HE Electa Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware was like a gleaming jewel in a magnificent setting as the 16th Annual Session of that Grand Body opened in the City of Wilmington on May 19th in the DuBarry Room of the Hotel DuPont. The Grand East was framed by white fan-shaped trellises covered with crimson

rambler roses, above which appeared in red letters on a silver background the motto "Love One Another". At each side of the entrance to the East stood a huge green basket of long-stemmed American Beauty roses and green ferns. The background was banked with palms and cybodium ferns, and a white cross outlined in red lights showed from the verdant green like a beautiful star. Large bouquets of red roses graced the white covered desks of the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer. White baskets at the Grand Star Points' stations were filled with symbolic flowers. The crimson carpet, the white furniture clustered around the electrically lighted altar, and the Ivory walls and crimson draperies of the DuBarry Room completed a picture which will long remain in the memory of those who attended the session.

Promptly at 2 o'clock, the meeting was called to order. Mayor Walter W. Bacon of the City of Wilmington was escorted into the Chapter room by the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother James Duncan, and introduced by the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Bertha Marion Smith.

ADDRESS BY W. W. BACON

Mayor of the City of Wilmington "Worthy Matron and Members of the Eastern Star, I assure you that it is a great pleasure for me as Mayor of the City of Wilmington to extend a few words of greeting and welcome to the local and visiting members.

"We want you folks to know that we consider it a great honor to our City to have the members of the Eastern Star from the State of Delaware gather here, and we also extend a most cordial and hearty welcome to those from without our State. We are delighted that you have chosen Wilmington as your meeting place, and we realize that we are going to profit by it and certainly hope that every one of you will enjoy your visit to our City.

"I know from my own experience in fraternal affairs at such meetings as this there will necessarily be a great deal of business to take care of, but I hope that you will find time while in Wilmington to carefully look over our City and its many attractions, and that you may be impressed with and carry away with you fond recollections of your visit here. I know you will carry a favorable impression of our people and their hospitality, and hope that there may be instilled in each of you a strong desire to return for many future visits.

"We in Wilmington are at present planning to celebrate the Three Hundredth Anniversary of the founding of our City in June, 1938. During this celebration, we are anticipating more than one hundred thousand visitors to our City, including several shiploads from Sweden who naturally are greatly interested in this Celebration.

"We are anticipating the presence of the Crown Prince and Princess and other members of Nobility from Sweden, as well as the President of the United States and several of his official family.

"In order to make such a celebration successful we are inviting the participation of all our citizens and are particularly stressing the possibilities of such fraternal organizations as the Eastern Star. I am quite sure that as time goes on and our plans are made public your organization will be thoroughly interested and I am going to take this opportunity to invite you to endeavor to make your own plans for participation in what I am quite sure will be an event long to be remembered.

"While I have been a member of the Masonic Fraternity for a long time and have held most of the offices connected therewith, this is the first opportunity I have ever had to meet with a Ladies' Organization, and I am told that while I have been invited to welcome you, I will also shortly be invited to retire

"I again wish to extend Wilmington's warmest greetings and wish you a most successful conference, and hope that you may enjoy your stay in Wilmington as much as we enjoy having you with us."

Since Mayor Bacon is not a member of our Order, he was then escorted

from the room by Brother Duncan. The Grand Officers also retired.

The American Flag, carried by the Grand Marshal, Sister Helen B. Reed, and a large white Bible, carried by the Grand Chaplain, Sister Hattie E. Wainwright, were brought into the Chapter Room. The Bible was placed upon the Altar while the Flag was dipped over the Book by Sister Reed who then placed it in a position of honor at the right of the Worthy Grand Matron's station in the East. This ceremony symbolized our loyalty to God and Country.

Past Grand Matron, Sister Julia Marr Story, and Past Grand Patron, Brother Harry F. Newlin, first Grand Matron and first Grand Patron of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, were escorted to the Grand East by the Grand Marshal. Sister Story formally called the meeting to order, requested the Grand Marshal to take her station and instructed her to invite the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and other Grand Officers to enter the

Chapter Room.

The approach of the Grand Officers was announced by Brother Charles V. Cleaver, herald. The Grand Marshal, carrying a baton topped by an electrically lighted star showing the five colors of the Order, led the Grand Officers into the Chapter Room. Each Officer wore a corsage of red roses tied with silver ribbon, a gift of the Worthy Grand Matron. The Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Patron and Grand Sentinel wore red rose buds on their coat lapels. The Worthy Grand Matron carried a huge arm bouquet of red roses tied with silver ribbon, a gift from Sister Story. Sister Edith Woodmansey sang "Open the Gates of the Temple" while the Grand Officers entered the Chapter Room and took their proper positions within the labyrinth.

Past Grand Matron, Sister Julia M. Story, extended the following wel-

come to the Worthy Grand Matron:

"Worthy Grand Matron:

"To be the one to welcome you as our Grand Matron at this, our 16th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter, is one of the greatest privileges and pleasures that could be accorded me.

"For this occasion you have selected the most beautiful point of our Star, the one that stands for so much, being built on love. Without this the world would be a cold and desolate place in which to live. In our first lessons of childhood we are taught that God is Love, and this lesson grows with us as time goes down through the years. It gives me a thrill to be the one to greet you on this occasion at the 'Electa Session', as you were appointed my Grand Electa in the first line of officers of the Grand Chapter of Delaware.

"You have been in constant service ever since, doing your work well, with fervency and with great love for the Order, and you have attained the highest honor that can be bestowed upon you in your State.

"I hope this session will be most instructive and harmonious, and may your subordinate chapters go back to their chapters feeling that they have been well repaid for coming here.

"May God bless and guide you, and may all your acts be filled with loving kindness, ever remembering to acknowledge Him in all our ways, that He will direct our paths.

"We will call this our 'Love Session', for we must 'Love One Another'."
Sister Story then directed the Grand Marshal to escort the Worthy Grand
Matron and Worthy Grand Patron to the East. Past Grand Patron Newlin
welcomed the Worthy Grand Patron as follows:

"Worthy Grand Patron James Duncan, it is a great pleasure to have the privilege of welcoming you to this Grand Chapter Session.

"This Grand Chapter has always been fortunate in having Grand Patrons who when called upon to preside have never been arbitrary or dictatorial in their manner but have always filled the station with dignity, courtesy and kindness.

"During the many years of our association, I have always found you to be a man of sterling character and I know that you with your knowledge of our constitution, rules and regulations will not only be of assistance to your Worthy Grand Matron, but you will also reflect credit to this Grand Chapter, and I wish for you and your Worthy Grand Matron a very pleasant and beneficial session."

As the Grand Marshal started toward the East, the officers of St. John's Chapter No. 4, of which Sister Smith is a member, each carrying a long stemmed red rose and a crystal goblet, symbols of the fifth point of our Star, Sister Smith's first appointment in the Grand Chapter, formed an arch of roses under which the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron walked to the East. Sister Lillian Arters sang "God Will Take Care of You" as the two took their stations. The roses were then gathered into a bouquet and presented to the Worthy Grand Matron by the Worthy Matron of St. John's Chapter, Sister Elizabeth George. Grand Honors were given to the presiding officers.

The Officers of St. John's Chapter, carrying the crystal goblets, then gave a well-executed drill in which the word "Love" was formed.

The Grand Officers took their respective stations and all was in readiness for the work of the 16th Annual Session to begin.

The Rev. Harry J. Wright, member of St. John's Chapter No. 4, gave the following Invocation:

"Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, we come to thee with praise and thanksgiving in our hearts, for what we have seen and heard here this afternoon. Thou art the source of all that is true, and beautiful and good.

"We thank Thee for the Order of the Eastern Star, and for the beautiful teachings which are taught us as members of this beloved fraternity. We thank Thee for the light of Thy truth which reveals to us love as the secret —yes the power of a truly noble life. May we all be faithful to these high and noble ideals which have been taught by precept and by example in the work in which we are engaged.

"Bless, we pray Thee, the work that we have in hand and at heart. May this session of the Grand Chapter be both profitable and inspiring. May we ever feel that we are workers together with Thee, and that this work is Thy work. Help us to comfort and to cheer one another along the pathway of life. And may all that we do, bring encouragement and help to others in the great task of building noble moral character.

"And finally, after a life well spent in Thy service here on earth, may we be gathered together in that eternal fellowship of Heaven, where we shall continue to serve Thee, and where we shall sing Thy praises in the house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens, with our loved ones who have gone before us.

"We offer our prayer in Jesus' name. Amen."

The 16th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware was then opened by the Worthy Grand Matron in regular form. During the ceremony of opening the Bible, Sisters Elizabeth Pierce and Edith Work sang "The Old Fashioned Book on the Altar" to the tune of "There's An Old Spinning Wheel":

"There's an old-fashioned Book on the Alter Telling stories of the long, long ago How He came as a babe in the manger With the Star shining brightly above.

It seems, I can hear Him in the garden
As He prayed alone, and all because of me,
There's an old-fashioned Book on the Altar
Telling us of His wonderful love."

The Grand Secretary then read the Roll Call of Officers and Constituent Chapters.

TRIBUTE TO THE AMERICAN FLAG Helen Billsborough Reed, Grand Marshal

"E Pluribus Unum—out of many, one—was the motto adopted by the founders of the Republic when they formed a union of thirteen states. To

these we have added, from time to time, thirty-five more. The founders were convinced, as we are, that a strong nation could be built through federtion. They were also convinced, as we are, that in America, under a free government, many peoples would make one nation. Throughout all these years we have admitted to our country and to citizenship immigrants from the diverse lands of Europe. We had faith that thereby we would best serve ourselves and mankind. This faith has been justified. The United States has grown great. The immigrants and their immediate descendants have proved themselves as loyal as any citizens of the country. Liberty has knit us closely together as Americans.

"There is the national Flag! He must be cold indeed who can look upon its folds rippling in the breeze without pride of country. If he be in a foreign land, the flag is companionship and country itself with all its endearments.

"Who, as he sees it, can think of a State merely? Whose eyes, once fastened upon its radiant trophies, can fail to recognize the image of the whole nation?

"It has been called a floating piece of poetry, and yet I know not if it has an intrinsic beauty beyond other ensigns. Its highest beauty is in what it symbolizes. It is because it represents all, that all gaze at it with delight and reverence.

"It is a piece of bunting lifted in the air, but it speaks sublimely, and every part has a voice. Its stripes of alternate red and white proclaim the original union of thirteen states to maintain the Declaration of Independence. Its stars of white on a field of blue proclaim that union of states constituting our national constellation, which receives a new star with every new state.

"The two together signify union, past and present. The very colors have a language which was officially recognized by our fathers. White is for purity, red for valor, blue for justice; and all together, bunting, stripes, stars, and colors blazing in the sky, make the flag of our country—to be cherished by all our hearts, to be upheld by all our hands.

"Don't be ashamed when your throat chokes and the tears come, as you see it flying from the masts of our ships on all the seas or floating from every flagstaff of the Republic. You will never have a worthier emotion. Reverence it as you would reverence the signature of the Deity.

"Listen! Our organist is playing the national anthem—"The Star Spangled Banner'. Stand up—and others will stand with you—sing it as you have never sung it before."

Everyone present joined in singing the "Star Spangled Banner".

TRIBUTE TO THE STATE FLAG S. A. Hellen

Worthy Patron, Five Points Chapter No. 13

"We have just paid tribute to the flag of our country—"The Stars and Stripes'. We are now to do likewise to the flag of our State.

"It is not our intention to dwell at length either upon the history of our State or flag as time will not permit, however it may be of interest to mention some of the principal events.

"In November 1637, two ships (if they may be so called), the Kalmar Nyckel (Key of Kalmar) and the Vogel Grip (Bird Griffin) sailed from Gothenburg, Sweden.

"Delayed by storm, it was not until the middle of March, 1638, that they landed on the banks of the Minquas Kill (Christiana River) at a point within the present limits of the City of Wilmington, where a ledge of rocks formed a natural wharf. It is not proposed here to relate how this little group carried on, of their difficulties or hardships; it is sufficient to say that they did carry on.

"This then was the origin of the State of Delaware and the first settlement in the entire Delaware River Valley.

"The history of our State has not been fully told. The story of her achievements on the field of battle, the prominent part she has taken in the formation and preservation of the Union has been neglected.

"The flag of our State as officially adopted consists of a blue background, in the center of which is a yellow diamond. On the diamond is the seal of the State, bearing the Hunter and Sportsman, the Oxen and Sheaf of Wheat.

"Our State, like others of the Union, has upon its flag emblems indicative of Agriculture and Commerce, Plenty and Prosperity. Delaware is indeed a land of plenty. Rich in historical lore and traditions. Our forefathers have handed down to us a heritage of which we can justly be proud.

"In conclusion we may say that Virginia has her Jamestown, Maryland her St. Mary's, Massachusetts her Plymouth Rock, but we have the first State, the first Star and the first Flag."

The Grand Body joined in singing "Our Delaware".

The following TRIBUTE was given TO THE EASTERN STAR FLAG by Past Worthy Matron, Sister Kate Smith, after which the Grand Body joined in singing "Star of the East" led by the Sussex Chapter No. 7:

"To our beautiful Eastern Star Flag I would pay tribute! Our flag, whose folds unfurl a message of charity, love and trust, and it is only when we make these virtues the keynote of our heart, that the light of our Order

will send its radiance near and far, and each member reflect the glory of our beautiful Eastern Star. If you look into the star decked heaven on a cool, clear night, if you have seen the rainbow after the rain, you can understand how—

"We took the BLUE of courage,
And fashioned a point of the star.
To this we added humility,
And made a YELLOW bar.
We took the WHITE of loyalty
To kindred, country and friend
We added faith and unfaltering trust
In God's love, even to the end.
For faith we made a GREEN ray.
For love the flag's RED bar,
And so we fashioned the banner
Of our beautiful Eastern Star."

Questions and Answers

- Q. On Past Matrons' night should the Past Matron presiding open the Chapter?
 - A. No. The Chapter should be opened by the Worthy Matron. Approved.
- Q. Can a Chapter accept an application from a young girl lacking a few weeks of being eighteen?
- A. No. See Page 155, Ritual—"All applicants for degrees shall be at least eighteen years of age."

Approved.

- Q. Can the Officers of a Chapter form the word C. W. in their opening march?
- A. Page 36—16 in 1935 Proceedings "Questions and Answers": "The only place the C. M. or the C. W. is to be used is during the initiatory and installation ceremonies."

Approved.

- Q. How long may an applicant wait to be initiated after election?
- A. Page 49, Sec. 29—"The fee for the degrees shall be returned to any petitioner who does not present herself or himself for initiation within ONE YEAR FROM DATE OF ELECTION."

Approved.

Recommendations

- 1. That Chapters urge their committees on applications to be more particular in their investigation. This is the most important committee in your Chapter.
- 2. Ascertain all facts available, regarding the character, etc., of the Petitioner, so as to be absolutely certain of their worthiness of becoming a member of our Order, before signing your report on investigation.
- Inquire if one Recommender has known the Petitioner at least six months.
- That the Associate Matron march to her station when the Worthy Matron says: "The Officers will take their respective stations." Now she falls in line with the other officers and is the last officer to reach her station.

Adopted.

5. That the money allowed by the Grand Chapter for the expenses of the Worthy Grand Matron when attending the General Grand Chapter Session, which is held every three years, be divided equally among the two Junior Past Grand Matrons and the Worthy Grand Matron in office at the time of the General Grand Chapter Session, provided all three can attend. If impossible for one of the Junior Past Grand Matrons to attend, then the money to be divided equally between the remaining Junior Past Grand Matron and the Worthy Grand Matron. If neither of the Junior Past Grand Matrons can attend, then the entire amount to be given to the Worthy Grand Matron.

Not adopted.

6. I would recommend that newly-made members be instructed in the Secret Work before too long a time has elapsed, so that they may be able to pass a creditable examination.

Adopted.

7. I would recommend that the Grand Representatives be offered an opportunity in their respective Chapters to give a talk concerning the jurisdiction they represent.

Not adopted.

8. I would recommend that there shall be no open Rituals in the Chapter Room except the one used by the Treasurer for prompting.

Not adopted.

Irregularities

1. The flag being placed in the Chapter Room outside of any Officer's station, leaning against the north wall. The flag is our guest of honor and should be placed in the East at the right of the Presiding Officer and as near on a line with the Presiding Officer as possible.

2. The Warder leaving the door unguarded at recess.

3. Members having Rituals open while Officers are exemplifying the Work. This is disconcerting to officers.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

Since forwarding my report to the Jurisprudence Committee, the following has come to me for official action:

May 5-Signing checks No. 133, 134, 135, 136, 137.

Upon the recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron of Quebec, I have the pleasure of appointing Sister Carrie Jordan, P. M., Patricia Chapter, Grand Representative of the Grand Chapter of Delaware in Quebec.

Questions and Answers

My dear Worthy Grand Matron:

At our last stated meeting a Past Patron of our Chapter, after having declared that there was nothing on record to show that we had ever received any dispensation to move from the Community House to the Church House, made the following motion:

To avoid any question of illegality all action taken in these several years since moving into the Church House be declared legal.

The fact that this change in our meeting place was made more than seven years ago while we were under dispensation was brought out before the motion was made.

- (a) Was the motion in order?
- (b) Can the minutes be approved, corrected, or additions made after they have once been approved?

(c) Can any action be taken by the chapter illegally and afterward be

declared legal by vote in a subordinate chapter?

(d) How should a motion that is out of order be disposed of after it has been adopted and spread upon the minutes?

I will thank you for a decision.

In answer to your letter of April 27, 1937. When you moved from the Community House to the Church House, you were not a Chartered Chapter under the Grand Chapter, therefore, you did not require a dispensation to move, you did not have a Charter to move.

The motion made by the Past Grand Patron is out of order, as everything that transpired in the several years he mentioned was under Charter and legal. If illegal his motion would not make it legal. The Worthy Grand Matron would have to declare it legal under her seal.

To dispose of a motion that is out of order, have it voted on to amend the minutes by striking out the motion. Two-thirds vote is necessary. Hope this is clear.

Dear Sister Smith:

At our stated meeting of April 22nd, the following motion was made: "That the Secretary be authorized to take such steps to correct the seal."

After discussion as to whether the seal would need any correction, the motion was withdrawn and the following motion made: "That the Worthy Matron get in touch with the Worthy Grand Matron to find the right thing to do and do it that way."

As you know, you granted a Special Dispensation to move the charter from the Church House to the Masonic Lodge Building at Newport.

Will you please give us your decision on this matter?

REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND PATRON

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

In every great program of athletic contests, when strength, endurance, skill and speed are tested there is always a relay race. As my year as Worthy Grand Patron draws to a close, I feel very much like I imagine one of the team of runners in such a relay race must feel. Twelve months ago my predecessors completed his section of the race, and, like a clansman of old, gave into my hands the wand for the next period of running. Experience has taught us that we are most happy when our minds are occupied and we have something to do. The time is here for us to do our part: let us resolve to give our very best.

Smith, and the staff of Grand Officers on every official visit to the various subordinate chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. We were graciously received and royally entertained, and I again want to express my appreciation for the beautiful gifts received on these occasions.

I attended a reception given by St. John's Chapter in honor of the Worthy Grand Matron and other Grand Officers who are members of their Chapter.

I wish to express my appreciation to my home Chapter Five Points No. 13, for the delightful reception tendered in my honor and Sister Josephine Wright, Grand Martha, for the courtesies and lovely gifts I received since I have been a Grand Officer. I shall always remember the very corial welcome extended to me by the Worthy Matron, Sister Mildred Grubb, whenever I attended the chapter meetings.

Hild, Electa; Grace Cottman, Warder; Paul Hughes, Sentinel.

I was assisted by the following Grand Officers; Sister Lilly Ann Pyle, Grand Secretary; Sister Martha Krapf, Grand Conductress; Sister Carrie Gemmill, Associate Conductress; Sister Hattie Wainwright; Grand Chaplain; Sister Helen B. Reed, Grand Marchal; Sister Ellen G. Duncan, Grand Warder;; and Brother William Nixon, Grand Sentinel.

After the institution of the Chapter, Five Points Chapter No. 13, exemplified the degrees in a very effective and efficient manner. After a recess the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Bertha M. Job's Daughters

I visited the Bethel of Job's Daughters during my year. The work of these young ladies is an inspiration. Wonderful opportunity is presented for molding of desirable qualities in young womanhood. Doubtless time will prove past members of Job's Daughters valuable Chapter Members.

Recommendations No.1

I have been very much concerned about the loss of membership through suspension for non-payment of dues since the so-called boom days of 1929-30.

We hear a great deal about recovery plans of different kinds. Is it not worth while to give our time and thought to a recovery program that will return at least a majority to our Chapters as active members?

I recommend that the Worthy Matron of every Chapter shall immediately appoint a MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE (each year), acting herself as exofficio Chairman of this Committee. The Membership Committee should obtain from the Secretary a list of all members suspended since 1929-30. Give careful consideration to this list. Conditions have changed. Many of these members were formerly, at one time, loyal and interested members. They may now be desirous of renewing their membership. Give them this opportunity. It is our purpose to see that the wives, daughters, mothers, sisters and widows of Master Masons are given the opportunity. Let us not over look the possibilities of adding new and desirable members to strengthen the work and purpose of the local chapters and the Grand Chapter of Delaware.

Worthy Matrons, work out your own plan. You understand your own local problems, conditions, and needs. Let this year of 1937 be a year of real service. On or before April 1st, 1938, report to the Grand Chapter the number of restored members.

That the incoming Gand Matron appoint a special Committee of three to compile the reports from the subordinate Chapters and give a detailed report at the next Grand Chapter Session.

Adopted.

Recommendations No. 2

That the Worthy Grand Patron make written report to his successor in Office of all outstanding petitions for dispensations and any preliminary work that has been done to create interest in localities where no Chapter exists. I make this recommendation in order that such preliminary work may not be lost but may be followed up by the incoming Worthy Grand Patron.

Recommendations No. 3

Since the adoption of recommendation No. 41, installing Officers at the time a Chapter is instituted, there is much repetition with the two ceremonies, I recommend that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to revise the Institution Ceremony.

of forming new Chapters. It would have been impossible for my wife to have gone to these locations during the day without the car and the evenings were not long enough to permit me to make them all. Without her help I could not have accomplished the work. So many, many thanks to Sister Anne, you are surely a "Grand Driver".

To Sister Mazie Moore: You drew my name in the Chapter as your "Star Pal", but you were The Pal, a wonderful pal to me and my family. You always knew when something was "going on" and insisted on being "The Grand Mother" to little Ann in order that my wife and I might enjoy ourselves knowing that Ann was being well cared for. Accept our deepest appreciation.

To my Wife: One question that will forever remain unsolved in my lifetime is why I should have been so singularly blessed with a pal like you. I have merited so little and yet have been endowed with your graciousness.

INTERNATIONAL TEMPLE DEDICATED BY EASTERN STAR

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25—One of the capital's most palatial mansions was dedicated last night as the new international headquarters of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Presentation of the building, bought with contributions from chapters all over the world, was made by William A. Duvall, Most Worthy Grand Patron, during a religious and symbolic ceremony held in the grand ballroom, scene of many a distinguished gathering in the days when the mansion was the residence of Perry Belmont. It was accepted for the Order by Mrs. Frances Haun, Most Worthy Grand Matron.

The new temple was designed by Sanson, a famous French architect, as the private home of Mr. Belmont, the grandson of Commodore Matthew Perry who brought about the signing of the first commercial treaty with

Japan. It is especially noted for its fine vistas, down circular staircases and through marble arches, reflected again and again in the mirrored doors.

The Eastern Star purchased the home of Mr. Belmont a year and a half ago at an unpublished cost. Since then its exterior has been cleaned, its silk wall coverings dry cleaned, its carved woodwork thoroughly washed and waxed, and its many cut-glass chandeliers polished and rewired.

Many Official Events

Before and during the World War, the house was the scene of important official entertainments for foreign and American guests. Its most distinguished visitor was the present Duke of Windsor who made his headquarters there when he came to Washington in 1919 as the Prince of Wales to return the visit President Wilson had made to Buckingham Palace. In the grand ballroom he bestowed British orders and honors on officers of the American army and navy.

Several other important foreign missions made their headquarters at the mansion, among them one from Japan in 1917 headed by Viscount Kikujiro Ishii and one from Great Britain headed by Sir Eric Geddes. In 1919 Presi-

dent Pessoa of Brazil occupied the house for a few days.

The job of furnishing the house in a manner fitting its grandoise style has been personally supervised by Mrs. Haun, who holds the highest office in the order.

Chapters in China, Hawaii, and the Philippines have sent gifts of their finest native materials. A pipe organ has been installed and was played by the city's foremost organists during the three-day open house held in connection with the dedication.

On the first floor are offices for the Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Mrs. Minnie Evans Keyes, and the Right Worthy Grand Treasurer, Mrs. Flora Campbell, as well as guest quarters for the Most Worthy Grand Matron and Most Worthy Grand Patron. The first floor also includes a "treasure room," containing souvenirs of the Prince of Wales' stay in the mansion and a priceless embroidered screen presented to Mr. Belmont by the Japanese Government in return for his hospitality to the Imperial Mission in 1917; and a small dining room whose ceiling has been decorated by Mrs. Eugenie Saugstad, of Alexandria, Va., with a symbolic oval painting representing the heroines of the order.

Grand Ballroom

On the second floor are the grand ballroom with its red brocaded walls and hand-carved oak woodwork; an equally lavish drawing room, and an Italian dining room whose ceiling was brought piece by piece from an Italian Castle and whose mantelpiece is said to be more than 800 years old. The former music room has been turned into a small chapel.

In the two wall cases, where Mrs. Belmont formerly displayed her famous collections of fans, the Eastern Star will post an honor roll of chapters which have contributed 100 per cent to the temple fund.

Fine Oriental and Aubusson carpets have been purchased to enhance the grandeur of the various rooms. The one in the chapel is more than 75 years old and the only one of its kind in the United States.

Fifteen rooms on the third floor formerly used as servants quarters will probably be used as record or trophy rooms.

The order now has over 2,000,000 members with chapters in all the states, all Canadian provinces, Cuba, Alaska, the Canal Zone, Mexico, Puerto Rico, China, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands. Members came from long distances to attend the dedication.

Mrs. Frances Haun Declares 'Temple Realizes Long Cherished Dream.'

Filled to capacity by 1,200 Eastern Star members, Perry Belmont's old home, New Hampshire and Eighteenth street northwest, once occupied by the visiting Prince of Wales, was dedicated as the organization's newest shrine.

The building, purchased in November, 1934, and since then under repair, was accepted for the order by Mrs. Frances Haun, Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter. Saying the "temple is the realization of a long cherished dream," Mrs. Haun said she hoped it would be a means and "a place for advancing human happiness."

Taking as the text for the latter part of her acceptance speech the symbolic star which hangs over the main entrance to the shrine, Mrs. Haun pointed to its colors, blue for fidelity, yellow for patience and constancy, white for purity and loyalty, green for faith and red for love. She hoped those virtues would always be present in this new temple.

Attendance Large.

So large was the crowd listening to Mrs. Haun that most of them, seated in downstairs rooms, a floor away from the dais, could not see her. Her voice was carried to them by amplifiers.

After the call to order and welcome, Toastmaster Paul B. Cromelin, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons, District of Columbia, sitting in the old art gallery behind a dais banked with flowers, introduced the guests from out of town; Right Worthy Associate Grand Master Sister Anna W.

Smalley, of Montana; Ella Morriss Mount, Worthy Grand Matron of Kentucky, and Most Worshipful Brother Neale Rutland, Grand Master of Masons in Tennessee.

Perry Belmont, from whom the shrine was purchased, a member of Holland Lodge in New York, also was introduced.

Symbolic Ceremony.

As part of the acceptance ceremony, cups of corn, wine and oil, symbolic of nourishment, refreshment and joy, were presented to the temple. In this presentation, William A. Duvall, who had charge of repairing the temple; Grand Master Cromelin, Harry B. Wright, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Maryland Masons, and Grand Master Rutland took part. Invocation was asked by Most Worthy Grand Patron Duvall.

Other events on the program were an opening organ prelude by Theodore C. Lewis, a quartet, Mrs. Selma S. Klein, Mrs. Leonor Ebert Reed, George A. Myers and Harry M. Furker, singing "The Lord Is in His Holy Temple" and "How Lovely Are Thy Dwellings," reading of the dedication honor roll by Minnie E. Keyes, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and in informal reception held in the old state dining room after the assembly had been sung, "Blest Be the Ties That Bind."

REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE ON REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

"To the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

"Your Committee on Jurisprudence fraternally submits for your consideration its Report as follows:

"We have carefully reviewed the Report of the Worthy Grand Matron and commend her, not only for her unquestioned loyalty to the Order but for the enthusiasm displayed and interest shown in our work at all times.

"We approve all Dispensations granted. However, we do agree that a specific time should be stated. The indefinite date in mind applies to dispensation granted February 9, 1937 to Five Points Chapter, No. 13, reading as follows: 'February 9—Granted Five Points Chapter, No. 13 a Special Dispensation to install Maybelle K. Van Sant as Associate Matron at their stated meeting on February 11, 1937, or as soon thereafter as possible'.

"We approve Answers given to all questions.

"We approve Recommendation No. 1.

"We disapprove Recommendation No. 2. This is contrary to Approved Recommendation No. 73, adopted by the Grand Chapter 1936.

"We neither approve nor disapprove Recommendation No. 3. In our opinion this is a matter for this Grand Chapter to decide as it is a repetition of the Recommendation that was disapproved by the Grand Chapter 1936. We, therefore, refer this Recommendation to the floor of the Grand Chapter for decision.

"We approve Recommendation No. 4.

"We disapprove Recommendation No. 5. As Grand Representatives are appointed by recommendation of the Worthy Grand Matron they are, therefore, representatives of the Grand Chapter and such recognition should be given in the Grand Chapter rather than in Subordinate Chapters:

"We disapprove Recommendation No. 6. There is nothing in our law governing who shall be the prompter in our Chapters nor is there a law prohibiting the use of Rituals by members. As to who shall be designated as prompter, if any, is a matter for decision in Subordinate Chapters.

"Supplementary Report: We approve Answers given to all questions. "With such exceptions, as noted, we approve the Report.

Giving to those who travel on with us
A helping hand, a word of cheer, a smile."

"Socrates said, 'A perfect judge or leader is one who hears courteously, answers wisely, considers soberly, decides impartially and is one whom no one can corrupt.' Perhaps I cannot do any of these things perfectly but I can assure you it will be my earnest and honest endeavor to do my best in all matters and at all times.

"There are many reasons why I want to do my best. These are some of them. I believe in this Order. I think it can mean and should mean much not only to the members but to the whole community. An Order that is founded on such fine principles will live and grow if we will but give it a chance. Let us leave personalities out and consider the Order as a unit.

"I believe in the various activities of the Order such as the benevolent, educational and relief work done by it. I do not believe it should take the place of your church but I feel it should come next to it. Do not give me your pledge but give it to your chapter and the work of the Order at large.

REMARKS BY WORTHY GRAND PATRON

The passing of Brother Harry T. Hickey, Past Grand Patron, to the Life Eternal, on Thursday, September 3, 1936, brought much sadness to the brothers and sisters of the Eastern Star, as well as to his friends and associates in all walks of life. His gentle courtesy and kindness will long be remembered.

Brother Hickey was born in Wilmington, December 17, 1862, Educated in the Wilmington schools, he became associated with the Junction and Breakwater Railroad at Lewes and held many important positions with Pennsylvania R. R. until his retirement May, 1929.

He was a member of the Masonic organization for exactly fifty years, having joined Jefferson Lodge September 3, 1886. Was Past Master of Hope Lodge, at Laurel, in 1900, member of Delta Chapter, St. John's Commandery, Delaware Consistory, Lu Lu Temple, and Tall Cedars, at Milford.

He was a most earnest and conscientious worker for the Order of the Eastern Star, being responsible for the organization of Adah Chapter in 1918, Georgetown Chapter, 1923, and was the second Past Patron of Adah Chapter in 1920. At Toronto, Canada, in 1925, he was appointed Worthy Grand Sentinel of the General Grand Chapter, the only Past Grand Officer in Delaware who had ever received that honor.

To his wife, Sister Mary Elizabeth Freeny, whom he married in 1894; his two sons, Harry M., of Bellefonte, with whom he lived, William F., of Washington, three grand-children, a sister, Mrs. Jennie Chappel, of Washington; and other members and friends of his family we extend deepest sympathy. He was laid to rest in Mt. Salem Cemetary.

ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER

Approved Recommendations

1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks.-1922.

2. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess,

otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.-1922.

3. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.-1922.

4. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an

examination.-1922.

- That no member be allowed to vouch for anyone unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.-1922.
- 6. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess; by doing so closes the Chapter.-1922.
- 7. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door.-1922.
- 8. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.-1922.
- 9. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls .- 1922.
- 10. That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patrons' Jewels.-1922.
- 11. That examinations for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificate to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record.-1923.
- That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledger, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.-1923.
- 13. That one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County.-1923.
- 14. That the proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner: One copy to each Grand Officer, to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron, to each Grand Representative of Delaware,

to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter; three copies to each Grand Chapter; five copies to each Chapter in Delaware.—1923-1930.

- 15. That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official cover for Delaware.—1923.
- 16. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting.—1924.
- 17. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close.—1924.
 - 18. That public installations be discontinued.—1924.
- 19. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as Obligation Night in which to have a Special Service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and Ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter.—1925.
- 20. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations," adding those made and approved each year.—1925.
- 21. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings.—1926.
- 22. That Officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations.—1926.
- 23. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparation rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed.—1926.
- 24. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner. —1926.
- 25. That the sale of anything in the Chapter Room be prohibited.—1926.
- 26. That the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.—1926.
- 27. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting a duplicate shall be sent at the same time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.—1926.

- 28. That in the printing of all future Annual Proceedings of this Grand Chapter bids shall be secured from three reputable printers in Wilmington, and the contract awarded to the lowest and best bidder by the committee.—1927.
- 29. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the name of the candidates initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter Rooms.—1928.
- 30. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given to the Worthy Grand Matron and each one of the members of the Board of Grand Instructors, to be returned to the Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. Also that a copy be furnished to the Worthy Matron of each Subordinate Chapter to be turned over to her successor at the close of her term of office.—1928.
- 31. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office.—1928.
- 32. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installation.—1928.
- 33. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention.

Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter.—1929.

- 34. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on demit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation.—1930.
- 35. That all members and visitors be required to fill out an identification slip at all Chapter meetings, to be collected by the Conductress and Associate Conductress when proving the Chapter, and that the Chapter Registry

Book be kept from these slips. Blank slips to be secured from the Grand Secretary.—1930.

- 36. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.—1930.
- 37. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss.-1930.
- That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter as amended to date be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session.) -1930.
- 39. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for approval.-1930.
- 40. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose.—1930.
- 41. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months) .- 1930.

42. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petition to become

the property of the Subordinate Chapter.-1930.

43. That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each.—1930.

44. That a price of \$5.00 (five dollars) be placed on Secret Work and \$2.00 (two dollars) on the Diagram of the Labyrinth.—1930.

45. That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star.—1931.

46. That a space be provided for the signature of the installing officer

on the list of officers installed.—1931.

- 47. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron, and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any members interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire.—1931.
- 48. That a form, for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary.—1931.
- 49. That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign proceedings after a period of five years, and that due care be taken in disposing of them.—1931.
- 50. That a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter, (marked "Property of Grand Chapter" and with Seal affixed) be given to each member of the Jurisprudence, Constitution and By-Laws Committees and to each elective officer and returned to Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. That copies be sold to interested members of the Order for twenty cents each.—1932.

51. That the Subordinate Chapters be required to use uniform order blanks when ordering supplies from the Grand Secretary's office, to be printed and supplied free to the Chapters by the Grand Chapter.—1932.

52. That the list of names of the members of subordinate Chapters be omitted and that in place thereof a Chapter directory be printed to contain the name of the Chapter, place, and time of meeting, the names of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, with the name and address of the Secretary.

That the margins and spacing be reduced, and the present cover page design be printed when the embossing dies now in use are worn out.—1932.

- 53. That a Grand Instructor be required to pass the examination to secure a Grade A Certificate not less than two months after being elected.—1933.
- 54. That the Grand Matron have the power to appoint a member who holds a Grade A Certificate, that the appointment of the Grand Matron shall be effective until the elected officer qualifies or until the next annual session of the Grand Chapter, when the office shall be filled by election.—1933.

- 55. That no practice meetings be held on Sunday.—1933.
- 56. That the approved recommendation, No. 34, 1930, be rescinded and that the Sentinel see that all members and visitors register in the Register Book.—1933.
- 57. That the Book of Instruction on Page 8—Reception of Grand Officers on Official Visits be changed from "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Conductress and Associate Conductress have finished proving the Chapter" to, "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Chapter has been declared open." My reason for this recommendation is that Grand Honors should not be given when the Bible is closed and the Chapter not opened.—1934.
- 58. That the names of all Past Matrons and Past Patrons be printed in the Proceedings after the names of the Officers.—1934.
- 59. That the Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee composed of four sisters and one brother to be known as an "Educational Fund Committee." One member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year. Thereafter one to be appointed each year to serve for five years. Said committee to have the custody of all money properly belonging to the fund. All disbursements to be signed by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Committee.—1934.
- 60. That in the future in the compilation of the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, the Grand Secretary be instructed to report on all motions, resolutions or amendments as follows:—"after discussion the following motion, resolution or amendment (as the case may be) being properly moved and seconded, was adopted or rejected (as case may be) by the Grand Chapter."—1934.
- 61. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given members of the Jurisprudence Committee. These books to remain the property of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and to be returned to the Grand Chapter at the completion of each member's term.—1934.
- 62. That the signs of the Five Degrees, as interpreted in the 1935 Schools of Instruction, be accepted for this Grand Chapter.—1935.
- 63. That the members be permitted to remain seated during the Opening March in Subordinate Chapters and called up when the position referred to in the Ritual is assumed.—1935.
- 64. That no Life Memberships shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such memberships.)—1935.

- 65. That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patron shall have the same restrictions as the Worthy Patron regarding the Pink Slip.—1935.
- 66. That all petitions for Affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star Membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered.—1935.
- 67. That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdiction.—1935. See pages 37-38.
- 68. That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to bring the Book of Instruction to date in accordance with the Ritual and that slips be printed to take care of these changes.—1935.
- 69. That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruction. This is in accordance with the General Grand Chapter.—1935.
- 70. That a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with the Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter.—1935.
- 71. That those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the opening of the Grand Chapter Session.—1935.
- 72. That in order to facilitate the making of proper records, secretaries of Subordinate Chapters be instructed to list on their annual reports both the new and old names of members whose names have been changed since the issuance of the latest annual report.—1935.
- 73. That the Associate Matron fall in line with other officers and march to her station, when directed by the Worthy Matron.—1936.
- 74. That all Grand Representative Commissions expire the same month, December 31st.—1936.
- 75. That Fifty Dollars be allowed Grand Secretary for 1935-1936 to purchase typewriter.—1936.
- 76. I recommend that the Grand Secretaries Salary be raised from \$150 to \$200.—1936.
- 77. That our proceedings be bound in book form with stiff backs, four or five in one volume.—1936.
 - 78. That Job's Daughters be added to our mailing list.—1936.

- 79. That Chapters urge their committees on applications to be more particular in their investigation. This is the most important committee in your Chapter.
- 80. That the Associate Matron march to her station when the Worthy Matron says: "The Officers will take their respective stations."—1937
- 81. That newly-made members be instructed in the Secret Work before too long time has elapsed.—1937.
- 82. That a Membership Committee shall be appointed each year by the Worthy Matrons.—1937
- 83. That the Worthy Grand Patron make written Report to his successor in office of all outstanding petitions for dispensations and any preliminary work that has been done to create interest in localities where no Chapters exist.—1937.
- 84. That a committee of three be appointed to revise the Institution Ceremony.—1937.

Approved Decisions

- 1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degree in a Chapter, when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petitioner, is null and void.—1922.
- 2. Is it permissible to do chrocheting or fancy work in the Chapter during the Session? No.—1922.
- 3. The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session.—1925. Recinded—1936.
 - 4. Can we hold rehearsal at members' homes? No.—1926.
- 5. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election.—1926.
- 6. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.—1926.
- 7. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter, and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission.—1928.
- 8. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the Obligation?

No. Members can rise and repeat Obligation when presiding officer calls for it.-1928.

9. After a petitioner has been balloted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot.—1929.

A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother.-1929.

11. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person who is not eligible to petition for the degrees.-1930.

12. A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents.—1930.

13. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record .- 1930.

14. A petition for affiliation on demit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual.-1930.

15. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon.-1930.

16. By-Laws of a subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a supply, as interpreted in my official letter number one.—1930.

- 17. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover the cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, 4), plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendation of Jurisprudence Com-mittee.) -1930.
- The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron.-1930.

The dignity and splendor of these Temples, together with the Flags of our country and Order and baskets of flowers made a veritable paradise in which, without a single exception, a constructive and successful Session was held.

At all the Grand Sessions the Holy Bible was of course the most honored symbol not only because it is on this precious Book that our Order is based but also because this Book of Books is a messenger of peace and hope—a messenger of God. Each Jurisdiction paid honor to our National Flag and in States near Canada the Union Jack was honored too. While over this imaginary line that divides Canada from us cur Sisters and Brothers of the several Provinces gave our Flag the respect due it.

To perpetuate the peaceful relations between the Dominion of Canada and the United States, an International Peace Garden was inaugurated some years ago, on the border line between North Dakota and Manitoba. This project commemorates more than 120 years of friendly relations between us. Inscribed on a bronze plate is a pledge of two nations-

"To God in His Glory We Two Nations Dedicate this Garden and Pledge Ourselves that So Long as Men Shall Live We Will Not Take up Arms Against One Another."

Each year it is rededicated to the principles it represents. We are proud to report that the Grand Chapters of both these Grand Jurisdictions are vitally interested in this project and its development. There can be no better way than this to promote peace and goodwill between Nations.

In a great many of the Grand Sessions the Most Worshipful Grand Master, or his representative brought greetings from that ancient and honorable institution to which we owe our existence. This shows a fine spirit of cooperation between the Masonic Fraternity and the Order of The Eastern Star.

The Worthy Grand Matrons, assisted by Deputies, Grand Lecturers, Boards of Supervisors, Grand Working Committees and Grand Instructors have labored earnestly to perfect the ritualistic work. And the several Grand Jurisdictions have sponsored various Orders for the young girls. There are over 50,000 young girls who are members of these Orders.

Sometime during each of the Grand Sessions a beautiful and impressive Memory Hour was held for those Sisters and Brothers who have gone on to the Great Beyond.

> "There is a plane far greater than the plane you know, There is a haven broader than the one you see, There is a haven where storm-tossed souls may go, You call it death—we, immortality."

Delaware extends loving sympathy to Sister Grand Jurisdictions who have been called upon to part with loved ones.

The benevolent work of our Order increases each year. We can well be pleased with our efforts to relieve those in trouble and distress. In some cases a regular monthly income has been paid so that a family might be kept united. Little children have been fed, clothed, and given a home. In 46 Grand Jurisdictions there are active Educational Loan Funds by means of which many young men and women are able to continue their college work. Some Jurisdictions give scholarships to some of our leading Universities. More than half million dollars was loaned last year. Certainly no finer piece of work could be done than this. Nor have we forgotten our aged. In some Jurisdictions the Order has its own Home but in many cases the Order of Eastern Star contributes to the support of the Masonic Home for the Aged.

I regret to report that we are still losing in membership yet I feel we can be encouraged because the loss this year is less than the previous year. We can rejoice in the fact that a marvelous fraternal spirit exists in all Jurisdictions which after all determines our strength. This spirit together with constructive works and increasing activities assures us a fruitful future whether our membership be large or small.

"Let us ever be doing the deeds that are kind Eager to help, to heal, and to bind. Let our feet never tire by night or by day Of helping God's weaker ones over life's way.

"In the depths of our eyes let there linger a smile Seeing through love, only good things worthwhile, With our hearts ever ready with comfort for others, Let us live for service, my sisters and brothers."

I want to thank this Grand Chapter for the privilege of acting as the Fraternal correspondent. It has been one of the most inspiring experiences of my life.

Sister Grand Secretary, may I thank you and your good husband for keeping me supplied with the Proceedings and particularly your promptness in delivering them to me.
