



INFORMAL OPENING

Wednesday afternoon, May 17th, 1.00 o'clock

Palms, and ferns with graceful spreading fronds formed a beautiful background in the Grand East; in front were banked baskets of lovely blooms and at each Star Point's station was placed a basket of exquisite blossoms in colors appropriate to the Point, adding beauty to the already beautiful DuBarry room in the Hotel duPont, Wilmington, when the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother John L. LeCompte, sounded the gavel at one o'clock, Wednesday afternoon, May 17, for the informal opening of the 18th Annual Session.

The Grand Officers and distinguished guests were seated in the East and the large room was filled to capacity with delegates and

members.

The Star Treble Chorus entered in drill formation and while standing in the position of the cross, sang "Faith of Our Fathers." They then took positions on the south side of the room while the flag escort entered. The Stars and Stripes, carried by Grand Marshal Sister Esther Sheaffer, the State Flag, carried by Sister Virda Simpler, Marshal of Brandywine Chapter No. 14, the Christian Flag, by Sister Anna Irwin, Marshal of Mizpah Chapter No. 2, and the O. E. S. Flag by Sister Benita M. Meenan, Marshal of Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, were presented at the Altar, then carried to the East and placed in positions prepared for them.

Next entered the Pages and Color Bearers. The Pages, after a short drill took a stand in the north side of the room while the Color Bearers, carrying pennants of the five emblematic colors formed a revolving star around the Altar. Now executing another drill of all

participants these officers retired to seats reserved for them.

The Worthy Grand Patron introduced the guest speaker, Rev. A. H. Kleffman, D. D., Pastor of West Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, who spoke of the three characteristics of Esther. His address follows:

ADDRESS OF DR. A. H. KLEFFMAN Pastor of West Presbyterian Church

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members and Friends of Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of Eastern Star:

I suppose my being here is an illustration of reciprocity. I invited you to the church for your annual service and then you invited me to come here and have a share in this, your 18th Annual Session.

It is a delight to be here and see how beautifully you do your work, and to wish you a successful Session today and Thursday.

I ought to feel at home here and I do, because in Baltimore I had some fellowship with the Eastern Star and here in Wilmington too, I have had some contacts with your work in past years. So many members of my congregation are here. I am reminded of being invited out to the New Castle County Workhouse-you will say, how very inappropriate-but it came to my mind. A colored minister was there to preach and a large part of the audience is usually colored people, and they have to stay until the service is over whether they want to or not. There were about 300 colored people and a few white people. During the singing of a hymn he leaned over and said: "Ah see quite a number of my congregation here today." What I see today is very encouraging and if other ministers were here they would see members of their congregation too. There is a close relationship between the Church and the Order of the Eastern Star. I have been impressed with vour ceremony and your tributes to the flags. Our own Stars and Stripes that represent this great country of ours in which we have the privilege of living. When one has traveled a great deal then there is a higher appreciation of this country than when one stays at home. The Christian Flag represents in its history more than a thousand years and with our State Flag and the Eastern Star Flag splendid ideals are represented.

In Syria one night as I was coming home, a man saw the little American Flag on my coat and he said: "Let me see that American Flag." He held it in his hand and kissed it over and over again and said: "Oh, what a great country is yours; how we love that country and all that it represents and all that it has done for the world." Others appreciate this great country, some of them waiting years and years before their turn would come. In 1926 the Russian immigration list was completed for ten years. Imagine waiting for ten years for your turn when the quota lists will permit them to come in. This flag is admired, as it should be, by people of all tongues and races. Your opening ceremony was filled with significance and these flags represent the things for which you stand.

In thinking of this service, I thought about one of the characters about which you have heard so much in past days. I could not expect to tell you anything you have not already been told of, but think about her for a little while, you might be reminded about some of the things you already know, but a great deal of our work is reminding ourselves and others of things that they and we both know. We all need to be

reminded many times.

Esther had three characteristics that are dominant in the record

of her life and work: Courage, Patriotism and Religion.

Courage is one of the fine virtues of life: a root virtue that helps to make other virtues strong; helps to put other virtues into expression. Honesty is a splendid thing but for honesty to function there must be courage. Purity and generosity are other virtues we hold as ideals, they all require the foundation of courage to make them strong and cause them to be expressed in the testing times of life.

Think of Esther; think of the root virtue, the foundation virtue upon which others must be built or grow if they are to be expressed as we would like to have them expressed in our lives and in the lives of others. Going before the king unbidden, the penalty being death to pay the price of her own life, unless he should extend the golden sceptre. But unbidden, she showed her courage in behalf of her prople.

Foolhardiness is facing danger unnecessarily: courage is facing

danger in the path of duty.

It was courageous on Esther's part to not keep silence. Some of the men may think it is absolutely unnecessary for me to tell the ladies that they should keep silent, but not any more so than men. Business men or men in whatever kind of work they represent, they can talk a good bit too. I was present at a meeting of 300 or 400 ministers and they had a good time talking and if there was a contest I don't know who would win. Esther's courage was fine in that she did not keep silent. Silence may not always be golden. Some folks say: "If you want a thing done well do it yourself"; but we don't make our own shoes; we don't act as our own dentist; those old sayings are not always true: Silence is not always golden. Esther had the courage not to remain silent but to speak clearly and bravely. A cause was in danger; she did not remain silent. If there is a cause that needs help and we are in favor of that cause, we should not keep silent. If great issues are to be settled that can be settled at the Ballot Box, we

should not keep silent but in the spirit of loyalty and courage and high ideals, when the day for voting comes, each one who has the privilege to vote should speak, not remain silent. When a friend is being unjustly accused, defend that friend. When an enemy is being unjustly accused twice the amount of courage is needed, but don't remain silent. Then perhaps when they hear of your courage and your defending them when they are unjustly accused, they may not be your enemy any longer. Learn not to remain silent when duty calls us to speak in behalf of a friend or a cause that needs assistance. There is a silence of expediency which says it will be much safer if I remain away and say nothing. A New York newspaper one year said: "We will do anything and everything that will increase circulation." A policy of expediency. Silence of expediency is unworthy of one who wants to meet the courage of Esther. One can be selfish and say "What do I care?" Be not selfish. Hers was an expression of courage that would not permit her to be silent when others in whom she was interested were in danger. Never leave unsaid something that ought to be said in behalf of a person or a cause for that is making one as guilty as saying what should not have been said.

Esther's patriotism saved her people. She felt the position was given her under Divine Providence; not for her own pleasure, but to be used for a high purpose. A great many people look at things that way. They have talents and they think of them as given to be used for some high purpose. Many women have more time than others and they may think of using that talent for a high purpose. Miss Dodge of Pittsburgh said: "My wealth has been given to me as pay in advance for the good I am supposed to do." What a great change would take place in the world if all the wealthy people would feel or think that way. Love of country comes next to love of home and we should all seek peace for our country. It is not all right to hate others. In Trafalgar Square is a monument to Edith Cavell bearing the inscription:

"Patriotism is not enough; There must be no malice in my heart towards any man."

Patriotism: There are sacrifices being made in homes in order that children may be sent to college that they may be better citizens. A high expression of patriotism making sacrifices to help produce better citizens.

A man said: "I could die for my country." Within two weeks that man had committed such a gross irregularity that his own name went down in disgrace and he was not a great citizen. It is a fine thing to die for one's country, but it is a fine thing to live our patriotism too. Esther's type of religion was making a contribution to patriotism. It has been said that one of the reasons why we have made progress in North America is because our forefathers came here seeking God's help; the people of South America went there seeking gold. What a difference between those two countries so many years ago.

In Esther's life we have the accomplishment of religion and patriotism, something like that we see in the life of George Washington. In a great many homes there are mothers fighting for the faith all alone; there are some where the fathers fight alone, but more where

mothers have to struggle on all alone. All honor to all women who are religious but double honor to those who are religious in the midst of surroundings that are not religious. Where there is prayer and reliance on Divine help for all things there is a great contribution to the welfare of the nation. There are many benefits in these fraternal organizations for women; they are beneficial I am sure, if a woman has the time and the strength an experience like this will certainly increase interest in life and make in turn a valuable contribution to life in the family circle. Religion, Patriotism and Courage: I trust that you will gain much from this work with all of its high goals. May you be blest mightily as individuals and as a group, realizing that in all we do it is necessary to have courage. We have hard work to do and loads to lift; Joy in the struggle, it is God's gift.

Singing—"I Know a Lovely Garden"—The Star Treble Chorus.

Worthy Grand Matron: The time has come, Dr. Kleffman, when we must prepare for our more active duties. I know that our members and visitors were interested and impressed as the subject of your address is one of our heroines. I regret, sincerely, that you cannot stay for the remainder of our session this afternoon, or attend those tomorrow, but we have enjoyed having you and appreciate your coming. Thank you.

Dr. Kleffman was escorted from the Grand Chapter room by the Worthy Grand Patron.

The Grand Officers retired to prepare for the formal opening.

FORMAL OPENING

Wednesday afternoon; 2.00 o'clock

The Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of Eastern Star, convened in its Eighteenth Annual Session in the DuBarry Room of the Hotel duPont at 2.00 P. M., Wednesday afternoon, May 17, 1939.

Past Grand Matron, Sister Julia Marr Story, and Past Grand Patron, Brother Harry F. Newlin were escorted to the Grand East by Grand Marshal, Sister Esther Sheaffer, and called the Grand Session to order.

Sister Story instructed the Grand Marshal to escort the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and other Grand Officers into the Grand Chapter room.

Sister Story welcomed the Grand Officers as follows:

"Worthy Grand Matron, I deeply appreciate the honor of being selected as the first to greet you at this, our 18th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware. The year has slipped away all too quickly, not giving us time for the many things we had planned to do, but "Time and Tide wait for no man."

Associate Patron holding a trusteeship. This was corrected when called to the Chapter's notice.

I was assisted in all of these installations by the Grand Sentinel, Brother Charles Krapf; in all but one by the Grand Marshal, Sister Esther Sheaffer, Grand Organist, Sister Lettie McMullen; all but two by the Grand Chaplain, Sister Irma LeCompte, the Grand Conductress, Sister Jane C. Zebley, acting Chaplain in Radiant and Five Points Chapters, in her absence. The Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Le-Compte, attended all installations but one, and this because of icy roads.

In Five Points Chapter it was my privilege to install Brother Emory as Associate Patron, Sister Emory, his wife as Esther, their daughter Elsie as Adah. Recommendations

1. As our Ritual provides for the appointment and installation of a Grand Lecturer I recommend that Art. 9, Sec. 8.-1, 2, 3, re Grand Instructors in our Constitution and By-laws be deleted and a new section providing for the appointment of a Grand Lecturer and Deputies be introduced.

It shall be the duty of the Grand Lecturer to visit each Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction and see that her Deputies instruct the officers and members in the correct performance of their duties.

She shall issue to any member of this Grand Jurisdiction who passes

a satisfactory oral examination a certificate of proficiency in two classes as follows:

- (A). In the Landmarks, Opening and Closing Ceremonies, Constitution, Rules and Regulations and Fundamental Parliamentary Laws.
 - (B). Proficiency in the Secret Work only.
- 2. I recommend that the Committee on Chapters under Dispensation and Charters shall be for a term of three years. The original three members of this committee shall be appointed for a period of one (1), two (2), and three (3) years respectively; one member shall retire each year, and the incoming Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint her or his successor.

Ouestions and Answers

O. Is it permissible for a Chaplain to wear a stole?

Q. The Tercentenary falls on our meeting night and may interfere with our officers being present. Can we get a Special Dispensation to change our meeting night or may we dispense with the meeting that night?

A. Stated meetings must be held on the nights specified in the By-laws and no dispensation can be granted to dispense with a meet-

ing; but if there be no quorum you can hold no meeting.

O. Can a man not a Master Mason become a member of the Eastern Star?

A. No.

Q. May we have color bearers?

- A. Yes, providing that no office is established for them on the floor, nor that they be a part of the hollow square formed by the officers. They may be seated among the members on the North and South.
- Q. We have two active and valuable members who through illness and reverses have fallen in arrears in their dues. May we remit their
- A. Yes, refer to Rules and Regulations for subordinate chapters, page 49, Sec. 28. Under the circumstances I feel that it would be the right thing to do.

O. May we receive the petition of a woman whose husband has

demitted from his Masonic Lodge?

A. No.

Q. Since receiving the petition of a woman her husband has received his demit from his Masonic Lodge, how shall we proceed?

A. The petitioner is not eligible and no ballot can be spread. The fee is returned to the petitioner, recorded in the minutes and record sent to Grand Secretary.

Q. Can I call a special meeting for the purpose of appointing an

investigating committee?

A. Would refer you to Sec. 30, page 49 of the Constitution and By-laws of Grand Chapter and your Chapter's By-laws, Art. 6, Sec. 1.

Q. According to the Constitution each Chapter must be furnished with three copies of the "Legal Code." What is the Legal Code? I

am told the Pink Slip; if so, why three copies when the Pink Slip says two?

A. The "Legal Code" is our "Penal Code" adopted by this Grand Chapter in 1923 but has not been printed nor issued to the

Subordinate Chapters.

Q. On page 47 of the Constitution, Sec. 18, it says "they shall be taken to the ante-room"; the Ritual says "to the preparation room." Since these are two different rooms should not the Constitution conform to the Ritual?

A. It should, and this will be referred to the Constitution and

By-laws Committee.

O. When shall the investigating committee be appointed on a

petition that requires a waiver?

A. When the waiver has been received by the Chapter asking it and not before.

P., acting Worthy Grand Patron; Associate Grand Matron, Sister Carrie L. Gemmill; Grand Conductress, Sister Jane C. Zebley, acting Grand Chaplain; Grand Adah, Sister Clara A. Reuter; Grand Ruth, Sister Anne Stout; Grand Esther, Sister Myrtle Sawdon, acting; Grand Martha, Sister May Heathcote; Grand Electa, Sister Ethel Bard. Sister Bella Gray, Associate Matron of St. John's Chapter was the soloist. We felt it a privilege to perform this service for our sister who had answered the call while visiting relatives in Wilmington.

Appreciation



ADDRESS

Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter Order of the Eastern Star

Anna W. Smalley

I have just been so thrilled listening to these reports. A gentleman said to me at dinner, "We are not a very large jurisdiction." But, folks, you make up in quality what you lack in quantity. And you make up in splendid reports for a Grand Chapter many times as large as this one. I want to express appreciation to your Worthy Grand Matron for her report, yet I wonder if it was best to continue to stand and give her report, on account of her accident to her ankle. I hope you will take account of what she said about the responsibility of the members of the Eastern Star, because when your Grand Jurisdictions are successful then my work is easy. You would be surprised at the thousands of letters I have answered in the last year and a half and sometimes I wonder if those who write those letters are following the obligations that we take. I doubt it because if they were then I would not have those letters to answer. Your Worthy Grand Patron's report and the good financial balance and all but one chapter 100% in the International Temple Fund. I am going to tell you that I hate to ask for money. Did you ever work on a budget, let us say of the Methodist Church? I have, and you have to have lots of moral support. It fell upon my shoulders to raise the International Temple Maintenance Fund and I thought if I could raise it in three years, I would be pleased. I am so happy that I have had wonderful support, but I had to ask for it. I am so happy to be here and it is a pleasure to be here when some of my committee members are present. I have the best General Grand Chapter family ever assembled. Others may not agree with me but I will continue to say so and I'll have the last word because I'll say "Scissors." I want to introduce Sister Margaret Smith who is to be one of my ushers in 1940. I hope you are all going to be with us in California. Just write to Sister Piper and she will give you all the information you need. We must let her earn her title. It seemed almost impossible that I was going to be able to fulfill my promise to be here, but I am here. You can accomplish anything you want to if you persevere. Opportunity comes if you care to accept it. It seems that when I went into this office every obstacle was mine. It seemed that I was not performing the tasks in the right manner, everywhere I turned there was an accident or some obstacle. We are living so fast, let us not forget to be kind. Every night before I go to sleep I think what have I done to make someone else happy. Just a kind word or a letter to someone who is ill or needing encouragement and many a time I have gotten out of bed and written a letter that night. If you go a mile, just go a little farther. Opportunity is the creator of all human testing. It comes once to the door of the hovel and once to the door of the mansion. Many times with all our other duties we forget little things, maybe a sick call or a flower or a kind word. If we ever needed encouragement it is now, at the present time. One time when the General Grand Chapter met in Virginia it so happened that a lady who came to visit relatives also brought a vote and I took her under

upstairs. We asked at the hotel desk if Sister Keyes was in and the clerk said, Yes, she is in room 224. We went up to room 224, deposited our bags, left a note for Sister Keyes and Sister Campbell and in the meantime in walked Sister Etta Keys and your Worthy Grand Matron came in with her sister. We realized it was not Sister Minnie Keyes, but they made us most welcome. I thank you for the most gracious manner in which you received us there. We have enjoyed your Grand Session and I thank you for the beautiful manner in which you referred to our Past Grand Matron, Amy Hollander. We have had two great losses in two weeks. We lost Sister Elizabeth Flit. It was quite a blow to the District of Columbia.

One of the first things I remember about Delaware was when Sister Hollander told me about you. I am having a most delightful time. I am sorry to have to leave you. I do feel that I should express the regrets of our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Yost. She sent her regrets to Sister Story. I met a great many Delaware folks after the Maryland Session and then we had such a nice time in Florida too. I am glad to be here with these other distinguished guests and am glad to renew my acquaintance with Sister Jones and also all my friends from Maryland. Brother Kimmel asked me to say a word to you about the trip to California. Brother Kimmel has been appointed as one of three on the Transportation Committee. He met with two others and they decided that Brother Kimmel should extend the invitation to Maryland, Delaware, Virginia and West Virginia to go with us on the "Anna W. Smalley Special." Seventy folks have signed up already. Brother Kimmel wanted me to extend a personal invitation to you folks in Delaware. He will be very glad to help you in any way he can. I also hope we are going to have Maryland with us.

I just couldn't leave without saying how pleased I am to be here with you and how proud I am of your friendship and I don't know whether you appreciate the fact that we have this lovely Christian woman as our Most Worthy Grand Matron; she is a beloved mother; she has two boys and a fine-looking husband. One of her sons graduates in June from Medical College. We gave a dinner for him not long ago, we are all very proud of him. Sister Smalley, your whole family has endeared itself to us and it was a great pleasure to be here with you, to pay our respects to you and to visit this Grand Chapter of Delaware. My chapter is celebrating its 13th birthday tomorrow and I must go back tonight. I did ask if I could stay until the midnight train. Members of Delaware Grand Chapter, it has been a great pleasure to be with you and we hope we are going to have some of you at our Grand Chapter meeting. I thank you for the luncheon and for the dinner we had with your Past Grands.

Motion by Sister Irma B. Barr, seconded and carried that Sister Louise E. Kreglow be made an honorary member of this Grand Chapter.

Sister Kreglow thanked the Grand Chapter for the honor.

REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of Grand Chapter, Order Eastern Star:

As your fraternal correspondent, I approached my task with fear and trembling, but in a little while what I thought was a task proved to be the most educational and informative pleasure in my Eastern Star life. I have been on an extensive trip around the world by the imagination route. I have visited the various Grand Jurisdictions, where I saw scenes of beauty and royal splendor in the settings of magnificent Temples, Armories, Ball-rooms, and spacious auditoriums; beautifully decorated for the occasion and each carrying out the color and theme of the particular session.

My greatest task was to select from the abundance of material the outstanding facts to bring to you some idea of the magnitude of

the work being accomplished by the largest fraternal and most outstanding organization for women in the world.

The Eastern Star was founded in February, 1850, and has grown until we now have approximately 13,469 Chapters and 1,592,849 members. General Grand Chapter was organized November, 1876, in Indianapolis, and has jurisdiction over 46 States and the District of Columbia, 7 Provinces in Canada, one each in Puerto Rico, and New Brunswick, also the Subordinate Chapters of Alaska, Canal Zone, Cuba, Hawaii, Mexico, Nova Scotia, China, Japan, Philippine Islands, Prince Edward Island, and the Yukon Territory. The Supreme Chapter of Scotland has supervision over all Chapters in Scotland, England, Ireland, New Zealand, Austria, India, Italy and South Africa. The New York and New Jersey Grand Jurisdictions work independently under the McCoy Ritual.

Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter, New Brunswick the youngest. Illinois has the largest membership, Puerto Rico has the smallest. The largest subordinate chapter is located in Topeka, Kansas, with a membership of 1,580. Midnight Sun Chapter in Alaska is the farthest north. The most popular month for meetings is October and Sessions last from 5 days in Pennsylvania to 1 day in Rhode Island. North Carolina gained the largest membership of the year, 1,135. Scotland's gain was 2,792. Oklahoma reports the greatest loss 4,031. I regret to report a loss of over 15,000 members as taken from the Proceedings.

The Holy Bible rests upon every Altar, placed there by the Grand Chaplain in ceremony in many of the Sessions. "The Traveling Bible," the property of R. T. King Chapter, Columbus, Ohio, graced the Altar of several Sessions. It is on the fourteenth year of its twenty-five year journey. It rested upon the Altar of this Grand Chapter in 1930.

That our Order is held in high esteem is shown by the civic welcomes given by Governors, Mayors, and public officials, who voice the heartiest of greetings and good wishes.

The flag of the United States is an honor guest in the East in all our Chapters and the pledge of alliegance given. In Canada we find the Union Jack and also the Stars and Stripes. We also find the State, Christian, and Eastern Star Flags in many Chapters.

To perpetuate the peaceful relations between Canada and the States an International Peace Garden has been inaugurated, midway on the border line between the two countries in the Turtle Mountains of North Dakota and Manitoba.

Nearly every jurisdiction maintains an Educational Fund, whereby our youth may be assisted to higher education, over 2000 young people have received benefit from these loans. Iowa leads in the number of loans granted. Louisiana established the first Educational Loan Fund, and it is the only jurisdiction not charging interest on loans.

The greater sense of the moral value of life is brought to the youth of today through the different Orders for girls, namely Rainbow for Girls, Job's Daughters, Beatitudes, Triangles, and Daughters of Eastern Stars. More than 50,000 girls belong to these organizations.

That our purposes are beneficient is shown in reports showing there are 53 Masonic and Eastern Star Homes, 15 Eastern Star Homes, 15 Orphanages, and 2 Tubercular Camps. The first Masonic Home was established in Kentucky. The Florence Nightingale Home in Ontario is the only one in Canada. Scotland cares for their aged through an Annuity Fund. Arizona has tendered to G. G. C. 60 acres of land to be improved as a national sanitorium for benefit of Masons and their families. Virginia, Texas, Florida, and Georgia maintain printing shops in the Masonic Homes where much of the Grand Lodge and Grand Chapter printing is done by the young people. About \$4,500,00 is contributed annually toward support of homes, relief and education.

In many States the Grand Matron has been invited to address the Grand Lodge, and the Most Worshipful Grand Master has addressed Grand Chapter. In Montana the W. G. P. was also the Most Worshipful Grand Master, and for a few days this was also true of Grand Patron of Wisconsin.

Steel Chapter No. 118, North Dakota, was constituted by Sister Anna W. Smalley, M. W. G. M. This being the only subordinate chapter ever receiving this distinction.

Many jurisdictions have Divine Service Sunday preceding the opening of the Session. Each Grand Chapter pauses in their deliberations to pay loving tribute to the memory of its members who have answered the call of the Master.

Kentucky owns the Robert Morris Home at La Grange, and has restored it to its former beauty and it is to be known as an Eastern Star Shrine. Ella Morris Mount, a granddaughter of Robert Morris, the founder of our Order, is a Past Grand Matron of Kentucky and also Worthy Grand Esther of the General Grand Chapter. Many Chapters celebrate August 31st, our founder's birthday.

Ohio has a twenty-five cent registration fee for delegates. Massachusetts' initiation fee is \$25.00. Indiana does not permit members to own rituals, use the Masonic method. All office bearers in Scotland are elected except the five Star Points. The fraternal correspondent is elected. New Jersey has a Grand Attorney, but no Associate Grand Patron. M. W. G. M. Sister Anna W. Smalley was the first to receive Honorary Membership in the Grand Chapter of New York. Our own W. G. M., Sister Krapf, and Grand Conductress, Sister Jane Zebley, were also made Honorary Members.

A traveling Star has been started in Canada. The object of which is to cultivate friendship and neighborliness among the Chapters. It must be carried, not sent to the next Chapter.

The endowment for the International O. E. S. Temple in Washington is slowly increasing. Nine Grand Jurisdictions, Alaska, Canal Zone, Hawaii, Philippine Islands and Yukon are 100%.

I extend greetings to the Fraternal Correspondents of other jurisdictions and thank them in the name of our Grand Chapter for the splendid reviews of Delaware. Sister Pyle, Grand Secretary, I thank you for promptness in providing me with the proceedings, and I do thank this Grand Chapter for the privilege of visiting these most

interesting Grand Sessions via the printed pages.

It is a real joy for me to be with this Grand Chapter Session. I bring greetings, congratulations and good wishes from your neighboring State of Maryland.

I have been thinking about this trip for quite a long time and it seems a very long time. Eight years have slipped away since my first visit to your Grand Chapter.

There is a page in my book of memory that reminds me of Delaware Grand Chapter. It happened at General Grand Chapter Session

in San Antonio, Texas. I don't know how many of you attended that session, but there were thousands of members seated in the building. It was wonderful to hear the beautiful music on the pipe organ, see the Grand Officers, all the ushers, and all the pages, etc. The Worthy Grand Matron of Delaware Chapter and the Worthy Grand Matron of Maryland Chapter had the honor of carrying the Eastern Star Banner and were we thrilled. Sister Mary Clower was your Worthy Grand Matron at that time. It was not a little bit of a banner, but a very large one. Sister Clower supported one side and I supported the other and we carried it in the procession. It was not easy to do. After the procession was over we were stationed in the East and stood at attention. 

ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER Approved Recommendations

That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter

the Secretary shall read the Land Marks.-1922.

That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.—1922.

That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.—1922.

That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee

will give an examination.-1922.

That no member be allowed to vouch for anyone unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.-1922.

That the Bible shall not be closed at recess; by doing so closes

the Chapter.-1922.

That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess,

members be required to use the guarded door.-1922.

That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.—1922.

That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls.-1922.

That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass

in all Patrons' Jewels.-1922.

That examinations for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificate to be filed with Grand

Secretary for complete record.—1923.

That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledger, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.-1923.

That one member of the Board of Instructors be elected every third year beginning this year, from outside of New Castle County.

-1923.

That the proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner: One copy to each Grand Officer, to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron, to each Grand Representative of Delaware, to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter; three copies to each Grand Chapter; five copies to each Chapter in Delaware.-1923-1930.

That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official cover for Delaware.—1923.

That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Alliegance be given at each meeting.-1924.

17. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its

That public installations be discontinued.—1924.

That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as Obligation Night in which to have a Special Service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and Ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter.-1925.

That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations" adding those made and approved each year.—1925.
21. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all

Chapter meetings.—1926.

That Officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or

similar articles to their stations.-1926.

That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparation rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the

Chapter is closed.—1926.

The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner.—1926.

That the sale of anything in the Chapter room be pro-

hibited.-1926.

That the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.—1926.

That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting a duplicate shall be sent at the same

time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.-1926.

28. That in the printing of all future Annual Proceedings of this Grand Chapter bids shall be secured from three reputable printers in Wilmington, and the contract awarded to the lowest and best bidder

by the committee.—1927.

- I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the name of the candidates initiated in one of the Chapters. while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter Rooms.-1928.
- That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given to the Worthy Grand Matron and each one of the members of the Board of Grand Instructors, to be returned to the Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. Also that a copy be furnished to the Worthy Matron of each Subordinate Chapter to be turned over to her successor at the close of her term of office.-1928.

That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate

Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office.—1928. 32. That a special dispensation be required to install officers

who are not installed at the regular installation.-1928. 33. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention.

Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter .- 1929.

That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on demit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation.

-1930.

That all members and visitors be required to fill out an identification slip at all Chapter meetings, to be collected by the Conductress and Associate Conductress when proving the Chapter, and that the Chapter Registry Book be kept from these slips. Blank slips to be secured from the Grand Secretary.—1930.

That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the

Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.—1930.

That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss.—1930.

That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter as amended to date be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session.)-1930.

That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for approval.—1930.

That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose.—1930.

That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months).—1930.

That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petition to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter.—1930.

That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each.—1930.

That a price of \$5.00 (five dollars) be placed on Secret Work and \$2.00 (two dollars) on the Diagram of the Labyrinth.-1930.

That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star.—1931.

That a space be provided for the signature of the installing

officer on the list of officers installed.—1931.

That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron, and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any members interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire.—1931.

48. That a form, for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as

other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary.-1931.

That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign proceedings after a period of five years, and that due care be

taken in disposing of them.—1931.

50. That a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter, (Marked "Property of Grand Chapter" and with Seal affixed) be given to each member of the Jurisprudence, Constitution and By-Laws Committees and to each elective officer and returned to Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. That copies be sold to interested members of the Order for twenty cents each.-1932.

That the Subordinate Chapters be required to use uniform order blanks when ordering supplies from the Grand Secretary's office, to be printed and supplied free to the Chapters by the Grand Chapter.

-1932.

That the list of names of the members of subordinate Chapters be omitted and that in place thereof a Chapter directory be printed to contain the name of the Chapter, place, and time of meeting, the names of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, with the name and address of the Secretary.

That the margins and spacing be reduced, and the present cover page design be printed when the embossing dies now in use are worn

out.-1932.

That a Grand Instructor be required to pass the examination to secure a Grade A Certificate not less than two months after being elected.-1933.

That the Grand Matron have the power to appoint a member who holds a Grade A Certificate, that the appointment of the Grand Matron shall be effective until the elected officer qualifies or until the next annual session of the Grand Chapter, when the office shall be filled by election.-1933.

That no practice meetings be held on Sunday.—1933.

That the approved recommendation, No. 34, 1930, be rescinded and that the Sentinel see that all members and visitors register

in the Register Book.-1933.

That the Book of Instruction on Page 8-Reception of Grand Officers on Official Visits be changed from "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Conductress and Associate Conductress have finished proving the Chapter" to "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Chapter has been declared open." My reason for this recommendation is that Grand Honors should not be given when the Bible is closed and the Chapter not opened.-1934.

That the names of all Past Matrons and Past Patrons be

printed in the Proceedings after the names of the Officers.-1934.

That the Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee composed of four sisters and one brother to be known as an "Educational Fund Committee." One member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year. Thereafter one to be appointed each year to serve for five years. Said committee to have the custody of all money properly belonging to the fund. All disbursements to be signed by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Committee.-1934.

60. That in the future in the compilation of the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, the Grand Secretary be instructed to report on all motions, resolutions or amendments as follows:- "after discussion the following motion, resolution or amendment (as the case may be-being properly moved and seconded, was adopted or rejected

(as case may be) by the Grand Chapter."-1934.

That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given members of the Jurisprudence Committee. These books to remain the property of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and to be returned to the Grand Chapter at the completion of each member's term.—1934.

That the signs of the Five Degrees, as interpreted in the 1935 Schools of Instruction, be accepted for this Grand Chapter.—1935.

That the members be permitted to remain seated during the Opening March in Subordinate Chapters and called up when the position referred to in the Ritual is assumed.—1935.

That no Lie Memberships shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such

memberships.)—1935.

That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patron shall have the same restrictions as the Worthy

Patron regarding the Pink Slip.-1935.

That all petitions for Affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star Membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered.—1935.

67. That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors

at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdic-

tion.—1935. See pages 37-38.

68. That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to bring the Book of Instruction to date in accordance with the Ritual and that slips be printed to take care of these changes. _1935

69. That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruction. This is in accordance with the General Grand Chapter. -1935.

70. That a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with the Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter.-1935.

That those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the

opening of the Grand Chapter Session.-1935.

That in order to facilitate the making of proper records, secretaries of Subordinate Chapters be instructed to list on their annual reports both the new and old names of members whose names have been changed since the issuance of the latest annual report.—1935.

73. That the Associate Matron fall in line with other officers and march to her station, when directed by the Worthy Matron.-1936.

74. That all Grand Representative Commissions expire the same month. December 31st.—1936.

That Fifty Dollars be allowed Grand Secretary for 1935-1936

to purchase typewriter.—1936.

76. I recommend that the Grand Secretary's Salary be raised from \$150 to \$200.-1936.

That our proceedings be bound in book form with stiff backs,

four or five in one volume.—1936.

That Job's Daughters be added to our mailing list.—1936.

That Chapters urge their committees on applications to be more particular in their investigation. This is the most important committee in your Chapter.

That the Associate Matron march to her station when the Worthy Matron says: "The Officers will take their respective stations."

-1937.

That newly-made members be instructed in the Secret Work 81.

before too long time has elapsed.-1937.

That a Membership Committee shall be appointed each year

by the Worthy Matrons.-1937.

That the Worthy Grand Patron make written Report to his successor in office of all outstanding petitions for dispensations and any preliminary work that has been done to create interest in localities where no Chapters exist.-1937.

That a committee of three be appointed to revise the Insti-

tution Ceremony.-1937.

That as the Conductress is the only one (except the Worthy Patron) to use the pink slip in her work, that the Associate Conductress be required to pass a Grade B examination at least three days before being installed as Conductress.-1938.

That the Associate Matron be required to pass an examination in the opening and closing ceremony before she is installed as

Worthy Matron.-1938.

That a complete set of our proceedings be bound for the use of the Worthy Grand Matron. That she be held responsible for same and deliver them to the Installed Grand Matron at the same time

she delivers the seal, etc.-1938.

That the fourth paragraph on page 28 in the proceedings of 1930 be eliminated and the following substituted: The Associate Conductress must be positive, when preparing the ballot box, that there are as many white balls as there are voting members in the chapter room, and the proper number of black balls or cubes. there be a chapter that has not in its possession as many white balls as it has members they should be purchased.-1938.

89. That the Grand Chapter give serious thought to changing our session to an earlier date and appoint a committee to look into

this matter.-1938.

90. That this Grand Body give its approval and recognize the sounding of the gavel in the subordinate Chapters as the opening of the Chapter.-1938.

Approved Decisions

The election of a petitioner to receive the degree in a Chapter, when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petitioner, is null and void.—1922.

2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in the Chapter

during the Session? No.—1922.

The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session.—1925. Rescinded.—1936.

Can we hold rehearsal at members' homes? No.—1926.

A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election.—1926.

6. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.

-1926.

- What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter, and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission.-1928.
- Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the Obligation? No. Members can rise and repeat Obligation when presiding officer calls for it.-1928.

After a petitioner has been balloted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot .- 1929.

A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother.—1929.

The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person

who is not eligible to petition for the degrees.—1930.

A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on

the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents.—1930.

13. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record.—1930.

14. A petition for affiliation on demit granted by Chapter not

using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by

our Ritual.-1930.

Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon.—1930.

By-Laws of a Subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a

supply, as interpreted in my official letter number one.—1930. 17. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, 4), plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendation

of Jurisprudence Committee.)-1930.

The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron. -1930.

19. That the Chapter Register be kept from the "Identification slips." The Sentinel shall copy the names from the slips into the

Registry Book.—1931.

20. That in accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Section 44, when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees, and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year.—1931.

That no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices

at the same time in a Subordinate Chapter.—1931.

22. That "A Student Loan Fund" be established. That said sum of \$93.91 be put on interest and some amount, no matter how small, be added each year.-1933.

23. That Secretaries do not read the names of rejected candidates in other Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction and that secretaries keep proper record of all said applicants.—1933.

24. Page 61, 1929 Proceedings, "do not give honorary membership to any one, this law rescinded."—1933.

25. That this Grand Chapter sponsor the Order of Job's Daugh-

ters.-1933.

26. That this Grand Chapter have a yearly benefit during the month of July or August and that fifty per cent of the proceeds be set aside for an Educational Fund and fifty per cent be put in the general treasury for Grand Chapter work. -1933.

27. That a member who is in arrears two and one-half years for dues and has received suspension notice may visit this Grand Chapter

by another Sister of the same Chapter vouching for her.—1935.

28. That a demitted or suspended Past Matron has the right to wear her Jewel, because it is her personal property; however, it does not seem to be good taste.-1935.

That approved Decision No. 3, 1922, be rescinded.—1936.

That the time referred to in constitution shall be the time prevailing in the Town or City on the date that the Grand Chapter is in Session.—1936.

31. Since a Memorial is a service sacred to the memory of a deceased person a Chapter is not required to hold such a service unless one of its members has died during the current year.—1938.




