# INFORMAL OPENING

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 15, 1946, 1.00 P. M.

The informal opening of the Twenty-fifth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, was called to order by Past Worthy Grand Matron Bertha M. Smith, Chairman of Sessions Committee.

The DuBarry Room of the Hotel DuPont in which all sessions were held, was a place of beauty. The Grand East was framed by a white trellis covered with purple wisteria, above which appeared a large silver star; across the center of the star on a purple background in silver letters the word "Friendship." The background of the Grand East was a white shredded cellophane curtain and banked with cybodium ferns, and on the trellis in silver on a purple background were the numbers 1921 and 1946, symbolic of our Twenty-fifth Session. White baskets at the Grand Star Points stations were filled with symbolic flowers, the crimson carpet, the white furniture clustered around the electrically lighted Altar, and the crimson draperies of the DuBarry Room completed a picture which will long remain in the memory of those who attended the session.

After the entrance of the American Flag, the State Flag, the Christian Flag and the Eastern Star Flag, was the entrance of the Pages who formed a triangle; then the entrance of the Worthy Matrons forming a star at the Altar, wearing capes in the five-star point colors. The Star Treble Chorus sang "God Bless Our Star." The Marshals then entered and formed a letter "V"; they were wearing red, white and blue capes and Sister Mildred Bryan dressed as Goddess of Liberty stood at the top of the "V" and sang "God Bless America."

# REPORT OF GRAND SECRETARY ELIZABETH M. FISHER

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

I submit a brief report of my official transactions for the period

May 17, 1945 to the present date, May, 1946.

At the close of Grand Session, May 1945, arrangements were made at the bank for the necessary changes in signatures on our checks.

All bills of Grand Session were paid immediately.

"Get well" cards and flowers for our absent members who were ill, were sent as requested by this Grand Body. All letters of thanks as requested by the Sessions Chairman were written and mailed as soon as possible.

Printing of necessary stationery, lists of Grand Officers and Committee Members were prepared, ordered printed and mailed to Sister Jurisdictions and those entitled to receive them in this Grand Iurisdiction. Notices of Official Visits of Worthy Grand Matron and

Worthy Grand Patron were prepared and mailed.

Memorial cards were prepared and mailed to all Grand Jurisdictions and all subordinate Chapters, also all Past Worthy Grand Matrons and Past Worthy Grand Patrons on the passing of Past Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Frank L. Howard, Past Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Grover C. MacNamee, and Past Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Myrtle C. Nesbitt.

In Memoriam cards have been received from Sister Grand Jurisdictions for 44 Past Worthy Grand Patrons and 34 Past Worthy Grand Matrons and one Grand Secretary. Sympathy cards have been sent

for each one of these Sisters and Brothers.

I have attested and placed Seal of Grand Chapter on 29 Proficiency Certificates awarded by our Grand Lecturer, Edna L. Gifford, and prepared 27 cards for Associate Matrons and Conductresses who have passed satisfactory examinations for work in opening and closing

I have attested and placed Seal of our Grand Chapter on 26 Certificates for Grand Representatives of Delaware in Sister Jurisdictions, have recorded and mailed them with a letter to the respective I have recorded and mailed with a letter, 19 Certificates to Grand Representatives of Sister Jurisdictions in Delaware.

I have made the necessary corrections in a number of Instruction Books and also in copies of Constitution and By-Laws, bringing them up-to-date, sending three copies of Constitutions so corrected to each Chapter with the announcement that I would be glad to correct copies

for any members wishing to have theirs brought up to date.

Due to the serious illness of our Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Helen C. West, and also our Grand Treasurer, Sister Helen R. Wilson, both of whom were in the hospital, it was necessary to make a change in the signatures on our checks. In company with Brother Willard T. Loreman, Chairman of Board of Grand Trustees, and our Associate Grand Matron, Sister Alice C. Abbott, we presented a written request to the Bank Officials for a change in signatures. We signed cards authorizing the acceptance of checks on our account, bearing the name of Alice C. Abbott, Associate Grand Matron and Elizabeth M. Fisher, Grand Secretary.

I attended all but one of the Official Visits, also attended the School of Instruction for Deputy Lecturers and several of the Installations.

Five hundred Christmas Cards were mailed from the Grand Secretary's Office.

Christmas Greetings received from Sister Grand Jurisdictions for Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Grand Representatives were mailed as requested.

Proceedings received from Sister Grand Jurisdictions were promptly given to the Associate Grand Matron who is our Fraternal Correspondent and some were mailed to Grand Representatives.

Proceedings of our May, 1945, Grand Session have been a source of annoyance and embarrassment, but the delay in delivery has been entirely beyond our control. Despite illness and death which held up the preparation of the material for our Proceedings, they were turned over to the printer early in August, 1945. Because of the many fair promises made to us by the printer, our hopes were high that they would be published at an early date. After waiting a reasonable time for some material for proof-reading, inquiry developed the fact that "Paper Shortage" was holding up the work. Under the present world conditions this seemed to us reasonable and we decided to be patient, but after another long delay, inquiry again developed that "Labor Shortage" was now causing the delay. Later on, an excuse of illness among employees, then illness of the manager, then death in the family of the man who was supervising the work until the word "Proceedings" sent shivers up and down our spine. We realized we were being treated with gross neglect, but as the printer had our material, our hands were tied and despite our requests for action, our pleadings or complaints, our Proceedings were not finished and mailed until March, 1946. No one regrets this more than our Junior Past Grand Matron, Sister Elizabeth Pierce and myself for we did everything in our power to expedite the publishing, reading and

returning the proofs personally the day after they were received. The Proceedings for 1944 were late enough but the date on which the 1945 Proceedings were mailed is something we would rather not think about. Perhaps conditions in the business world will make the report on Proceedings next year much more satisfactory in every way, at least we earnestly hope so.

I have endeavored to take care of requests for supplies promptly but there have been some items, such as ribbons, jewels, emblems and Bibles which have not been obtainable from any place at any price.

Bibles ordered in June, 1945, have not yet been delivered.

We have had delays, difficulties and disappointments of all kinds in the Grand Secretary's Office this year and we know the inconvenience has been felt in subordinate Chapters but we trust everyone realized these annovances and inconveniences were caused by conditions beyond our control and not by neglect or lack of interest in your needs.

Our Annual Reports were a little late in coming in this year and I would like to ask that our secretaries make a special effort to have them in the Grand Secretary's Office not later than Feb. 15th.

Victory Chapter No. 15. Art. 1, Sec. 2. Except when a meeting falls on any National holiday, Christmas Eve or New Year's Eve,

this meeting shall be omitted.

Victory Chapter No. 15. Sec. 2-1A. "That when a Stated meeting of this Chapter shall fall on Christmas Eve or New Year's Eve such meeting shall be omitted." We approve.

Amendment to Delaware Chapter No. 1, O. E. S. By-Laws, made

October 23, 1945, which reads as follows:

"The stated meetings of this Chapter shall be held on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of each month at 7.45 P. M. (no meetings in July and August, Dec. 24 or Dec. 25, and when the Grand Chapter Banquet falls on our meeting night." We approve.

Report of Constitution and By-Laws recommending a return to Board of Grand Instructors in place of Deputy Grand Lecturers.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star:

We, your Committee on Constitution and Laws in conjunction with the Jurisprudence Committee, approve amendments to by-laws as previously approved by the Associate Grand Matron. Our attention has been drawn to dissatisfaction in the present system of instruction by Lecturers and have been asked to offer a recommendation to the Board of Grand Instructors, therefore we recommend:

A return to the Board of Grand Instructors, to be elected by the Grand Chapter, each for a period of three years. The Board to consist of four members, two for New Castle County Chapters, and one each for Chapters on Routes 13 and 113. Their duties to be the same as the old Board of Grand Instructors.

This will make necessary changes in the Constitution as follows:

Art. IV, Sec. 2. There shall be a Board of four Grand Instructors, etc.

Art. IV, Sec. include Board of Grand Instructors.

Art. IX, Sec. 1. "She shall be a member ex-officio of the Board of Grand Instructors.

Paragraph 12, return "Board of Grand Instructors."

Delete Sec. 17 entirely.

Delete Sec. 8, paragraphs 1, 2, A and B re duties of Grand Lecturer and restore the former Sec. 8 entirely re Grand Instructors.

After a lengthy discussion, motion was made by P. W. G. Patron J. W. Miller, seconded by W. G. Patron Charles V. Cleaver, that the recommendation be laid upon the table. Motion adopted.

Grand Secretary Emeritus, Sister Lilly Ann Pyle, was presented in the West and welcomed by Worthy Grand Matron. As this was Sister Lilly Ann's birthday she was escorted to the East and the Assembly sang "Happy Birthday."

# REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT SISTER ALICE C. ABBOTT, Asso. Grand Conductress

In submitting my report, I must tell you that it has been a real pleasure to have traveled from Maine to California, and from Canada to Scotland, by way of the various Proceedings, thus experiencing no transportation difficulties in catching trains or buses.

As we are welcoming new members into our Order each year, we

are glad to review a few items of general information:

The Order of the Eastern Star was founded in 1850 by Robert Morris and has grown to be one of the largest Fraternal Organizations in the world. It consists of four Sovereign bodies, namely:

The General Grand Chapter.

The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland.

The Independent Grand Chapter of New York, and The Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey.

There are now over 12,000 Chapters and the membership today is nearly 2,000,000 members.

Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter and New Brunswick the youngest. The largest is Illinois and the smallest is Puerto Rico, while our own State of Delaware is the smallest in the United States.

It has been an inspiration and an education to learn of the great advancement of our Order. Space will not permit me to record all of the interesting information that has come to us from the various Grand Jurisdictions. I can only give you a few of the highlights, here and there, hoping that you, too, may gain a more comprehensive idea of the great work we strive to do.

The open Bible rests upon every altar, which should remind us of our Obligation and our belief in Him, whose Star we follow.

"Old Glory," symbol of the land in which we live, with its story place of honor.

Sister Mamie Lander, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and Brother Harold T. Landeryou, Most Worthy Grand Patron, were honored guests of many Grand Chapter sessions, giving inspiring messages of courage and hope for the future.

Benevolence, Red Cross and Defense Work of all kinds have been especially emphasized. Oklahoma has given 17 ambulances to the War Department. Missouri equipped 24 ward cars on Overseas battleship Missouri. New York raised a sum of \$94,000 which was battleship Missouri. New York raised a sum of \$94,000 which was for hospitals, one large Hammond Organ for a U. S. Hospital ship, 3 pianos and musical instruments for two complete orchestras. Some Grand Jurisdictions raised money for a Prisoner of War Fund, others purchased Mobile Canteens, X-Ray machines and hospital broadcasting systems. This is only a small amount of the work that is going on over all the territory that embraces Eastern Star organizations.

There are 50 Eastern Star and Masonic Homes, and 18 exclusive Eastern Star Homes, while 23 states contribute to the support of the Masonic Homes. Ten states have Orphanages and 4 have Tuberculosis Homes. Many Jurisdictions sponsor Employment Bureaus, Relief Boards, Hospital Circles and Central Service Committees. It has been estimated that approximately \$5,000,000 is contributed annually by members of the Order for the upkeep of these Homes and Hospitals, and also for relief and education.

The promotion of ideals among girls is sponsored in many Jurisdictions. There are the Job's Daughters, Rainbow Girls, the Daughters of the Eastern Star of New York, and the Beatitudes in Florida. Approximately 60,000 girls are members of these Orders.

# BRIEF HIGHLIGHTS

New Mexico has a permanent Seeing-Eye Dog Fund.

A sister in Alberta, Canada, 80 years old, drives 80 miles to Chapter, fills her station of Electa, and drives back home the 80 miles. She has been doing this for five years.

Honorable Harry S. Truman, President of our United States, is a Past Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Missouri, A. F. and A. M., and a Past Patron of Grandview Chapter No. 365, Order of the Eastern Star, Grandview, Missouri.

The Duke of Kent was Most Worshipful Grand Master of England at the time of his death. He was installed by his brother, King George, who is a Past Grand Master. The mother of Queen Elizabeth is a member of the Eastern Star.

Minnesota has maintained a widow and orphanage fund for over forty years.

Ohio charges a registration fee of 25 cents per member to defray the expenses of the Grand Chapter. Other jurisdictions have adopted this plan.

On behalf of the Grand Jurisdiction of Delaware, we extend Fraternal Greetings to our Sister Jurisdictions, and express our appreciation for the manner in which their Fraternal Correspondents have reviewed our Grand Proceedings.

holding office-mother, father and three daughters.

An O. E. S. Home Fund is well supported, and a banner is given to the chapter with the largest per capita donation.

This Grand Chapter has a large investment in War Bonds and an Ambulance Fund.

#### ARKANSAS

The Sixty-ninth Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Arkansas was dedicated to the late Sister Gussis Burnett Park, Worthy Grand Matron from November 1, 1945, to May 13, 1946. Sister Park served six months of her term of office.

# BRITISH COLUMBIA

The Thirty-fourth Annual Session, known as the "Five-Ray" Session—Fidelity, Constancy, Loyalty, Faith and Love. Worthy Grand Matron requested no corsages, etc., but money be given for a fund for the Crippled Children's Home in Vancouver. Also, each chapter hold one function a year and proceeds to start a Revolving Educational Fund. Constituted three new chapters. Reports on war work were gratifying. An electric organ costing over \$1,000.00

was donated to Shaughnessy Hospital in Vancouver. Ritualistic work was demonstrated by Grand Officers.

### COLORADO

The 52nd Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Colorado, known as the "Star of the East" Session, convened in Denver, September 23-24, 1944. The decorations were very simple, yet effective, and symbolic of the motto: "Peace on Earth, Goodwill Toward Men."

The Senior Past Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Eva Aldrich, who presided over the Grand Chapter fifty years previously, was recognized and honored by the assembly, and given a gorgeous orchid.

Through the efforts of the War Service Committee, a recreation room was completely furnished for the returned convalescent service men at Fort Logan Hospital in Denver.

### DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

Stated meeting held in May, and Forty-ninth Session held in Jan., 1945. Electric Organ presented to Navy Chapel in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Regret passing of Sister Flora Campbell, Right Worthy Grand Treasurer, and Past Worthy Grand Matron. Hold Annual "Nite of Thrills" for benefit of Masonic and Eastern Star Home, proceeds \$12,836.23, an all-time high. Conferred upon Sister Teachum, title of "Grand Lecturer Emeritus" in recognition of her long and faithful service.

### GEORGIA

Held Special Executive Emergency Session in June due to ban on conventions by O. D. T. consisting of 50 delegates only for purpose of reading reports, granting charters to thirteen new chapters, and advancement of line officers only. Dedicated Eastern Star Temple. Presented American Red Cross with ambulance and station wagon.

#### IDAHO

The 43rd Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Idaho was held in Lewiston, June 12, 13, 1945. "Sunrise Session." Members have given much time and money in the work of Red Cross, Canteen, U. S. O., and Masonic Service Centers.

"A Sunrise Fund" has been started to give comfort (wherever possible) to service men.

Sponsors an Eastern Star Library.

#### ILLINOIS

The 70th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Illinois, known as the Patriotic Service Session, convened in Medinah Temple, Chicago, Oct. 3-4, 1944. One of the distinguished guests was Sister Mamie Lander, Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Reports showed a very active interest in war activities, Red Cross, and the Masonic Service Center. Over 12,000 service men were enter-

tained in this Center during the year.

The U. S. Treasury Dept. credited the O. E. S. with the sale of bonds at a Victory Rally totaling \$218,000 and the first bomber purchased had stenciled on its side, "Eastern Star of Illinois."

Another bond drive netted \$300,000 in three weeks, an amount sufficient to fully equip a thousand bed hospital in the United States.

Two Homes and a Masonic Hospital are maintained.

#### INDIANA

The 71st Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Indiana, convened in Indianapolis, April 25, 1945.

The Red Cross Equipment Fund amounted to \$10,309.68. \$5,000 of this amount was used to furnish 5 recreational rooms in a Convalescent Hospital. A station wagon was also purchased for the Fort Wayne Red Cross Chapter. Several wards of 50 beds each were equipped with radio headphones.

\$16,556.62 was presented to the Masonic Home by the chapters, realized from penny collections. Elmer F. Gay, Supt. of the Home, is a 33rd degree Mason and has belonged to the Masonic Order for fifty years.

During the year, the Worthy Grand Matron dedicated 873 babies to the principles of the Order.

Job's Daughters and the Order of Rainbow for Girls enjoy large memberships in this State.

### Iowa

The 67th "Victory" Session was held in 1944. Home of Most Worthy Grand Patron whose gavel traveled over the State. Worthy Grand Matron presented Iowa State Flag to Grand Chapter, her three grandsons acting as bearer and escort. Reports show gain in membership of 1,583. Eastern Star Masonic Home with 98 members maintained by several endowment funds.

#### KANSAS

"Build Stately Mansions" was the Motto of the Grand Chapter of Kansas which convened in Main Lodge Room of the Masonic Temple, Topeka, Kansas, April 17, 1945.

The Grand Session met for one day and only necessary business was transacted. No subordinate Chapters were represented.

In order to make their Motto worthwhile and effective, the Eastern Star Project for the year was, "The Green House" for Winter General Hospital which was adopted as a reconditioning unit where flowers could be grown for the patients and by the patients.

# KENTUCKY

The Grand Chapter of Kentucky held their Annual Session in Lexington in October, 1944.

This "Light and Liberty" Session was dedicated to the memory of Mrs. Florence B. Dunkie, Mother-in-law of the Worthy Grand Matron.

Seven new Chapters were instituted.

The sisters and brothers of the Eastern Star in Kentucky sold \$1,701,000 in bonds. In recognition of this fine job, Sister Dunkie, the W. G. M., was presented with a Citation on behalf of the Treasurer of the United States.

#### MAINE

War Emergency Session was the title given to the Grand Chapter of Maine when it convened May, 1945.

Credentials were issued to the present and incoming Grand Officers and such Committee members who had necessary official duties.

The elective line Officers were to be advanced. There was no election of Associate Grand Patron or Associate Grand Conductress. The incoming Grand Matron appointed two Past Grand Officers to fill those stations for the ensuing year.

#### MANITOBA

"Be Strong and of Good Cheer" was the motto chosen by the Worthy Grand Matron of the Grand Chapter of Manitoba.

This Twenty-third Annual Session, called the Unity Session, was held in the Fort Gerry Hotel, Winnipeg, Canada. On the west wall a large plaque of white letters standing five feet high formed the word "Victory" with the flags of the allied nations overhead. The backs of the Star Points' chairs were covered with a floral decoration of the appropriate colors with the letter "Unity" outlined in white.

The Worthy Grand Matron in her address said, "The project for the year would be the raising of funds to be used toward the purchase of equipment for the new wing at Deer Lodge Hospital."

## MICHIGAN

The 78th Session of the Grand Chapter of Michigan, known as the "Prayer for Peace" Session, convened in Grand Rapids, October 10-12, 1944. Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter in the world, having 466 Chapters.

Outstanding on the program was a beautiful anniversary tribute arranged in honor of the 25th anniversary of service of the Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Minnie Evans Keyes, in a formation representing the Star, Pentagon and Circle—symbols of the Subordinate Chapter, the Grand Chapter, and General Grand Chapter.

One of the outstanding achievements in the Grand Chapter of Michigan, was the presentation on D-Day of a check for \$10,000 as a gift from the Subordinate Chapters to the Percy Jones Hospital for radio equipment. During the Session, another \$10,000 was presented to the same hospital to insure every occupant of the hospital bedside radio privileges. The 466 Chapters have done outstanding war work.

#### MINNESOTA

"Peace Session" held in September, 1945, postponed from usual time in May account of O. D. T. ban on conventions. "Faith" and station of Martha stressed during year by Worthy Grand Matron. Contributed \$20,147.52 to "O. E. S. Victory Wing" at Post Hospital, Fort Snelling, building recreation room complete with furnishings.

#### MISSOURI

The 71st Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Missouri, known as the "Session of Light," convened in St. Louis, October 29, 1945.

Honorable Harry S. Truman, our President, is a Past Patron of

Grandview Chapter No. 365, O. É. S., of Grandview, Missouri.

The Opening Ceremony was beautiful, ending in a very impressive Bible Ceremony.

This Jurisdiction sponsors Job's Daughters and Order of Rainbow for Girls. Also active in all branches of Red Cross Work.

A loan fund, known as the Missouri Eastern Star Revolving Fund of 1945, was established to be used for emergency short-time loans without interest to veterans of World War II returning to colleges.

#### NEBRASKA

The 69th "Temple Session," dedicated to the memory of Worthy Grand Matron's son, who made the Supreme Sacrifice in World War II.

Maintains Masonic-Eastern Star home for Children. Reports show gain in membership of 738. Sponsors Student Educational Loan Fund. Grants Certificate and Fifty Year Pins to members who have been initiated 50 years.

#### NEVADA

"Rainbow Session." Grand Secretary is Past Worthy Grand Matron and member of committee on Foreign Relations of General Grand Chapter. Special project is Order of Rainbow for Girls.

# New Brunswick

Only 15 years old. "Unity and Peace Session." Instituted one Chapter. Pledged unswerving loyalty to King George and Queen Elizabeth and the two Princesses.

# NEW HAMPSHIRE

"Peace Session" reports increase in membership. Has an Eastern Star Home Fund; also Educational Loan Fund. Presented forty-six 50-year certificates.

# NORTH CAROLINA

The Grand Chapter of North Carolina, which was scheduled to meet in Greenville, June 10th-13th, in the East Carolina Teachers

College, was postponed, due to the ban on conventions. The Elective and Appointive Grand Officers, District Deputies, Standing and Special Committees continued to serve in their capacities.

A fully equipped ambulance was presented to the U. S. Navy

by this Grand Chapter at Elizabeth City.

Maintains Eastern Star Home at Greensboro. Sponsors the Order of the Rainbow for Girls.

North Carolina issues a monthly Eastern Star Paper known as the "Tar Heel Star News."

#### NORTH DAKOTA

Presentation of Pioneer Past Worthy Grand Patron, Walter Lincoln Stockwell, was an outstanding feature of this Grand Chapter. Brother Stockwell has held membership in the O. E. S. since March, 1893. In his closing address, Brother Stockwell said, "Let us remember Paul's message to the Galatians, 'Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ.' I sincerely wish you all could read the wonderful message he gave to the Grand Chapter of North Dakota.

The 56th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Ohio, known as the Harmony and Peace Session, convened in Columbus, Oct. 30, 1945.

The Committee on Survey and Purchase of Gifts for the War and Veteran Hospitals of Ohio, is to be commended for their wonderful work. Gifts to these hospitals amounted to several thousand dollars.

Following the custom of the past several years, Eastern Stars of Ohio purchased during the year, hundreds of brooms made by blind broom makers—assisting those who are afflicted. 176 Chapters purchased brooms totaling \$11,069.69.

#### ONTARIO

The 29th "Victory, Loyalty, Devotion" Session was held. Has Florence Nightingale Home for Children and Aged. Instituted 2 new Chapters. Reports show gain in membership of 184. Sold \$12,007.50 for "Boots for Britain" to help children of Britain. Presented Most Worthy Grand Matron with plaque to be placed in Temple in Washington, sent from Essex, England, made from a building bombed by the Germans. A sacred concert on Sunday preceded the Opening.

#### OREGON

The special "Peace Session" held in place of the cancelled 56th Annual Session, was opened in the beautiful Shrine Ballroom on Oct. 1st. The Organ Prelude concluded, the lights were dimmed and the silence was broken by a lovely soprano voice singing, "Sweet Peace the Gift of God's Love."

In one of the Subordinate Chapters of Oregon, a member has filled the station of Ruth for 47 years. A family whose contribution to Stardom is a Worthy Matron, with 4 daughters, Adah, Ruth, Esther and Martha; the last three filling those offices in the Chapter. Dad is Jr. Past Patron, and the son and daughter-in-law are newly initiated members of the Chapter.

#### PENNSYLVANIA

The 50th Session of the Grand Chapter of Pennsylvania, "The Golden Jubilee Session," convened in Pittsburgh, June 12-15, 1944.

A Cathedral setting was provided for the Grand East, featuring a beautiful church window which depicted angels at the foot of the Cross. The color scheme for this session was Gold and Purple.

Red Cross hours by the members totaled 1,062,892. There were 6,252 blood donors.

The Fraternal Correspondent gave a most wonderful and unique report in rhyme, having committed it to memory. I had the pleasure of meeting her at the Grand Session.

### QUEBEC

The 23rd Annual Meeting of the Grand Chapter of Quebec was dedicated "Star of Bethlehem Session" to the pioneers of the Order in Quebec "who came of age" at the 21st Annual Session last year. Quebec has 31 Chapters, and a membership of 2,067. One new Chapter was instituted last year.

#### RHODE ISLAND

The Golden Jubilee Session of the Grand Chapter of Rhode Island convened in East Providence, October 10, 1945. A History of the Grand Chapter over the 50 year period was prepared by one of the Past Matrons. Three of the Subordinate Chapters held 50th anniversaries.

Sponsors Educational and O. E. S. Home Funds and Order of Rainbow for Girls.

Report on United Clothing Drive was very gratifying. Members active in Red Cross Work.

# SASKATCHEWAN

The 29th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Saskatchewan, O. E. S., known as the "Bells of Peace Session," convened in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, May 15-17, 1945.

The Worthy Grand Sentinel of the General Grand Chapter (who is a member in Saskatchewan) gave the address of welcome.

Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Lander, was presented with a beautiful Floral Ceremony given by the Grand Star Points.

Kiawatha Chapter No. 47, in the province of Kamsack, was left homeless when a cyclone destroyed the Masonic Temple. Contributions from other Chapters totaling over a thousand dollars as well as a personal check from the Worthy Grand Patron of over a thousand dollars was sent to the Grand Secretary's office to assist Kiawatha Chapter in re-establishing herself.

SOUTH CAROLINA

This Chapter had to forego the regular Grand Chapter Session, and questionnaires were sent to first four officers of the Subordinate Chapters to elect a new set of Grand Officers.

A Mobile Canteen Unit was donated to the Red Cross and \$2,000.00 forwarded to China for the China War Relief. Also played a big part in the Masonic Drive for a fleet of hospital planes, the bond sales totaling more than a million dollars.

# SOUTH DAKOTA

The 56th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of South Dakota convened at Mitchell, October 10-12, 1944.

The colors chosen for this "Loyalty Session" were blue and goldour State Colors.

The three funds supported by this Grand Chapter are: Educational Loan Fund, O. E. S. Home Fund, and Masonic Service Fund. Over \$2,000 was sent through Red Cross for Prisoners of War.

Sponsors Job's Daughters, having 9 Bethels with a membership of 550 girls.

Central Service Correspondents are active to see that members are extended courtesies in other Jurisdictions.

### TEXAS

Delegates to the "Freedom Session" of the Grand Chapter of Texas began assembling in Amarillo on Sunday, and a large number of members were in attendance at Church services at the First Baptist Church.

On Monday evening, Oct. 22nd, the Opening Session was held in the Municipal Auditorium of Amarillo. This Grand Chapter Session was the Sixty-third for Texas.

I the year 1945, Texas Chapters initiated 8,089; total number of Chapters 609, and number of members 72,623.

#### UTAH

The 40th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Utah, the "Garden Session," convened in Salt Lake City, Oct. 11, 1945. Sister Mamie Lander, Most Worthy Grand Matron, attended.

Sponsors Job's Daughters, having six Bethels.

An hour of music was given by the Worthy Grand Matron's niece, who was well known for her contralto voice, and who arrived from New York with her accompanist to fulfill her aunt's dream of four years.

\$1,100.83 was donated to Educational Rehabilitation Fund. Also donated generously to China Relief. Total of 44,214 hours spent on Red Cross Work.

#### VERMONT

The 73rd Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Vermont convened in the Community House at Rutland, Vermont, June 6, 1945.

In the Grand East a huge American Flag adorned the wall and the Worthy Grand Matron's motto for the year, "Love, Loyalty, and Service," was appropriately displayed.

Deputy Grand Patrons as well as Deputy Grand Matrons are

appointed.

The membership of Vermont is 10,957.

#### WASHINGTON

The "Serve, Sing and Smile Session" of the Grand Chapter of Washington was held in Seattle, June 21, 1945.

The 40,000 members in the State of Washington did a great

amount of Red Cross, Defense and other war work.

Sponsors Job's Daughters and Order of Rainbow for Girls. Also has an Educational Loan Fund and a Children's Foundation Fund for assisting needy children.

#### WEST VIRGINIA

The 42nd Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of West Virginia was held at the Masonic Temple, Clarksburg, West Virginia, Oct. 2, 1945. The Worthy Grand Matron's motto for the year was "Love One Another."

West Virginia's chief financial project for the year was "Hospital Equipment for China," their goal was \$1,000; they received \$1,906.79.

One Chapter has a Worthy Matron 80 years old and she has a thorough knowledge of the work. Another Chapter has two officers who must drive 42 miles to attend meetings, and one who drives 30. They are loyal officers and are regular in attendance.

### WYOMING

The 48th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Wyoming, known as the "Martha Session," convened in the Masonic Temple, Cheyenne, Aug. 28, 1945.

Worthy Grand Matron urged every Chapter in the State to buy "War Emergency Bonds" and also asked Red Cross Work be continued.

1. American flag, etc.

We find nothing in the By-Laws governing this procedure. Approved recommendation:



# ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER APPROVED RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter, the Secretary shall read the Land Marks. 1922.

2. That a committee be appointed to purchase suitable badges to be worn by our representatives to the General Grand Convention. 1922.

3. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order. 1922.

- 4. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction. 1922.
- 5. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination.
- 6. That no member be allowed to vouch for anyone unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them. 1922.
- 7. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess; by doing so, closes the Chapter. 1922.
- 8. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door. 1922.
- 9. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware. 1922.
- 10. That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patron's Jewels. 1922.
- 11. That examination for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record. 1923.
- 12. That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Book, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledger, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State. 1923.
- 13. That the Proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner; one copy to each Grand Officer, to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron, to each Grand Representative of Delaware, to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter; five copies to each Chapter in Delaware and three copies to each Grand Jurisdiction.

#### 1923-1930

- 14. That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official Cover for Delaware. 1923.
- 15. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting, 1924.

- 16. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session, immediately after its close. 1924.
  - 17. That Public Installations be discontinued.
- 18. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as "Obligation Night" in which to have a Special service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter. 1925.
- 19. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations," adding those made and approved each year. 1925.
- 20. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings. 1926.
- 21. That officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations. 1926.
- 22. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparation rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed. 1926.
- 23. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore, no Chapter or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner. 1926.
- 24. That the sale of anything in the Chapter room be prohibited. 1926.
- 25. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting, a duplicate shall be sent at the same time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary. 1926.
- 26. That in the printing of all future Annual Proceedings of this Grand Chapter, bids shall be secured from three reputable printers in Wilmington and the contract awarded to the lowest and best bidder by the committee. 1927.
- 27. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the name of the candidate initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter rooms. 1928.
- 28. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office. 1928.
- 29. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installation. 1928.
- 30. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon

first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention. Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter. 1929.

31. That the paraphernalia shall not be used for any other pur-

pose than that of Chapter work. 1929.

32. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on demit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation. 1930.

33. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter. 1930.

34. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution as a part of their required property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary, the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the

necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. 1930.

35. That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter as amended to date, be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session). 1930.

36. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the

Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for approval. 1930.

37. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose. 1930.

38. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation, shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August)

unless stated meetings are held during these months. 1930.

39. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petition to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter. 1930.

40. That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each. 1930.

41. That a price of Five (\$5.00) Dollars be placed on Secret Work and Two (\$2.00) Dollars on the Diagram of the Labyrinth. 1930.

42. That the Opening and Closing Ceremonies used in this Session of Grand Chapter be adopted as the official opening and closing ceremonies of this Grand Jurisdiction. 1930.

43. That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star. 1931.

44. That a space be provided for the signature of the installing

officer on the list of officers installed. 1931.

45. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any members interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire. 1931.

46. That a form for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as

other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary. 1931.

47. That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign Proceedings after a period of five years and that due care be

taken in disposing of them. 1931.

48. That a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter (marked—"Property of Grand Chapter" and with Seal affixed), be given to each member of the Jurisprudence, Constitution and By Laws Committee and to each elective officer and returned to Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. That copies be sold to interested members of the Order for twenty cents each. 1932.

49. That "A Student Loan Fund" be established. That said sum of \$93.91 be put on interest and some amount, no matter how small,

be added each year. 1933.

- 50. That no practice meetings be held on Sunday. 1933.
- 51. That the Book of Instruction on Page 8, "Reception of Grand Officers on Official Visits," be changed from "They shall be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Conductress and Associate Conductress have finished proving the Chapter," to "They should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Chapter has been declared open." My reason for this recommendation is that Grand Honors should not be given when the Bible is closed and the Chapter not opened. 1934.

52. That the names of all Past Matrons and Past Patrons be printed in the Proceedings after the names of the officers. 1934.

53. That the Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee composed of four sisters and one brother to be known as an "Educational Fund Committee," one member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years and one for one year. Thereafter one to

be appointed each year to serve for five years. Said committee to have the custody of all money belonging to the fund. All disbursements to be signed by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the committee. 1934.

54. That in the future in the compilation of the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, the Grand Secretary be instructed to report on all motions, resolutions or amendments as follows: "After discussion the following motion, resolution or amendment (as the case may be), being properly moved and seconded, was adopted or rejected, (as the case may be) by the Grand Chapter." 1934.

55. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given members of the Jurisprudence Committee. These books to remain the property of the Grand Chapter of Delaware and to be returned to the Grand Chap-

ter at the completion of each member's term. 1934.

56. That the signs of the Five Degrees, as interpreted in the 1935 Schools of Instruction, be accepted for this Grand Chapter. 1935.

57. That no Life Membership shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such memberships). 1935.

58. That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patrons shall have the same restrictions as the Worthy

Patron regarding the Pink Slip. 1935.

59. That all petitions for affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered. 1935.

60. That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdiction.

1935. Pages 37-38.

- 61. That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to bring the Book of Instruction to date in accordance with the Ritual and that slips be printed to take care of these changes. 1935.
- 62. That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruction. This in accordance with the General Grand Chapter. 1935.
- 63. That a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter. 1935.
- 64. That those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report, which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the opening of the Grand Chapter Session. 1935.
- 65. That in order to facilitate the making of proper records, secretaries of Subordinate Chapters be instructed to list on their annual reports both the new and old names of members whose names have been changed since the issuance of the latest annual report. 1935.

- 66. That copies of the various sections of the report of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron which may properly come before the Jurisprudence Committee be placed in their hands at least two weeks before the Grand Chapter Session and the remainder of the reports be in the hands of this committee not later than one week before. 1935.
- 67. That all Grand Representatives Commissions expire the same month, December 31. 1936.
- 68. That our Proceedings be bound in book form with stiff backs, four or five in one volume. 1936.
  - 69. That Job's Daughters be added to our mailing list.
- 70. That Chapters urge their committees on application to be more particular in their investigation. This is the most important committee in your Chapter. 1936.
- 71. That the Associate Matron march to her station when the Worthy Matron says: "The officers will take their respective stations." 1937.
- 72. That a Membership Committee shall be appointed each year by the Worthy Matrons. 1937.
- 73. That the Worthy Grand Patron make a written report to his successor in office of all outstanding petitions for dispensations and any preliminary work that has been done to create interest in localities where no Chapters exist. 1937.
- 74. That a committee of three be appointed to revise the Institution Ceremony. 1937.
- 75. That as the Conductress is the only one (except the Worthy Patron) to use the pink slip in her work, that the Associate Conductress be required to pass a Grade B examination at least three days before being installed as Conductress. 1938.
- 76. That a complete set of our Proceedings be bound for the use of the Worthy Grand Matron. That she be held responsible for same and deliver them to the installed Grand Matron at the same time she delivers the Seal, etc. 1938.
- 77. That the fourth paragraph on Page 28 in the Proceedings of 1930, be eliminated and the following substituted, "The Associate Conductress must be positive, when preparing the ballot box, that there are as many white balls as there are voting members in the Chapter room and the proper number of black balls or cubes. If there be a Chapter that has not in its possession as many white balls as it has members, they should be purchased. 1938.
- 78. That this Grand Body give its approval and recognize the sounding of the gavel in the Subordinate Chapters as the opening of the Chapter. 1938.
- 79. Having noticed some of the articles published in the newspapers regarding Eastern Star work, I recommend that Recommendation No. 1, Proceedings of 1928, Page 27, be strictly adhered to. 1941.

80. I recommend that all Chapters requesting Dispensations shall accompany their request by check drawn on Treasury of Chapter requesting same. 1941.

81. That the salary of the Grand Secretary be reduced from \$200

to \$150 per year. 1941.

82. We recommend that the percent (50%) as stated in the recommendation regarding the Summer Benefit of 1933 on Page 89 of the 1940 Proceedings, be changed to 25% to the Educational Loan Fund and 75% to the General Treasury for Grand Chapter work. 1941.

83. That the compensation to the Fraternal Correspondent be

eliminated for the time being. 1941.

84. I recommend that in order to eliminate embarrassing situations, Honorary Memberships in Subordinate Chapters not be proposed or voted upon when the recipient is in the room. 1943.

85. That the Grand Lecturer's contingent fund be increased to

\$50.00, 1943.

86. That the gestures used in Adah's lecture for the past two years be adopted in this Jurisdiction. 1944.

87. That the Associate Conductress hand the ballot box to the Worthy Matron from the floor of the Chapter room and not go up on

the platform. 1944.

88. That we discontinue the use of stoles. The Jurisdiction of Delaware has adopted the use of shoulder ribbons and no officer should wear both. 1944.

89. That the Deputy Grand Lecturer instruct new candidates in the Secret Work within thirty days after their initiation. 1944.

90. That the second paragraph on Page 28 of the 1930 Proceedings

be incorporated in the Book of Instructions. 1944.

91. That the outline for Proficiency examinations in the Constitution and By-Laws, Rules and Regulations for Class A certificates as found on Pages 29, 30 and 31 of the 1930 Proceedings, be mimeographed for the use of those desiring to take the examination. 1944.

92. That a card be issued to the Associate Matrons as follows to show that they have passed the examination required. "This is to certify that ..... Associate Matron of ..... Chapter No..... has passed a satisfactory examination in opening and closing ceremonies. 1944.

93. That the Conductress drape the Charter immediately after the Flag Ceremony in all Chapters. This to be incorporated in the

Book of Instructions, 1944.

94. Since the present method of entrance for officers of subordinate Chapters is Ritual and therefore mandatory, I recommend that No. 30 on page 4-a of the Book of Instructions, be deleted. 1944.

95. That when a Chapter amends its By-Laws, copies of said amendments be sent in threes to the Grand Secretary, one for the book in the Grand Secretary's office, one for the book held by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, and one for the Worthy Grand Matron's book. These books will then be kept up-to-date. 1944.

96. That since the bound set of books for the Grand Secretary's office cannot be found, I recommend that another set be bound and that it be kept in the Grand Secretary's office permanently. 1944.

97. That the incoming Deputy Grand Lecturers receive a copy

of the Proceedings. 1944.

- 98. That the Worthy Grand Patron read Article 8, Sec. 1, of the Constitution, on balloting, before the election of officers each year. 1944.
- 99. That the words "Without further ceremony" be deleted from Article 11, Sec. 6 of the Rules and Regulations. This will give the Worthy Grand Matron the privilege of having a ceremony if she so chooses. 1944.
- 100. Approved Recommendation No. 38 states, "That five copies of the Constitution be furnished instead of three. Each Chapter should receive two copies of the Secret Work and one Diagram of the Labyrinth and one Book of Instructions. Each Chapter is required to have a Roll Book, a Register and a Record Book, therefore, these should be furnished at the time of institution. 1944.
- 101. That the Associate Grand Matron, who according to our Constitution and By-Laws, automatically becomes Fraternal Correspondent, be granted permission to divide the Proceedings received, with the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress, each to review and report same to the Associate Grand Matron to be included in her report to this Grand Chapter. 1944.

102. That the diamond used in the future for Past Grand Matron's

Jewel, be a fine point eighteen (.18) white stone.

103. When it is impossible for the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron to attend a Grand Visitation, the Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress proceed as though both officers were present and conduct either Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron, as the case may be, to the East. 1945.

104. Since the Ritual requires the Associate Matron to assume the duties of the Worthy Matron, I recommend that the Conductress take an examination in the Opening and Closing Ceremony, at least three

days before being installed as Associate Matron. 1945.

105. Inasmuch as we no longer use the words "My duty is" and "his or her station is" in the opening exercises of Subordinate Chapters, that the Grand Chapter delete these words from the opening exercises of the Grand Chapter. 1945.

## APPROVED DECISIONS

1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degrees in a Chapter when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petition, is null and void. 1922.

2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in Chapter

during the Session. No. 1922.

3. Can we hold rehearsal at member's home? No. 1926.

4. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election. 1926.

5. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.

1926.

6. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission. 1928.

7. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the Obligation? No. Members can rise and repeat Obligation when

presiding officer calls for it. 1928.

8. After a petitioner has been ballotted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot. 1929.

9. A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star, if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother. 1929.

10. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person

who is not eligible to petition for the degrees. 1930.

11. A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents. 1930.

- 12: A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated. Signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record. 1930.
- 13. A petition for affiliation on demit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual. 1930.
- 14. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is ballotted upon. 1930.
- 15. By-Laws of a Subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a supply as interpreted in my official letter No. 1. 1930.
- 16. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. 111, Sec. 1 and 4), plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendations of Jurisprudence Committee). 1930.

- 17. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron. 1930.
- 18. That any resolution or law voted on and adopted at any Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, shall not be in force until after the Session in which such laws were adopted, is closed, unless the time of taking effect is included in the motion.
- 19. That in accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Section 44, when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year. 1931.
- 20. That no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices at the same time in a subordinate Chapter. 1931.
- 21. That Secretaries do not read the names of rejected candidates in other Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction and that Secretaries keep proper record of all said applicants. 1933.
- 22. Page 61, 1929 Proceedings. "Do not give honorary membership to anyone." This law rescinded 1933.
- 23. That this Grand Chapter sponsor the Order of Job's Daughters. 1933.
- 24. That a member who is in arrears two and one-half years for dues and has received suspension notice, may visit this Grand Chapter by another sister of the same Chapter vouching for her. 1933.
- 25. That a demitted or suspended Past Matron has the right to wear her Jewel, because it is her personal property; however, it does not seem to be good taste. 1935.
  - 26. That approved Decision No. 3, 1922, be rescinded. 1936.
- 27. That the time referred to in Constitution be the time prevailing in the town or city on the date the Grand Chapter is in Session. 1936.
- 28. Since a Memorial is a service sacred to the memory of a deceased person, a Chapter is not required to hold such service, unless one of its members has died during the current year. 1938.
- 29. The per capita tax shall be seventy-five cents for all members on the books, December 31, regardless of when they joined the Chapter. "Chapters working under dispensations as well as chartered chapters shall pay the specified amount of per capita dues to the Grand Chapter. Constitution—Article XIII, Sec. 2, also Article III, Rules and Regulations, Sec. 1, p. 7.) The per capita shall not be pro-rated. 1944.
- 30. The sum of fifty cents shall be paid on all Charter members as well as those initiated prior to the end of the fiscal year to the Grand Chapter, since they all pay Five Dollars initiation fee. No fee is paid to the Grand Chapter for affiliations. 1944.



31. Only a brother may occupy the station of Worthy Patron or Associate Patron. (This decision made by Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Easton). If there is no brother present, the Worthy Matron may invite a Past Matron to call the Chapter to order and invite the Worthy Matron and other officers to enter the Chapter room. 1944.

32. A dispensation is required to hold a special election, the Chapter members being notified ten days prior thereto. (Constitution and By-Laws, Article I, Sec. 10, under Rules and Regulations governing

subordinate chapters. 1944.

33. Collection plates shall not be passed in the Chapter room. The By-Laws specify the amount of dues each member shall pay. Voluntary contributions may be put into a receptacle placed in a convenient place, such as Electa's cup or on the Associate Matron's pedestal. 1944.

34. There shall be no music while the prayer is being said. (Ritual,

Page 34-fine print.) 1944.

- 35. In the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter, Sec. 65, of the Rules and Regulations governing subordinate Chapters, PP 3, and 7, use the word "Worthy" after the word "Past" and states that the officers should be introduced by their full title. Therefore, the word "Worthy" should be used. 1944.
- 36. A member of the order has been visiting our Chapter for some time, and has decided to affiliate with us. Can she be balloted on and welcomed on the same night?
- Yes. I refer you to approved decisions No. 13—1930. However, I would suggest the petitioner wait in the preparation room while the Chapter is balloting. 1945.
- 37. We have received a petition for the conferring of degrees from a W. A. C. at the New Castle Army Air Base. As our law calls for white in which to be initiated, shall we return this petition, or can she, if elected, be initiated in her uniform?
- Yes. If these girls are sacrificing their lives that we may enjoy the privilege of freedom, we can sacrifice our law as to white dresses, that they may enjoy the privileges of our Order. There is no greater honor for the Order of the Eastern Star, than to accept a member into our Order who wears the uniform of the United States Army or any branch of the service of United States, providing they meet our requirements. 1945.
- 38. A wife of a Master Mason who desires to become a member of our Chapter will not have been a resident six months when her petition is received but will be a resident six months when she is initiated. Would it be possible to receive her petition?
- No. I refer you to Article 1, Section 30, Rules and Regulations, for the government of Subordinate Chapters in Delaware. 1945.
- 39. If the Worthy Patron does not care to learn the long lecture in the initiatory ceremony, can the Associate Patron assist by giving this part of the work?

No. Your Worthy Patron is in charge of the initiatory work and if he does not care to learn the long lecture, it is not compulsory. The Ritual informs him that it is optional and therefore it is strictly his prerogative. I personally feel that the candidate loses the most beautiful part of the initiatory work when the long lecture is omitted. However, that is the law. 1945.

40. My sentinel brought his resignation into the Chapter room on our stated meeting, February 6. Due to the fact it was thought illegal for the sentinel to enter the room and present any business, it was laid on the table until the next stated meeting. What disposition do I make of this matter?

Since that time I have received the resignation of three of my appointive officers. Should I declare these offices vacant and obtain special dispensations to install new officers to fill these vacancies or

continue with substitutes the rest of my year?

I have never heard of an officer resigning after being installed into office, however, a dissatisfied officer does not make a good one, and I would suggest that you accept the resignations, for "those who assume obligations lightly and forthwith forget them" do not make good members and to be a good officer, one must first be a good member. Therefore, I would fill these vacancies with new officers, obtain a dispensation, and have them installed as soon as possible. 1945.

41. These resignations were addressed to me in care of the Chapter and Secretary. Should I accept them in open Chapter or, should

my Secretary send letters of acceptance?

Since these are your personal appointments and were not voted into office by the Chapter members, my answer to this question is, have the resignations read by the Secretary so that they may be recorded in the minutes, and treat them as you would any other communications—Noted and filed. For in America we cannot compel people to serve against their will; this tends to dictatorship, and that is what our boys are giving their lives to overcome. 1945.

42. Can these members, after resigning, attend the stated meet-

ings the rest of this year, or must they wait for a new year?

There is no law that says we can bar any member from attending our meetings, provided that they are in good standing and do not affect the peace and harmony of the Chapter, however, if these officers, because of some personal feeling do not want to take their respective stations after having assumed the officers' obligation around the Altar, upon which rests our Holy Bible, repeating these words, "I will faithfully and impartially perform all the duties belonging to the office for which I have been selected," I would think this evidence enough that they are not interested in the welfare of the Chapter, and therefore should not desire to attend the meetings. 1945.
