### OPENING SESSION May 15, 1935

HE GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE, Order of the Eastern Star, convened in its Fourteenth Annual Session in the room of Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, Pythian Castle, 906 West Street, Wilmington, May 15, 1935, at 2.00 P. M.

The Grand Session was called to order by the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister M. Etta Keys.

The Grand Secretary called the roll of constituent Chapters.

A motion was made by Jay W. Miller, Worthy Grand Patron, that this Grand Session recess until May 22, 1935, at 2.00 P. M., according to resolution adopted at Special Session on February 25, 1935; seconded by Walter E. Sawdon, P. G. P.

The motion was adopted.

By order of the Worthy Grand Matron the Grand Marshal declared the Grand Chapter called to recess to reconvene at 2.00 P. M. on May 22, 1935, in the duBarry Room of the Hotel duPont.

#### Wednesday Afternoon Session

May 22, 1935

The Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, convened in its Fourteenth Annual Session in the duBarry Room of the Hotel duPont at 2.00 P. M. on Wednesday, May 22, 1935.

The duBarry Room was decorated with palms; baskets of flowers appropriate to the respective Star Points were placed at each station and a basket of beautiful red roses was in front of the Worthy Grand Matron's station.

The Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Jay W. Miller, called the Grand Chapter Session to order at two o'clock and introduced the guest speaker as follows:

"Sisters and Brothers: It is not my function at this time to extend any words of welcome or greeting. There are enough of those on the official program so that I think you ought to be convinced by the time the program is over that you are really welcome. I will not take any time of yours or mine in that respect.

"This occasion in one respect is a culmination of an ambition that I have had for several years. It is some four or five years ago that I heard the speaker at a Consistory function in this city and I have tried since that time to have him come back for one or another occasion, but he is such a busy man and in such demand as a speaker that he was unable to do so until this time. I know you will be well repaid for his having been here today. He is the pastor of the Wharton Memorial M. E. Church in Philadelphia, a Master Mason, a member of several Masonic bodies and a 33rd degree Mason. I am particularly proud and happy to present to this body today Dr. Richard Radeliff, who will speak to us at this time."

#### **ADDRESS**

#### Dr. Richard Radcliff Philadelphia, Pa.

Dr. Radcliff: "Worthy Grand Patron: I am sorry that I cannot give the other officers their official titles, but I am pleased to be here and I am very glad that you changed your date. I was in Florida on the 15th and came home yesterday in order that I might be here today. I have been looking forward to this visit for some time.

"I understand that it will be necessary for me to depart as soon as I get through with what I have to say. Perhaps that will be the better part of valor. It may be wise for me to leave when I am through.

"I told the Secretary that I was nervous. I was just feeling a little embarrassed in the presence of so many ladies and a few men. But I ought not to be embarrassed; my mother was a woman and my dear wife was a very precious woman to me. It was her departure and my heavy work that made insistent my brief journey to the South, but I am glad that I can be with you today.

"In the presence of so many women I am reminded of a little composition that a girl wrote in school one day. The teacher asked her to write a composition and she selected as the subject of her composition 'Man.' That is a very good subject for a composition. She began it by saying 'God made man.' You see she was orthodox. 'But when He got through making man and looked at him He said, "I think I can do better if I try again." And so the essayist continued, 'God tried again and He made woman. And that is the reason,' she said, 'why there are more women than men in the world today.' She said, 'Boys, well they are a worthless set. Boys will use everything but soap.' She concluded her essay by saying, 'If I had my way about it, we would have in the world only girls and dollars.'

"I suppose it would take a good many dollars to keep things moving if we had only girls in the world today. But all hail to the women who are seeking the redemption of society. There isn't anything in this world today that needs redeeming quite so much as human society. I do not know who will do the task if women do not accomplish it because it appears to me that men are making a very miserable attempt at redeeming society.

"They talk about women's suffrage as if it had a limit. There is not a place in earth or heaven, not a task to mankind given, not a blessing or a call, not a whisper yes or no; there isn't a life or death or birth that has a feather's weight of worth without a woman in it.

"Social science assumes that woman's place in society marks the level of service. The virtue of a nation is never higher than the virtue of its women. If this old world of ours is ever to be redeemed from the awful curses that so constantly prey upon the very heartlife of its people, it will be due largely through woman's influence. No great reform has ever been accomplished on earth without a woman's influencing that great reform.

"In the ages long ago we find a nation in peril. Its destruction was imminent. The plans were well laid and those plans were laid by men who had ambitions and who desired. Of course, in order that they might have the ascendency and sit upon the throne and lay their rule in this world, this

national life had to be destroyed. It happened just at that time that God had prepared a woman, one of the most remarkable characters in that part of the history of the world.

"And so it was that up out of obscurity, up out of abject poverty, up out of a rustic past came this great and noble character and she wove her beautiful life; she wove the purity of her heart, the nobility of her character into the heart and graces of one in authority. The result was that this woman who was willing to sacrifice her life for the salvation of her people went into the presence of the king and solicited from that king those pledges and promises that meant the salvation of her people. I am told that she occupies a very prominent point in the Star of your Order. She sits upon a throne, I believe, in your Order. She is a star of the brilliance of genius and her name is Esther.

"What a noble character is that queen that lived in the long, long ago! Now she needed no insignias to set forth her royalty. Her royalty was the beauty of her own divine personality. Her royalty was the nobility of her womanhood. She needed no exterior. It came out from the very fibres of her being. It came as a sunburst out of the purity of her heart. She seemed to exceed all the nobility that was required for women in her standing in that day. Her virtues were her crown. Esther was no heartless beauty intent on her own elevation, regardless of the welfare of others. If there is anything that is repellant in this world, it is a beautiful woman that possesses either a heart of stone or a spirit steeped in selfishness. This queen of the long ago was not of that character. Esther's earnestness was of the noblest type. A woman's earnestness is the elevating power that society needs in every day and generation. 'I will go in to the king and if I perish, I perish,' That is the kind of character that that queen of the long ago possessed. And it is precisely that same kind of character that is needed in the womanhood of our day and generation. When you assume such nobility of life and of character, you mold and you fashion the thought, the principles, the life of mankind.

"In 1837, Wendell T. Phillips, that brilliant Boston lawyer, eloquently talked for some time in favor of the abolition of slavery. He gave more than a quarter of a century of his fine natural ability addressing large assemblies, facing angry mobs, for many of the people of that day and generation were not sympathetic to the message that was coming from the heart and brain of this noble man.

"Where did he get the strength to stand up and face that angry mob night after night, in his own city and far distant from his home? I'll tell you where he got the strength. There in his home in a little room kept dark because of necessity, there lay upon a bed a little frail woman, sick for a number of years. The sunlight had to be kept from her room and she lay upon her bed. And every day and every night before Wendell Phillips would go out, he would go into that room, kneel down beside that bed and put his arms around that dear, frail wife, and she would plant a kiss upon his brow and then she would say 'Wendell, don't shilly shally; play the man.' I tell you, I don't know of anybody that has any degree of manhood whatever but can go forth with a blessing like that upon him and withstand any of the

forces of evil, any of the enemies that are tending to break down human society in this day and generation.

"Do you know why we have so many, 'shilly shally' men in positions today? It is because we do not have quite enough of the stamina of womanhood as is portrayed in the wife of Wendell Phillips. When you will put a little more backbone into your husbands, when you will put a little more of courage into their blood, when you will give to them your blessing as God blesses you, I tell you then the men of our day and generation are going to be stronger and more stalwart in all of their efforts.

"Another point in your star bears the name of Adah, the one who speaks loudly to us of love, that self-sacrificing love. I do not know of anything quite equal to it. It is told in the Good Book that the greatest thing in all the world is love. I believe it. I believe the teachings of that Book. I believe the teachings that are to be found in this tenet in your fraternal order. I believe that the greatest thing in all God's world is love; and that many today are dying, literally dying, for the warmth of a little more love. I'll tell you what it is that cracks the hearth-stones in so many homes in America. It is love, the lack of it, the loss of it, for it has taken wings and has flown out the door of so many of our American homes today. We have loveless women and loveless men and the result is that our home life is not all it ought to be at this time.

"A minister was once taken through an institution where heartbroken men were incarcerated. He was led down the aisles of this building and came to a room in which there was a man fondling a little toy baby and the minister said to the attendant, 'What is the matter with this man?' The reply was, 'He was in love with a dear woman and she jilted him and it has broken his heart and it has disturbed his mind. Hence he is in this institution and when he fondles this baby he thinks he has this dear woman in his arms. He presses a kiss on the face of this doll baby and thinks he is loving again the woman who cast aside that love.' Down the aisle he went and finally came to another room. In it there was a poor man. It seemed his mind was worse than that of the first. He was beating his head against the wall. The minister said, 'What is the matter with this man?' The reply was, 'This is the man that married the woman that jilted the first man.'

"You have in your Star great magnitude, great beauty, great strength of character in these five points that we are considering at this time. Benjamin Franklin one of the many times he was in Paris stood up before the Assembly and read out of the Bible one of the most fascinating of the many beautiful stories to be found in that Book; and some literary people of high scholastic attainments approached him at the close of the address and said to him: 'Where did you get that wonderful story that you read to us today?' He said, 'I got it out of the Bible.' If you want to read the story of Ruth, go to your Bibles and there you will find the stories recorded of this beautiful character that is deified, a spirit of humility that is taught in your splendid Order—never pushing herself forward, always ready to retire, always ready to be helping someone else.

"You know the story, oh, so well. How the famine drove the family from their home in Judea down into the land of Moab and their daughters married sons of Israel, and how in due time not only father but sons passed away and the woman Naomi left without husband and sons had two daughters-in-law who also desired to remain with her. Orpha remained in the land of her fathers and mothers but Ruth had entreated Naomi not to leave her or to return without her, for 'whither thou goest, I will go and where thou lodgest, I will lodge; thy people shall be my people and thy God my God.' So, forsaking all the religion of her fathers and mothers, she goes into this new land, into this new life, into this new opportunity and comes into a land that is now flowing with milk and honey. She isn't going to be the one depending upon Naomi to help her. No, rather this young girl will be the strong support of the older woman, as it always should be. The young should stand up and permit the old to lean upon them, and Ruth said by her very act and her conduct that she would be the support of her mother-in-law at this time

"You know the story — how she went out to work in the fields, doing that menial service, ever expressing the spirit of humility, and by that spirit of humility was brought finally to a life of nobility. She became the wife of Boaz and so became the great, great grandmother of Jesus, one who was willing to be humble, one who was willing to support the sick, one who was willing to work unhonored; God surely made her blessed among women. She became the mother of the precious boy out of whose loins finally came the world's great Redeemer, the Lord and Saviour of us all. What a precious privilege God is ready to bestow upon all women for I believe for her the noblest satisfaction in life is to be the mother of the generations that are before us.

"When I am thinking of motherhood I can never, never forget that noble saying that was born in the praise of a dear little boy whose mother left him when he was a mere lad but finally came to the highest position that this nation gives to any of her citizens, and in that maturity of conduct and intellect he said 'All that I am and all that I have I owe to my dear, praying mother.' A woman of great ability in more recent days was wont to write books that others read, and now they ceased for a while and a dear friend met her and said, 'I haven't had any of your books recently. What are you writing today?' The woman replied, 'I am writing two books today.' 'And what are their names?' she was asked. She said, 'Their names are John and Mary. God has given to me two children and I am writing my life and my character and all that God is wont to give me into the life and character of this dear boy and girl.' Do you know that mothers largely make men and women out of boys and out of girls? In those plastic days that they live in the formative period of their lives when character is beginning to be molded and advanced, just the least mistake that a mother can make is dangerous.

"One day the 'phone bell rang and little Billy was going to run to the 'phone when mother called down stairs and said to him, 'Billy, you just tell that person who's calling that mother is not in today.' And then sometime later in life, that same mother was compelled to say to some of her friends

and neighbors, 'I don't know what it is, but our Billy is a terrible liar.' Of course he is a terrible liar, but who told the first lie? The mother, and that made its impression on that dear boy. He never forgot it. It was easy for him to tell the second lie after mother had taught him how to tell the first.

"There is another point in your Star in which your Order finds its way into the spiritual realms. I am so glad to know that here in this phase of our Masonic life and Masonic work we have evidence of the spiritual in human life and character. Here we have one who sought and found her way into the secret of His presence and divine praise. Here is one who lived her life in faith, faith in the son of God who lived here and gave himself for her. Here you express yourself in that great belief in the presence of good, that there is goodness in existence. We have the bad; we have the evil; we have darkness in opposition to light; we have night in contrast with day; we have badness in contrast with goodness; but, oh, what a blessed thing it is for you to have in one point a Martha who could find her way into the presence of the Lord, Jesus Christ, believing in Him, exemplifying such a belief that the light has come out and today we find that no matter how dark the cloud is, behind that darkness the sun is shining. Thank God for the shining sun behind the clouds of life! No day or no experience is so dark in your heart and life but that faith penetrates and we are able to see the light of God shining from His heaven down upon our pathway. And Martha it was who told us that we live again and 'whosoever liveth and believeth in Him shall never die.'

"We are sorrowing now in our American life and especially in our American womanhood because one of the noblest characters we have had in the last half century has just passed away and our nation is in mourning over the going of so great and so generous a character as Jane Addams. What she did out of the generosity of her life, her heart, her spirit and all the talents God gave her for the uplifting of human kind! I have learned to respond to spiritual service, and its teaching is that it is more blessed to give than it is to receive, ever faithful to the Cross of that One who suffered and died on the Calvary for the salvation of the world.

"So I pray that God will richly bless you in your session here and that as you go back to your chapters in your several localities, and go back to your homes and go back to your social life and tasks of everyday life, these five points will shine brightly before you and that you will be able better to understand them, to love them, to live them and that everyone that you may come in contact with, every man you may be able to influence may be a better man, every woman a better woman, every child a better child, each chapter a better chapter, all through the coming days."

Past Grand Matron, Sister Julia M. Story, and Past Grand Patron, Brother Harry F. Newlin, were escorted to the Grand East by the Grand Marshal and called the Grand Session to order.

Sister Story instructed the Grand Marshal to escort the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and other Grand Officers into the chapter room.

The Worthy Grand Matron carried a beautiful bouquet of red roses, and all her officers wore corsages of the same flower.

Sister Story welcomed the Grand Officers and the Grand Chapter of Delaware as follows:

"Through the courtesy of our Worthy Grand Matron, who has conferred on me the honor and privilege of calling this Fourteenth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware from recess to labor, I extend to you a most sincere and cordial greeting.

#### Tribute to THE AMERICAN FLAG By Mrs. Edna H. Watson Grand Marshal

#### SISTER WATSON:

"Behold the emblem of our country
The greatest Flag of the greatest Nation.

"We love our flag because we love the republic for which it stands; We love our flag because we love the institutions of freedom which the republic fosters;

We love our flag because its protecting care follows us to every clime. Behold the most beautiful Flag in the whole world.

"May it never be used in any cause except that to which it has been dedicated, the cause of liberty, equality, justice for all and a staunch belief in the living and true God.

"We shall always love the stars and stripes
And we mean to be ever true
To this land of ours
And the dear old flag
The Red, the White, the Blue;
Then hurrah for the flag,
Our country's flag,
Its stripes and white stars too,
There is no flag in any land
Like our own Red, White and Blue,"

The Worthy Grand Patron led in pledging allegiance to the flag, after which the "Star Spangled Banner" was sung.

#### Tribute to THE STATE FLAG By Charles V. Cleaver Worthy Patron, Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3

BROTHER CLEAVER: "We have just paid fitting tribute to our National Emblem and now may we look at this flag of blue with its diamond-shaped center and the great seal therein. Yes, this is the State Flag—Delaware's State Flag, which we are proud to honor here today.

"We were without such a flag until a commission appointed by our State Legislature was authorized to obtain drawings and designs for one. This Commission met and selected the design in the summer of 1912 but due to no appropriation having been allowed, the Commission could not have a flag made. The Daughters of the American Revolution was the first to have a flag made of the official design and they displayed it with pride at their convention in Washington, D. C., in July, 1913. The flag was placed first in the line of state flags in the Continental Memorial Hall in Washington, D. C. The seal in the center of the diamond is the great seal of Delaware and its history is most interesting. The present seal has portrayed on it parts of the seals that were given to this section when known as the three lower counties. This great seal is one of the most closely guarded pieces of property held in our State House, for without the affixing of it, the many bills and documents are not legal. Once back in Revolutionary times the British carried the great seal away and the legislature was held up in passing their laws.

"Delaware has often been called 'the Diamond State' because although next to the smallest state in the Union, its narrow boundaries contain great wealth and beauty. The background of blue may be likened to the sky when all clouds have vanished, thus calling to our minds the lesson of fidelity.

"Thus we have our State Flag with the official seal thereon and the diamond to remind us of the blessings that are to be found about us and the blue to remind us of fidelity. May we keep faith with ourselves and our flag and carry on to the coming generations the unblemished emblem that we proudly call our State Flag."

SISTER LANG: "It is not the olive valleys, the pasture lands or the great centers of learning that made Greece the greatest of ancient countries. Ans. No. Refer you to Landmark 7.

Approved.

14. When is the investigating committee appointed on a petition requiring a waiver of territorial jurisdiction?

Ans. The petition does not become the property of your Chapter until territorial waiver has been granted, at which time the committee should be appointed.

Approved.

15. May we escort the Associate Matron to her station?

Ans. No. The Ritual does not provide for this.

Approved.

16. Can we repeat the C. M. during our opening march?

Ans. No. The only place the C. M. or the C. W. is to be used is during the Initiatory and Installation ceremonies. See Ritual.

Approved.

17. Is is permissible for a Subordinate Chapter to use a march in which the square and compasses are formed and explained by the Worthy Patron from the East?

Ans. There is no law covering this point, but I believe it unwise to use symbols of other organizations in our Chapters.

Approved.

18. May a person who is not a member of the Order arrange the Labyrinth for the Chapter?

Ans. The Labyrinth is part of our Secret Work and a person who is not a member does not know how it should be arranged.

Approved.

19. I was initiated seventeen years ago and have not been in the Chapter since and do not remember enough to pass an examination. I would like to visit another Chapter; what shall I do?

Ans. Visit your home Chapter, have with you your visiting card and someone, a member of the Order, who can vouch that you are the member whose name is on the card.

Approved.

20. If after a Mason's death his widow adopts a daughter, is the daughter eligible to the Eastern Star?

Ans. No; she would not be his adopted daughter.

Approved.

#### Recommendations

1. That the Signs of the Five Degrees, as interpreted in the 1935 Schools of Instruction, be adopted for this Grand Jurisdiction.

Adopted.

2. That the members be permitted to remain seated during the Opening March in Subordinate Chapters and called up when the position referred to in the Ritual is assumed.

Adopted.

That no Life Memberships shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such membership.).

Adopted.

4. That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patron shall have the same restriction as the Worthy Patron regarding the Pink Slip.

Adopted.

5. That all petitions for Affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered.

Adopted.

 That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdiction.

Adopted.

## Reception of Distinguished Visitors

The order of Reception of Distinguished Visitors in this Grand Chapter shall be as follows:

Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron.

Past Most Worthy Grand Matrons and Past Most Worthy Grand Patrons.

Other Grand Officers of the General Grand Chapter.

Committee Members of the General Grand Chapter. Grand Matrons and Grand Patrons of other Grand Jurisdictions. Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons of other Jurisdictions. Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons of Delaware. Present Grand Officers of other Grand Jurisdictions (Installed). (Other Grand Officers: See note below).

#### How Received

WORTHY GRAND MATRON: "Will the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron please rise.

"Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress, you will present our Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron at the Altar. Grand Marshal, you will escort the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron to the East." (Calls up Grand Chapter.).

(The Grand Marshal meets the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress with the Most Worthy Grand Officers in front of the Associate Grand Matron's station and escorts them to the Altar, stands in a convenient position during introductions, then escorts them to the East. In the East she stands in front of the Worthy Grand Matron's station, stepping back to give grand honors.

If the M. W. G. Matron or Patron are announced in waiting, the Grand Conductress, Associate Grand Conductress and Grand Marshal meet them at the door and proceed as above.)

WORTHY GRAND MATRON: "Are there other General Grand Chapter Officers (or officers next to be received, as the case may be) in the room?"

(If only one arises, the Grand Conductress is directed to present her or him at the Altar or in the West, as it may be. If more than one, ask them to assemble in the West and then direct the Grand Conductress-and Associate Grand Conductress if there are both sisters and brothers-to present them.)

All Grand Officers who have not been Grand Matrons or Grand Patrons are presented in the West and escorted to the East outside the Labyrinth.

Grand Instructors, District Deputy Grand Matrons, Deputy Grand Lecturers, etc., may be presented in the West, welcomed and escorted to their seats, or if there is room may be seated in the East.

Grand Representatives of other Grand Jurisdictions near this Grand Chapter shall be presented in the West and escorted to the East by way of the Altar. Grand Representatives between other Grand Jurisdictions have no official standing in this Grand Chapter except as visitors.

7. That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to bring the Book of Instruction to date in accordance with the Ritual and that slips be printed to take care of these changes.

Adopted.

### Decisions

1. How many days constitute "due notice" for a Special meeting? Decision. "Due notice" shall be ten days; that is, notices shall be mailed ten days before such meeting.

Not approved.

2. Objection has been made to the installation of one of our officers. Has a member the right to object and if so, how shall the matter be handled?

Decision. If the officer is an appointed officer, the objection must be submitted to the Chapter and decided by a secret majority ballot.

Approved.

### Irregularities

I am mentioning the following irregularities with the hope that they may be corrected and all Chapters profit by this reference.

Doors to the Chapter room being left unguarded during recess and Chapters not purged after resuming order.

One Secretary having candidates sign a proceedings instead of the Chapter By-Laws.

Warder and Sentinel permitting members to leave and enter Chapter room promiscuously without permission of the presiding officer and without required alarms.

I find some of the Chapters having long opening marches and short opening ceremony. I feel that the Ritualistic Work should not be sacrificed in this way, but that if time does not permit exemplifying both, the march should be omitted.

Approved.

### Job's Daughters

I accepted an invitation to visit the local Bethel of Job's Daughters and enjoyed meeting with this lovely group of girls. I feel that encouraging and helping them is a privilege and opportunity that every member of the Order of the Eastern Star should take advantage of. They appreciate friendly interest and encouragement in their work. With the training these girls are receiving, we see a bigger and better future for our Order. I would suggest that some of our local Chapters invite these girls to exemplify their work in their Chapter room after their meeting is closed.

The Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Jay W. Miller (known to the girls as "Daddy Miller") accompanied me on this visit. I was impressed with the cordial manner in which we were received and appreciated the beautiful drill used in presenting me flowers; also the gift I received.

### Correspondence

I shall always cherish the friendships formed through the letters that have come to me as Worthy Grand Matron. Each letter was given my personal attention and I endeavored to answer them as promptly as possible.

The usual Christmas Greetings were sent out through the office of the Grand Secretary. We received greetings from the General Grand Chapter and Grand Jurisdictions.

Many personal cards and letters were received from the members of the Subordinate Chapters in Delaware, for which I express my thanks.

### Proceedings

I wish to acknowledge Proceedings received from other Grand Jurisdictions. Many thanks—and in a short time I hope to be able to enjoy reading them.

It was also recommended that an effort be made to secure \$1.00 from each member, for the maintenance of the Temple.

These recommendations were passed. A Book of Instructions, prepared by the officers of the General Grand Chapter, has been prepared and will soon be available. After much discussion it was voted to accept members of New Jersey on petitions of affiliation, after investigating the Masonic relationship upon which the sister had been admitted to the Order—the General Grand Chapter not recognizing the eligibility of a step-daughter of a Mason to the Order as recognized by New Jersey. North Dakota and Manitoba have established an International Peace Garden and ask for the approval and moral support of the General Grand Chapter, which was given.

A recommendation was made and approved that each Grand Chapter enact laws requiring each Chapter to carry on some educational program. No changes made at this Assembly will become effective until official notification is received.

The installation of Mrs. Frances Haun as Most Worthy Grand Matron and Mr. William A. Duvall as Most Worthy Grand Patron and other officers was a most beautiful affair.

Delaware was honored by having our Past Grand Matron, Sister Anna Belle Sauter, appointed on the Educational Committee.

To attend an Assembly of the General Grand Chapter is a wonderful inspiration and brings to us forcefully the magnitude of the work of our Order, and gives one an ambition to be more useful and makes one realize his obligation to his fellowmen.

Ans. Yes. The member is entitled to a seat in this Grand Chapter if she has

received only the suspension notice but has not been suspended.

Approved.

2. Does a demitted or suspended Past Matron have the right to wear her Jewel?
Ans. Yes, it is personal property; however, it does not seem to be good taste.
Approved.

3. If the position of the flag is lower than the East, should the flag be to the

right of the presiding officer or the right of the audience?

Ans. Refer you to Ritual, page 35. The flag should be placed in the East at the right of the presiding officer.

Approved.

### Recommendation

That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruction. This is in accordance with the General Grand Chapter.

#### REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

It is both a privilege and a duty for me to present to you an account of my stewardship during the past year. It is my hope that you will find that account at least reasonably acceptable.

In one respect, I feel that I accomplished more than my predecessor, Brother C. Herbert Neutze. While the contemplation of the honor and duties of the position of Worthy Grand Patron sent him to his bed several weeks before the Grand Chapter Session two years ago and kept him there for some time thereafter, I was able to survive the Session last year and did not succumb until two days after its close. The present Associate Grand Patron, Brother Victor J. Carmine, looks quite strong and healthy and it is my sincere hope that he will survive the ordeal entirely with no ill effects.

#### Official Visits

During the Summer and Fall, it was my privilege to accompany the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister M. Etta Keys, and the staff of Grand Officers on official visits to the various subordinate Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. As a small contribution to these occasions, I presented a series of talks on the origin and development of the twelve landmarks of the Order. It was a pleasure to delve into the history of the Order in this manner and I, at least, secured a great deal of information therefrom.

#### Other Visits

I was also present at several installations of new officers of subordinate Chapters during January and attended some of the schools of instruction held under the direction of the Worthy Grand Matron and the Board of Grand Instructors.

It was also a pleasure to attend practically all the annual banquets of the various subordinate Chapters-and to take an active part in the gastronomic proceedings.

### General Grand Chapter

I had the privilege of being one of the representatives of this Grand Chapter at the Triennial Assembly of the Order held in Tampa, Florida, in November, 1934.

On November 13, 1934, the Worthy Grand Matron and I, together with seven other members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, joined the delegation from the District of Columbia on the S. S. Fairfax at Baltimore for the trip to Tampa. We were entertained at Savannah, Georgia, by members of the Savannah Chapters while en route. Leaving the boat at Jacksonville, Florida, we motored to St. Augustine, drank from the Fountain of Youth with no observable results, went by rail to West Palm Beach, rubbernecked our way by motor coach through Ft. Lauderdale, Miami Beach, Miami and Coral Gables-then boarded the train for Tampa, where we arrived Saturday evening, November 17.

It was said to be the largest Triennial Assembly ever held and incidentally the largest convention of any kind that Tampa had ever entertained. There were reported to be 568 delegates from fifty-three Grand Jurisdictions, and fourteen delegates from fourteen subordinate Chapters under the jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter. Including all visitors, there were approximately 6,000 members

of the Order in Tampa during the Assembly.

Delaware was represented by twenty members of the Order-with eleven voting

delegates.

I attended all business sessions of the Assembly and participated in the debate on two or three questions in which some of the Delaware delegates were interested. It was also my privilege to have printed some brief excerpts from two of the talks I had given at official visits to subordinate Chapters in Delaware and to distribute them to those who were interested,

The Worthy Grand Matron has given you a detailed report of the Assembly. My chief regret is that a larger number of our membership could not have been present to gain inspiration and help from attendance at the various functions.

#### Fraternal Courtesies

The exchange of fraternal courtesies with other jurisdictions is one of the most pleasant features of a year in the "Grand East." In company with the Grand Matron and a number of other members, I visited as follows:

# Order of Job's Daughters

With the Worthy Grand Matron I made a formal visit to Bethel No. 1, Order of Job's Daughters in Wilmington, on December 17, 1934. Personally, I have been interested in this organization since it was instituted in October, 1932, and served as Associate Grand Guardian of Delaware for nearly two years. I believe the organization has splendid possibilities for developing the girls of our community and incidentally serving as a sort of training school for the Order of the Eastern Star.

The girls are deserving of a more active and wholehearted support by the Order of the Eastern Star than they have so far received, if the sponsorship by the Grand Chapter is to mean anything at all—and if the Order of Job's Daughters is to survive and prosper. Is it too much to suggest that the members of this Grand Chapter, especially those in Wilmington, plan to visit the local Bethel at least once during the year, or to show their interest in some other way? It would be deeply appreciated by the girls, I am sure, and would do much to make our sponsorship of the Order be of some real value to them.

### Recommendations

1. I recommend that a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with the Order of Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter.

Adopted.

I recommend that those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the opening of the Grand Chapter Session.

Adopted.

#### Good of the Order

I believe that the outlook for the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware is bright. For a number of years, the membership in this jurisdiction grew amazingly fast. Gradually the increase became smaller from year to year, until in recent years we have been forced to record a loss—even as we have done this year.

During the depression, past or present—(depending somewhat upon your politics)—we have lost a large number of members through non-payment of dues. As Sister Minnie E. Keyes, Right Worthy Grand Secretary, stated in her report to the General Grand Chapter in Tampa, we had some dead wood in our membership and it was well to be rid of it.

I hold no brief for retaining those members who have lost interest in the Order and are therefore excess baggage on our membership rolls. However, it does pain me deeply to hear of members who have been suspended for non-payment of dues, when possibly a little more active work by the Worthy Matron, or some other officer, would have retained that person in our membership. It is my firm belief that no member who desires to remain a member should be suspended for non-payment of dues, if she shows an interest in the Order and expresses a willingness to pay a part of her dues, however small that part may be. Or, if she is unable to pay anything, I believe that her dues should be remitted in whole or in part, and that a valued member of the Order may thereby be retained in membership. It seems to me just as important to retain old members as it is to acquire new ones. Our Order stands, among other things, for charity and loving kindness; surely it is logical that that charity and loving kindness should begin at home—among our own Chapter members.

The right and wrong use of the black ball has been a matter of perennial debate among our most conscientious members. Rightfully used, it is of course a protection against the admission of undesirable and improper persons into our membership. Wrongfully used, it becomes a source of disruption in the Chapter and of untold heartaches among those who have been refused admission. Unfortunately, there is some evidence that the black ball is occasionally used for personal rather than fraternal reasons. It is probable that this problem can never be wholly eradicated, but let us endeavor to keep it to a minimum in our various Chapters.

#### Appreciations

Worthy Grand Matron, it has been a privilege to serve with you in the "Grand East." Your long and valued service to this Grand Chapter, first as Grand Secretary and finally as Worthy Grand Matron, has given you a store of Eastern Star knowledge that has served you well in your position and has been of inestimable value to me

and all of your associates. You and I have not always agreed upon matters under discussion; you did not expect it, and I trust I have not disappointed you too much. But it has always been a friendly difference of opinion, and I believe you can say with me that we are parting as friends at the end of the year, even as we entered it.

The Grand Secretary has ever shown a willingness to give me any information or help whenever I asked for it; and for her courtesy and helpfulness, I am happy to

express my appreciation.

The friendly association with all the Grand Officers throughout the year has

been a delightful experience and will ever be a pleasant memory to me.

For the many thoughtful remembrances and expressions of interest during my illness last summer, I am deeply grateful. It was almost worth the illness to be able to hear from so many members of the Order in so many different ways.

#### Conclusion

We are soon to fling the mantle of leadership to our successors, who travel from the West to the East to become the presiding officers of this fine fraternal organization. I bespeak for you, Sister Bessie and Brother Victor, the fine spirit of helpfulness that we have enjoyed during the past year. And may your year be one in which there will be only enough of clouds to enhance the beauty of the sunshine that will be yours.

### REPORT OF THE GRAND SECRETARY

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware:

Another year has rolled away so quickly we wonder how it went and I am called upon to give an accounting of the work which I have done as your Grand Secretary, and with pleasure it is presented to you.

As you know, much of the work of this office is routine and can be told in a few

words, although it fills twelve busy months.

Under routine work comes all printed matter, including official notification of all legislation enacted by the Grand Chapter; lists of new officers and committees; annual proceedings; circular letters; stationery for the Grand Officers; Christmas cards; annual report blanks; notice of special session; and programs and invitations.

The correspondence takes much time and attention and as the Order grows, it

increases from year to year.

Immediately after the close of the Annual Session, all bills were promptly paid and stationery ordered for the year.

Fidelity Bond for the Grand Treasurer, Grand Secretary, Secretaries and Treasurers of the Chapters were renewed. Certificates of Proficiency have been attested for those recommended by the Board of Grand Instructors.

Commissions for Grand Representatives to represent Delaware in other Grand Jurisdictions were issued when requested and forwarded with greetings. BROTHER DUVALL: "Worthy Grand Matron, the Most Worthy Grand Matron has a wonderful faculty for saying the right thing at the right time and putting things where they belong. I would feel much better if she would introduce the subject on which I am to speak."

#### ADDRESS

### Mrs. Frances Haun Most Worthy Grand Matron

SISTER HAUN: "I believe, Worthy Grand Matron, that I have heard Brother Duvall refer to my having been near the Blarney Stone. Say, who is it who has been there?

"I was just going to ask the Worthy Grand Matron, with her kind permission, for there are so many of our distinguished guests who will not be here tomorrow, to allow me to give my time to them now. There is no one to whom I would rather give a larger part of my time than to my very highly esteemed Most Worthy Grand Patron, and yet he has called on me for help. I hope I won't fail him.

"This subject on which I am sure Brother Duvall is going to talk to you is a subject that is very near to my heart, and because of the one who has made this request, by virtue of his position as an officer of the General Grand Chapter and as my personal friend and because of my very deep and keen interest in this subject, I cannot find it in my heart to refuse, although I am sure that he does not need anyone to give the introduction.

"This subject that I am going to presume that he is prepared to speak to you upon at this time is that of our International Eastern Star Temple. We are going to have this Temple in the City of Washington, our nation's capital, and so near to you. What part the Grand Chapter of Delaware or any other Grand Chapter has in the building and the furnishing and the endowing of this Temple depends upon you. What part each one of your subordinate chapters has depends upon the initiative, the resources, the interest, and the untiring work of the faithful members of that chapter. What part and what responsibility each of you as individuals has depends wholly upon you

"We possibly might purchase a site and wholly complete this Temple and have it ready for dedication without the aid of some one Grand Chapter or without the aid of some of our members, but such a transaction would make us very sad and would be very far from what we desire. It is not just the money adequate to provide for this Temple and its completion which we desire of you but it is that we desire this to be a members' Temple and that each of you can point with pride and feel a glow within your heart in years to come that this is your Temple, that you had a part in it. Be that part ever so humble, we do not try to find what you did give because we know that one dollar from one member would mean as much as ten or a hundred from someone else.

"We have said that our slogan that has been given in General Grand Chapter many years ago was 'A dollar a member' because we knew that if we succeeded in getting that many dollars we could easily have this Temple and because we did not believe that there was a member in our ranks who could not give this one dollar for the Temple.

"Now I believe I will say that I think no one can successfully contradict me. There might be some of us unable just to pull out a dollar and lay it down; but a dollar grows, not only from quarters and dimes, but also from nickels and pennies.

"Many times this has been presented to our people following each Triennial Assembly and I feel sure that in any one of those terms of three years, it could have been paid by each member, representing thirty-three cents a year. Do you believe that we have any member among us who could not give thirty-three cents a year, who could not deny himself or herself of as many as thirty-three pennies for something else during the

year? Well, granting for the sake of argument that that is true, how many of the rest of us could and should be willing to make up that little amount for others?

"We always have among us, as has been suggested here tonight, some dead wood. We always, unfortunately, have some who are joiners, not members, some who have come and been exposed to our degrees and in some way it hasn't taken. They have never seen the light, and they are not interested in things which make for the growth and development of our Order. There are some few whose circumstances are such that they have not been able to give anything toward a worth while project or purpose. There are some we know who have not been able to pay their dues for the last few years. So there are always some of us who have to be willing to do our part for our neighbor, because there is no possible way for those of us who have taken the vows of this Order to think for one monent that we are not our brother's keeper.

"Now, we want not only every Grand Chapter but every subordinate Chapter to strive to have some contribution, be it only a small part of a dollar, remembering that it is not the gift but the spirit in which it is given that counts most of all. You know it is a very beautiful thought to remember that when the Wise Men came bringing gifts, these gifts of gold and and frankincense and myrrh were of far different values, yet in the memoriam which has come down, it has never been recorded which brought which gift but each has been given the same credit.

"So I say that it may be that there is a responsibility upon some of us greater than that of others to make up for our brothers and sisters; and in the Chapter here, there are some members who have definite reasons who cannot or do not give their part; that is where a Temple Committee appointed in each of these Chapters can very easily give some form of entertainment or devise some means whereby they can make up this quota to make each Chapter 100%. I feel sure that when we work out our plans more fully for this Temple, you will be enthusiastic over the proposition, and we hope very soon to be able to give you more definite information; you have the advantage of having the Chairman of the Eastern Star Temple Committee near you where you can get news first-hand. I feel sure that we will have some form of giving recognition to the Grand Chapters in the Order which are 100% for this Temple.

"And I have not emphasized the most important part of your contribution. Any good deed brings its own reward and I believe that your greatest reward will be the consciousness you will have within yourself of having done your part and having had not the least part but the most that you could possibly have, doing the most that you could for this great cause.

"Now, Brother Duvall is going to tell you much more about this. I trust that this will serve as a proper introduction for the Chairman of the International Temple Committee whom it was my pleasure to appoint."

### **ADDRESS**

# William A. Duvall Most Worthy Grand Patron

Brother Duvall: "Now, I am all set. I have very little to say. You know we are quite opposite in some things, the Most Worthy Grand Matron and I. She does not have any trouble with heat. She can stand a lot of it and it is awfully warm in here tonight and I am so much higher I get the full benefit of the heat in the room. Yet she is headed for Alaska and I am going in the opposite direction to the Hawaiian Islands. So we are leaving you very shortly. But we are very anxious to acquaint you fully with the building of this International Temple.

"It is to be an actual fact, dedicated before the next Triennial Assembly. We have been reluctant to speak too loudly of the work done so far. But we believe that you folks up here in Delaware, you are a part of the states around the city of Washington—Virginia, the District of Columbia, Maryland and Delaware—just like four fingers on a hand. We are very closely related. We have been that way from the very beginning and there is no reason why we should not be that way until the finish of this Temple.

"Your Most Worthy Grand Matron has outlined to you a complete picture of what we are asking of you, and mind you, this is only a voluntary gift on your part. There is no coercion about this collecting of funds for the International Temple. You have members here who have been outstanding since the very beginning for this Temple. Sister Story and Sister Riley have made liberal contributions from their own private funds. I believe they will continue to contribute until the Temple is a reality. Will you do this? Follow up the suggestion of your Most Worthy Grand Matron. I am sure the incoming Grand Matron will be pleased to appoint a committee to work up this proposition. I only have this one desire-that is that Delaware share 50-50 with the other states around the city of Washington. It gives us something to talk about when we go in the West. Land is cheap in the West and folks out there don't see a small piece of land in Washington for a lot of money like we do. I have already talked with some of our members from the West. When we talk of spending \$345,000 for a Temple, they say they can buy a thousand acres of land out West for that amount.

"They are just as interested as we are. We who live near the District of Columbia should owe our unstinted support towards the International Temple. The purpose of the committee is to acquaint you with the building of the Temple.

"You will probably be given an opportunity to make donations in another way. Being a young jurisdiction, you probably are not in possession of many trinkets or little things that you have gathered by way of some historic pieces of furniture, and the like, which may find their places in the museum or the archives of the Temple. We must keep that in mind. There is come talk of setting aside a room for each Grand Jurisdiction. We will talk about that after we get the building.

"Now, may I tell you just this much. The committee was called to Washington early in January. The Most Worthy Grand Matron was present. Some property was examined. Our eyes fell upon this one piece

of property—which is a magnificent piece of property. An option was placed. And yesterday morning before we left Washington the agent called and said that they would be able to give us something definite within two weeks. To transfer this property it was necessary to take our quotation for ratification. All this is being done and they assured us something would be coming of a definite or tangible nature within two weeks. And as soon as we get definite information that the property is ours, we will let you know and we will be glad if you will sing it from the housetops. But please don't criticize us for not giving you full information until the deal is consummated.

"You good people in Delaware know all about it. You have been working on it almost as long as we have and I have every reason to believe that you will do your part. I want you to know, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, that I am indebted to you and your officers for the splendid time that I have enjoyed since yesterday in your company. It is true you may be a small jurisdiction and a young jurisdiction but you have all the qualifications of older and larger jurisdictions. Keep in mind that our large jurisdictions are only multiplied small jurisdictions. You are growing in the right direction if my observations serve me right. The environment of this wonderful Session, the room below where we had a good time last night with the inner man, with dancing and the like, and then here in this beautiful room today—there isn't a Grand Chapter any place in the land that enjoys a better surrounding than you do here. So don't let your small numbers bother you. Be up and doing. Make the few count for something.

"You know there are two doors to success; namely, pull and push. You know folks that couldn't push a pound but they would pull their weight in gold. Others don't care to be out in front. You can't get them to pull but they will push. Don't let that stop you from pushing. You each have a duty to perform, whether you sit on the sidelines or whether you fill an officer's chair. I can scarcely refrain from using this poem which illustrates so fully what I mean. I use it often. It was written by Paul Lawrence Dunbar.

'One day the Lord had a job for me to do I said, "you get somebody else or wait until I get through." I don't know how the Lord came out but he seemed to get along.

'So one day I needed the Lord and I needed
Him right away
But he never answered me at all.
But down in my aching heart I could hear
him say,
"Nigger, I got too much to do, you get
somebody else or wait until I get through."

"Do you get the moral of that little poem? Nobody can do the job that God has marked out for you. Every soldier in line must pull his gun up and stand and sight when directed. Wouldn't it be a poor lineup of soldiers if one would go up and the other down? I don't care to make a reflection on the feminine side of the house tonight but that brings up a story I read about a husband and wife. He had sat two and a half hours looking out of the window and saw two horses pulling two tons of coal uphill. He, said, 'Mary, come here.' She very reluctantly came to the window. Said he, 'Why can't you and I pull together like those horses?' She said, 'We could, if there were only one tongue between us.'

"We must give the other fellow as much as we want to take. Our success in life will depend upon just how much we can pull together. We can't get very far by finding fault with our neighbors. Someone used this little illustration talking about flying. Some boys were flying their kites out in the field. It was said that 'Little boys flying their kites are pulling in the white winged birds, but you can't do that when you're flying words.' We get off on a tangent sometimes and the words begin to fly. You can't

bring them back.

"I didn't intend to stay on my feet quite so long. I'm getting hotter by the minute now. May I express again my deep appreciation for the splendid courtesy and cordiality and all that has come to us during our stay with you? I am sorry I cannot stay during your whole Session. I would like to be present when you get into the business session and get to arguing a little bit. I like that. There is only one fault with the Eastern Star; the lady folks sit back and let the men do most of the arguing. I think they should do their part in arguing in the Chapter room, and I should like to be present during your discussions.

"May I wish for you continued success for the rest of your time in the East and extend a very cordial invitation to you to join the rank of 'has-beens' after tomorrow? May I congratulate the incoming officers and

wish for you much success."

One year ago I started on a wonderful journey through the Eastern Star world. Today my journey is ended and I am grateful for the opportunity of bringing to you a glimpse of the vast accomplishments of other Grand Jurisdictions.

During the year it has been my privilege to review fifty-seven proceedings.

Most beautiful have been the settings of all Grand Chapter Sessions.

The various sessions, ranging from one day in Scotland and Rhode Island, to five in Pennsylvania, were held in stately ball rooms, magnificent temples, gorgeously decorated armories, and halls transformed into bowers of beauty by hands that spared neither time nor effort.

Music has been provided by choruses, quartets, chanters, soloists and vested choirs. The charmingly gowned officers entering the Grand Chapter room with escorts, sometimes of Rainbow Girls, Job's Daughters, Pages, Worthy Matrons,

have added stateliness and charm to all the Sessions.

There are four Sovereign Grand Bodies; namely, the General Grand Chapter, the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, the Grand Chapter of New York and the Grand Chapter of New Jersey.

There are twelve Chapters in Alaska, six in Hawaii, four in Canal Zone, two in China, nine in Nova Scotia, one in Cuba, one in Mexico, one in Philippine Islands,

five in Prince Edward Island, one in Yukon.

The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland has dominion over the Grand Chapter of Scotland and over Chapters in England, Ireland, Italy, New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, Iceland, and India. All of these Chapters use practically the same Ritual as we do, with the exception of the Grand Chapters of New York and New Jersey.

The Ritual is translated into Spanish, German, Chinese and Italian.

The first guest of honor at all Grand Sessions is the national flag. In our own beloved United States it is "The Stars and Stripes." In Canada it is their honored "Union Jack" and often we find the O. E. S. Flag and the State Flag also honored.

The Holy Book, the divine word of God, always rests on our Altar, reminding us of our obligations and our responsibilities.

The Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mildred Schanbacher, and Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother John Hammill, honored many Grand Chapter Sessions by their presence. The addresses of these distinguished guests were interesting and inspiring.

In an address given by our Most Worthy Grand Matron, she states that over two million five hundred thousand dollars has been spent by Eastern Star Chapters for the erection, equipping, furnishing and maintaining of homes, orphanages,

hospitals, student aid and emergency relief.

We find Mayors, Judges, Governors, Worshipful Grand Masters of the Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M. of the Jurisdictions, addressing our Sessions. We are proud of this evidence of cooperation from those to whom we are related "by the dearest ties." In a number of the Grand Chapters, the office of Grand Sentinel is elective.

Schools of Instruction and the Proficiency Tests on the Ritual and Laws are growing in popularity. Some Grand Chapters request all officers to pass this test before holding office.

The Order is the largest of its kind in the world and the third largest of all

fraternal Orders.

The oldest Grand Chapter is Michigan, organized in 1867; the youngest is New

Brunswick, organized in 1930.

Illinois is the largest Grand Jurisdiction, with 846 Chapters, 201 in Chicago and 233 in Cook County. Porto Rico is the smallest, and the largest single Chapter is Beulah Chapter of Topeka, Kansas.

Quite a number of Grand Chapters arrange for special church services on the Sabbath preceding the Session, and these are well attended by the officers and

members.

Benevolence is the outstanding principle of the Order of the Eastern Star. There are forty-nine Masonic and Eastern Star Homes, twelve exclusive Eastern Star Homes and ten states provide orphanages. Connecticut has a million dollar Hospital; South Carolina has a tubercular cottage; Canada has one Eastern Star Home, and Idaho has an Eastern Star Library.

Beautiful Memorial Services are held in every Grand Jurisdiction in memory of

those sisters and brothers who have passed to the Grand Chapter on high.

One of the most important activities of our Order is the Educational Loan Fund. Forty-five Grand Jurisdictions have Educational or Student Loan Funds. Louisiana is the pioneer in this work and charges no interest on loans.

Oregon does not charge interest on loans while the borrower is in school.

South Dakota and Colorado support tubercular camps.

The first Masonic Home was built in Kentucky in 1871.

Rochester Chapter in Minnesota has a wonderful mission service at the Mayo Clinic, where last year over 3,700 members of the Eastern Star and Masonic Order received treatment.

Wisconsin has a Masonic Employment Bureau where Masons and Eastern Stars are helped to find employment.

Each member in New Hampshire contributes five cents toward their Educational Fund.

The Grand Secretary of Oklahoma has served for twenty-five years.

The Most Worthy Grand Matron of New Jersey is an ordained Minister. New Jersey also has a Right Worthy Grand Attorney.

Scotland and Alberta have men for Grand Secretaries. Massachusetts has a brother for Fraternal Correspondent.

North Carolina, Indiana, and New York have men for Grand Marshal.

Rhode Island and Wisconsin have men for Grand Organist.

The Worthy Grand Matron of Washington reports on her official visits she found: Five sisters serving as the five points of the Star; father and daughter, Worthy Patron and Worthy Matron; father and daughter, Associate Patron and Associate Matron; twin brothers, Worthy Patron and Associate Patron.

The Worthy Grand Matron of Tennessee reports finding a sister eighty-two years of age who was initiated September 10, 1932. She has the distinction of having been given the degrees of the Order in 1878, by Rob Morris personally, along with some others.

In Tennessee each child in the Masonic Home is adopted, clothed and otherwise provided for by a Chapter. Tennessee also maintains night schools for illiterate adults.

The Worthy Grand Matron (1934-1935) of Alabama has a daughter serving her mother this year as Grand Marshal.

The Associate Grand Conductress of Kentucky is the granddaughter of Rob Morris.

Illinois has an Eastern Star Sanitarium at Macon.

The Worthy Grand Matron of Quebec had the pleasure of installing her daughter as Worthy Matron of her own Chapter, an honor that comes to a Grand Matron very seldom.

The Worthy Grand Matron of Louisiana served as Grand Chaplain for the installation of the Masons. This is quite an honor, as it was the first time in the history of Louisiana Masonry that a woman had any part in a Masonic ceremony.

There are so many wonderful thoughts gathered from the Proceedings of the various jurisdictions which I wish I might include in this report. Some of these I was able to touch upon in the individual reports.

To the Fraternal Correspondents of other Grand Jurisdictions, who were most kind and generous in reviewing Delaware Grand Chapter Session, I extend greetings, grateful thanks and appreciation on behalf of this Grand Chapter.

I am grateful to our own Grand Secretary, Sister Lilly Ann Pyle, for mailing the Proceedings so promptly and her many acts of kindness to me.

A meeting of the Committee was held June 25, 1934, also April 25, 1935, at the home of our Worthy Grand Matron. At the first meeting, the following officers were elected:

Plans and forms to be used by this Grand Chapter for the Educational Loan Fund were discussed. The President appointed Brother Grover C. MacNamee, P. G. P., to correspond with our sister Jurisdictions and to select from their plans and forms the best suited to our jurisdiction.

We submit to this Grand Chapter for your approval the following:

This fund shall be known as The Educational Loan Fund of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star.

The purpose of the Fund shall be to create, preserve and administer a fund, or funds, to assist deserving students who are children of members of the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware to higher education.

Loans shall be granted for educational purposes only.

Beneficiaries under this fund shall be members, or children or adopted children of members in good standing of the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware.

Applicants for loan under this fund shall furnish a High School diploma or the equivalent, at the time of making application for initial loan.

Applications for loan shall be accompanied in all cases by a satisfactory doctor's certificate of health.

A person desirous of making application for a loan from this fund, shall state the desire to a member of the Chapter in which he or she, or a parent, holds membership; the Worthy Matron upon being notified of the desire shall appoint a committee of three members of the Chapter (excluding any relative of the applicant) who will report on the character, ability as student, and general reputation of the applicant, this report to be forwarded by the Secretary, under seal of the Chapter, to the Chairman of the Committee on Educational Loan Fund.

This committee shall be allowed sixty days for investigation before granting loan.

If an applicant for loan desires, or is required to attend a University, College or School outside the State of Delaware, this committee shall be furnished with a valid reason for same, and the unanimous approval of the committee shall be required before loan is granted.

If after investigation the application for loan is approved by the Committee, a note signed by the applicant, and one other person satisfactory to this committee as security shall be given.

All loans will be evidenced by a promissory note, or notes, bearing interest of 4% from date of loan.

Checks will be drawn jointly in favor of the Beneficiary and the School.

If, for any reason, a Beneficiary under a loan shall marry and leave school or discontinue his studies for any other reason, the loan in full with interest to date shall be due and payable immediately; should payment in full not be made at once, satisfactory arrangements for a continuance must be made with the Committee, and interest at 6% shall be due from date of leaving studies.

Applications for loan shall be made only on the regular form, furnished by this Committee for that purpose.

The maximum loan shall not exceed \$200.00 a year to any one applicant.

### **ADDRESS**

# Mrs. Frances Haun Most Worthy Grand Matron

SISTER HAUN: "I told you when I first came that I was at your service and ready to do or speak at any time or any occasion that you might ask of me; so to be consistent I cannot refuse.

"I believe that I have enjoyed this business session as much as any of you, because I am very much interested in the different discussions and the different methods which Grand Chapters use in conducting their business. I am also making a study of the different ways in which Grand Chapters conduct elections. You have no idea of the great variety in this procedure.

"I am happy to have this opportunity to tell you how much I have enjoyed being your guest and the many courtesies that you have extended me ever since coming to your city. There are some special things which I wish to say, and, lest I forget, I have made notes of them. If you will pardon me, I would like to speak of these first, just by way of parenthesis.

"I believe it is the little things that really mean the most in our work in Subordinate, Grand, and General Grand Chapters. Someone said to me just before the last Triennial Assembly: 'I suppose you have great plans outlined to accomplish, to do greater things than your predecessor.' I said, 'No.' Perhaps I am wrong not to have done so, but I haven't. I feel that if I can be true to each obligation as it comes and meet each day's duties, I have done well.

"And, since I have been in this work with the different people I have met and the people of the different countries and nations with whom I have come in contact, I really have a different conception of the brotherhood of man, the fatherhood of God, and our responsibility to those who have received the message of the Star. I believe it isn't the big things that stand out in prominence that amount to the most in our hearts, but it is the little things that we go out of our way to do. I may be wrong, but I have set myself this special goal—that I shall try to prove my worthiness of the confidence which my sisters and brothers have placed in me by finding or making an opportunity to do some little thing for someone each day, or more than once a day, if I can.

"In this connection, let's speak a word about opportunity. Most of our poets have written poems on opportunity. Some give the idea that opportunity comes but once, knocks at your door, and if you do not give it an entrance, it is gone. Others have given us the beautiful idea that opportuity comes again and again and each day gives us a fresh opportunity. I like the story of a man who in battle had his sword broken, and then said: 'Oh, what wonderful things I could have accomplished and what great service I could do if I had a sharper blade or a new sword, but this old, dull, rusty thing is no good.' He throws it down and runs away. Along comes the king's son, who stoops down and picks out of the sand this broken, rusty blade, defends the flag of his country and wins a great victory for what he considered a worthy cause. I would like to present this idea to you, not as a General Grand Officer, but as a member, that it is our responsibility to make our own opportunities. I believe there is not a day or an

hour that we cannot make an opportunity to pass on the wonderful lessons of our labyrinth.

"I have heard a great deal said recently about one's responsibility for all the ills and redresses of the world. In my own state I recently heard our very excellent Grand Master admonishing the sisters to go home and urge their husbands to attend lodge meetings more frequently and in many other things placing the great responsibility for the promotion and betterment of the world through fraternalism on the women. I heard your very excellent speaker here in this Session do the same thing, placing the greatest responsibility for the affairs of this world and for the tying in of the fraternity on women.

"Quite recently I had a young man in the early twenties come to me. He said, 'Will you talk to Mary?' Now Mary was a very attractive little lady of about sixteen. I said, 'Just what shall I say to her?' He replied, 'Don't you think she is worth saving? Well, she isn't doing as you would approve.' I asked him to be a little more specific as to just what I should talk to her about. 'Well,' he said, 'if you will talk with her, I believe you will have a great influence on her. I believe that your talking to her will help us boys to be better, to be what you want us to be.'

"So, whether we like it or not, whether we think it is fair or not, from the days of Adam on down, this responsibility has been placed on us, that the greatest single influence in this world is that of women. And influence is responsibility. Responsibility requires opportunity and we can and must make our own opportunities. We cannot be satisfied with what has gone before. We must adjust ourselves to the rapidly changing complex situations of our world today. We would not be satisfied with the automobile or the airplane or the radio of a few years ago—they have gone; they are no more.

"Science has always been seeking for the truth, but science has never dared believe it has found the truth. Once in the name of science they put spider webs on wounds, then peroxide and then iodine. Evolution goes on and on and on. But throughout all these years of science seeking for the truth, we must ever believe that truth is the highest thing that man may contemplate. There have been two great truths by Him whose Star we have seen in the East which have never changed. These two great truths on which all of the lessons of our Star are founded are the love of God and the love of our fellowmen. If we could with the members that we have throughout the world in this Order all be of one accord and exemplify in our daily lives these great lessons of honor, humility, love, generosity and faith, which our distinguished heroines teach us, a great deal more of misery and ills of humanity would be overcome. How much worth while is an office or a title or success of a social venture if in our hearts we are not true to this obligation which we took before this Sacred Altar. If we have not learned to live these lessons of our heroines, I would suggest to you a square which deserves our attention in connection with our work.

"In the first point in this square, I would place study. We need to be concerned with education, not only in the general acceptance of the term but with education in our own Chapters, in our own Order.

"How many of us know the history of our own Order and of our founder? How many of us know thoroughly the history of our own heroines? I believe it is entirely impossible to read with spirit and understanding the pages of our Ritual without each time having some new lesson suggest itself to us that we had not thought of before. I never tire of seeing and hearing our ritualistic work exemplified because it is not the same old story to me. for the people in the different states doing this work have made it their own There is a different interpretation and a different insight. There is so much that we don't think of just at the first in these lessons of our Order in each one of the Star points. Just for instance I will give a suggestion. How many of us have thought that if it had not been for a letter we would not have had this beautiful story of Electa? John, the beloved disciple, was concerned with a mother's love and interest in her children and when he finds in another country the children of this good woman, he writes to her to tell her how well they are doing. How many times do we take advantage of an opportunity to write to others to give them cheer, happiness and encouragement when we could? There are many, many lessons of each of these points that we get between the lines if we observe and study.

"The second point of that square is Worship. Study of the large sacrifices and achievements of these heroines and their lessons that are presented to us would lead us into worship. Why have we come? How many of us at our regular chapter meetings can answer that as we should? Why do we go sometimes? Could it be that you go to hear the news or to see how someone else performs her part or to see how somebody is dressed or to show that you are important there? Why have we come here? I have had a great many people, some very thoughtfully and some perhaps using the word because it sounded good, to wish for me that I might have wisdom in this work. And surely I need it. And I am impressed also with reading one little statement from someone which said, 'Honesty is the first chapter in the book of wisdom' but to my mind there is no more beautiful representation of wisdom than our words which give the answer of the wise man. That is the highest type of wisdom which I would like to have as the leader of this Order.

"Then I would come to the third point of the square. I am only giving you mere suggestions here. Into that I should add the term 'Fellowship' because I believe we would first have to have individual study which would bring us into the right spirit of worship for the Star and Him whom it represented and then into Fellowship. We say we are sisters and brothers and how much do we mean? Are we acting towards them as sisters and brothers? Are we treating them as such? Ours is a wonderful fellowship if we really make it that.

"Then I would come to the last point of the square—and that is Service. And I would have a very deep meaning by that. I would have us feel that if we would uplift others we must be uplifted ourselves. If we would come, we must first aspire. If we would rule, we must serve. If we would gain a victory, we must know how to surrender. The years march on, a magnificent process. But the significance of this is what part we will have in the process. The last two or three years have brought much confusion and now we can

see the future but dimly. Acting, thinking and achieving is surely the only formula for us. It is your privilege, it is my privilege, to be a leader into further fields that we may enjoy and help others to know a more abundant life.

"Now, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, I wish especially at this time to give my appreciative thanks to the Grand Representative of Tennessee for a very beautiful floral tribute presented to me. I wish to express my appreciation of my member of the General Grand Chapter family who is in your midst and commend her work for education. I would like to commend the excellent service and thorough manner of consideration which your Jurisprudence Committee have given to the work of this Grand Chapter. I would like to express again my appreciation for meeting here in your Grand Chapter Session with your Grand Secretary whom it was my pleasure and privilege to call my friend before you had a Grand Chapter. I am pleased to know that you want to give attention to your flag and that you have the spirit of patriotism among you. I believe we will always be careful to make a distinction between a patriotic organization and a military organization in any way.

"I hope that it may be my pleasure and privilege to meet with you again in your Grand Chapter. I can scarcely look forward to this pleasure, however, because I have consecrated my efforts upon Subordinate Chapters and our International Eastern Star Temple. I am expecting you to remember me in your thoughts and prayers as I work for these two objectives, and I may say that I am fortunate in being privileged just at this time before my planned visit to Alaska to find so many Grand Chapters meeting here near enough together that I might be with several of them and there will be a great many Grand Chapters that I will have to miss. So I can scarcely feel that it would be just the right thing, except there would be some special circumstances, to visit any one twice. I want all of you sisters and brothers to come and return my visit at our Triennial Assembly in September, 1937, at Indianapolis. We have decided upon our building, which is large enough to seat everybody and we are going to seat all of you, I am sure we can, on the first floor so we will have no trouble with those who develop heart trouble over-night. Then again, I want you to be ready with your beautiful State song and other appropriate songs to take part with us. I want to feature music and assembly singing at this meeting. I want you to come ready to feel that you have a part even though you are just a visitor at this Session and in all matters that come before our people at this time.

"I want you to think of me as I go from you not as a Most Worthy Grand Matron who has been to see you but as a friend who is ready to serve you and help you in every way possible at all times."

#### REPORT OF JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

Sister Amy E. Meyer, P. G. M., made a motion that this recommendation be adopted. It was seconded by Brother Walter E. Sawdon, P. G. P.

After discussion, the recommendation was withdrawn.

### REPORT OF INTERNATIONAL O. E. S. TEMPLE COMMITTEE

Under the Resolution adopted at Tampa this committee consisting of the Most Worthy Grand Matron, Most Worthy Grand Patron, Right Worthy Grand Trustees, and four members appointed by the Most Worthy Grand Matron, was given power to proceed with the purchase of a suitable site and with the completion of the Temple Plan, under the limitations prescribed in the Resolution.

So important a trust requires that no haste be made but that sufficient time be taken to make every inquiry and detail come to light.

"However, we want our membership to know that the task has been undertaken with earnestness, the plan is progressing and definite details will be sent out at the earliest possible moment. In the meantime, you who so generously subscribed to this great Temple Plan must keep the matter before your associates in the Order that we may have their cooperation for its completion.

"Contributions are still coming in and a great interest is being manifested by many Jurisdictions. We urge that you make every effort to inform the individual members of this plan so that they may contribute and thus become part builders and owners in the completed Temple."

SISTER CHAPIN: "Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron. officers and members, you all know it is a joy to me to be here in Delaware again. As Brother Chapin says, we ought to have been here before. We have been going south for several winters. This year I did feel able to come. Some of you who were members before your Grand Chapter was formed, possibly will remember that your Chapter was the first Chapter I visited officially after my election as Most Worthy Grand Matron and I certainly spent happy times with members in Delaware. I spent a week here visiting your Chapter. I can't tell you what a help it was to me. I visited you with some trepidation at first because it was my first official work. But when I came to know you better, it gave me confidence in my work with other Chapters. I knew when we formed the Grand Chapter of Delaware that you would be just as successful as you have been. Your work has been splendid. After my visit here in the formation of your Grand Chapter, that was my first trip. We visited these four splendid Chapters in the Canal Zone, and spent two weeks among them. We enjoyed so much our visit there, and I enjoyed the friendships I formed there.

"Several of you attended the General Grand Chapter, and your Grand Matron and those who went have brought back to you the work of the General Grand Chapter, which brings to you a greater realization of the extent of the work of Eastern Star. SISTER HAUN: "I am going to say, and very sincerely, how much I enjoyed the very excellent reports of the Grand Matron and Grand Patron in this Grand Chapter Session and also the committee reports. There are two special things in connection with your Grand Chapter for which I wish to commend you, Worthy Grand Matron; one is the way that you call your sessions to order and call them off. I am trying to discourage the Grand Chapters of calling from labor to refreshment and from refreshment to labor.

"One thing for which I wish to commend all of you is your quiet attention during attending at the Altar. To my mind it is a very great sacrilege not to be reverent at that time. I am sorry to say I have not found that in all Grand Chapters.

"There has been quite a good deal said by different people here about the tongue. It is supposed to be the weaker sex who want to look to it and which needs to be most careful about the tongue. I want to call your attention to this fact that as members of the Order, we have a very great responsibility in this respect. That has been noted by all nations.

"The Greek said, 'The boneless tongue, so small and weak, can crush and kill.' The Turk said, 'The tongue can destroy a far greater horde than can the sword,' and the Persian warned 'Don't let your tongue cut off your head.' The Chinese phrased it thus, 'The tongue can speak a word whose speed does outspeed the sea.' The Hebrew admonished, 'Though the feet may slip, ne'er let the tongue.' The Sacred Word is the best of all—'Who keeps his tongue, keeps his soul.' "

#### REMARKS AND RESOLUTION

SISTER MEYER: "I am not talking now as a member of the Jurisprudence Committee but would like to speak for myself. I have been seriously concerned with a paragraph in our Proceedings of 1934, and I should like it to be thoroughly understood that I am talking as an individual and not involving the opinion of anyone else. I said this afternoon that I so thoroughly enjoyed freedom and liberty that I would not deprive another human being of it. That is true in all phases of work. I have been engaged in work of the Eastern Star since 1918. I can safely say without fear of contradiction from anyone that I have never been arbitrary or unfair to any member of this Grand Jurisdiction, neither have I failed to assume any responsibility which was mine nor have I at any time failed to face facts.

"At this time without going any further into the matter, I want to offer the following resolution which may be considered rather drastic but it

thoroughly expresses my opinion.

"Resolved, That this Grand Chapter record its disapproval of a discourteous, egotistical, arbitrary and dictatorial manner on the part of a presiding officer, and urge that all future presiding officers be mindful of their obligation to all members of the Order; that they recognize the supremacy of this Grand Chapter over its affairs and thoroughly acquaint themselves with the rules and regulations of this Grand Chapter."

Sister Louise W. Green, P. G. M., seconded the resolution. After discussion, the resolution was adopted.

# REMARKS AND RESOLUTION

# By the Worthy Grand Patron

BROTHER MILLER: "In 1931, a resolution was passed which provided for filing the names of candidates for office in this Grand Chapter; that those names may be filed with the Grand Secretary either through Subordinate Chapters or by any member of the Grand Chapter ten days in advance of the Grand Chapter Session; the names of candidates to be submitted to the members of the Grand Chapter at the time of the election.

"In 1932, the report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee referred to this resolution, stated that inasmuch as the Constitution of the Grand Chapter of Delaware provides that there shall be no nominations for office in this Grand Chapter, and believing the resolution to be contrary to the Constitution, submitted an amendment to the Constitution to provide for filing names of candidates for office as outlined in the resolution. The amendment received its first reading at that time, but upon its second reading in 1933 was killed.

"Now there is still more or less difference of opinion among our members as to whether the old resolution still stands in spite of the regulation in the Constitution, and as to whether we might file names of candidates for office. In order to clarify the situation, I submit this resolution:

"'Resolved, That the resolution relating to filing names of candidates for office as reported on Page 90, Proceedings of 1931, be rescinded at this time."

# ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER

### Approved Recommendations

- 1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks.—1922.
- 2. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.—1922.
- 3. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.—1922.
- 4. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination.—1922.
- 5. That no member be allowed to vouch for anyone unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.—1922.
- 6. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess; by doing so closes the Chapter. -1922.
- 7. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door.—1922.
- 8. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.—1922.
- 9. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls.—1922.
- 10. That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patrons' Jewels.—1922.
- 11. That examinations for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record.—1923.
- 12. That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledgers, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.—1923.
- 13. That one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County.—1923.
- 14. That the proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner: One copy to each Grand Officer, to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron, to each Grand Representative of Delaware, to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter; three copies to each Grand Chapter; five copies to each Chapter in Delaware.—1923-1930.
- 15. That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official cover for Delaware.—1923.
- 16. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting.—1924.
- 17. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close.—1924.
  - 18. That public installations be discontinued.-1924.

- 19. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as Obligation Night in which to have a Special Service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and Ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter.—1925.
- 20. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations," adding those made and approved each year.—1925.
- That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings.

  —1926.
- 22. That Officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations.—1926.
- 23. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparation rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed.—1926.
- 24. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner.—1926.
  - 25. That the sale of anything in the Chapter Room be prohibited.—1926.
- 26. That the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.—1926.
- 27. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting a duplicate shall be sent at the same time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.—1926.
- 28. That in the printing of all future Annual Proceedings of this Grand Chapter bids shall be secured from three reputable printers in Wilmington, and the contract awarded to the lowest and best bidder by the Committee.—1927.
- 29. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the name of the candidates initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter Rooms.—1928.
- 30. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given to the Worthy Grand Matron and each one of the members of the Board of Grand Instructors, to be returned to the Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. Also that a copy be furnished to the Worthy Matron of each Subordinate Chapter to be turned over to her successor at the close of her term of office.—1928.
- 31. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office.—1928.
- 32. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installation.—1928.
- 33. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention.

Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Sec-

retary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter.—1929.

- 34. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on demit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation.—1930.
- 35. That all members and visitors be required to fill out an identification slip at all Chapter meetings, to be collected by the Conductress and Associate Conductress when proving the Chapter, and that the Chapter Registry Book be kept from these slips. Blank slips to be secured from the Grand Secretary.—1930.
- 36. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.—1930.
- 37. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss.—1930.
- 38. That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter as amended to date be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session.)—1930.
- 39. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, for approval.—1930.
- 40. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose.—1930.
- 41. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months). —1930.
- 42. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petition to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter.—1930.
  - 43. That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each.—1930.

44. That a price of \$5.00 (five dollars) be placed on Secret Work and \$2.00 (two dollars) on the Diagram of the Labyrinth.—1930.

45. That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star.—1931.

46. That a space be provided for the signature of the installing officer on the list of officers installed.—1931.

47. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron, and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any member interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire.—1931.

48. That a form, for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary.—1931.

49. That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign proceedings after a period of five years, and that due care be taken in disposing of them.—1931.

50. That a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter (marked "Property of Grand Chapter" and with Seal affixed) be given to each member of the Jurisprudence, Constitution and By-Laws Committees and to each elective officer and returned to Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. That copies be sold to interested members of the Order for twenty cents each.—1932.

51. That the Subordinate Chapters be required to use uniform order blanks when ordering supplies from the Grand Secretary's office, to be printed and supplied free to the Chapters by the Grand Chapter.—1932.

52. That the list of names of the members of subordinate Chapters be omitted and that in place thereof a Chapter directory be printed to contain the name of the Chapter, place, and time of meeting, the names of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, with the name and address of the Secretary.

That the margins and spacing be reduced, and the present cover page design be printed when the embossing dies now in use are worn out.—1932.

53. That a Grand Instructor be required to pass the examination to secure a Grade A Certificate not less than two months after being elected.—1933.

54. That the Grand Matron have the power to appoint a member who holds a Grade A Certificate, that the appointment of the Grand Matron shall be effective until the elected officer qualifies or until the next annual session of the Grand Chapter, when the office shall be filled by election.—1933.

55. That no practice meetings be held on Sunday.-1933.

56. That the approved recommendation, No. 34, 1930, be rescinded and that the Sentinel see that all members and visitors register in the Register Book.—1933.

57. That the Book of Instruction on Page 8-Reception of Grand Officers on Official Visits be changed from "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Conductress and Associate Conductress have finished proving the Chapter" to, "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Chapter has been declared open." My reason for this recommendation is that Grand Honors should not be given when the Bible is closed and the Chapter not opened.—1934.

58. That the names of all Past Matrons and Past Patrons be printed in the Proceedings after the names of the Officers—1934.

- 59. That the Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee composed of four sisters and one brother to be known as an "Educational Fund Committee." One member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year. Thereafter one to be appointed each year to serve for five years. Said committee to have the custody of all money properly belonging to the fund. All disbursements to be signed by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the committee.—1934.
- 60. That in the future in the compilation of the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, the Grand Secretary be instructed to report on all motions, resolutions or amendments as follows:—"after discussion the following motion, resolution or amendment (as the case may be) being properly moved and seconded was adopted or rejected (as the case may be) by the Grand Chapter."—1934.
- 61. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given members of the Juris-prudence Committee. These books to remain the property of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and to be returned to the Grand Chapter at the completion of each member's term.—1934.
- 62. That the signs of the Five Degrees, as interpreted in the 1935 Schools of Instruction, be accepted for this Grand Chapter.—1935.
- 63. That the members be permitted to remain seated during the Opening March in Subordinate Chapters and called up when the position referred to in the Ritual is assumed.—1935.
- 64. That no Life Memberships shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such membership.)—1935.
- 65. That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patron shall have the same restriction as the Worthy Patron regarding the Pink Slip.—1935.
- 66. That all petitions for Affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star Membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered.—1935.
- 67. That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdiction.—1935. See pages 37-38.
- 68. That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to bring the Book of Instruction to date in accordance with the Ritual and that slips be printed to take care of these changes.—1935.
- 69. That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruction. This is in accordance with the General Grand Chapter.—1935.
- 70. That a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with the Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter.—1935.
- 71. That those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the opening of the Grand Chapter Session.—1935.
- 72. That in order to facilitate the making of proper records, secretaries of Subordinate Chapters be instructed to list on their annual reports both the new and old names of members whose names have been changed since the issuance of the latest annual report.—1935.

### Approved Decisions

1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degrees in a Chapter, when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petitioner, is null and void. —1922.

2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in the Chapter during the

Session? No.-1922.

- 3. The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session.—1925.
  - 4. Can we hold rehearsal at members' homes? No.-1926.
- 5. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election.—1926.
- 6. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.—1926.
- 7. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter, and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission.—1928.
- 8. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the Obligation? No. Members can arise and repeat Obligation when presiding officer calls for it.—1928.
- 9. After a petitioner has been balloted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot.—1929.
- 10. A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother.—1929.
- 11. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person who is not eligible to petition for the degrees.—1930.
- A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents.—1930.
- 13. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record. —1930.
- 14. A petition for affiliation on demit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual.—1930.
- 15. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon.—1930.
- 16. By-Laws of a subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a supply, as interpreted in my official letter number one.—1930.

17. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover the cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, 4), plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendation of Jurisprudence Committee.)—1930.

18. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron.-1930.

19. That the Chapter Register be kept from the "identification slips." The

Sentinel shall copy the names from the slips into the Registry book.—1931.

20. That in accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Section 44, when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees, and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year.-1931.

21. That no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices at the same

time in a subordinate Chapter.-1931.

22. That "A Student Loan Fund" be established. That said sum of \$93.91 be put on interest and some amount, no matter how small, be added each year.—1933.

23. That Secretaries do not read the names of rejected candidates in other Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction and that secretaries keep proper record of all said applicants.-1933.

24. Page 61, 1929 Proceedings, "do not give honorary membership to any one,"

this law rescinded .- 1933.

25. That this Grand Chapter sponsor the Order of Job's Daughters.—1933.

26. That this Grand Chapter have a yearly benefit during the month of July or August and that fifty per cent of the proceeds be set aside for an Educational Fund and fifty per cent be put in the general treasury for Grand Chapter work.—1933.

That a member who is in arrears two and one-half years for dues and has received suspension notice may visit this Grand Chapter by another Sister of the

same Chapter vouching for her.-1935.

28. That a demitted or suspended Past Matron has the right to wear her Jewel, because it is her personal property; however, it does not seem to be good taste. -1935.
