May 20th and 21st, 1931

The Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, convened in its Tenth Annual Session, in the DuBarry Room of the Hotel duPont Biltmore, Wilmington, Delaware, on May 20, 1931, at two o'clock in the afternoon.

Grand Marshal, Sister Anna Lee Waller, Past Matron of Adah Chapter, No. 5, escorted Past Worthy Grand Matron Sister Julia M. Story to the East, to preside during the opening of the Grand Chapter.

The Grand Marshal then escorted the first Worthy Grand Patron of Delaware, Brother Harry F. Newlin, to the East.

The Grand Marshal, by order of the presiding officer, invited the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and other Grand Officers to enter the Chapter room.

The Worthy Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Patron were presented at the Altar, escorted East, and given Grand Honors.

The officers of Radiant Chapter, No. 6, put on a very beautiful drill, which was well executed. Each officer carried an arm bouquet, which added greatly to the effect. At the conclusion of the drill the officers formed the letters spelling the Worthy Grand Matron's first name. At the conclusion of "I", Sister Elva R. Curry recited:

I—I stands for the ideal you hold in your hand, The best Worthy Grand Matron in the land.

At the forming of "R", she recited:

R—R stands for Right, which we all feel you do; That is why we leave our decisions to you.

At the forming of "M", she recited:

The Worthy Grand Matron responded:

Dear Sister Curry: I want to express my grateful appreciation to you and Radiant Chapter, No. 6, who have given their time and talent rendering such a beautiful drill, which I am sure was enjoyed by all. I shall always have a warm spot in my heart for all of you.

Our Worthy Grand Matron has given me the privilege and honor of greeting you today, so it is with open hearts that we extend fraternal love and greetings to you, our Secretaries.

In the few minutes given me, I would like to compliment you publicly upon your fine reports and splendid work. I want the Grand Chapter as a whole to know what fine Secretaries you are.

Sometimes you get weary of the detail work of your office, but your posi-

tion is one of the most important in the world-wide organization of the

Eastern Star.

Today you do not come to us as strangers, but as beautiful rays of our Star, which reach far beyond the horizon and radiate love to all. We trust that your stay among us will be both pleasant and profitable.

Again, dear Sister Secretaries, let me in the name of our Worthy Grand Matron and members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware bid you welcome.

Sister Mabel L. Knox, Secretary of Delaware Chapter, No. 1, responded:

Sister Pyle: I am honored with the privilege of responding to your gracious words of welcome extended to the Secretaries. We justly appreciate the kindly thoughts you have expessed. We have earnestly performed our duties to our Chapters and to the Grand Chapter, and take this opportunity of thanking you for your cooperation. Worthy Grand Matron, on behalf of my Chapter, Delaware, No. 1, I thank you for the honor of responding to the address of welcome to the Secretaries.

These were welcomed by the following words from the Worthy Grand Matron:

Guests Visiting: We are always happy to welcome our neighbors and friends; our Grand Session would not be quite complete without you and we trust that your stay with us will be pleasant and one you will long remember.

Yet, beautiful and as expressive as words are, they cannot express to you our pleasure that you are our guests today.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS

Sisters Sarah MacNamee, Estelle Holt, and Dora Fitzgerald were appointed to serve on the Necrology Committee, and Brother Harry F., Newlin

to serve as Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee in place of Brother Pepper.

The Worthy Grand Matron asked for the minutes of the last Grand Chapter Session, and Brother Harry F. Newlin moved that the minutes as printed in the proceedings be accepted and further reading be dispensed with. The motion was seconded and adopted.

The Worthy Grand Matron asked Sister Minnie E. Keyes to address the Grand Chapter at this time as she was soon leaving for Washington, D. C. Sister Keyes responded:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Visitors, Brothers and Sisters: It is a great pleasure for me to be here today. I do not need to tell you that my heart has been in this Chapter since its very beginning. I was instrumental in its beginning, and I have never lost interest here. I am delighted to have come here and witnessed the opening of this Grand Chapter, and I am sorry I cannot be here tomorrow to witness your work. I have been more than pleased with the addresses. They were all short and to the point. I have been pleased with everything so far, and know that from the atmosphere found here you are all joined by the bond of Fraternity, and I can but hope that we may all go out from this meeting refreshed and inspired for having been here, and that we can all give credit where credit is due and refrain from unjust criticism. Sometimes I think we forget that we are members of the Order of the Eastern Star and all that that membership means, and we also forget to hold fast to the Ritual and to the obligation. And now I want to say just a few words about the meeting down in San Antonio, Texas, this Fall. I do hope that Delaware will send a fine delegation, and if I could hear this Delaware Song sung down there as it was today, my heart would thrill with pride. I miss many faces here today, and regret that they are not here with us. I want the members to know that we need their help and their activities, and especially those who come from the smaller Chapters.

"On this very day our Patron is installing a Chapter in Nova Scotia. In Nova Scotia, the Masons are quite different in their attitude from our Brothers here. They are a quiet body of men, and were not sure that they wanted the Eastern Star there, so our Patron visited the Grand Lodge in Nova Scotia, and then wrote me for statistics of the work the Eastern Star is doing for Masonry and the beneficent work of the Eastern Star, and so the Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia went on record as sponsoring the Eastern Star, and soon we shall have a Grand Chapter there. So the work is going on. We look to the members to uphold the work and make this Order just what we would have it to be. I am pleased that such a fine delegation of visitors is present. It warms my heart to see this assemblage, to listen to your speeches, and to witness the fine appearances you make. Sister Benjamin has come a long way. All these Sisters and Brothers from Maryland and Virginia and the District are thinking of your work with pleasure."

In closing she thanked the Brothers and Sisters in Wilmington for the friendship she had enjoyed with them and quoted:

"True Friendship has a flavor that sweetens all our years. It banishes

doubt-and sets our heart a-singing."

The Worthy Grand Matron thanked Sister Keyes for her delightful message to us and expressed regret that she was leaving so soon.

The Worthy Grand Matron then called upon Sister Amie Hollander, Present Grand Matron of the District of Columbia, who responded:

"I am just delighted to be here this afternoon. It is my first visit to Delaware, and I am very much impressed with everything you have done here. I want to thank you for your cordial welcome. I am very proud of the delegation from the District. I bring you the regrets of our Worthy Grand Patron, who is in Michigan. We met your Worthy Grand Matron in Baltimore, and were very glad to continue the friendship with this visit to her Grand Chapter.

I would like to add a few words about the trip to Texas. We are going by boat from New York to New Orleans, and we are hoping that Delaware will join the Delegation. You know the District, Maryland, and Virginia have always been called the Trinity, and we are hoping to change that triangle into a square and have Delaware join us. Now, Worthy Grand Matron, we wish you just a splendid session. You have such a splendid band of Past Grands that I am sure you will have their help and cooperation, and we wish for you and your Jurisdiction everything that is pleasant."

The Worthy Grand Matron then called on Sister Katherine Meritt, Junior Past Grand Matron of the District of Columbia, who responded:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Brothers and Sisters: I wish to thank you for your cordial welcome. I am very glad to be here. I met your Worthy Grand Matron and your Patron at Valley Forge and have a picture of you. I, too, wish that your session may be a happy one and that you may have everything you wish for. Now I want to speak further about the trip in the fall, as I am Chairman of the Sub-committee, and in that capacity I wrote to Maryland, West Virginia, and Virginia, asking them to join the District. The Delegation will leave Saturday morning, October 24, 1931, for New York, where they will board a steamer to go to New Orleans, arriving there Friday, and then going to San Antonio, where they will arrive on the next Saturday. The cost will be \$149.00 for the steamer fare from New York. The fare by rail is just a little cheaper, \$141.00. Information and all details can be obtained by writing to the Chairman of the District or through Mr. Coleman of the B. & O. Railroad.

The Worthy Grand Matron discovered that several distinguished visitors had been overlooked, and she asked them to assemble in the West at this time.

Sister Beetam, Brother Meritt, Sister Barnes, and Sister Weber responded. They were then escorted to the East and welcomed.

Sister Riley suggested that it would be very nice to sing Maryland's State Song at this time, and the suggestion was immediately carried out.

The Worthy Grand Matron then asked Sister Bessie Miles, Past Grand Matron of Maryland, for a few words.

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Visitors, Sisters, and Brothers: I feel very much at home, although this is my first visit to the Grand Chapter in Delaware, and I can truthfully say that this is an unexpected pleasure, for little did I realize yesterday that I would have this happy privilege and pleasure of meeting with this Grand Body. I feel that I must apologize for being late this afternoon. As I did not know about the daylight saving here, I was just one hour behind time, but I want to say that after waiting for several years for this opportunity, I prevailed upon Mr. Miles to go a little out of his way this morning and come over to Wilmington with the promise that I would only remain two hours. Now I am afraid I am going to lose the confidence of my husband." Sister Miles then described her visit to attend the breaking of the ground for the Masonic Home of Maryland, and closed by saying: "I want to say that I hope that this Grand Chapter Session will be one of the best and most profitable ones that this Grand Jurisdiction has ever had. I thank you."

The Worthy Grand Matron then called upon Brother Charles Gallaway, Past Grand Patron of the District, who responded:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Grand Officers, Visitors, and Members: It is an extreme pleasure that I am privileged to be here today. It is indeed a pleasure to accompany our Worthy Grand Matron here in bringing a greeting from the District to Delaware. It was a pleasure this morning to drive over the good roads and enjoy the beautiful scenery on the way, and I feel that, after all, our Grand Jurisdictions are in every way becoming closer and closer together. This would not have been possible a few years ago, and I hope the same thing is true in our fraternal lives. I am sure that we are always pleased to welcome the members near and around us. During my year as Grand Patron we enjoyed Sister Horn at our meetings, and it is a pleasure now to return the call. I do want to bring the fraternal greetings from the District of Columbia, and wish for your session the greatest pleasure and progress."

The Worthy Grand Matron then called on Dr. Beetam (C. H.), Past Grand Patron of Maryland, who responded:

"First I want to apologize. I feel negligent in my duty because I missed the last two sessions and promised myself that I would not miss the third. It was my pleasure to see your Worthy Grand Matron as Associate Conductress in the North, and it is a pleasure to see her now in the East, which she graces so beautifully. In the beginning, the Delaware River is just a small

stream, but as it flows on in its course it gets wider and wider, so does our Chapter grow. For five years I knew everybody, and now I see many strange, new faces on all sides. Now I want to thank you for your courtesy and wish you a happy and prosperous session, and to each and every one of my Brothers and Sisters a pleasant time."

The Worthy Grand Matron responded:

"We are delighted to have you, Brother Beetam, with us again, for we have missed you in our past few sessions."

At a few minutes after five o'clock the Grand Marshal, by order of the Worthy Grand Matron, declared the Grand Chapter called to recess, to resume work at eight P. M.

EVENING SESSION

A few minutes past eight o'clock the Grand Marshal, by order of the Worthy Grand Matron, proclaimed the Grand Chapter called from recess to resume work.

With a great deal of pride I can say that the work throughout the state is very commendable and most of the Chapters are in a most satisfactory condition. I found but few irregularities, and each time, upon calling attention to them, corrections were graciously received with appreciation and a willingness to conform to the right.

Book of Instructions

Requests have come for definite instruction in a few instances not covered by the Book of Instructions at Schools of Instruction.

1. When the Worthy Matron directs the Examining Committee to retire with the Visitor and Marshal to escort them, how would the Chairman of

Examining Committee procure Bible?

Answer: The Chairman of Examining Committee will go to the Altar between Ruth and Esther, procure Bible and back out between Esther and Martha, assemble in the West; the Marshal will go directly to the visitor, offer her right arm, escort her to the West, and when the Committee is ready the Marshal will proceed to the door with the visitor, followed by the Committee single file.

2. How are candidates led into the Chapter?

Answer: Candidates are led into the Chapter room single file by the Conductress. Candidates and Associate Conductress stand in straight line facing North.

3. Should the Associate Conductress on reporting names of candidates in waiting to receive the degrees, use the prefix "Miss," "Mrs." or "Mr."?

Answer: Yes.

4. When Associate Conductress brings in a sister or brother to be affiliated, should they make the salutation sign back of Esther's chair before proceeding to the Altar to be introduced?

Answer: Yes.

If they should be from New York or New Jersey, when would they receive the obligation?

Answer: After being introduced and welcomed by Worthy Matron, Associate Conductress would have the sister or brother to kneel and the Worthy Patron would then give the obligation, then proceed to the Secretary's desk to sign the By-Laws.

Questions and Answers

Many questions were referred to me, all of which were answered to the best of my knowledge and interpretation of our Laws.

1. Is a member entitled to vote who has not paid his dues for the current year?

Answer: Yes. If the member has not been suspended for the non-payment of dues he can vote.

2. If a candidate is elected on the second ballot, should the Secretary's record show the first ballot dark and the second clear?

Answer: No. The result is all that should be recorded.

3. When does a petitioner for affiliation begin to pay dues? Answer: From the date of affiliation.

4. Is the Sentinel required to wear white when a Sister?

Answer: Yes. Approved Recommendation 1926, that all Sister Officers must wear white at all stated meetings.

5. Does the Associate Patron examine the ballot?

Answer: No. The first three officers examine the ballot.

6. When the Worthy Patron is absent can the secret work be in possession of the Associate Patron?

Answer: Yes. In the absence of the Worthy Patron the Associate Patron is one of the three principal officers.

7. When a Sister marries, should the Secretary change her name on the Chapter record and in the report to Grand Chapter?

Answer: Yes.

Decisions

 Who shall keep the Chapter Registry book from "identification slips"?

Decision: The Sentinel shall copy the names from the slips into the Registry Book.

2. Is it necessary to procure a waiver of territorial jurisdiction over a

petitioner when the following conditions exist?

A petitioner living in a town in which there was no Chapter, on September 13, 1929, petitioned an out-of-town Chapter, and was rejected on September 27, 1929.

In the meantime a Chapter was instituted in her home town.

On September 12, 1930, the same petition was again received by the same Chapter, and was rejected on September 26, 1930.

Six months later, on April 24, 1931, the petition was again presented to

the Chapter first petitioned.

Decision: In accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Sec. 44, Over Rejected Applicant, "when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year."

3. A brother serving as Trustee has been elected Associate Patron. Does he have to resign as Trustee to hold the office of Associate Patron?

Decision: Inasmuch as there has been no law in the past prohibiting the holding of two offices by the same member in Subordinate Chapters, this election may stand.

To answer this question for the future, my decision is, that no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices at the same time in a Subordinate Chapter.

Recommendations

 That the usual pages be set aside in our 1931 Proceedings in honor of the memory of the honored dead of our own and sister jurisdictions, and—

That a page in the Proceedings be reserved in memory of Brother William H. Redmile, Past Grand Patron, and that his picture be placed on same.

- 2. That no officer or member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star.
- 3. That a space be provided for the signature of the installing officer on the list of officers installed.
- 4. I recommend that a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron and that officers of Subordinate Chapters be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire.
- 5. Because Secretaries have no way of knowing what information to give to the Worthy Grand Matron when requesting a Special Dispensation, thus causing unnecessary correspondence, and some forget the dispensation fee of \$1.00, I recommend that a form for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, like the form submitted below, be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary.

Art. XIV, Sec. 1. To read "The duties of all other officers shall be such as are prescribed by the Ritual, Constitution, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter for the government of Subordinate Chapters."

Art. XV. Addition to Sec. 1. "Except that any law, ruling, or edict of the Grand Chapter altering these By-Laws shall have the effect of an amendment without further action of the Chapter."

International Temple

As you know, in the Capitol of our Nation there is to be built an International Eastern Star Temple that will, through ages, stand before the world as a tangible evidence of our sincerity in the work of relief and of service. I commend to you the report of the Temple Committee and hope that you will join with them in their endeavor to place Delaware in the forefront of those assisting in the erection of this monument to our Order.

Address

Another year has passed into silence; we pause to pay tribute to those who, during the past year, have been called to the unknown land from whence

no traveler returns, and are waiting at Heaven's Portals to welcome us. We must brush aside the tears that steal into our eyes and think of those who were dear to us and true to our Fraternal Order. As we are gathered here, there comes a sadness as memory recalls those who have passed through the gates into the garden of God. The circle of our Past Grand Officers has again been broken by the passing of Past Grand Patron William H. Redmile, who departed this life July 27, 1930, the second link to be broken in the Chain of Past Grand Officers. One who had endeared himself to so many of our Fraternal Order. His life in his home, in his Church, and in the Order of the Eastern Star tells us he has just passed on to that beautiful City of God.

"In the garden of remembrance, there is a little sheltered spot, Fragrant with the bloom and beauty of the sweet forget-me-not; And no flowers in the garden fairer, brighter, ever grew Than the little flower that whispers, 'Always, we'll remember you'."

Sister Rose Lee Freeny, of Adah Chapter, No. 5, departed this life September 26, 1930.

Sister Freeny was a Past Trustee of the Grand Chapter; her gain is our loss.

"He bids them rest for a season,
For the pathway has grown too steep,
And folded in green pastures,
He giveth his beloved sleep."

Also on April 15, 1931, Brother Frank G. Bartram, Past Patron of St. John's Chapter, No. 4, whose death cast a gloom over us, for Brother Bartram had endeared himself not only to the members of his Chapter but to all with whom he came in contact. To me his passing was especially sad as we served together in the East during the year 1923.

Singing, "Safe in the Arms of Jesus," by Edith M. Work and Reba Scarborough.

Officers holding lighted candles place them on the Altar. All officers form chain around Altar.

Worthy Grand Patron: "Our fraternal chain, though severed here, will some day be reunited (Officers raise hands) where there are no broken links. Until then, dear ones, good night."

Organist plays softly, "Abide With Me."

Before closing the Worthy Grand Matron called on several visitors for short addresses. The Worthy Grand Matron of Maryland, Sister Lula W. Boucher, responded:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Visitors, Brothers and Sisters: It surely is a joy for me to be here this evening. This is my first visit to Delaware Grand Chapter, and I know that it has certainly been my loss. Your Committee, your welcome, your smiling faces, all made me feel quite at home, and it is quite a pleasure for me to bring you greetings from the Grand Chapter of Maryland, and wishes that you might have a bright and prosperous future and keep on working and doing good work, so that your good deeds shall stand as a monument to the Grand Chapter of Delaware down through the ages. Before I left home I wrote many letters of greeting to other Grand Chapters, but you know you do not get much of a thrill sitting at a

typewriter. It is so much nicer to be here among good Eastern Star Members," In closing she recited the Weaver's Poem.

The Worthy Grand Matron next called on Brother Yerger, Past Worthy Grand Patron of Maryland, who responded:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware: I am rather embarrassed to meet all my confreres in evening clothes the way I am dressed, but all I can say is 'Just as I am, without one plea.' Some time ago a medical student asked a prominent physician what he should do in order to become a successful physician himself. and the physician just said 'Patience, boy.' So while I was out in the hall. waiting to be admitted while your Grand Matron read her report, I thought that that was a good qualification for a Patron. I think your Worthy Grand Patron must have been a good one. Yesterday ground was broken for a home for dependent Masons, their wives, sisters, and mothers and children, and the Eastern Star was paid a singular honor, and I think the Eastern Star received a boost and more advertising than any amount of money could have bought. The Worthy Matron announced that the Eastern Star had contributed over \$30,000.00, and no Masonic body has contributed more, with but one exception. May God bless all of you so that none of you here will need to use it. I am delighted to be here, and wish you all manner of success, and as they say in the West, you must have a 'Barr' for a Matron."

The Grand Matron said she was very sorry she had kept Brother Yerger waiting so long out in the Hall.

Sister Hickman, Junior Past Grand Matron of Maryland, addressed the Chapter:

"Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Brothers, and Sisters: Your Grand Matron says she has a warm spot for me, but I don't believe it is any more so than the one I have for her. We were not so far apart and could get together often, and she came to several of our visitations. I hope that the Trinity formed several years ago may be changed into a square, a square that will be filled with the good thoughts of our Sisters in these Jurisdictions, that will enable us to stand before our Father and hear Him say 'Well done,' as I am sure our Sister Hague is receiving just now. She was always Aunt Mary to us ever since we first worked with her nine years ago. I hope when we leave, we may be leaving with such a record as she made. I would wish that for all of you. Grand Matron, I want to thank you again for all the courtesies we have been privileged to share this year, and I wish you many years of service to the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and to the Worthy Grand Patron and other Officers a beautiful path with many flowers, entered always by thorns, but entered always by friends (or flowers) on the bright side of life."

Brother Mason, Past Worthy Grand Patron of Maryland, then addressed the Grand Chapter:

"Before I forget it, which I oft times do, Sister Wagamont asked me to extend greetings to you. I want to thank you for your courtesy. I have enjoyed every minute of my stay with you. I have been impressed with your work. Your peace and harmony has been remarkable. I have listened to your reports. I have enjoyed the opening, which was most beautiful. We go from State to State, and it is just the same, all banded together in the great cause of humanity, for that one great purpose, and we feel just as you felt when you opened. May your efforts be crowned with success, and the only way is to remember first that 'we came here of our own free choice, therefore complain not,' and we are told that 'we have seen His star in the East and are come to worship Him,' and so long as we come in the light of that Book and that Star we can have Peace and Harmony. Upon that foundation, and that alone, can any Chapter or any Grand Chapter look to for success. I have often thought of this when Chapters are not coming along so well. So long as you work under this Charter so long will you live and prosper. Then, and then alone, can we expect to have the success we are wishing for. I hope the balance of your session will be just that way, that we will all remember that we are working under the Light of that Book, and I hope that when you step down from the East you will take all the honor that can be taken by any Grand Matron."

"I certainly have enjoyed this day with you, and I want to wish that the rest of your Session will be just as pleasant as it has been so far, and I also want to thank you for all your kindness."

Sister Yerger, wife of the Past Worthy Grand Patron, said this:

"I am only a 'trailer' this year, but I am happy to be with you, and all I can wish for you is the greatest success."

The Worthy Grand Matron next called on Sister Benjamin, Worthy Grand

Electa of the General Grand Chapter and Past Worthy Grand Matron of

Utah, who responded:

"I have indeed been happy to be with you tonight. I bring you Greetings from Utah. This is the first opportunity I have had of visiting in this part of the Country, and I have been charmed with your beautiful city. I had the pleasure of sitting in the Grand Chapter of Maryland, and I met your charming Grand Matron and Grand Patron, and I, as well as all of us, have been charmed with her manner. I have had the pleasure of visiting nineteen Grand Chapters, and in all of them the work is growing. Many States have homes and educational funds. I had begun to think that all the Chapters were large. and now I feel quite at home because ours is very small, it being the third smallest, but you are doing just as much as the larger ones. In the smaller chapters I believe that there is more harmony and not so much strife and position. In the large chapters they appreciate the honors more. Illinois is our largest Grand Chapter, with more than two thousand members. We have a very small field, although our State is quite large. This is due to the fact that about fifty per cent of our population is Mormon, and this limits our membership. I visited Scotland last year. They have about a ninety thousand membership there. They meet twice a year, convene at 2 P. M., and by 6 are through with their work. Everything is handled through a committee. There were fifteen of us in the party, and we were very cordially greeted. They are still using the same furniture they had two hundred years ago, when they were organized. Before that Altar, Robert Burns, the poet, and Sir Walter Scott became members. Continuing down through Italy we stopped at Pompeii, where the guide pointed to a stone marked 'Masonics,' and there was the emblem, the clasped hands, the trowel, and the plumbline. antiquity of the Masonics brought back the Masonry of two thousand years ago. I was disappointed that I was not able to be at the breaking of ground over in Maryland, but I could not get there, and we are all rejoicing over the cooperation between the Eastern Star and the Masons. Recently, while I was visiting in Philadelphia, I was sitting in a Chapter Room where there was not a man present. They had balloted, but without the Patron.

"I have enjoyed being with you. I thank you for your courtesy, and ex-

pect to remain until the end of the Session. Thank you."

Sister William, wife of the Past Most Worthy Grand Patron, was called upon, and responded:

"In Porto Rico, the Masons furnish shoes for the children. To help, the Eastern Star women furnish the children with a lunch at noon. We saw them marching in for their lunch, then the Eastern Star women furnishing a place for the mothers, while they waited for their children. So in Porto Rico the Eastern Star is working hand in hand."

Past Worthy Grand Matron of Virginia, Sister Ammye C. Hord, spoke: "I assure you it is a great pleasure to be here. It is my first visit to your Grand Chapter. I do hope that we will form a square. We were sorry that

our Chapter meets so near your time, and we did not have any visitors this year. Our Grand Chapter meets in Richmond next year. We have a splendid Eastern Star home, and I hope that the Grand Chapter of Delaware will have the pleasure of visiting us next year."

The Worthy Grand Matron added that she certainly did hope to have the pleasure of visiting the Virginia Grand Chapter next year, as it was too near the time of her own to attempt it this year.

The Grand Matron then called on Sister Mary E. Teachum, Grand Lecturer of the District of Columbia, who said:

"I can assure you that this is a pleasure to be with you. For quite a while I have looked forward to visiting the Delaware Grand Chapter, and I have always just been so busy that it was almost impossible. Worthy Grand Matron, I wish to thank you for the manner in which you received me today. I have enjoyed every moment of this meeting. Sisters and Brothers, I was particularly impressed by that, because I have served the District as its Instructor for thirty-three years, and I realize the work and pleasure attached to the Offices, and Worthy Grand Matron, I wish for your Instructors all the success possible. The Trinity has been mentioned, and I am proud to say that in 1915 I had the pleasure of getting up the ceremony to form the Trinity, and if the Square is formed, I trust that the Trinity will never be broken, but that the Trinity will be cemented with sweetness and purity."

The Grand Marshal, by order of the Worthy Grand Matron, called the Grand Chapter from work to recess, to reconvene at 10 o'clock in the morning.

At 10.15 A. M. the Grand Marshal, by Order of the Worthy Grand Matron, proclaimed the Grand Chapter called from recess to resume work.

Mrs. Blanche Melson sang "My Wild Irish Rose."

REPORT OF THE FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT

To the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

To this Grand Chapter I owe the privilege of taking one of the most wonderful and enlightening trips of my life. I started on a book tour to the Grand Sessions of 52 Grand Jurisdictions, with my favorite chair for a Pullman seat, while my passports and schedules were the Proceedings sent to me by our Grand Secretary. However, the journey proved too long for me, owing to my condition. While I felt this was my task and really wanted to perform it, I realized it would be impossible, and I therefore gratefully acknowledge the assistance of our Grand Conductress, Sister Anna Belle Sauter, who so kindly visited five Grand Jurisdictions.

The experience has broadened my vision and rendered me more sensitive to the beauty of our Order. To visit 52 Grand Chapter Sessions even in the quiet of my home has afforded a splendid opportunity to acquire a better knowledge of the Eastern Star world, yet I realize that it is too much to be crowded into one short year, and would advise our Fraternal Correspondent to divide with the Conductress and Associate Conductress, as recommended two years ago.

The average member of the Order little realizes how vast the Organization really is. It is not only national but international, consisting of four sovereign bodies, the General Grand Chapter, the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, and two independent Grand Chapters of New York and New Jersey.

Temples and Halls were transformed into veritable fairy lands, with flowers and emblematic decorations. The Flag is an honored guest at all Grand Chapter Sessions, and many times our own Flag received honor with

the Flags of other countries.

Michigan, the "Mother" Grand Chapter, is sixty-four years old, and New Brunswick, the youngest, not yet a year old, has 18 Subordinate Chapters.

Many of the addresses of welcome are brought by the Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Masonry. In many Grand Jurisdictions the Worthy Grand Matron is invited to address the Grand Lodge.

The misuse of the black cube is strongly referred to in a great number of the reports submitted by Worthy Grand Matrons, and many appeals are made to members to use more discretion in this matter and not allow their personal feelings to be consumed with personal prejudice. As a result of this, many Chapters have reported small gains in membership.

Illinois has the largest membership, 199,556, with 845 Chapters; Ohio is second, with 123,653 members and 506 Chapters. Beulah Chapter, No. 34, of Kansas has 1,983 members. In South Dakota the Order Eastern Star Chapters outnumber the Masonic Lodges.

Two Grand Chapters have celebrated their Silver Anniversary during

the year-North Carolina and Nevada.

Connecticut has a charter member of Day Star Chapter No. 69, who has never missed a stated or special meeting of the chapter since it was instituted twenty years ago. One chapter in Connecticut initiated 126 candidates during the year.

Sixty-three Chapters in North Dakota have received their 100 per cent certificates for the International Temple Fund.

Out of the total of 455 deaths in Maine seventy were members of the Grand Chapter, and two Chapters lost their Worthy Patron.

Ontario reported a dance and bridge party, held in Royal York Hotel, for the benefit of the Florence Nightingale Home Fund, had netted the fund the sum of \$1,509.16.

Eight Chapters lost everything by fire and two lost all their funds in bank failures.

A Committee appointed at the Grand Chapter of Texas to provide a fund for the expenses of the General Grand Chapter, to be held there in November, 1931, reported there had been collected a sum in excess of \$33,000. Great preparations are being made to entertain the visitors.

The Educational Loan Fund, which was first established in Louisiana, has now reached almost every Grand Jurisdiction. Louisiana is, however,

the only one that does not require interest or exact a time limit on the loan. Iowa leads in the greatest number helped.

These are but few of my gleanings, but time and space will not permit more.

We approve the recommendation, but there was only a limited number of the books of instruction. They cost over \$1.00 apiece. We would submit the following: 'We recommend that the new edition have a cheaper style back, and be sold at cost price plus 50 per cent profit.' ''

Sister Barrett moved that the recommendation of the Jurisprudence Committee be adopted. Sister Caufman seconded the motion, and Brother Newlin explained that the expense comes now, and the copies on hand would be kept for the officers and instructors, and the cheaper edition would be sold. The motion was adopted.

Sister Horn moved that the report of the Jurisprudence Committee be adopted in its entirety. Sister Story seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

At 12 o'clock the Grand Marshal, by order of the Worthy Grand Matron, proclaimed the Grand Chapter called from work to recess, to resume work at 1,30.

AFTERNOON SESSION

At 1.45 P. M. the Grand Marshal, by order of the Grand Matron, declared the Grand Chapter called from recess to resume work.

The Worthy Grand Matron invited the Worthy Grand Patron to serve during the Election of Officers. The Worthy Grand Patron appointed Brother Frank Harrar to serve as Clerk, and Jay Miller and Sister Annie Ellis and Sister Florence Fader to serve as Tellers, with the Pages as collectors.

Sister Horn moved that the Chapter dispense with the order of business to allow the Committee on Unfinished Business to finish. Brother Newlin seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Sister Horn moved that the Grand Chapter adopt the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the Grand Chapter—Article 4, Sections 3 and 6, Article 6, Section 1, as printed in the Proceedings last year. Brother Newlin seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Brother Newlin read the sections cited above.

The regular order of business was then resumed.

During the various intervals between the individual elections the following took place:

Sister Horn read the following History of the Eastern Star in Delaware:

HISTORY OF THE FIRST TEN YEARS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE, ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR

Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Barr, and Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Sawdon, to you has come the honor to preside over the Tenth Annual Session of this Grand Chapter, and it seems only fitting that we should take the time to review and record a brief sketch of the history of the accomplishments and development of the Order in this Grand Jurisdiction during this ten-year period.

Our Grand Chapter was constituted Tuesday, November 15, 1921, with eight Subordinate Chapters and a constituent membership of 1,488, under the supervision of Most Worthy Grand Patron Alfred C. McDaniel and Most Worthy Grand Matron Ellie Lines Chapin, the last of the States in this grand country of ours to join the union of Grand Chapters.

Our Grand Chapter was launched upon its history-making voyage with Sister Julia M. Story, Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Harry F. Newlin, Worthy Grand Patron, at the helm, and our first Session was held May 17 and 18, 1922, in Pythian Castle, 908 West Street, Wilmington, Delaware, with these officers presiding.

Today we were privileged to have these pioneers in the Grand East to call the Tenth Annual Session of this Grand Body to Order, and may the same privilege be ours at the end of the next decade.

In bringing to you the gleanings of the facts that make up the history of the Order in Delaware, it is pleasing to note that while the limits of our jurisdiction do not warrant our going ahead by leaps and bounds, we have progressed with a slow and sure development that bespeaks a strong foundation.

The first addition to our subordinate Chapter membership came with the Constitution of Georgetown Chapter, No. 9. The petition for a Dispensation for this Chapter was presented to the Grand Chapter by Brother Harry Hickey with his report as Worthy Grand Patron in 1923, and Brother Alfred M. Clower, Worthy Grand Patron, took in charge the preliminaries of organization. With the assistance of Worthy Grand Matron Lillie Schofield Riley, Past Grand Patron Harry Hickey, and Associate Grand Patron William H. Redmile, the new Chapter was Instituted June 19, 1923, with Sister Annie V. See, Worthy Matron, and Brother Thomas B. Pepper, Worthy Patron. On April 26, 1924, at a Special Meeting of the Grand Chapter, a Charter was granted to Georgetown Chapter, and the Chapter was officially Constituted by Sister Riley, Worthy Grand Matron, on May 2, 1924.

As a result of the earnest efforts of Worthy Grand Patron William H. Redmile to promote the Order through the organization of new Chapters, with 'the able assistance of Sister Martha W. Krapf, a member of St. John's Chapter, No. 4, and a resident of Newark, Newark Chapter was Instituted with thirty-nine members on Thursday, April 23, 1925, with Sister Krapf as Worthy Matron and Brother Robert S. Gallaher as Worthy Patron. This Chapter was presented with their Charter and Constituted on December 17, 1925, by Worthy Grand Matron Louise W. Green, assisted by Worthy Grand Patron E. B. Wilson.

Upon the request of Sister Marguerite G. Cooper, a member of Delaware Chapter, No. 1, and a resident of Harrington, Worthy Grand Patron E. B. Wilson granted a Dispensation for a Chapter in Harrington, and on April 17, 1926, Kent Chapter was instituted. At a special Session of the Grand Chapter, a Charter was granted on April 16, 1927, and on April 27, Worthy Grand Matron Elizabeth Leach, assisted by Worthy Grand Patron Walter R. Wood, Constituted Kent Chapter, No. 11, with Sister Marguerite G. Cooper, Worthy Matron, and Brother Randolph Graham, Worthy Patron.

Worthy Grand Patron Thomas B. Pepper granted a Dispensation for the organization of a Chapter in Frankford, and on January 25, 1928, with the assistance of Worthy Grand Matron Rose E. Newlin, the Chapter was Instituted, with Sister Levessa E. Cannon, Worthy Matron, and Brother Topp M. Heath, Worthy Patron. Charter was granted to Frankford Chapter, No. 12, at a Special Session of the Grand Chapter on April 21, 1928, and Worthy

Grand Matron Rose E. Newlin, with the assistance of Past Worthy Grand Patron Harry F. Newlin, Constituted the Chapter on April 25, 1928.

With the assistance of Sister Ellen Gravell Duncan and Brother James Duncan, members of Julia M. Story Chapter, No. 3, residing in Richardson Park, Worthy Grand Patron Robert S. Gallaher was privileged to Institute the thirteenth Chapter in our constellation of Stars on February 6, 1930, with Sister Duncan, Worthy Matron, and Brother Paul W. Lowden, Worthy Patron. Charter was granted to this Chapter at the Annual Session of Grand Chapter May 21, 1930, and Five Points Chapter, No. 13, was Constituted by Worthy Grand Matron Mattie Pyle Horn during the Session.

The recapitulation of membership through these ten years shows a slow growth as to membership increase, the greatest increase in any one year being 113 in 1926 and the lowest being 5 in 1929. In explanation of this we may use the time worn reason of the several months in the immediate past by saying it is "the depression." However, last year's recapitulation shows an increase of 63, and for the entire time from 1921 to 1931 our membership has grown from 1,488 to 1,987, a total increase of 499, which is complimentary considering the size of our State.

Time and space does not permit a review of the fraternal development as may be gleaned from the various reports of our Grand Matrons, Grand Patrons and Committees, suffice to say that all the frailties of humanity are displayed in fraternal relationships as in any other walk of life, but as the years come and go we learn in life's hard school that before we can practice the virtues taught in our beloved Order we must learn how to exercise patience in awaiting the ultimate triumph of truth, how to surmount suspicion of the lack of purity of purpose in our fellowman, how to be kind to those who are unkind to us, and above all the lesson of toleration. When humanity has mastered these lessons, the practice of the fraternal virtues will follow as day follows night.

In the words of our Worthy Grand Matron, "with a memory for yesterday, work for today and a hope for tomorrow," may we not go forward on our history, making voyage with a new determination to make our Order truly beneficent throughout our Jurisdiction.

Past Grand Matron Sister Green moved that the History of the Grand Chapter as read by Past Grand Matron Sister Horn be spread on the minutes; was seconded and adopted.

Sister Horn read the report of the proposed amendment to the Constitution, and then moved the adoption of the amendment. Brother Beatty seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Article 1, Section 4, was then read by Sister Horn, and Sister Horn moved the adoption of the Recommendation. Sister Green seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Article 1, Section 42, was then read by Sister Horn, who moved that the recommendation be adopted. Brother Esham seconded the motion, and it was adopted, after this discussion:

Brother Caufman: "In 1929 a Committee report was given a second reading, and when the Committee was formed it was for the purpose of changing the Constitution. In 1930, that was changed by order of the Worthy Grand Matron, because common sense tells us that this was the purpose of the Committee". What line of Jurisdiction?"

Worthy Grand Patron: I will try to answer, and if I am wrong, I ask to be corrected. I believe that the territorial jurisdiction and those lines were adopted by the recommendation of the Matrons and Patrons of the Chapters affected, and if I remember rightly that was only read once and adopted. In the back of our constitution and by-laws it says 'No amendment to this constitution shall be made except in the following manner.' Section 3."

Brother Newlin: "That Committee on Territorial Jurisdiction submitted a report to this Grand Chapter. They recommended things which were submitted and resubmitted to the Chapter to refuse or accept, and last year Chapters objected and brought the matter to the Grand Chapter, and that is why it was here. This is an amendment—Section 42. Now we are taking final action on Section 42." Motion carried.

Proposed amendment to Article 1, Section 5, was read, and Sister Horn moved that the amendment be adopted. Brother Newlin seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Brother Newlin then moved that this amendment "except that" be added to the amendment, and Sister Horn seconded it. It was adopted.

By-Laws submitted for amendment, Article 1, Section 8, was then read.

Sister Horn moved the adoption of this amendment. Brother Newlin seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Article 1, Section 30, was then read.

Sister Horn moved that the amendment be adopted. Brother Newlin seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Article 1, Section 63, was read.

Sister Horn moved the adoption of the amendment. Brother Beatty seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

The Grand Secretary read two letters in reference to Territorial Jurisdiction, and Worthy Grand Patron announced that if there was dissatisfaction he would appoint a Committee to report back this evening, if possible. I would suggest that the members be asked to get in touch with the Committee immediately, and appointed Brothers Miller and Newlin and Sister Story to serve

on the Committee. Upon being informed that Brother Miller could not be here this evening, he appointed Brother Shinn in his place.

Sister Neutz read the report of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, after which Sister Horn moved that the report be adopted and spread on the minutes. Sister Stausebach seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Constitution



Sister Horn then moved that the Resolution be adopted.

After discussion, the motion was then adopted.

every minute of the time.

"I want to congratulate you, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, on a most successful year and a very pleasant and harmonious closing. I thank you." (Applause.)

Sister Benjamin: "I want to tell you how much I have enjoyed the session

today and to see how you work out your problems.

"It certainly is a nice little thing for the Worthy Grand Matron to call on your Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons. It is a delightful finish to your session. Past Grands are sent out to do a work and they are not supposed to be heard from. But it is a nice thing that you might expect from

your Grand Matron.

"I want to speak to you about the Order of Job's Daughters. Quite a number of members are interested in an order for girls. Sisters and Brothers, I think this is the most interesting and most helpful and most important work that the Order of the Eastern Star and the Masonic bodies ever attempted. The Order of Job's Daughters is an organization for girls of Masonic relationships between the ages of thirteen and twenty. It gives them instruction looking to spiritual and moral upbuilding, instructs them in the love of God, and reverence for the Holy Bible. The first prayer of their ceremony is the

Lord's Prayer, in which all girls join.

"It teaches them obedience to their parents. It teaches them loyalty and patriotism in order to combat the influences that are at work in our country. They have their flag ceremony at the opening when the flag is presented at the Altar. It gives a wonderful appearance. It works a wonderful good in them and develops the ability to carry on the work with intelligence and grace. It teaches them grace and poise and teaches them how to preside at the meetings and how to carry on other business portions of their work, how to make motions, how to proceed and handle other business. It is educational in that they have musical instruction and dramatic instruction as well as the study of the Holy Book. They are taught the Lord's Prayer, the Golden Rule. They have mysterious signs and passes, symbols, and pretty little crowns and robes. They are asked, 'Do you believe in the Lord's Prayer, and do you believe in the Golden Rule?' In the obligation they say, 'I am going to do at least one useful act each day.'

"You must admit those are wonderful principles for the girls, and every girl must be a relative of a Mason. The eligibility is broader than for the Star. They can be granddaughters, great granddaughters, nieces, sisters, or half

sisters, but there must be a Masonic relationship in the background.

"Sister Teachem has done marvelous work with these girls, forming a Triangle of Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia, and I know she will be very happy to help you. If any of you would like any further information I will be glad to send you literature, and I know you will feel very well paid.

"I want to thank you again, Sisters and Brothers, for your courtesies to me. I have enjoyed all your meetings, and I shall carry back with me a picture of this beautiful assemblage and your lovely officers. I do wish for the incoming officers a very happy and prosperous year. I shall carry back all these memories with me to the West, and I hope when any of you come out to the Rocky Mountain District, that you will look me up and I shall be very glad to greet you and show you around the sights of our city. Again I thank you."

Sister Teachem: "I have enjoyed this meeting very much and I wish the Grand Officers all success."

Sister Mary Williamson, Washington: "Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Visitors and Sisters, and Brothers: I wish to extend to these Grand Officers my congratulations and also my congratulations to the incoming Grand Officers and to say to you that I have enjoyed every moment of my visit here, and if any of you come to the District you are welcome. The door stands wide open for any Brother or Sister of the Eastern Star.

I have heard the remarks of Sister Benjamin in regards to the qualifications and purpose of the Order of Job's Daughters. If you want to see it in reality, just come to the District where I have a Bethel of girls. They are a hundred girls from thirteen to twenty years of age, a beautiful sight. We would be glad to have any of you come, and any time you can make up your mind to start this girls' organization in the State of Delaware, I am willing to be your friend and help you with yours."

Sister Amy C. Hord: "I am glad to be here at this Grand Chapter session. It is one of the best I have attended, and I feel that everything has gone off just A No. 1. I thank you for your courtesy in calling on me, and I wish for the new officers the very best year they can have, and that they have health to do their work."

Sister Julia M. Story: "Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers, and Members: I presume that you are all tired of listening to me talk. I talk so much, and if I could only present a talk that would be worth while I would not mind. REPORT OF JURISDICTION COMMITTEE

Frankford-Georgetown

This committee recommends that the territorial jurisdiction of Frankford and Georgetown Chapters remain the same as is with the exception that the town of Millsboro which will remain as neutral territory to be drawn on by both Chapters without any release of jurisdiction being required from either Chapter.

Brother Newlin moved the adoption of the Report of the Committee on Territorial Jurisdiction for Frankford and Georgetown.

Brother Thomas, Worthy Patron, reported for Frankford Chapter that they were satisfied, and Sister Mary M. Calhoun, Worthy Matron, reported for Georgetown Chapter by saying: "I suppose it will have to stand as adopted, so we are satisfied." Brother Hickey seconded the motion, and it was adopted.

Brother Newlin then read the second half of the report in reference to Newark and Five Points, as follows:

Newark-Five Points

That the territorial jurisdiction of Newark and Five Points Chapters remain the same with the exception that all of the territory west of the road leading from north of Stanton through Kiamensi, Marshallton, Cranston Heights to Price's Corner, thence west through the Cedars to Hockessin,

remain neutral territory to be drawn on by both Chapters without any release of jurisdiction being required from either Chapter.

The Grand Matron asked if there was any further business to come before the Grand Chapter, and their being none, the Worthy Grand Matron gave the following address:

I have known all my weaknesses and short-comings, but still I have tried to serve you the best I know how, and I hope to continue to serve the Order of the Eastern Star for the rest of my life, and I hope that my life may be an example that this insignia I wear will be an inspiration and honor to this Order."

Past Grand Patron Brother Sawdon was given a desk by Officers and Committees of Grand Chapter, which was presented by Brother Frank L. Harrar, who said:

"It gives me pleasure to present this to you. No doubt you have made many acquaintances, and you will want to correspond with these friends.

Here's the opportunity. Just remember this represents to them the desire to keep in touch with you. They don't want this friendship to slip away. They know that you will wear well. It is here for your service, and we present it to you with a great deal of pleasure. Also on behalf of your own Chapter it gives me great pleasure to present you with the chair, that will enable you to continue this correspondence in a perfectly comfortable manner."

Sister Zebley presented Brother Sawdon with a gift from his wife, and Brother Sawdon responded: "She might be your Grand Organist, but she's my Grand Wife. I'll thank her when I get home."

Brother Sawdon presented a gift to Sister Barr, and said: "Here's just a token that as time passes on you may be reminded of the pleasant times we have had together."

Sister Barr thanked Brother Sawdon for the gift.

Gift from husband to Mrs. Barr. In thanking him she assured him that she would never be Worthy Grand Matron again.

Gift from Adah Chapter presented to Mrs. Barr by Mrs. Fitzgerald.

Sister Barr: "Sister Fitzgerald and members of Adah Chapter, No. 5:

"Some time in the lives of all, no matter where we roam, We'll hear the faithful call of those dear friends from home."

"There is nothing that touches the heart and thrills the soul as love, loyalty, and devotion of one's own Chapter. To you who have known me longest and rejoiced as I ascended the ladder to the Grand East, and who have so loyally

watched my course, being most faithful, always ready and willing to assist me when the occasion arose, I wish to express my deep appreciation for this expression of your love, and I thank you very, very much for this gift."

Mrs. Meyer presented Mrs. Clower with gift from her husband which said: "To my best girl from her best beau."

ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER

Approved Recommendations

- 1. That at every semiannual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the $\,\mathrm{Sec}$ retary shall read the Land Marks.—1922.
- 2. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.—1922.
- 3. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.—1922.
- 4. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination.—1922.
- 5. That no member be allowed to vouch for anyone unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.—1922.
- 6. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess; by doing so closes the Chapter.—1922.
- 7. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door.—1922.
- 8. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.—1922.
- 9. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls. —1922.
- That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patron's Jewels.—1922.
- 11. That examinations for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record.—1923.
- 12. That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledgers, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.—1923.
- 13. That one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County.—1923.
- 14. That the proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner: One copy to each Grand Officer, to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron, to each Grand Representative of Delaware, to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter; three copies to each Grand Chapter; five copies to each Chapter in Delaware.—1923-1930.

- 15. That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official cover for Delaware.—1923.
- 16. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting.—1924.
- 17. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close.—1924.
 - 18. That public installations be discontinued.—1924.
- 19. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as Obligation Night in which to have a Special Service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and Ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter.—1925.
- 20. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations", adding those made and approved each year.—1925.
- 21. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings.—1926.
- 22. That Officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations.—1926.
- 23. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparations rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed.—1926.
- 24. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner.—1926.
 - 25. That the sale of anything in the Chapter Room be prohibited.—1926
- 26. That the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.—1926.
- 27. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting a duplicate shall be sent at the same time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.—1926.
- 28. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the names of the candidates initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter Rooms.—1928.
- 29. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given to the Worthy Grand Matron and each one of the members of the Board of Grand Instructors, to be returned to the Grand Secretary on their retirement from Office. Also

that a copy be furnished to the Worthy Matron of each Subordinate Chapter to be turned over to her successor at the close of her term of office.—1928

- 30. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office.—1928.
- 31. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installation.—1928.
- 32. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention.

Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter.—1929.

- 33. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on dimit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation.—1930.
- 34. That all members and visitors be required to fill out an identification slip at all Chapter meetings, to be collected by the Conductress and Associate Conductress when proving the Chapter, and that the Chapter Registry Book be kept from these slips. Blank slips to be secured from the Grand Secretary.—1930.
- 35. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.—1930.
- 36. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss.—1930.
- 37. That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter as amended to date be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each

of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session.)—1930.

- 38. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, for approval.—1930.
- 39. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose.—1930.
- 40. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months).—1930.
- 41. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petitions to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter.—1930.
 - 42. That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each.-1930.
- 43. That a price of \$5.00 (five dollars) be placed on Secret Work and \$2.00 (two dollars) on the Diagram of the Labyrinth.—1930.
- 44. That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star.—1931.
- $45. \ \ \,$ That a space be provided for the signature of the installing officer on the list of officers installed.—1931.
- 46. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron, and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any member interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire.—1931.
- 47. That a form, for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary.—1931.
- 48. That Article 5, Section 1, be amended so that this Grand Chapter may meet in any town in Delaware where there is a subordinate Chapter, at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron.—1931.
- 49. That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign proceedings after a period of five years, and that due care be taken in disposing of them.—1931.

Approved Decisions

- 1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degrees in a Chapter, when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petitioner, is null and void.—1922.
- 2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in the Chapter during the session? No.—1922.
- 3. The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session.—1925.
 - 4. Can we hold rehearsal at member's homes? No.-1926.
- 5. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election.—1926.
- 6. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.—1926.
- 7. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter, and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission.—1928.
- 8. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the obligation? No. Members can arise and repeat obligation when presiding officer calls for it.—1928.
- 9. After a petitioner has been balloted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot.—1929.
- 10. A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother.—1929.
- 11. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person who is not eligible to petition for the degrees.—1930.
- 12. A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents.—1930.
- 13. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record.—1930.
- 14. A petition for affiliation on dimit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual.—1930.

- 15. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon.—1930.
- 16. By-Laws of a subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a supply, as interpreted in my official letter number one.—1930.
- 17. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover the cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, (4),) plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendation of Jurisprudence Committee.)—1930.
- 18. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron.—1930.
- 19. That the Chapter Register be kept from the "identification slips." The Sentinel shall copy the names from the slips into the Registry book.—1931.
- 20. That in accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Section 44, when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees, and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year.—1931.
- 21. That no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices at the same time in a subordinate Chapter.—1931.


