two copies of their By-Laws.

I believe the Jurisprudence Committee little realized what a task they were giving the Grand Matron to perform. In perusing these By-Laws, I found that according to their By-Laws, four of the Chapters were still working under the General Grand Chapter, and that few of the Chapters had amended their By-Laws to conform with legislation enacted by this Grand Chapter since its Constitution.

In the performance of this task, I appreciate the hearty cooperation of the Chapters and am pleased to report that, with few exceptions, the necessary corrections have been made.

Copies of these revised By-Laws have been turned over to the Juris-prudence Committee.

November 19th—Frankford Chapter No. 12. Omitting "stated meetings that fall on holidays in which case the meeting will be held the following evening" and changing the time of the stated meetings to 8 P. M. from April 1st to October 1st; including "Associate Patron" in list of elective officers.

December 2nd—Sussex Chapter No. 7. Omitting stated meetings on the third Thursday in May and during July and August; changing "three" to "four" in the Section referring to a quorum; including "Associate Patron" in list of elective officers; Section referring to dimit accompanying petition for affiliation by addition "when the applicant's previous membership was in another Grand Jurisdiction"; by addition of clause "except that any ruling or edict of the Grand Chapter altering these By-Laws will have the effect of an amendment without further action on the part of the Chapter."

December 17th—Mizpah Chapter No. 2. Changing time of stated meeting from 7.45 to 8.00 P. M. and omitting stated meeting on January 1st.

December 26th—Georgetown Chapter No. 9. Changing time of stated meeting from 7.30 to 8.00 P. M.; including "Associate Patron" in list of elective officers; by addition of Amendment clause referring to legislation by Grand Chapter; changing annual dues from "three" dollars to "five" dollars.

In checking this edition I found that they were "Approved by Mattie Pyle Horn, Worthy Grand Matron." This was done through some misunderstanding, as I had approved only the amendments above referred to, under date of December 2nd, and corrections I have requested are in sections as printed in the new edition.

April 17th—Sent letters to Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8, Radiant Chapter No. 6 and Mizpah Chapter No. 2, calling attention to sections in their By-Laws that were not in conformity with the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and requested that the necessary corrections be made.

Questions and Answers

"Knowledge is boundless, but the capacity of one's mind is limited."

Many of the questions that have been asked have been answered by referring the questioner to the Constitution and Laws and to the approved

Decisions and Recommendations of the Past Grand Matrons. However, a few of these questions I will record, believing that they may help other officers and members.

1. The health of one of our officers will not permit her to perform the duties of her office. Can she sit in the Chapter room and see the work while another fills her station pro tempore?

Answer. Yes. (Approved)

2. Can we elect a member to an office who is absent at the time of the election?

Answer. Yes. (Approved)

3. Can the Associate Matron when acting Worthy Matron invite a Past Matron to preside for her?

Answer. Yes, if she is present at the meeting. If she is absent it is the duty of the Worthy Patron to invite a Past Matron or a sister to preside.

(Approved)

4. Can a widow of a Master Mason who has married a man who is not a Mason petition for the degrees on the affiliation of her first husband?

Answer. No. (Approved)

5. A letter has been received from the Order of the Amaranth requesting information as to the standing of a member of our Chapter who has moved to another Jurisdiction. Shall we send this information?

Answer. No. I would suggest that you notify your member of the attitude of this Grand Jurisdiction as outlined in Art. II, Sec. 2, of the Constitution.

(Approved)

6. Can a Chapter remit the dues of its suspended members?

Answer. Yes, according to the Rules and Regulations. However, this is not advisable if the suspended member is financially able to pay dues. If a member is financially unable to pay dues the charitable act is to remit the dues and not to suspend such member. (Approved)

7. A member has objected to a person elected to receive the degrees. Shall I inform the incoming Worthy Matron who made the objection?

Answer. No. (See Sec. 61, Rules and Regulations.) I suggest that you inform the objector that if the objection is to remain, it should be made to the incoming Worthy Matron after she is installed. (Approved)

Decisions

1. What disposition shall be made of a petition upon which the Brother on the Investigating Committee reports the Master Mason, upon whom the petitioner claims to be eligible to membership, has dimitted from the Masonic Lodge?

Decision. The Investigating Committee shall report the applicant "ineligible to petition for the degrees on her Masonic affiliation."

The Secretary shall note this in her records and so report to the Grand Secretary;

The petition fee shall be returned to the petitioner;

The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person who is not eligible to petition for the degrees. (Approved)

Can a legally adopted daughter petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents?

Decision. Yes. (Decision approved by the General Grand Chapter in 1928.) (Approved)

3. When does a petitioner for affiliation become a member of the Chapter—when elected or when she or he signs the By-Laws?

Decision. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record. (Approved)

4. In view of the attitude of the General Grand Chapter toward Chapters using Rituals other than those promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, how shall we handle a petition for affiliation on a dimit granted by such a Chapter?

Decision. In the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual. (Approved)

5. Can members be admitted to the Chapter room after the Report of the Committee on Investigation is received and before the Ballot is announced?

Decision. No. The Ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon. (Approved)

6. Should we order the printing of a new edition of our By-Laws through the Grand Secretary?

Decision. Yes. By-Laws of a subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a "supply," as interpreted in my official letter number one. (Approved)

7. A Certificate of Proficiency has been defaced by the member to whom it was issued. Shall a duplicate be issued to this member?

Decision. Yes, upon payment of a fee to cover the cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal, (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, (4), plus the list price of the Certificate.

(See recommendations of Jurisprudence Com.)

Recommendations

1. That the Opening and Closing Ceremonies used in this Session of the Grand Chapter be adopted as the Official Opening and Closing Ceremonies of this Grand Chapter. (Approved)

The Committee to consist of three members, the first appointment to be for one, two and three years respectively. (This recommendation will require an amendment, see Art. VI, Sec. 2, Page 34, if approved.) (Approved)

- 3. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on dimit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation. (Approved)
- 4. That all members and visitors be required to fill out an identification slip at all Chapter meetings, to be collected by the Conductress and Associate Conductress when proving the Chapter, and that the Chapter Registry Book be kept from these slips. Blank slips to be secured from the Grand Secretary. (Approved)
- 5. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner

initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter. (Approved)

- 6. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss. (Approved)
- 7. That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter, as amended to date, be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided at this Grand Session. (Approved—Printing of new edition ordered postponed until after 1931 Session).
- 8. That no person shall be elected to any office in this Grand Chapter or in any subordinate Chapter, who resides more than ten miles beyond the State boundary or more than ten miles beyond the jurisdiction of the Chapter, and that removal of the residence of any officer beyond these limits shall automatically create a vacancy in that office, except the office of the Worthy Matron or the Worthy Patron, which shall be filled by the Associate Matron or the Associate Patron.

 (Not Approved)
- 9. That the policy of introducing candidates for offices in this Grand Chapter, immediately before voting for that particular office, be adopted by this Grand Chapter, and used at this Session. (Not Approved)
- 10. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for approval.

 (Approved)
- 11. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Conand that the cards furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, this purpose.

 (Approved)

Five Points Chapter U. D.

At the Institution of Five Points Chapter U. D., the Worthy Grand Patron honored me by placing the work of the Chapter in my charge. It has been my privilege to instruct the officers in the duties of their office and to share the enthusiasm of the entire membership, as well as their joys and

difficulties. These two attributes seem to travel hand in hand through life and the Order of the Eastern Star is not exempt.

I am pleased to report, that while the work has been a bit difficult for some, the progress is highly commendable, that at the first stated meeting of the Chapter, the Opening and Closing Ceremonies were rendered without use of a Ritual, and that their Initiatory work has been exemplified in a manner becoming those who have been in the Order for years, rather than by officers who have been members only a matter of weeks.

I feel that this Grand Chapter in adopting a "Status of Honorary Membership" for this Grand Jurisdiction conferred upon the Subordinate Chapters a great favor, as it was a case of either showing partiality or making every Grand Matron and Grand Patron an honorary member of each Chapter.

It made me glad to read the following in the report of a Fraternal Correspondent in another Jurisdiction: "Through the report of the Committee on Status of Honorary Membership, it is seen that the members of this committee very emphatically put the stamp of disapproval upon promiscuous granting of honorary membership So to be elected to honorary membership in the Order in Delaware really means something beside a polite gesture upon the part of the members of the Chapters. This forward step coming from the baby Grand Chapter, reminds us 'A little child shall lead them'."

Contingent Fund

Of the \$125.00 received for my expenses in the performance of my official duties, I am returning \$6.18 to the Grand Chapter. An itemized account of my expenditures has been filed with the Board of Grand Trustees.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

To the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

Since forwarding my report to the Jurisprudence Committee, the following matters have come to me for official action:

By-Laws Approved

May 12th. Approved amendments to the By-Laws of Kent Chapter No. 11, omitting stated meeting when it falls on January 1st; changing annual dues from three to five dollars; addition of "when applicant's previous membership was in another Grand Jurisdiction" to section referring to dimit accompanying petition for affiliation; by addition of "except that any law, ruling or edict of the Grand Chapter altering these By-Laws, has the effect of an amendment without any action on the part of this Chapter," to section on Amendments.

May 19th. Approved revised By-Laws of Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8.

Waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction

Requested by the Grand Matron of Maryland:

May 19th. Over Mrs. Dorothy Holloway, Millville, Delaware, in favor of Holly Chapter No. 45, Berlin, Md. Referred to Frankford Chapter No. 12.

Question and Answer

8. Can a member of a Chapter in Wilmington petition another Chapter in Wilmington for affiliation without first securing a dimit?

Answer. No. The approved recommendation states that "in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction" a member of the Order may petition for affiliation without first securing a dimit. (See recommendation approved 1929). This does not provide for this procedure between Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction. (Approved)

Decision

8. Is a Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron of a Chapter under Dispensation a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron if they are not elected to that office at the time of Constitution?

Decision. Yes. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron. (Approved)

Recommendation

12. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months). (Approved)

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

Once more the ever-moving wheel of time has completed its revolution and we gather again to give an account of our Stewardship. It is with a deep sense of appreciation for the privilege that has been mine that I come to the close of my year as Worthy Grand Patron. It is, indeed, a pleasure to greet you from the Grand East, to join with our Worthy Grand Matron in extending to you all a hearty and sincere welcome to this our Ninth Annual Session, and to express to you the wish that your presence may be a source of inspiration, pleasure, and profit to each one of us.

Necrology

We are very happy to report that the Golden Chain of our Official Family has not been severed. We are truly grateful to our Heavenly Father for His

watchful care and guidance during the past year. We note with deep regret the passing of members of the subordinate chapters, and to all who have suffered the loss of those near and dear to them we extend our heartfelt sympathy.

Official Acts

It was my privilege and pleasure to sign, concurrently, the first official letter sent to the subordinate chapters by our Worthy Grand Matron.

Story, Sister Rose E. Newlin, and Sister Jean Hubert Caufman, Past Grand Matrons. Brother Harry F. Newlin, Brother Harry T. Hickey, and Brother Alfred M. Clower, Past Grand Patrons. Their presence was an inspiration to all.

Eastern Stars who were present from many of the Chapters throughout the State to greet and welcome the new Chapter added much to the ceremony of Instituting.

At the conclusion of the Instituting work, by invitation, the Chapter was opened in full form, and the initiatory work conferred on four candidates by the officers of my home Chapter, Newark, No. 10. It being necessary that specific territorial jurisdiction be established for Five Points Chapter, U. D., after considerable thought, with a view of being entirely fair to all concerned, I made the following assignment:

Description of Jurisdiction of Five Points Chapter, U. D., Richardson Park, Delaware

BEGINNING at the intersection of the public road leading to Mermaid and the State Line between the States of Delaware and Pennsylvania, in or near the Town of Southwood, and continuing thence as follows:

With the said State Line in an easterly direction to the intersection of said State Line with the road leading from Kennett Square to Brick Meeting House, thence easterly with said road leading to Brick Meeting House in a southeasterly direction to the road leading from Centreville to Newport, thence with the said road leading to Newport, in a southerly direction to where it intersects with the Lancaster Pike, thence with said Pike in an easterly direction to the Middleboro Road, thence with the said Middleboro Road, in a southeasterly direction to the point where it intersects with the center line of the W. & N. R. R., thence with the said center line of said railroad, in a southerly direction to the point where the center line projected, would intersect the center line of the Delaware Road, thence with the center line of the said Delaware Railroad in a southwesterly direction to the overhead bridge on the State Road at Farnhurst, thence with the said State Road in a southwesterly direction to Hares Corner, thence with the Hares Corner Road in a westerly direction across the Christiana River to Christiana Town, thence in a northerly direction with the road leading through Harmony and Mermaid to the place of BEGINNING.

Together with a copy of the above, I addressed the following communication to each of the Subordinate Chapters of New Castle County:

February 7, 1930

To the Officers and members of the Subordinate Chapters, Order of the Eastern Star, of New Castle County, Delaware.

Greetings:

For your information I am enclosing copy of the description of the Territorial Jurisdiction assigned to Five Points Chapter, U. D., effective as of February 6, 1930, and to hold until the Grand Chapter Session in May, 1930.

On April 10, and again on April 24, I officially visited Five Points Chapter, U. D., for the purpose of inspecting their work and examining their By-Laws. I was very much pleased with the manner in which they conducted the business affairs of the Chapter and also with the proficiency of the initiatory work. On April 24 their proposed By-Laws, submitted to me, was taken up with the Chapter, and with minor changes proposed by members of the Chapter, I approved them on that date and referred them to the Jurisprudence Committee for their approval. At the same time I recommended to the Worthy Grand Matron, to the Committee on Chapters Under Dispensation, and to the Jurisprudence Committee, that a charter be granted to Five Points Chapter, U. D., to be constituted as Five Points Chapter No. 13.

Official Visits

I was happy to be able to officially visit all the Subordinate Chapters with the exception of Kent No. 11. Conditions beyond my control prevented me from making this visit, a fact which I very much regretted.

It was my privilege to witness the initiatory work in many of the Chapters last year, and I want to commend the officers of the various Chapters on the very proficient manner in which the work was done. During the past year the highly instructive program presented by our Worthy Grand Matron should prove most helpful to the Subordinate Chapters. I also had the pleasure of witnessing the installation of officers of Newark Chapter No. 10, Radiant Chapter No. 6, St. John's Chapter No. 4, and Delaware Chapter No. 1. In my own Chapter, Newark No. 10, the Worthy Grand Matron, who had been invited to install our officers, in her usually thoughtful way, extended to me an invitation to install my daughter, Anna E. Gallaher, as Worthy Matron. I was, indeed, very happy to accept the invitation and I deeply appreciate the honor and distinction accorded me.

Appreciation

I am grateful to the several Chapters for their very kind invitations to attend their banquets, social functions, and entertainments throughout the year. I was especially delighted to attend the reception given by St. John's Chapter No. 4, in honor of our Worthy Grand Matron. The most pleasant times had on all these occasions shall ever linger in my memory.

For the beautiful gifts presented to me, for the many courtesies and splendid hospitality extended to me, and to my good wife, I express my gratitude and thanks.

I wish also to express my sincere appreciation to our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, for her counsel on matters for the good of the Order and for her willingness to assist me in every way possible. To our Grand Secretary, Sister M. Etta Keys, I am especially indebted for the prompt and efficient manner in which the details in connection with the instituting of Five Points Chapter were handled, as well as for her many other acts of kindness.

To Past Grand Officers I am grateful for their words of advice, so cheerfully given.

Honorary Membership

I very much appreciate the courtesy extended by St. John's Chapter No. 4 in presenting to me a beautifully engraved certificate of honorary membership

Recommendations

I recommend that all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petitions to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter. (Approved)

For the Good of the Order

With the thought in mind that perhaps we all, too often, make more or less indiscreet remarks, within and outside the Chapter rooms, which results in unpleasant misunderstandings, tending to injuriously affect the peace and harmony of our Order, I am prompted to submit for your thoughtful consideration the following verse:

"If you are tempted to reveal
A tale some one to you has told
About another, make it pass
Before you speak, Three Gates of Gold.
These narrow gates: First is it true?
Then is it needful? In your mind

Give truthful answer, and the next Is the last and closest, Is it kind? And if to reach your lips at last It passes through these gateways three, Then you may tell the tale, nor fear What the result of speech may be,"

Conclusion

To those in whose hands will soon rest the responsibility of guiding the affairs of this Grand Chapter during the year just ahead, I bespeak for them the same splendid cooperation that it has been our privilege to enjoy this year, and

May the end of a perfect year be yours, When the evening Stars appear; And may every day have been a perfect day, To the end of YOUR perfect year.

Another year of Eastern Star history has been made. With the return to you of the mantle of authority with which you invested me one year ago, may I again express my profound gratitude for the honor, courtesies, and friendly treatment accorded me.

REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

In submitting my report, I bring you the result of a most delightful and profitable experience. While the labor has been taxing, yet the knowledge I have gained of the work of our beloved Order has more than compensated.

I could not express my gratitude to this Grand Chapter for granting me the privilege of serving you as Fraternal Correspondent. From this mental travel through the various Grand Jurisdictions I have gleaned much information regarding the activities, growth and progress of our Order. I have gathered many beautiful gems of thought and marvelous accounts of splendid work, and it is with pleasure that I bring you a brief outline of the many worthwhile things being done by other Grand Jurisdictions.

The wings of fancy have carried me to the Annual Sessions of 52 Grand Chapters in 51 Grand Jurisdictions, and the imagination has needed little stimulation to visualize those beautifully decorated Grand Chapter rooms, filled with their gatherings of enthusiastic members of the Order. The details of the Proceedings of each were so complete and so well compiled that usually it was easy to imagine one was really witnessing the programs carried out by them.

I am very sorry that I did not have the pleasure of reviewing the Proceedings of Connecticut, New York and Kentucky, due to the fact of non-arrival of same.

The form of opening Grand Chapter Session is very much the same in all Jurisdictions. The first guest of honor at all Grand Sessions is the National Flag. In our own beloved United States it is "The Star Spangled Banner." In Canada it is their honored "Union Jack" and often we find the O. E. S. Banner and the State Flag also honored.

The growth of our Order has been almost inconceivable and "The Light of His Star" now shines practically all over the world. It is an international organization with four Sovereign Bodies, consisting of the General Grand Chapter, the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland and the two independent Grand Chapters of New York and New Jersey. From a few members less than sixty-five years ago we have grown to be the largest woman's and third largest fraternal organization in the world, with a membership of over two million.

Every Grand Chapter has its memory hour. All are beautifully solemn, lifting the heart and mind from things earthly to those eternal in the world where death comes not. One from the ranks of the General Grand Chapter was called to rest during April, 1930—Kansas and the whole world, mourns the loss of Sister Emma M. Viets, Past Grand Matron of Kansas, and Right Worthy Associate Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter.

The reports of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, and addresses given by distinguished guests are all of invaluable educational worth and give us a faint glimpse of the wonderful character of those at the helm of our beautiful order. At almost every Grand Chapter Session the Worshipful Grand Master addresses and welcomes the members of the Eastern Star. Very often the same courtesy is likewise accorded the Worthy Grand Matron to address the Masonic body when they are in session, showing the splendid spirit of cooperation existing between the Order of the Eastern Star and the Masonic Fraternity.

The outstanding features of the organization are its charities and benevolences. Much of the efforts are directed toward the support of O. E. S. Homes, or sharing in the responsibilities of the Masonic Homes. In the United States there are:

Eleven exclusive Eastern Star Homes for the aged and dependent.

Thirty-five Masonic and Eastern Star Homes.

The Masonic Fraternity and Eastern Stars in ten jurisdictions are caring for orphan children.

Pennsylvania has two Eastern Star Homes—one in Western Pennsylvania and a new one in Eastern Pennsylvania, which was dedicated on June 1, 1929.

New Jersey has also just dedicated a new O. E. S. Home that cost \$70,000.

A cottage for the Superintendent of the Masonic Home was erected and furnished by the Grand Chapter of Alabama, at a cost of \$13,500.

Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, has the only Army Chapter in the world.

Beulah Chapter, Topeka, Kansas, is the largest subordinate Chapter in the world, with a membership of 2,016.

To Texas credit is due for erecting the first Grand Chapter office building, at a cost of \$25,000.

Sixteen states have celebrated their Golden Anniversaries.

Thirty states have passed their Silver Anniversaries.

Florida, Virginia and Scotland celebrated their Silver Anniversaries this

year.

At the twenty-fifth Silver Jubilee Session of Florida, held in April, 1929, Grand Chapter presented to the Grand Lodge of Florida, A. F. & A. M., a wonderful Silver Jubilee gift of \$25,000, representing \$1,000 for each of the twenty-five years the Grand Chapter has been in existence. This sum is to form an Eastern Star Hospital Endowment Fund for the Masonic Hospital.

The Worthy Grand Matron of Florida gave her report from memory;

very unusual.

Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter, having been organized in 1867. Eight of their Chapters have over 1,000 members. By amendment to the By-Laws the office of Grand Sentinel has been made elective.

Sister Florence S. Babbitt, Past Grand Chaplain, and a Life Member of the Grand Chapter of Michigan, passed away just a few weeks after presentation of the Christian Flag at their Annual Session. Sister Babbitt carried the first American Flag in General Grand Chapter, and initiated the Flag Service in the Subordinate Chapter, as well as in the Grand Chapter of Michigan.

Michigan has a Sister who has been a member of the Eastern Star 58 years. Quebec is the youngest Grand Chapter, being seven years old.

Illinois is the largest Grand Chapter, with a membership of 200,368 in 845 Chapters. The Worthy Grand Matron selects a Grand Lecturer from her own Chapter to be used as an Instructress. There are 524 Grand Lecturers in Illinois.

Robert Morris Chapter is the largest in Illinois, with a membership of 1,368.

Washington State has a Sister and Brother who have been members of the Star 56 and 57 years, and each were initiated by Robert Morris.

District Deputy Grand Matrons and Patrons of each district, and the Worthy Matrons of each Chapter make reports, which are printed in the Proceedings of South Carolina. Collective ballots are allowed.

Porto Rico is the smallest Grand Chapter, but on account of the poverty among the inhabitants of the Island the Order has risen to the greatest heights of service. Among the charities is noted that of acting in conjunction with the Masons, in serving hot lunches to the under-nourished children.

South Dakota has the largest percentage of members of any state, having 1,000 more Stars than Masons.

Arizona has a per capita tax of \$1.00 and permits collective ballots.

Maine and Minnesota have Brothers to serve as Fraternal Correspondents.

Their reports are most interesting.

Alberta has a joint Installation. I find here a scarcity of brothers as Patrons—one Patron having served under nine Grand Matrons.

Ohio boasts of the services of a Sentinel for forty-six years. This brother is ninety-two years young. His service to Masonry is said not to be excelled, having served as Tyler for fifty-two years, which service merited his appointment as Honorary Tyler at the session of Grand Lodge.

Social training for youth connected with the Masonic Order and Eastern Star has not been overlooked. The De Molay for boys is reported growing in strength, while seventeen jurisdictions sponsor the "Order of the Rainbow" for girls and thirteen jurisdictions sponsor "Job's Daughters." Thus a portion of the future membership of the Order is training and growing under the influence of its precepts and principles.

Schools of Instruction are held in almost every state and are productive of much good. District Deputy Grand Matrons, Board of Grand Examiners, Instructors and Grand Lecturers assist the Grand Matron in her work.

Rhode Island is the only state without a Fraternal Correspondent. Their Grand Chapter Session is for one day only.

Regarding the traveling Bible, of which we had found no trace in the last two years, Sister Chadwick, Most Worthy Grand Matron, said at the Grand Chapter Session of Wyoming that it had ended by being returned to the owner, R. T. King Chapter of Columbus, Ohio, after it was brought back from China among Sister Henrich's effects. I would like to state, for the benefit of those interested, that this Bible is again in circulation and I had the pleasure of seeing it used upon the Altar at the Grand Chapter Session of Maryland on Wednesday, April 30, 1930, and Delaware is now honored in having it upon the Altar at its ninth Annual Session.

Brilliant, thoughtful addresses, lovely music and impressive installation ceremonies all added charm and inspiration to the sessions, while banquets, receptions and other social functions furnished a more personal contrast for visiting members.

There are so many wonderful thoughts gathered from the Proceedings of the various jurisdictions, which I wish I might include in this report. Some of these I was able to touch upon in the individual reports.

To the Fraternal Correspondents of other Grand Jurisdictions, who were most kind and generous in reviewing Delaware Grand Chapter Session, I extend greetings, grateful thanks and appreciation on behalf of this Grand Chapter.

I am grateful to our own Grand Secretary, Sister M. Etta Keys, for mailing the proceedings so promptly and her many acts of kindness to me.

The Fraternal Correspondent of Louisiana is allowed 10 pages to report upon fifty-six Grand Jurisdictions.

Ohio boasts of the services of a Sentinel for forty-six years. This brother is ninety-two years young. His service to Masonry is said not to be excelled, having served as Tyler for fifty-two years, which service merited his appointment as Honorary Tyler at the session of Grand Lodge.

Social training for youth connected with the Masonic Order and Eastern Star has not been overlooked. The De Molay for boys is reported growing in strength, while seventeen jurisdictions sponsor the "Order of the Rainbow" for girls and thirteen jurisdictions sponsor "Job's Daughters." Thus a portion of the future membership of the Order is training and growing under the influence of its precepts and principles.

Schools of Instruction are held in almost every state and are productive of much good. District Deputy Grand Matrons, Board of Grand Examiners, Instructors and Grand Lecturers assist the Grand Matron in her work.

Rhode Island is the only state without a Fraternal Correspondent. Their Grand Chapter Session is for one day only.

Regarding the traveling Bible, of which we had found no trace in the last two years, Sister Chadwick, Most Worthy Grand Matron, said at the Grand Chapter Session of Wyoming that it had ended by being returned to the owner, R. T. King Chapter of Columbus, Ohio, after it was brought back from China among Sister Henrich's effects. I would like to state, for the benefit of those interested, that this Bible is again in circulation and I had the pleasure of seeing it used upon the Altar at the Grand Chapter Session of Maryland on Wednesday, April 30, 1930, and Delaware is now honored in having it upon the Altar at its ninth Annual Session.

Brilliant, thoughtful addresses, lovely music and impressive installation ceremonies all added charm and inspiration to the sessions, while banquets, receptions and other social functions furnished a more personal contrast for visiting members.

There are so many wonderful thoughts gathered from the Proceedings of the various jurisdictions, which I wish I might include in this report. Some of these I was able to touch upon in the individual reports.

To the Fraternal Correspondents of other Grand Jucisdictions, who were most kind and generous in reviewing Delaware Grand Chapter Session, I extend greetings, grateful thanks and appreciation on behalf of this Grand Chapter.

I am grateful to our own Grand Secretary, Sister M. Etta Keys, for mailing the proceedings so promptly and her many acts of kindness to me.

Grand Chapter this, our report:

We most sincerely commend the Worthy Grand Matron on the earnestness which she has shown in the administration of her office and her untiring efforts for the promotion of the good of the Order. She has shown herself to be an able executive possessing the courage of her convictions.

Official Transactions

1. We approve the action of the Worthy Grand Matron in directing the Grand Secretary to omit from the Book of Instructions that portion explaining the sign of Martha as being an interpretation of the Secret Work. (Approved)

2. We approve the action of the Worthy Grand Matron in declaring all letters, reports, etcetera, of Georgetown Chapter No. 9, issued to March 29th,

bearing the irregular seal, to be official.

3. We approve the Worthy Grand Matron's action in sending the Chapters in Kent and Sussex Counties a request that they familiarize themselves with their territorial jurisdiction assigned them, so that this matter may be (Approved) intelligently acted upon in this Grand Chapter Session.

4. We approve the interpretation of "Supplies" noted in Official letter No. 1, sent to Subordinate Chapters by the Worthy Grand Matron. (Approved)

5. We recommend that the Chapters note the Irregularities reported by the Worthy Grand Matron, that they may be avoided in the future. (Approved)

Dispensations Granted

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Report No. 1

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, O. E. S.:

We, your Special Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, report that we have carefully examined the Constitution and By-Laws and find the following corrections necessary in order that they conform with the new Ritual:

Rules and Regulations for the Government of Subordinate Chapters

ARTICLE I

- Sec. 3. "The elective officers of a Chapter shall consist of a Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, Secretary, Treasurer, Conductress, Associate Conductress, all of whom shall be elected annually by ballot, by a majority of the members present at the first stated meeting in December. The appointive officers"—etc.
- Sec. 4. "All officers shall be installed on the first stated meeting in January or as soon thereafter"—etc.
- Sec. 5. "Elective Officers. Vacancies in the elective offices can only be filled pro tem at each meeting. Vacancies in the appointive offices can be filled by the Worthy Matron at a stated meeting."
- Sec. 10. By adding to the present section "The Associate Patron fills the office of Worthy Patron."

- Sec. 30. Second sentence to read: "They shall be presented at a **stated** meeting, referred to a committee of three, and lay over until the next **stated** meeting," etc.
- Sec. 38. To read: "Associate Patron. The Associate Patron shall perform the duties appertaining to his office, and in the absence of the Worthy Patron, assume his duties."

(The addition of this section as number 38 will require the renumbering of the sections following).

- Sec. 52. Strike out the present section and insert in lieu thereof: "What Necessary. The presence of a Charter or Dispensation, an Altar upon which shall be an open Bible, together with either the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, and six other members of the Chapter, are necessary to open a Chapter for the transaction of business."
- Sec. 56. "How Conducted. The Ballot upon petitions for degrees, affiliation or dimits, can only be taken at a stated meeting," etc.

Since our Constitution reads: "Article III. Sec. I. This Grand Chapter declares its allegiance to the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. It will use only the Ritual, Signet and Labyrinth promulgated by the General Grand Chapter and will conform to its Constitution and Laws,"—we believe it is the prerogative of this Grand Chapter to adopt these amendments immediately, and so recommend.

Report No. 2

To the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

We, your Special Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, believing that the Associate Patron should have the same privileges as a voting representative of his Chapter as the Associate Matron, do submit the following Amendments to the Constitution of this Grand Chapter:

ARTICLE IV

Sec. 3. The membership of this Grand Chapter shall consist of the foregoing officers who hold until their successors have been elected and installed; the above Boards; all Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons that shall have presided over a duly **instituted and** constituted Chapter in this

Grand Jurisdiction, provided they are affiliated with some subordinate Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, all Worthy Matrons, Worthy Patrons (or their legally appointed proxies), all Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons while in office who have been installed, of chartered Chapters under this Grand Jurisdiction. The Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons cannot appoint proxies or hold office or any committee appointment in this Grand Chapter. The Worthy Matron's, Worthy Patron's (or their proxies), Associate Matron's and Associate Patron's official characters must be certified to by their respective Chapters under seal."

Sec. 6. A proxy must be an affiliated Present or Past Matron or a Present or Past Patron, or Associate Matron or Associate Patron of the same Chapter whose officer or officers she or he represents.

ARTICLE VI

Sec. 1. Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons have one personal vote each. A Worthy Matron who is also a Past Worthy Matron has one vote. A Worthy Matron who is a Past Worthy Matron and holds the proxy of the Worthy Patron has two votes. A Worthy Matron holding the proxy of the Worthy Patron has two votes. A Past Worthy Matron who holds the proxies of both the Worthy Matron and the Worthy Patron has three votes. The same rule applies conversely to the Worthy Patron, Associate Matron and Associate Patron. No one shall cast more than three votes. Representatives of Chapters in arrears for dues shall not vote unless so ordered by two-thirds vote of the delegates present in the Grand Chapter. No Chapter under Dispensation shall have the right to representation in this Grand Chapter until after the Grand Chapter votes to give them a Charter, after which the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron and Associate Patron, if present, shall have all the privileges of membership in the Grand Chapter, not in conflict with these laws.

(Page 39.) Obligation. "I will conform to the Ritual of the Order, Constitution, etc.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Report No. 3

To the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

We, your Special Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, find that recommendations have been adopted by this Grand Chapter that are in conflict with the Constitution and By-Laws, and believing these recommendations to be the preferable policy in this Jurisdiction, submit the following amendments:

Constitution

ARTICLE VIII

Sec. 2. By striking out "And may be either public or closed as the Grand Chapter may decide."

Section as amended to read: "The installation shall not take place until after all other business of the Grand Chapter has been completed."

Rules and Regulations for the Government of Subordinate Chapters

ARTICLE I

Sec. 4. By striking out "A public installation may be held before the first regular meeting in January without a special dispensation; but a dispensation must be secured to publicly install officers on any later date," and by addition of—"A dispensation must be secured to install officers on any later date. Public installations are prohibited in this Jurisdiction."

Section as amended to read, "Installation. All officers shall be installed on the first stated meeting in January or as soon thereafter as possible. A dispensation must be secured to install officers on any later date. Public installations are prohibited in this Jurisdiction. Officers legally hold their positions until their successors are elected and installed, or until their offices are declared vacant by the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron."

Sec. 42. By striking out "extend to a point half way in a direct line between the city limits of the nearest Chapters in all directions." and inserting in lieu thereof, "be the jurisdiction approved by this Grand Chapter, except that in the case of a new Chapter the Worthy Grand Patron shall have the privilege of assigning a Jurisdiction to such Chapter, which shall be their lawful jurisdiction until the next Session of the Grand Chapter."

Section as amended to read: "Between Chapters. When more than one Chapter is located in any city, town or village, jurisdiction over candidates for initiation shall be concurrent in all respects. In all other cases the jurisdiction of a Chapter shall be the jurisdiction approved by this Grand Chapter, except that in case of a new Chapter the Worthy Grand Patron shall have the privilege of assigning a jurisdiction to such Chapter, which shall be their lawful jurisdiction until the next Session of the Grand Chapter."



Section as amended to read: "Elective Officers. Vacancies in the elective offices can only be filled protem at each meeting. Vacancies in the appointive

- (b). The Worthy Matron may invite members of another Chapter to assist in the initiatory work."
- Sec. 30. By inserting "filled in and" and striking out "the next stated meeting and reported upon unless further time is granted by the Chapter," and insert in lieu thereof "a subsequent stated meeting."

Section as amended to read: "For Initiation. Petitions for initiation shall be made in writing, filled in and signed by the applicant and recommended by two members of the Chapter. They shall be presented at a stated meeting referred to a committee of three and lay over until a subsequent stated meeting and reported upon. Petitions of," etc.

Sec. 63. To read "Reception of Affiliated Members. After signing the By-Laws, a newly affiliated member shall be introduced and welcomed by the Worthy Matron, or with newly initiated members."

The balance of this section to be Sec. 64, under title of "Instruction to Chapters on Reception of Officers," and by reversing the order of Reception by changing paragraph (8) to (1); (7) to (2); (6) to (3); (5) to (4); (4) to (5); (3) to (6); (2) to (7). In order that the highest ranking officer should be invited to seats in the East before lower ranking officers.

By adding a Section explaining duties of Committee:

"Constitution and By-Laws. The Committee on Constitution and By-Laws shall familiarize themselves with the laws of the Order in this Jurisdiction, pass upon and submit all proposed amendments to the Constitution and Laws of this Grand Chapter; approve in conjunction with the Jurisprudence Committee all By-Laws temporarily approved by the Worthy Grand Matron and all other By-Laws presented by Chartered Chapters and Chapters under Dispensation; such approval shall be considered sufficient without such By-Laws being presented to the Grand Chapter for final adoption.

(The Committee shall consist of three members, the first appointment to be for one, two and three years respectively, one member shall retire each year, and the incoming Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint her or his successor, "etc. See Sec. 2.).

Your Committee on Blanket Bond reports that they have secured the following offer from one of the outstanding surety companies and submit it for your approval.

"Our Uniform Schedule of bonding will replace the miscellaneous assortment of Personal and Corporate Surety Bonds that may now be in force throughout your Organization with one instrument issued by a Company with

ample resources and many years of experience.

Our bond, which will be continuous in form and cover the "position" and not the "individual," offers complete protection at all times. It will be unnecessary to notify us when a new officer is elected to any bonded position except when the amount of the bond is over \$1,500. In this event we will require a completed short form application from all officers and employees occupying positions bonded in excess of this amount. It has been our experience that the information contained in applications completed by those covered by Fidelity Bonds is highly important and valuable in the event the unexpected happens and we are called upon to apprehend a defaulter."

The rate is 25 cents per hundred dollars, minimum premium per Chapter

\$2.50.

Therefore, Be It Resolved; That this Grand Chapter be empowered to purchase a Uniform Schedule or Blanket Bond covering all officers, Chapter officers and all others handling funds of the Organization, the same to be furnished to each Chapter at a cost based upon the amount of each bond to be required.

ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER

Approved Recommendations

- 1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks.—1922.
- That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.—1922.
- 3. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.—1922.
- 4. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination.—1922.
- 5. That no member be allowed to vouch for any one unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.—1922.
- That the Bible shall not be closed at recess,—by doing so closes the Chapter.—1922.
- 7. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door.—1922.
- 8. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.—1922.
- 9. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls.

 —1922.
- 10. That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patron's Jewels.—1922.
- 11. That examinations for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record.—1923.
- 12. That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledgers, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.—1923.
- 13. That one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County.—1923.
- 14. That the proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner—One copy to each Grand Officer—to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron—to each Grand Representative of Delaware—to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter—three copies to each Grand Chapter—five copies to each Chapter in Delaware.—1923-1930.

- 15. That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official cover for Delaware.—1923.
- 16. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting.—1924.
- 17. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close.—1924.
 - 18. That public installations be discontinued.-1924.
- 19. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as Obligation Night in which to have a Special Service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and Ceremony to be left in the hands of the W. M. of each Chapter.—1925.
- 20. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations" adding those made and approved each year.—1925.
- 21. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings.—1926.
- 22. That Officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations.—1926.
- 23. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparations rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed.—1926.
- 24. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances, therefore no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner.—1926.
 - 25. That the sale of anything in the Chapter Room be prohibited.—1926.
- 26. That the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.—1926.
- 27. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting, a duplicate shall be sent, at the same time, to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.—1926.
- 28. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the names of the candidates initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter Rooms.—1928.
- 29. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given to the Worthy Grand Matron and each one of the members of the Board of Grand Instructors, to be returned to the Grand Secretary on their retirement from Office. Also

that a copy be furnished to the Worthy Matron of each Subordinate Chapter to be turned over to her successor at the close of her term of office.—1928,

- 30. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office.—1928.
- 31. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installation.—1928.
- 32. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention.

Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter.—1929.

- 33. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on dimit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation.—1930.
- 34. That all members and visitors be required to fill out an identification slip at all Chapter meetings, to be collected by the Conductress and Associate Conductress when proving the Chapter, and that the Chapter Registry Book be kept from these slips. Blank slips to be secured from the Grand Secretary.—1930.
- 35. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.—1930.
- 36. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss.—1930.
- 37. That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter, as amended to date, be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each

of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session.)–1930.

- 38. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, for approval.—1930.
- 39. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose.—1930.
- 40. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months).—1930.
- 41. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petitions to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter.—1930.
 - 42. That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each.-1930.
- 43. That a price of \$5.00 (Five Dollars) be placed on Secret Work and \$2.00 (Two Dollars) on the Diagram of the Labyrinth.-1930.

Approved Decisions

- 1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degrees in a Chapter, when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petitioner, is null and void.—1922.
- 2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in the Chapter during the session? No.—1922.
- 3. The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session.—1925.
 - 4. Can we hold rehearsal at member's homes? No.—1926.
- 5. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election.—1926.
- 6. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.—1926.
- 7. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter, and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must

show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission.—1928.

- 8. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the obligation? No. Members can arise and repeat obligation when presiding officer calls for it.—1928.
- 9. After a petitioner has been balloted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot.—1929.
- 10. A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother.—1929.
- 11. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person who is not eligible to petition for the degrees.—1930.
- 12. A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents.—1930.
- 13. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record.—1930.
- 14. A petition for affiliation on dimit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual.—1930.
- 15. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon.—1930.
- 16. By-Laws of a subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a supply, as interpreted in my official letter number one.—1930.
- 17. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover the cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, (4),) plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendation of Jurisprudence Committee.)—1930.
- 18. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron.—1930.

A beautiful memorial service was held by the Grand Officers, Past Grand Patrons and Past Grand Matrons.
