

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 21, 1947, 2.00 P. M.

The 26th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, convened in Julia M. Story Chapter Room, Pythian Castle, 906 West Street, Wilmington, Delaware, on Wednesday, May 21, 1947, at 2.00 P. M.

Past Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, and Past Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Robert S. Gallaher, presided in the Grand East. Acting Grand Marshal, Sister Ella F. Cleaver, escorted the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Alice C. Abbott, the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Percy C. Cotty, and other Grand Officers into the Grand Chapter Room. Past Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, welcomed the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron as follows:

Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, welcome to the Grand East and to the task that is before you. May this, the 26th Grand Session, be a high-light in the annals of history of our Grand Chapter and of our Grand Order that is serving the Divine Plan of Life by the practice of the virtues portrayed in the lessons taught.

REPORT OF THE CREDENTIAL COMMITTEE

Five (5) Chapters represented and 35 voting delegates present. Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Alice C. Abbott, made the follow-

ing announcement:

Sisters and Brothers: Inasmuch as our By-Laws state that the "Annual Meeting of this Grand Chapter shall be held in the city of Wilmington on the third Wednesday of May at 2.00 o'clock P. M., or at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron, in any town or city in Delaware where there is a Subordinate Chapter," I had to officially open this Grand Chapter today, the third Wednesday of May. As no adequate meeting place could be secured on the exact date of our Annual Session, it was necessary for me to declare an Emergency, which I have done by means of an official letter to all the Subordinate Chapters in this state, after taking up the matter with some of the members of the Jurisprudence Committee and the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, as well as some of the members of our Grand Chapter. M., at which time the regular schedule of business will be transacted. As no business will come before the Grand Chapter at this time, we will recess until Monday, May 26th. The Informal Opening is scheduled for 1 o'clock. The Formal Opening at 2 o'clock P. M.

Worthy Grand Matron thanked her substitutes and expressed her appreciation to the members on the sidelines.

The Grand Marshal, by order of the Worthy Grand Matron, proclaimed the 26th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, called to recess, to reconvene at two o'clock on Monday, May 26th, in the Gold Ballroom of the Hotel DuPont.

INFORMAL OPENING

1.00 P. M.

The Informal Opening of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, known as the Harmony and Happiness Session, was held in the Gold Ballroom of the Hotel DuPont and called to order by the Sessions Chairman, Sister Elizabeth E. Pierce, at 1

o'clock, daylight saving time.

The room was beautifully decorated in connection with Harmony. Musical clefs, cut from red and black construction paper were placed around the room. Miniature pianos were on taborettes at the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress stations and on the floor of the platform of the Associate Grand Matron and Patron, also in the Grand East.

A large plaque adorned the Grand East with the same design as

the Worthy Grand Matron's program.

A hand-painted four-sectioned screen rested below the plaque surrounded by palms and flood lights from the floor representing the rising of the sun in East. Behind each star point's pedestal was a container in which a golden lyre rested.

At the sound of the gavel, the conductresses of the subordinate chapters acting as Pages and carrying American flags formed a Guard of Honor as the American Flag, carried by P. W. P. Brother J. Nelson Abbott, Christian Flag carried by P. W. G. P. Brother Robert W. Larrimore, State Flag carried by P. W. P. Brother Harmon Money, who served with the Worthy Grand Matron in her home chapter, and Eastern Star Flag carried by P. W. P. Brother Wm. D. Ayers, were brought into the Grand Chapter room.

After placing each flag in its respective standard, the color bearers faced West and stood at attention as each Page placed her flag in a receptacle provided in the Grand East. When the last Page had returned to her station, all retired in the formation of the letter

"H", in keeping with Harmony and Happiness.

A human lyre was formed. The Star Treble Chorus and Worthy Patrons of 1946-47, and Assistant Sentinels forming the frame, while the Pages, Marshals, Organists and Worthy Matrons of 1946 and 1947 of the Subordinate Chapters represented the strings, each wearing a cape of gold cloth, and sang to the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron to the tune of "Sympathy." Charsha, mother of the Worthy Grand Matron and to whom the Session was dedicated was presented with a huge bouquet of red roses and introduced by the Sessions Chairman. very cordial welcome was extended by the Worthy Grand Matron and Sister Ruth M. Laws, Worthy Matron of Five Points Chapter No. 13, Newport, sang "All the World is Waiting for the Sunrise," a favorite of the Worthy Grand Matron's mother.

Rev. C. N. Harris, Pastor of Harrison Street M. E. Church, gave the invocation and greetings from the City of Wilmington were extended by the Judge of the Municipal Court, Hon. Thomas

Herlihy, Jr.

The Star Treble Chorus sang a medley of songs relative to roses, honoring the Worthy Grand Matron's flower for the year, after which Rev. Harris delivered an address on the Motto for the year of the

Worthy Grand Matron, "Harmony and Happiness."

During a selection by the Star Treble Chorus, the Worthy Grand Matron escorted her mother, Worthy Grand Patron escorted Judge Herlihy, and the Sessions Chairman escorted Reverend Harris from the Grand Chapter room due to the fact that they were not members of the Order, and the Assistant Sentinels prepared the labyrinth for the formal opening at 2.00 o'clock.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

At the last Grand Chapter Session a motion was adopted that the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter be revised under the supervision of the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, assisted by the Grand Secretary. On the evenings of July 1, July 16, 1946, March 17, and May 19, 1947, meetings of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee were held at my home relative to the revising. On each occasion I invited the Associate Grand Matron to attend. This revision is now complete awaiting approval of this Grand Chapter.

On the evenings of July 25, 1946, April 7 and April 22, 1947, I called at the home of the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, Brother Jay W. Miller, relative to some information on the By-Laws and the declaration of an Emergency for the Grand Chapter Session. I was accompanied on these visits by the Grand Secretary, Sister Sarah E. Riggin, and Brother Charles V. Cleaver.

SPECIAL SESSION OF GRAND CHAPTER

A special session of this Grand Chapter was held on Saturday evening, October 12, 1946, at 7 o'clock, in Pythian Castle, for the purpose of granting a charter to Unity Chapter U. D. Letters were sent from the office of the Grand Secretary on September 12th, notifying the members of this Special Session. I wish to thank Sisters Ella Cleaver and Lillian Larrimore for substituting for Warder and Starpoint Martha, respectively.

CONSTITUTING OF THE NEW CHAPTER

It was indeed a real pleasure for me to have the privilege of Constituting Unity Chapter on October 29, 1946. Approximately sixty-five members from Wilmington went by bus or private cars to witness the ceremony. The large chapter room was filled to capacity with members from all over the state. Feb. 15, 1947—Appointed Sister Dora Fitzgerald as Acting Deputy Grand Lecturer for Sussex Chapter in the absence of Sister Louise Wright who was vacationing in Hawaii. Notified the Grand Lecturer

and Sussex Chapter of this temporary change.

Apr. 4, 1947—Appointed Brother Howard Payne to Registration Committee to serve the unexpired term of the late Brother Leroy Beatty.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

To all verbal and written questions, I have given careful consideration and have replied to the best of my ability. Most of these were answered by referring to the Ritual, Book of Instructions, or the Constitution and By-Laws. Where advice was asked in several cases, I endeavored to give counsel that would be conducive to the Harmony and Happiness of the Chapters.

1. May we ballot at a Special meeting?

Answer: No.

2. May we have news items printed in our weekly home-town news-paper?

Answer: Yes, any brief news items may be printed in your weekly

home-town newspaper.

3. We have a new-comer in our town, having purchased a house here. Her household goods have been in storage here for over six months, but inasmuch as she was not able to get the tenants out of her newly-purchased home, she had to stay in her former town. She has now been living here nearly four months. Would she be eligible to join our chapter?

Answer: No. The person must have lived in the jurisdiction of the chapter six months. See Article A, Section 30. Rules and Regulations governing Subordinate Chapters in Delaware.

4. Our Secretary passed away. May we hold a Special meeting to elect a new one?

Answer: Yes, after a Special Dispensation has been granted from the Worthy Grand Matron for the purpose of electing a Secretary and all members have been notified 10 days before the election meeting.

5. Our charter is now draped for one of our deceased members. The 30-day period has not expired. Another one of our members just passed away. Do we undrape the charter (even though the 30-day period hasn't expired) and then drape it again for the other member?

Answer: No, do not undrape the charter. Have the presiding officer mention the passing away of this other member, thus the drape remaining on the charter for 60 days for the two deceased members.

6. I am Marshal in my chapter, but due to the illness of our Secretary, I am serving in her station until she is able to assume her duties. How shall I sign the Minutes?

Answer: Secretary, pro-tem.

7. Can a suspended member of ——— Chapter affiliate with another chapter in the city?

Answer: No. The member must be reinstated in his or her chapter before she can affiliate with another chapter.

8. Can a person join our chapter who is unable to kneel at the Altar due to arthritis in her knees?

Answer: Yes. I see no reason why a person should be deprived the privileges of our Order due to her inability to kneel at the Altar. She could stand with bowed head while taking the Obli-

gation.

9. We would like a Special Dispensation granted for the purpose of holding our regular meeting on December 26th, as our regular meeting night occurs on December 25th. You will find enclosed \$1.00 for this Special Dispensation.

Answer: It is impossible for me to grant this Dispensation, because regular meetings cannot be changed. Meetings are either

regular or special. I suggest amending your By-Laws.

10. Our Secretary passed away. Should we fill this station pro-tem or hold an election to elect a new one?

Answer: Since this is a very important office, I suggest having an election to elect a new Secretary.

- 11. If a Past Worthy Matron from another Jurisdiction affiliates with our chapter, should she be listed as a Past Worthy Matron? Answer: She will always be a Past Worthy Matron from the Jurisdiction where she came, and my opinion is, after affiliating with your chapter, she should be listed as an Affiliated Past Worthy Matron.
- 12. Is it legal for a chapter to receive a petition from one whose husband was a Master Mason in good standing at the time of his death, but has remarried and whose present husband is not a Mason?

 Answer: When this person remarried, she ceased to be the widow of the Master Mason; therefore, she would not be eligible to

petition a chapter.

13. Can a secret ballot be taken on any part of our chapter business?

Answer: Yes. I refer you to Page 34, Section 11 of the Grand Chapter Rules and Regulations which reads: Unless otherwise ordered, the voting shall be by raising the right hand.

14. What is the proper procedure for investigating the Masonic affiliation of a petitioner? Answer: To write the Secretary of the Lodge to which the Master Mason belongs.

1. Minutes being typewritten and pinned in Minute Book.

2. Pocketbooks at officers stations.

- 3. Members discussing chapter business in presence of those who are not members of the Order and also at public chapter suppers. 4. Walking through the Labyrinth during recess of the chapter.
- 5. Secretaries not using correct stationery for certain phases of the work.
- 6. Not opening Bible for test oath.

7. Wearing colored hose.

DECISIONS

Inasmuch as we were not able to secure an adequate meeting place for our Grand Chapter Session on the third Wednesday of May, the time which our Grand Chapter By-Laws state we should meet, I took the matter up with some of the members of the Jurisprudence Committee and the Constitution and By-Laws, as well as some of the members of our Grand Chapter. After much discussion and consideration, it was decided for the good of the Order to declare an Emergency, which I did by means of an official letter sent to all the Subordinate Chapters in the State. As I wanted to comply with the By-Laws and was able to obtain a chapter room, I officially opened the 26th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, in Julia M. Story Chapter Room, on the third Wednesday of May, the twenty-first, at 2 P. M., then recessed until the following Monday where adequate accommodations had been made in the Gold Ballroom of the Hotel DuPont for our annual twoday session; the regular order of business taking place.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. To amend Article V, Section 1 of Constitution and By-Laws to read:

"The Annual Meeting of this Grand Chapter shall be held in the City of Wilmington on the Third Monday of May at two o'clock P. M., or, at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron, in any town or city in Delaware where there is a Subordinate Chapter.

2. That the Deputy Grand Lecturers be given authority to give examinations in Class B, but the certificate be issued by the Grand Lecturer.

3. That a nominating committee be appointed to receive nominations for the elective offices and a definite hour be set for the closing of the nominations. My reason for this, which dates back ten years, is that it will eliminate the "whispering campaigns" which are very confusing and often cause misunderstandings. It will also give every voting delegate the opportunity to know who is a candidate for the office.

4. Candidates may be seated during the lecture of the Worthy Patron in the Initiatory Work.

5. Increase capitation tax from 75c to \$1.00 per member—this would eliminate the necessity of raising money by means of a summer benefit.

6. That a Past Worthy Matron or Past Worthy Patron from another Grand Jurisdiction, who has affiliated with us in this Grand Jurisdiction, be known as an affiliated Past Worthy Matron or Past Worthy Patron, having all the privileges and prerogatives of the Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons in this Grand Jurisdiction.

Sunday morning we attended religious services in the beautiful Tampa Theatre. The sermon was delivered by the 74-year-old Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Florida, F. and A. M., and Pastor of the Presbyterian Church.

From three to five o'clock on Sunday afternoon, it gave me much pleasure to entertain at tea in my suite in the Hotel Hillsboro in honor of the Delaware Delegation and some of our Eastern Star friends. The guests numbered one hundred. I do appreciate the help given me by my friends in making this tea successful.

Following the Delaware Tea, Brother Larrimore and I enjoyed our visit to the Texas Tea, where I received a lovely picture of the Texas Bluebonnets and some of the flower seeds.

At 9 P. M. a pageant entitled "The Gleaners" was given by the

Grand Chapter of Oklahoma at the Municipal Auditorium.

The exchange of souvenirs between the Grand Jurisdictions on Sunday evening and Monday at the Floridan Hotel created much fun and laughter.

Monday afternoon, Sister Helen Anderson, a Past Worthy Matron of Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3, now residing in Tampa, drove several of us around the city of Tampa and to St. Petersburg where we saw the famous "Green Benches." Sister Anderson was extremely helpful

and kind to the Delaware Delegation.

The Informal opening on Monday evening at 8.30 o'clock, held in the Homer Hesterly Armory, was very beautiful, with many notables of the city and state present, and Delaware was very proud to have in this lengthy procession three members; namely, Sister Elizabeth E. Pierce and Clara A. Reuter as Ladies-in-Waiting, and Brother Robert W. Larrimore, as an Assistant Worthy Grand Sentinel.

The theme of the Most Worthy Grand Matron's session was, "The Silver Lining of Peace." Our hearts were saddened by the absence of the Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Harold Landeryou, who had been confined to his bed for a year with a nervous breakdown.

One of the most thrilling sights was the Flag Cavalcade. Delaware Delegation again was very proud when they saw the State Flag being carried with great dignity by our Past Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Larrimore.

The Formal Opening was at 10 A. M., Tuesday, November 12th. Each morning the sessions were preceded by lovely and very impressive

pageants.

Tuesday evening at 6 P. M. was the Crystal Ball with 1100 attending, after which we were invited to the Egypt Temple Shrine Club to dance and witness a floor show.

Wednesday was devoted to regular order of business and reports.

The only changes noticed were:

- 1. That at this session and hereafter, all candidates are to be regularly nominated preceding the election to the office for which they aspire.
- 2. That the Right Worthy Grand Trustees be elected for 9, 6, and 3 years as indicated.
- 3. The office of Worthy Grand Sentinel be made elective instead of appointive as heretofore. However, this will not take place until the Triennial session in 1949.

The evening session ended with a Memorial Service, "Garden of Memories."

Thursday was devoted to reports and election of officers. This took quite a long while. I was very much impressed with Brother Landeryou's report—one section in which he stressed the point that we should encourage our Masonic Brothers to join the Order of the Eastern Star. It is not just a woman's organization, but is for Masons, their wives, daughters, mothers, widows and sisters.

One of the outstanding reports was that of Sister Minnie E. Keyes, Right Worthy Grand Secretary, who after 26 years of service retired from the office. Her report showed many interesting items.

A very beautiful pageant was given Thursday evening in the Armory by the members from Hawaii. Also, a lovely fashion show by one of Tampa's Department Stores—ending with a beautiful wedding party.

Friday, the Delaware Delegation went to Silver Springs by bus, the round trip requiring nearly four and one-half hours. Thirty-seven members took the trip and we were really thrilled with our ride in the

glass bottom boats.

Friday evening was Installation of Officers, after which the 25th Triennial Session closed in regular form to meet in Toronto, Canada, in 1949.

Altogether, it was an enjoyable session. It was a real pleasure to attend the various State breakfasts, luncheons and dinners we were invited to, and meeting so many lovely and congenial sisters and brothers from other Grand Jurisdictions. It was a very stren-

uous week, but I thoroughly enjoyed it all.

The delegation from Delaware were quite proud to have their state recognized in the appointments of Sister Olga Philip, Most Worthy Grand Matron—that of Sister Elizabeth E. Pierce, Past Worthy Grand Matron, who was appointed to serve as a member of the Foreign Relations Committee.

The majority of our delegation left by train for home Saturday afternoon, arriving in Wilmington, 1.30 P. M., Sunday, November 17th. Eight of our members joined 400 other Eastern Star members from the Convention and flew to Cuba—spending a few days there.

I wish to express my deep and sincere gratitude to you, my Grand Chapter, for the privilege of this wonderful trip. It made me realize that whether a subordinate chapter, a Grand chapter, or the General Grand Assembly, we are all striving to maintain the high principles

upon which our Order was founded.

I wish to thank Sister Martha W. Krapf, Chairman of the Souvenir Committee, and Sister M. Etta Keys, Chairman of the Badge Committee, for their choice selection of very attractive souvenirs and badges which so many members admired. Again, many thanks to Brother Robert W. Minutes of the first day's session were read and approved.

REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE

ON THE REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, O. E. S.:

Your Jurisprudence Committee has carefully reviewed the report of the Worthy Grand Matron and respectfully submits the following:

1. Dispensations Granted

We approve all dispensations granted, except the one to Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8 to elect and install a secretary at a special

meeting on September 24, 1946.

Paragraph 3, Section 1, Article 1, of Rules and Regulations for the Government of Subordinate Chapters in Delaware, states: Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Worthy Matron and such business as trials, conferring of degrees, installation of officers, funerals, and memorial services or ceremonials and observances, shall be transacted, etc.

This section does not specifically state that officers may not be elected at a special meeting. By inference, however, it would seem that election of officers may be held only at a stated meeting.

To avoid any question of legality in the election in Caesar Rodney Chapter, we ask that the action of the chapter be approved, but recommend that in the future election of officers be confined to stated meetings in the subordinate chapters.

2. Subordinate Chapter By-Laws

We approve, in conjunction with the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, all changes in subordinate chapter by-laws.

3. Questions and Answers

a. We approve answers to Questions 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, 12, 13.

b. We approve answer to Question 6 relating to signature of marshal as secretary pro tem, but recommend that, wherever possible, officers be required to fill the stations to which they have been elected or appointed.

c. No. 11, relating to the status of a past worthy matron from

another Grand Jurisdiction.

We believe that a past worthy matron from another Grand Jurisdiction, having affiliated herself with a subordinate chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, is no longer an active past worthy matron in the other Grand Jurisdiction. Her status would be that of a dimitted past worthy matron in the other Grand Jurisdiction. Whether a past worthy matron or a past worthy patron from another Grand Jurisdiction should be listed as an affiliated past worthy matron or an affiliated past worthy patron will depend upon the action of this Grand Chapter on Recommendation No. 6 of the Worthy Grand Matron. We disapprove

the answer to Question No. 11.

d. No. 14, relating to proper procedure of investigating the Masonic affiliation of a petitioner: We agree that a proper procedure is to write the secretary of the lodge of which the Master Mason is a member, but would add that legal information, either oral or written, from a brother in good standing is also proper procedure.

4. Irregularities

We approve the action of the Worthy Grand Matron in calling attention to various irregularities.

5. Recommendations

a. We approve Recommendations Nos. 2, 4, and 5.

b. Recommendation No. 1: We approve, but suggest that the amendment be worded to allow a week's variation at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron, prior to or following the

specified time.

c. Recommendation No. 3: We believe this recommendation has merit. However, we believe that the nominating committee should be composed of one member from each subordinate chapter, one of whom should be named as chairman. We believe further, that nominations should be permitted from the floor of the Grand Chapter and would suggest, also, that the presiding officer introduce those who have been nominated just prior to the election for each office.

The adoption of this recommendation will require an amendment to Section 1, Article VIII of the Constitution by deleting the sentence: "No nomination for candidates for office shall be

With these additions, we approve the recommendation.

d. Recommendation No. 6: We have no objection to a past worthy matron from another Grand Jurisdiction being listed as an affiliated past worthy matron after she has become affiliated with a subordinate chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction. She cannot have the privileges and prerogatives of the members of this Grand Chapter without violating Section 3, Article IV of the Constitution. She could, therefore, not have the privilege of voting or of holding an office or committee appointment in this Grand Jurisdiction. We, therefore, approve the recommendation that a past worthy matron or past worthy patron from another Grand Jurisdiction, who has affiliated with us in this Grand Jurisdiction, be known as an affiliated past worthy matron or past worthy patron; but disapprove the section relating to "having all the privileges and prerogatives of the past worthy matrons and past worthy patrons in this Grand Juris-

6 Decision

We approve the decision of the Worthy Grand Matron to hold the Grand Chapter Session on the dates specified. A similar emergency occurred in 1935, and the Grand Chapter Session was held a week later than the date specified in our Constitution.

Section 1, Article VIII, of the Constitution specifies that election of officers shall begin at 2 o'clock P. M., Thursday of the meeting week. Obviously, this is impossible if the Grand Chapter convenes on Monday, and the Constitution should be amended to specify that the election should be held at 2 o'clock P. M. on the second day of the Grand Chapter Session. Technically, the only way the Constitution can be fully complied with at this Grand Chapter Session is by recessing today and reconvening on Thursday. Obviously, this would be impracticable.

We, therefore, approve this decision of the Worthy Grand

Matron.

We commend the Worthy Grand Matron for her zeal and enthusiasm in promoting the welfare of the Order, her meticulous attention to details, and her untiring efforts in behalf of the Order of the Fastern Star.

Jurisprudence Committee approved the change from third Wednesday to third Monday, but suggested an amendment be made to allow a week's variation at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron, prior to, or following the specified time.

Motion made by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by P. G. P. Brother Charles V. Cleaver, that this Amendment be made.

Motion adopted.

That the Deputy Grand Lecturers be given authority to give examinations in Class "B", but the certificate be issued by the Grand Lecturer.

Jurisprudence Committee approved. Motion made by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by P. G. P. Brother Charles V. Cleaver, that this permission be granted to Deputy Grand Lecturers. Motion adopted.

3. That a Nominating Committee be appointed to receive nominations for the elective offices and a definite hour be set for the closing

of the nominations.

Jurisprudence Committee approved but suggested that the nominating committee should be composed of one member from each subordinate chapter, one of whom should be named as chairman. We believe further that nominations should be permitted from the floor of the Grand Chapter and would suggest, also, that the presiding officer introduce those who have been nominated just prior to the election for each office.

After considerable discussion, motion was made by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by Associate Grand Patron, Brother Horace K. Fulmer, that we have nominations for office, but suggested the question be referred to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee and that they present a more acceptable plan for receiving nomi-

nations. Motion adopted.

4. Candidates may be seated during the lecture of the Worthy

Patron in the Initiatory work.

Motion by P. G. M. Sister Sarah E. Riggin, seconded by Associate Grand Patron, Brother Horace K. Fulmer, that this recom-

mendation be adopted. Motion adopted.

5. That a Past Worthy Matron or Past Worthy Patron from another Grand Jurisdiction, who has affiliated with us in this Grand Jurisdiction, be known as an affiliated Past Worthy Matron or affiliated Past Worthy Patron, having all the prerogatives and privileges of the Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons in this Grand Jurisdiction.

Jurisprudence Committee disapproved the part of this recommendation reading "be known as an affiliated Past Worthy Matron or affiliated Past Worthy Patron, having all the privileges and pre-rogatives of Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons in this Grand Jurisdiction, and suggested that it read "They be known as Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons and received with the Past Matrons and Past Patrons.

Motion by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by P. G. M. Sister Amy E. Meyer, that this with change in wording the recommendation be approved. Motion adopted.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS:

Question No. 6. I am Marshal in my chapter, but due to the illness of our Secretary, I am serving in her station until she is able to assume her duties. How shall I sign the Minutes. Answer: Secretary pro-tem.

Answer approved, but suggest wherever possible officers be requested to fill the office to which they have been appointed.

Motion by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by Associate Grand Patron, Brother Horace K. Fulmer, that this answer and suggestion be accepted. Motion adopted.

Question No. 11. If a Past Worthy Matron from another Jurisdiction affiliates with our chapter, should be listed as a Past Worthy

Matron?

Answer: She will always be a Past Worthy Matron from the Jurisdiction where she came, and my opinion is, after affiliating with your chapter, she should be listed as an Affiliated Past Worthy

This answer was disapproved by the Jurisprudence Committee and motion was made by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by P. G. M. Sister Helen C. West, that the decision of the Jurisprudence Committee on Recommendation No. 6 covering the same subject be accepted. Motion adopted.

Question No. 14. What is the proper procedure for investigating

the Masonic affiliation of a petitioner?

Answer: To write the Secretary of the Lodge to which the Master

Mason belongs.

Jurisprudence Committee approves the suggestion to write, but would add that legal information either oral or written from a brother in good standing is also proper procedure.

Motion by P. G. P. Brother Jay W. Miller, seconded by Associate Grand Patron, Brother Horace K. Fulmer, that this be accepted.

Motion adopted.

REPORT OF THE PRINTING COMMITTEE

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

The Report of the Printing Committee has been a sorry story for

several years, but this year we can strike a more cheerful note.

Quotations were requested from all printing establishments in Wilmington, equipped to do this kind of work. Only two or three were interested and the prices quoted were exorbitant. One printer, stated he had done our work years ago and would not undertake it again unless we secured a new Die for the cover, which would cost us perhaps \$30.00 or more. Our good friends, Charles L. Story Company, gave us the best quotation and upon being given the contract, said they would do everything possible to get our Proceedings printed and distributed not later than October 15th. And, on the 15th of October, because of their diligence and interest in us and our Order, the Proceedings were finished and mailed.

The manager of the Charles L. Story Printing Company told us that one of the reasons for the high cost of our Proceedings and the delay in delivery, was the type of cover we use. The emblem on the cover in colors requires a die (which will have to be renewed, before we can have any more prints made from it), necessitates sending the work out of the State, as no concern in Delaware does that kind of work. The colors have to be burned in. Our contract is so small that when it is given to a concern outside of the State, consideration is given to larger orders in preference to ours and even though a local printer finishes his part of the work on time, Proceedings cannot be

fully finished until the covers are received.

We, therefore, suggest that Recommendation No. 14 in Active Legislation reading as follows:

"That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official Cover for Delaware" be rescinded and a cover such as is used on the Proceedings of most all Grand Jurisdictions, namely, just the printed words:

PROCEEDINGS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER OF DELAWARE YEAR 1947

or whatever the year may be. Color to be whatever the Worthy Grand Matron may desire, providing the cost is normal.

FIVE POINTS CHAPTER No. 13-May 17, 1946:

The above appears to be more a motion of the Chapter that would require an amendment. Same should be presented in form of amendment to read:

'Strike out \$40.00, Art. 8, Sec. 2, insert \$60.00; Strike out \$3.00, Art 8, Sec. 2, insert \$10.00."

Frankford Chapter No. 12—Dec. 3, 1946:

UNITY CHAPTER No. 16-April 3, 1947:

No meetings will be held on Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, the evening preceding or the evening of Grand Chapter Session. Motion by P.W.G.M. Sarah E. Riggin, seconded by P.W.G. Patron Walter Sawdon, that the Worthy Grand Patron's Report be accepted and printed in the Proceedings. Motion adopted.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern

Star.

We, your Committee appointed to endeavor to clarify some of the articles in the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, submit the following report:

After many hours of careful study and consideration, we suggest

the following procedure: THAT-

Article IV, Sec. 8, Page 9, be re-written to clarify the meaning: It now reads: "No person except Worthy Grand Matron, Asso. Grand Patron and Grand Treasurer, shall be installed as an elective officer in this Grand Chapter and no member of the Board of Instructors can serve, unless she holds a Certificate of Proficiency from the Board of Instructors, in the secret work, initiation work of the Ritual, the Constitution, Rules and Regulations of this Grand Chapter and fundamental parliamentary rules.

IT WILL THEN READ:

"The Worthy Grand Matron, Asso. Grand Matron, Grand Conductress, Asso. Grand Conductress, Grand Secretary, Grand Lecturer and Deputy Grand Lecturer shall not be installed as an elective or appointed officer in this Grand Chapter until she holds a Certificate of Proficiency in Class 'A'."

Article V, Sec. 1, page 9. It now reads: "The annual meeting of this Grand Chapter shall be held in the City of Wilmington on the third Wednesday of May at 2.00 o'clock P. M. or at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron in any town or city in Delaware where there is a subordinate chapter."

IT WILL THEN READ:

"The annual meeting of this Grand Chapter shall be held in the City of Wilmington on the third Monday of May at 2.00 o'clock P.M., or at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron, in any town or city in the State of Delaware, where there is a subordinate chapter. If satisfactory accommodations are not available at the time stated, the Worthy Grand Matron may select any time within a week prior to, or following the above-mentioned date."

Article VI, Sec. 1, Page 9, Representatives and Proxies: Re-write to clarify:

"Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons have one personal vote each. A Worthy Matron, who is also a Past Worthy Matron has one vote. A Worthy Matron who is a Past Worthy Matron and holds the proxy of the Worthy Patron has two votes. A Worthy Matron holding the proxies of both the Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron has three votes. (The same rule applies conversely to the Worthy Patron, Asso. Matron and Asso. Patron). No one shall cast more than three votes. Representatives of Chapters in arrears for dues shall not vote unless so ordered by two-thirds vote of the delegates present in the Grand Chapter. No Chapter under dispensation shall have the right to representation in this Grand Chapter until after the Grand Chapter votes to give them a Charter, after which the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Asso. Matron and Asso. Patron if present shall have all the privileges of membership in the Grand Chapter, not in conflict with these laws."

The only change we suggest in this paragraph is the sentence reading: "The same rule applies conversely to the Worthy Patron, Associate Matron and Asso. Patron."

After the change, this sentence would then read:

"Neither an Associate Matron, nor Associate Patron may appoint a proxy, but either may carry a proxy of the Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron."

Article 8, Sec. 1, Page 10. "Change 2.00 o'clock P. M. Thursday" to read as follows:

"2.00 o'clock P. M. on the second day of Grand Session."

Page 18, paragraph 8, "Bond" and Page 19, Sec. 6, paragraph 1, "Bond." Combine this in one paragraph under "Blanket Bond" reading as follows:

"A Blanket Bond covering the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, shall be secured from a solvent and satisfactory Guaranty Company, authorized to transact business in the State of Delaware, in such form as is deemed necessary, conditioned upon the faithful discharge of their duties as prescribed by the Constitution. The premium for this Blanket Bond shall be paid by this Grand Chapter."

These are the only changes we suggest in the wording of the present Constitution and By-Laws.

We recommend, however, that items under "Active Legislation of the Grand Chapter—Approved Recommendations—be omitted from our Proceedings and included in our Book of Instructions.

If satisfactory accommodations are not available at the time stated, the Worthy Grand Matron may select any time within a week prior to, or following the above-mentioned date."

Motion by P.G.M. Sister Amy E. Meyer, seconded by Brother Thomas C. Rodway, that this change be made. Motion adopted.

Article VI, Sec. 1, Page 9. Representatives and Proxies.

The sentence in this Article to be changed is the one reading: "The same rule applies conversely to the Worthy Patron, Associate Matron and Associate Patron." After re-editing it will read:

"Neither an Associate Matron nor Associate Patron may appoint a proxy, but either may carry a proxy of the Worthy Matron or

Worthy Patron."

Motion by P.G.M. Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, seconded by P.G.M. Sister Jane C. Zebley, that this change be made. Motion adopted.

Article 8, Section 1, Page 10. "Change 2.00 o'clock P.M. Thursday to read: '2.00 o'clock P.M. on the Second day of Grand Session'."

Motion by P.G.M. Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, seconded by P.G.P. Brother John LeCompte, that this change be made. Motion adopted.

Page 18, paragraph 8, "Bond" and Page 19, Sec. 6, paragraph 1, "Bond" combine in one paragraph under "Blanket Bond" reading as

"A Blanket Bond covering the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer, shall be secured from a solvent and satisfactory Guaranty Company, authorized to transact business in the State of Delaware, in such form as is deemed necessary, conditioned upon the faithful discharge of their duties as prescribed by the Constitution. The premium for this Blanket Bond shall be paid by this Grand Chapter."

Motion by P. G. Matron, Sister Mattie Pyle Horn, seconded by P. G. P. Brother Walter E. Sawdon, that these two paragraphs be combined as suggested. Motion adopted.

Suggestion was made by the Committee that items under "Active Legislation" of Grand Chapter—Approved Recommendations, be omitted from our Proceedings and included in our Constitution.

After considerable discussion, it was decided that the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee to work on these items of Legislation and also the Approved Decisions and present them again at next Grand Chapter Session.

To have had the privilege along with the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress of traveling far and wide, visiting in fancy the Grand Sessions of other Grand Jurisdictions, visioning as we read the beauty of the surroundings, the dignity of the work and the legislation enacted, has greatly enriched our vision of service and knowledge of our Order and now we wish to share this experience with every member of our Star. However, time and space do not permit our telling you how our Order shines with undiminished lustre through countless lives. In deep reverence each Grand Chapter pauses from its deliberations to pay loving tribute to the memory of the sisters and brothers who have been called to the Grand Chapter above.

Our International Temple is located in Washington, D. C. It flies no flag, but a large electric Star, in a pentagon, surrounded by a circle sends forth its light.

It has been a wonderful year for the Eastern Star world, much benevolent work was accomplished. Chapters are gaining in mem-

bership and the Order is steadily moving forward.

A new year lies before us, filled with responsibilities that call for Divine guidance, Love and Loyalty. On behalf of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, we extend cordial greetings to the Fraternal Correspondents of other Grand Jurisdictions and thank them for the excellent reviews of the work in Delaware. To you, Sister Elizabeth, our Grand Secretary, goes my sincere thanks for your promptness in giving the Proceedings to me.

Member has made a will bequeathing 20 acres in Phoenix to be used as a Home for elderly people. Grand Secretary is making card file for every member. Has more than seventy-one thousand dollars as a nucleus for Eastern Star Home. Purchased sixteen projectors and microfilm for special project for Veterans Hospitals, "Projected Books."

ALBERTA.

25th Annual Session (Fidelity Session) was held June 5, 1946. Colors Blue and Silver. Motto—Blest Be the Tie That Binds. The Union Jack and Stars and Stripes were joined together depicting the friendship between our two nations.

British Columbia-1946.

Celebrated their "Jewel" Session as Province of Canada was 75 years old and the Grand Chapter, 35 years old. Grand Electa of Washington gave tribute to Stars and Stripes in ceremony with Union Jack. Held three Special Sessions for Instituting Chapters. Extended invitation to General Grand Chapter to meet in Toronto in 1950. Special project of Worthy Grand Matron raised more than three thousand dollars for a Cancer Fund, also aided Crippled Children's Hospitals in Victoria and Vancouver.

Mrs. Mamie Lander, Most Worthy Grand Matron, was an honored guest and spoke of her many travels to the different Grand Jurisdictions. An Afghan campaign was sponsored. Seventy-one Afghans were made for the Service men and women during the war.

ILLINOIS.

Peace was the predominating feature at the Seventy-first Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Illinois which convened at Chicago, October 2nd, 1946.

The Worthy Grand Matron in her first Official Communication to the Subordinate Chapters made an appeal that a coin collection

be taken Guest Night. From a generous response she was able to present to Chicago Chapter of the American Red Cross \$15,000 from the members.

Job's Daughters, Red Cross, Veterans Hospital are sponsored. Worthy Grand Matron's Project was the "Masonic Home Maintenance Fund." \$12,000.00 was given to this fund. In this Home are some

members of the Eastern Star.

MARYLAND.

Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth Annual Session of Maryland.

April 20-24, 1946.

Mrs. Vincent Massy presented a check to Queen Mary from the O. E. S. Patriotic Association for the British Invalid Children's Aid. A toast to the King and the President of the United States of America was proposed by William Calvert, Worthy Grand Patron.

"Chapel Session" convened in Portland with beautiful chapel window as main theme of decoration. Special project was raising \$2,686.32 for Tractor fully equipped for Masonic and Eastern Star Home. Three chapters celebrated fifty years of service.

Have Memorial Chapel Fund created to add a chapel to Eastern Pennsylvania O. E. S. Home. Educational, Home, Rehabilitation Funds are sponsored, also Job's Daughters. Motto, "Be Ye Kind," was carried out in the Project for the year. "Kindness Cottage," which is a freewill offering for every kindness shown you during the year, is to increase the Endowment Fund.

SUPREME GRAND CHAPTER OF SCOTLAND-1945-1946.

In addition to Grand Committee meetings, holds half-yearly meeting in October and annual meeting in March. Grand Officers known as "Grand Officer Bearers" with the exception of Star Points are elected. Has Senior and Junior Chaplains, both men. Outstanding work, Annuity Fund.

TENNESSEE.

Memorial Gates in memory of a Past Most Worthy Grand Matron and two Past Most Worthy Grand Patrons were given to Eastern Star Home. Fraternal Correspondent gave report in verse, assisted by Grand Representatives to Texas of other jurisdictions, who presented red roses in ceremony to Sister Lander and Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Vollus.

VERMONT-1946.

"Rainbow" Session dedicated to Grand Secretary Emeritus and Past Grand Matron. In exchange of honors, tribute to Union Jack was given by the Worthy Grand Matron of Quebec, when presented by the Grand Marshal of Quebec. coming back to Delaware.

REPORT OF REHABILITATION SERVICE COMMITTEE

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, O. E. S.:

The following report is given. The first visit to the Veterans Hospital was made on Sunday, Oct. 20, 1946, from 2 to 4 P. M. A tea table was arranged as attractively as possible, fruit juice punch and home-made cookies together with apples were served the patients

in each ward. Those patients who were not allowed to eat were given a little pencil gift. On the above date we took to the hospital for use among the patients, 50 Afghans which were made during Sister Elizabeth E. Pierce's year as Worthy Grand Matron. We also had the folding wheel chair bought at that time delivered at the hospital.

Early in November two subscriptions to the Book of the Month Club were ordered through the Grand Secretary's office for the hospital library.

In November, I was appointed on Hospital Committee by J. J. Crowe, Head of Recreation. Sister Elizabeth M. Fisher was appointed my alternate.

In December, just previous to our party at the hospital while attending the Annual Banquet of Newark Chapter, held in Newark, our Worthy Grand Matron's Chapter, I asked if we might buy in addition to what had already been planned for the Christmas Party, twelve dozen Christmas tree ornaments. These had been asked for by the Recreation Department. At the suggestion of Brother Cleaver, Past Worthy Grand Patron, a collection box was passed and \$32.50 was realized. This money was used to help finance the Christmas party.

Mrs. Wheelwright gave through our Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Cotty, the twelve dozen tree ornaments for us to take to the hospital. As Chairman of this work I wrote Mrs. Wheelwright thanking her for same.

We went to the hospital laden with many gifts. First, each patient was given Christmas cards and stamps so that he might remember his families during the holidays. Each one also received a box of nuts and candy tied with bright red ribbon, apples and fruit juice punch and angel food cake were served. To those who were not permitted to eat we gave packages of cigarettes. The ribbon used to tie Christmas boxes was donated by the Star Treble Chorus. The materials for the cakes were donated by Victory Chapter and they were all made by Sister Wilgus, member of Victory Chapter and our present Grand Martha. After every one had been served we had two cakes left. These we took to the Home for Aged Women, Harrison and Gilpin Avenue. Read letter of thanks.

Ten days before Christmas we mailed cards, stamps, box of candy and a carton of cigarettes to William Fitzgerald, son of Sister Fitzgerald, our Associate Grand Conductress, and to Julius Cooper, son of Sister Cooper, first Matron of Kent Chapter. Both of these veterans were in government hospital outside of Delaware. Box of candy and oranges to Mr. Ralph Virden, husband of member of Victory Chapter, who was a patient in Delaware Hospital. Together with the Worthy Grand Matron, visited a veteran who lost his arm while working in the Pennsylvania Railroad yards. Took oranges and nuts to his children and offered to help family if they needed it. No call for help came.

Our next party at the hospital was January 19, serving the usual iced fruit punch and cookies with cigarettes for those unable to eat. The party in February was similar except each patient was given a package of cigarettes. This was made possible by donations of some of our members. Each of the following gave a carton of cigarettes: Sisters Alice Abbott, Martha Krapf, Myra Robinson, Mattie Malcom and Jane Zebley; and Brothers Percy Cotty, Worthy Grand Patron, and Frank P. Keys.

A party was held the following month (March) with the usual attractive tea table being rolled from ward to ward by one of our brothers.

On April 6 we held open house in the recreation room for patients and their guests. Two tea tables complete with lace cloth, punch bowl, candles, flowers, etc., were set up and during the afternoon an informal program was given. It included selection by Star Treble Chorus, cornet solos by Past Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Cleaver, specialty dances by little Carol Foster and Kenny Jester, accordion solos by Miss Donovan and piano selections by Mr. Albert Pettit. This party was highly praised by both patients, guests and personnel of hospital.

Our last party was held on May 6. At this time Sister Chason went with our members through the wards playing and singing. The patients enjoyed this very much and asked for certain favorite selections.

These parties were all held from 2 to 4 in the afternoon.

We have delivered 7 Afghans to date. One from Delaware Chapter and 6 from our Baby Chapter, Unity No. 16. There are a number still to be delivered. Three from Newark and also from Sussex and Kent Chapters.

Early last fall we bought a punch bowl, ice pan, mixing bowl, ladle, large spoon, flower vase and two candle sticks for use in the recreational work. (Previous to this I had been taking these things from home.) We are still waiting to get a suitable pitcher, the money for which was given by Mizpah Chapter. (No glass or china.) Among the donations through our committee are 100 yards of oxford cloth by Sister Mabel Stirlith; knives, spoons, ice pick, ladle, games, case of No. 5 cans of pineapple juice by Sister Edith McLean; cake plates by Sisters Keys, Simpler and Shinn; cookie basket, Sister Myrtle Sawdon; orange, pineapple, grapefruit and grape juice, Sister Edna Gifford; a lovely tablecloth with emblematic star embroidered in each corner by Sister Bertha Kelly. Sugar by Adah Chapter members.

Sister Litchfield called, offering a piano, but the Veterans Hospital did not need it; however, the National Guard was most anxious to get various pieces that could be used in day rooms to be set up in Armories of the State. With very little effort we secured two pianos; the second one through Sister Martins; 78 records, 5 lamps with shades, 2 lamps without shades; 3 shades; 13 books; 1 complete set of Waverly

Novels; 2 radios; 12 copies of Reader's Digest; 4 ash trays; 7 strong chairs; 3 victrolas. Most of these articles were sent to Sister Keys and the Army truck picked them up.

Our largest donation to the Veterans Hospital was buying, cutting, making and hanging the drapes in 3 wards. Sisters Abbott, Fisher, and I picked out the material and I feel I should tell you the stores, Crosby and Hill, and Grant's, made a splendid reduction in price of the material. They were cut, made and hung by Sisters Lorraine Putzier, Bertha Kelly, Sara Hoffman, Laura Fulmer, May Pople, Elizabeth Fisher, Alice Abbott, Sara MacNamee, Ella Cleaver, Beneta Meenan, May Payne, Maude Ames, Mabel Stirlith and Sara Riggin. The reason they hang so well is because our own men put the fixtures and rods up. They were Brothers Robert Larrimore, Pierce Laws, Charles Cleaver, William Meenan, and Irvin Putzier. As there were nearly a hundred windows this was no small job, I assure you.

If you wonder how we could spend so much money just remember Sister Helen West and Brother Charles Cleaver left a goodly amount of money in this fund when their year was completed.

I was asked by Sister May Smith, Past Matron of Five Points Chapter, if we could furnish some volunteers to help at the armory where an affair was being given to raise money for a Nurses National Memorial in Washington. I might add here, Delaware lost one "woman in white" in Africa. This young lady was a graduate of the State Hospital and Delaware's contribution will be in her memory. The following volunteered for this project: Sisters Hilda Buckmaster, Helen Helbing, Emma Dorchell, Beneta Meenan, Ella Cleaver, M. Etta Keys, Emma Gehret, Josephine Kuckenbacker, Iva Ostendarp, May Payne, Sarah Hoffman, Marian Kumpel, Grace Hild, Florence Lang, Lillian Arters, Alice Minner, Madoline Litchfield, Anna Harrington and Brothers Meenan, Cleaver, Keys, Payne and Kumpel. A total of 106½ volunteer hours was given. In addition each chapter was asked to donate \$1.00 and as each did the Grand Secretary sent a check of \$16.00 to the National Committee. (Read letter).

At the present time, 3 of our members are taking the indoctrination course which is being given at the Veterans Hospital. This is a standard course given in all government hospitals to those who are willing to work as volunteers in the hospital. I had expected to take this course but moving away it wasn't possible. The members taking the above course are: Sisters Helen Welsh, Sadie Conly, and Mildred Grubb.

It is quite impossible to give the names of all sisters and brothers who have gone to the Veterans' Hospital and helped serve these parties, but to each of you I want to express my personal thanks and also the grateful thanks of the patients, their families and the personnel of the hospital.

Last but by no means least my thanks go to Sister Keys for her donations of sugar and her many telephone calls to ask you good people to make cookies, which you so generously did. In fact, you

made 4,361.

Worthy Grand Matron, the work has been close to my heart and I have enjoyed helping to bring a little bright spot in the long days the veterans spend in the hospital. A few years ago thousands of our boys and men went whistling and singing off to war. A war, not for gain or glory, but to defend our ideals and freedom. Many did not come back. Many lie beneath the palms of the Pacific, the poplars of France, the beech trees of England or the olive trees of Africa. Many nations have buried in their earth the mortal remains of our boys. Little American flags flutter above neat white crosses, reminding us of the awful cost of war. As we approach Memorial Day, let us remember them and why they fought and died. Let us also remember with compassion those who came home with no song on their lips but sick in mind, body and soul, and help them when we can, but most of all as members of the Order of the Eastern Star and followers of the Prince of Peace; let us see that we do all in our power to prevent such a waste of life again. Let us strive for Peace on Earth and Goodwill among all men.

REPORT OF RED CROSS P. M. Ellen K. Robinson, Chairman

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware:

I herewith submit report of Red Cross work done by Subordinate Chapters from May 1, 1946 to April 30, 1947.

Delaware Chapter No. 1:421 knitting hours; 535 unit hours; 249 garments.

Mizpah Chapter No. 2: 385 unit hours.

Julia M. Story Chapter No. 3: 436 knitting hours; 439½ unit hours; 135 garments.

St. John's Chapter No. 4: 227½ unit hours making boys' shirts, girls' dresses and skirts.

Adah Chapter No. 5: No report.

Radiant Chapter No. 6: 214½ unit hours; 10 garments; 182 buttons and button holes.

Sussex Chapter No. 7: 288 knitting hours; 64 unit hours; 22 garments.

Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8: 286 knitting hours; 124 garment hours; 68 garments.

Georgetown Chapter No. 9: No report. Newark Chapter No. 10: No report.

Kent Chapter No. 11: No report. Frankford Chapter No. 12: No report.

Five Points Chapter No. 13: 90 hours canteen; 912 motor corps; total 1002 hours.

Brandywine Chapter No. 14: 389 unit hours; 91 garments.

Victory Chapter No. 15: No report.

Unity Chapter No. 16: 104 knitting hours; 61 unit hours; 9 garments.

The time consumed in this Red Cross work was 1829 knitting hours and 31571/2 unit hours, making a total of 49861/2 hours.

The work completed consisted of 19 mufflers, 30 sweaters with sleeves, 2 sleeveless sweaters, 10 wristlets, 1 beanie and 56 Afghan squares, 6 ice bag covers, 6 hospital bags, 140 girls' skirts, 29 girls' dresses, 209 baby shirts, 37 boys' shirts, 13 snow suits, 12 boy's overalls and 16 girls' capes, making a grand total of 586 garments.

I wish to thank all who have cooperated in any way, and especially our baby chapter, Unity No. 16, for the work they have accomplished this past year.

The need for Red Cross work is still urgent. Although the war is over, the widows and orphans of the European countries must be clothed and fed. In the coming year I hope each chapter of this Grand Jurisdiction will feel the necessity of doing Red Cross work.

Worthy Grand Matron, I thank you for the privilege of working with you this year and hope your session will continue to be full of love and harmony.

ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER APPROVED RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter, the Secretary shall read the Land Marks. 1922.

2. That a committee be appointed to purchase suitable badges to be worn by our representatives to the General Grand Convention. 1922.

3. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order. 1922.

4. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction. 1922.

5. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee

will give an examination.

6. That no member be allowed to vouch for anyone unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them. 1922.

7. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess; by doing so, closes the Chapter. 1922.

- 8. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door. 1922.
- 9. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware. 1922.
- 10. That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patron's Jewels. 1922.
- 11. That examination for Grade B Certificates be taken at least three days before installation. Certificates to be filed with Grand Secretary for complete record. 1923.
- 12. That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Book, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledger, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State. 1923.
- 13. That the Proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner; one copy to each Grand Officer, to each Past Grand Matron and Past Grand Patron, to each Grand Representative of Delaware, to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter; five copies to each Chapter in Delaware and three copies to each Grand Jurisdiction.

1923-1930

- 14. That the cover on Proceedings of this Grand Chapter for 1921 and 1922 be adopted as Official Cover for Delaware. 1923.
- 15. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting. 1924.

- 16. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session, immediately after its close. 1924.
 - 17. That Public Installations be discontinued.
- 18. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as "Obligation Night" in which to have a Special service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter. 1925.
- 19. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations," adding those made and approved each year. 1925.
- 20. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings. 1926.
- 21. That officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations. 1926.
- 22. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparation rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed. 1926.
- 23. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore, no Chapter or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner. 1926.
- 24. That the sale of anything in the Chapter room be prohibited. 1926.
- 25. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting, a duplicate shall be sent at the same time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary. 1926.
- 26. That in the printing of all future Annual Proceedings of this Grand Chapter, bids shall be secured from three reputable printers in Wilmington and the contract awarded to the lowest and best bidder by the committee. 1927.
- 27. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the name of the candidate initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter rooms. 1928.
- 28. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter be kept on file in the Grand Secretary's office. 1928.
- 29. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installation. 1928.
- 30. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon

first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention. Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter. 1929.

31. That the paraphernalia shall not be used for any other pur-

pose than that of Chapter work. 1929.

32. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on demit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected, shall be required to take the Obligation.

33. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter. 1930.

34. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution as a part of their required property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary, the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the

necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. 1930.

35. That a new edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter as amended to date, be authorized and that this edition be under the supervision of the Grand Secretary and the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws. That five copies be furnished each Chapter, one for the use of each of the first four officers while in office, one to be kept by the Secretary for use of the members. Distribution in Grand Chapter to be decided by this Grand Chapter Session. (Postponed until after 1931 Session). 1930.

36. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the

Committee on Constitution and By-Laws for approval. 1930.

37. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose. 1930.

38. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation, shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August) unless stated meetings are held during these months. 1930.

39. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petition to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter. 1930.

40. That the Proceedings be sold at \$1.50 each. 1930.

41. That a price of Five (\$5.00) Dollars be placed on Secret Work and Two (\$2.00) Dollars on the Diagram of the Labyrinth. 1930.

42. That the Opening and Closing Ceremonies used in this Session of Grand Chapter be adopted as the official opening and closing cere-

monies of this Grand Jurisdiction. 1930.

43. That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing its members, or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star. 1931.

44. That a space be provided for the signature of the installing

officer on the list of officers installed. 1931.

45. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any members interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire. 1931.

46. That a form for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as

other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary. 1931.

47. That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign Proceedings after a period of five years and that due care be

taken in disposing of them. 1931.

- 48. That a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter (marked—"Property of Grand Chapter" and with Seal affixed), be given to each member of the Jurisprudence, Constitution and By-Laws Committee and to each elective officer and returned to Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. That copies be sold to interested members of the Order for twenty cents each. 1932.
- 49. That "A Student Loan Fund" be established. That said sum of \$93.91 be put on interest and some amount, no matter how small, be added each year. 1933.
 - 50. That no practice meetings be held on Sunday. 1933.
- 51. That the Book of Instruction on Page 8, "Reception of Grand Officers on Official Visits," be changed from "They shall be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Conductress and Associate Conductress have finished proving the Chapter," to "They should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Chapter has been declared open." My reason for this recommendation is that Grand Honors should not be given when the Bible is closed and the Chapter not opened. 1934.
- 52. That the names of all Past Matrons and Past Patrons be printed in the Proceedings after the names of the officers. 1934.
- 53. That the Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee composed of four sisters and one brother to be known as an "Educational Fund Committee," one member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years and one for one year. Thereafter one to

be appointed each year to serve for five years. Said committee to have the custody of all money belonging to the fund. All disbursements to be signed by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the committee. 1934.

54. That in the future in the compilation of the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, the Grand Secretary be instructed to report on all motions, resolutions or amendments as follows: "After discussion the following motion, resolution or amendment (as the case may be), being properly moved and seconded, was adopted or rejected, (as the case may be) by the Grand Chapter." 1934.

55. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given members of the Jurisprudence Committee. These books to remain the property of the Grand Chapter of Delaware and to be returned to the Grand Chap-

ter at the completion of each member's term. 1934.

56. That the signs of the Five Degrees, as interpreted in the 1935 Schools of Instruction, be accepted for this Grand Chapter. 1935.

57. That no Life Membership shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such memberships). 1935.

58. That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patrons shall have the same restrictions as the Worthy

Patron regarding the Pink Slip. 1935.

59. That all petitions for affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered. 1935.

60. That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdiction.

1935. Pages 37-38.

61. That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee of three to bring the Book of Instruction to date in accordance with the Ritual and that slips be printed to take care of these changes. 1935.

62. That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruc-This in accordance with the General Grand Chapter. 1935.

63. That a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter. 1935.

64. That those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report, which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the

opening of the Grand Chapter Session. 1935.

65. That in order to facilitate the making of proper records, secretaries of Subordinate Chapters be instructed to list on their annual reports both the new and old names of members whose names have been changed since the issuance of the latest annual report. 1935.

- 66. That copies of the various sections of the report of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron which may properly come before the Jurisprudence Committee be placed in their hands at least two weeks before the Grand Chapter Session and the remainder of the reports be in the hands of this committee not later than one week before. 1935.
- 67. That all Grand Representatives Commissions expire the same month, December 31. 1936.
- 68. That our Proceedings be bound in book form with stiff backs, four or five in one volume. 1936.
 - 69. That Job's Daughters be added to our mailing list.
- 70. That Chapters urge their committees on application to be more particular in their investigation. This is the most important committee in your Chapter. 1936.
- 71. That the Associate Matron march to her station when the Worthy Matron says: "The officers will take their respective stations." 1937.
- 72. That a Membership Committee shall be appointed each year by the Worthy Matrons. 1937.
- 73. That the Worthy Grand Patron make a written report to his successor in office of all outstanding petitions for dispensations and any preliminary work that has been done to create interest in localities where no Chapters exist. 1937.
- 74. That a committee of three be appointed to revise the Institution Ceremony. 1937.
- 75. That as the Conductress is the only one (except the Worthy Patron) to use the pink slip in her work, that the Associate Conductress be required to pass a Grade B examination at least three days before being installed as Conductress. 1938.
- 76. That a complete set of our Proceedings be bound for the use of the Worthy Grand Matron. That she be held responsible for same and deliver them to the installed Grand Matron at the same time she delivers the Seal, etc. 1938.
- 77. That the fourth paragraph on Page 28 in the Proceedings of 1930, be eliminated and the following substituted, "The Associate Conductress must be positive, when preparing the ballot box, that there are as many white balls as there are voting members in the Chapter room and the proper number of black balls or cubes. If there be a Chapter that has not in its possession as many white balls as it has members, they should be purchased. 1938.
- 78. That this Grand Body give its approval and recognize the sounding of the gavel in the Subordinate Chapters as the opening of the Chapter. 1938.
- 79. Having noticed some of the articles published in the newspapers regarding Eastern Star work, I recommend that Recommendation No. 1, Proceedings of 1928, Page 27, be strictly adhered to. 1941.

80. I recommend that all Chapters requesting Dispensations shall accompany their request by check drawn on Treasury of Chapter requesting same. 1941.

81. That the salary of the Grand Secretary be reduced from \$200

to \$150 per year. 1941.

- 82. We recommend that the percent (50%) as stated in the recommendation regarding the Summer Benefit of 1933 on Page 89 of the 1940 Proceedings, be changed to 25% to the Educational Loan Fund and 75% to the General Treasury for Grand Chapter work. 1941.
 - 83. That the compensation to the Fraternal Correspondent be

eliminated for the time being, 1941.

84. I recommend that in order to eliminate embarrassing situations, Honorary Memberships in Subordinate Chapters not be proposed or voted upon when the recipient is in the room. 1943.

85. That the Grand Lecturer's contingent fund be increased to

\$50.00, 1943.

86. That the gestures used in Adah's lecture for the past two

years be adopted in this Jurisdiction. 1944.

- 87. That the Associate Conductress hand the ballot box to the Worthy Matron from the floor of the Chapter room and not go up on the platform. 1944.
- 88. That we discontinue the use of stoles. The Jurisdiction of Delaware has adopted the use of shoulder ribbons and no officer should wear both. 1944.
- 89. That the Deputy Grand Lecturer instruct new candidates in the Secret Work within thirty days after their initiation. 1944.

90. That the second paragraph on Page 28 of the 1930 Proceedings be incorporated in the Book of Instructions. 1944.

91. That the outline for Proficiency examinations in the Constitution and By-Laws, Rules and Regulations for Class A certificates as found on Pages 29, 30 and 31 of the 1930 Proceedings, be mimeographed for the use of those desiring to take the examination. 1944.

92. That a card be issued to the Associate Matrons as follows to show that they have passed the examination required. "This is to certify that _____ Associate Matron of ____ Chapter No.__ passed a satisfactory examination in opening and closing ceremonies. 1944.

93. That the Conductress drape the Charter immediately after the Flag Ceremony in all Chapters. This to be incorporated in the

Book of Instructions. 1944.

94. Since the present method of entrance for officers of subordinate Chapters is Ritual and therefore mandatory, I recommend that No. 30 on page 4-a of the Book of Instructions, be deleted. 1944.

95. That when a Chapter amends its By-Laws, copies of said amendments be sent in threes to the Grand Secretary, one for the book in the Grand Secretary's office, one for the book held by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, and one for the Worthy Grand Matron's book. These books will then be kept up-to-date. 1944.

96. That since the bound set of books for the Grand Secretary's office cannot be found, I recommend that another set be bound and that it be kept in the Grand Secretary's office permanently. 1944.

97. That the incoming Deputy Grand Lecturers receive a copy

of the Proceedings. 1944.

- 98. That the Worthy Grand Patron read Article 8, Sec. 1, of the Constitution, on balloting, before the election of officers each year. 1944.
- 99. That the words "Without further ceremony" be deleted from Article 11, Sec. 6 of the Rules and Regulations. This will give the Worthy Grand Matron the privilege of having a ceremony if she so chooses. 1944.
- 100. Approved Recommendation No. 38 states, "That five copies of the Constitution be furnished instead of three. Each Chapter should receive two copies of the Secret Work and one Diagram of the Labyrinth and one Book of Instructions. Each Chapter is required to have a Roll Book, a Register and a Record Book, therefore, these should be furnished at the time of institution. 1944.
- 101. That the Associate Grand Matron, who according to our Constitution and By-Laws, automatically becomes Fraternal Correspondent, be granted permission to divide the Proceedings received, with the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress, each to review and report same to the Associate Grand Matron to be included in her report to this Grand Chapter. 1944.

102. That the diamond used in the future for Past Grand Matron's

Jewel, be a fine point eighteen (.18) white stone.

- 103. When it is impossible for the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron to attend a Grand Visitation, the Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress proceed as though both officers were present and conduct either Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron, as the case may be, to the East. 1945.
- 104. Since the Ritual requires the Associate Matron to assume the duties of the Worthy Matron, I recommend that the Conductress take an examination in the Opening and Closing Ceremony, at least three days before being installed as Associate Matron. 1945.
- 105. Inasmuch as we no longer use the words "My duty is" and "his or her station is" in the opening exercises of Subordinate Chapters, that the Grand Chapter delete these words from the opening exercises of the Grand Chapter. 1945.

APPROVED DECISIONS

- 1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degrees in a Chapter when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petition, is null and void. 1922.
- 2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in Chapter during the Session? No. 1922.
 - 3. Can we hold rehearsal at member's home? No. 1926.

4. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election. 1926.

5. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes.

6. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission. 1928.

7. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Obligation at the same time a candidate is taking the Obligation? No. Members can rise and repeat Obligation when presiding officer calls for it. 1928.

8. After a petitioner has been ballotted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot, 1929

9. A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star, if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother. 1929.

10. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person

who is not eligible to petition for the degrees. 1930.

11. A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents. 1930.

12. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated. Signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record. 1930.

13. A petition for affiliation on demit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by 1930. our Ritual.

14. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is ballotted upon. 1930.

15. By-Laws of a Subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a

supply as interpreted in my official letter No. 1. 1930.

16. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. 111, Sec. 1 and 4), plus the list price of the Certificate. (See recommendations of Jurisprudence Committee). 1930.

17. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron. 1930.

18. That any resolution or law voted on and adopted at any Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, shall not be in force until after the Session in which such laws were adopted, is closed,

unless the time of taking effect is included in the motion.

19. That in accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Section 44, when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year. 1931.

20. That no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices

at the same time in a subordinate Chapter. 1931.

21. That Secretaries do not read the names of rejected candidates in other Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction and that Secretaries keep proper record of all said applicants. 1933.

22. Page 61, 1929 Proceedings. "Do not give honorary membership to anyone." This law rescinded 1933.

- 23. That this Grand Chapter sponsor the Order of Job's Daughters. 1933.
- 24. That a member who is in arrears two and one-half years for dues and has received suspension notice, may visit this Grand Chapter by another sister of the same Chapter vouching for her. 1933.
- 25. That a demitted or suspended Past Matron has the right to wear her Jewel, because it is her personal property; however, it does not seem to be good taste. 1935.
 - 26. That approved Decision No. 3, 1922, be rescinded. 1936.
- 27. That the time referred to in Constitution be the time prevailing in the town or city on the date the Grand Chapter is in Session. 1936.
- 28. Since a Memorial is a service sacred to the memory of a deceased person, a Chapter is not required to hold such service, unless one of its members has died during the current year. 1938.
- 29. The per capita tax shall be seventy-five cents for all members on the books, December 31, regardless of when they joined the Chapter. "Chapters working under dispensations as well as chartered chapters shall pay the specified amount of per capita dues to the Grand Chapter. Constitution—Article XIII, Sec. 2, also Article III, Rules and Regulations, Sec. 1, p. 7.) The per capita shall not be pro-rated, 1944.
- 30. The sum of fifty cents shall be paid on all Charter members as well as those initiated prior to the end of the fiscal year to the Grand Chapter, since they all pay Five Dollars initiation fee. No fee is paid to the Grand Chapter for affiliations. 1944.

- 31. Only a brother may occupy the station of Worthy Patron or Associate Patron. (This decision made by Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Easton). If there is no brother present, the Worthy Matron may invite a Past Matron to call the Chapter to order and invite the Worthy Matron and other officers to enter the Chapter room. 1944.
- 32. A dispensation is required to hold a special election, the Chapter members being notified ten days prior thereto. (Constitution and By-Laws, Article I, Sec. 10, under Rules and Regulations governing subordinate chapters. 1944.

33. Collection plates shall not be passed in the Chapter room. The By-Laws specify the amount of dues each member shall pay. Voluntary contributions may be put into a receptacle placed in a convenient place, such as Electa's cup or on the Associate Matron's pedestal. 1944.

34. There shall be no music while the prayer is being said. (Ritual,

Page 34-fine print.) 1944.

- 35. In the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Chapter, Sec. 65, of the Rules and Regulations governing subordinate Chapters, PP 3, and 7, use the word "Worthy" after the word "Past" and states that the officers should be introduced by their full title. Therefore, the word "Worthy" should be used. 1944.
- 36. A member of the order has been visiting our Chapter for some time, and has decided to affiliate with us. Can she be balloted on and welcomed on the same night?

Yes. I refer you to approved decisions No. 13—1930. However, I would suggest the petitioner wait in the preparation room while the Chapter is balloting. 1945.

- 37. We have received a petition for the conferring of degrees from a W. A. C. at the New Castle Army Air Base. As our law calls for white in which to be initiated, shall we return this petition, or can she, if elected, be initiated in her uniform?
- Yes. If these girls are sacrificing their lives that we may enjoy the privilege of freedom, we can sacrifice our law as to white dresses, that they may enjoy the privileges of our Order. There is no greater honor for the Order of the Eastern Star, than to accept a member into our Order who wears the uniform of the United States Army or any branch of the service of United States, providing they meet our requirements. 1945.
- 38. A wife of a Master Mason who desires to become a member of our Chapter will not have been a resident six months when her petition is received but will be a resident six months when she is initiated. Would it be possible to receive her petition?

No. I refer you to Article 1, Section 30, Rules and Regulations, for the government of Subordinate Chapters in Delaware. 1945.

39. If the Worthy Patron does not care to learn the long lecture in the initiatory ceremony, can the Associate Patron assist by giving this part of the work?

No. Your Worthy Patron is in charge of the initiatory work and if does not care to learn the long lecture, it is not compulsory. The Ritual informs him that it is optional and therefore it is strictly his prerogative. I personally feel that the candidate loses the most beautiful part of the initiatory work when the long lecture is omitted. However, that is the law. 1945.

40. My sentinel brought his resignation into the Chapter room on our stated meeting, February 6. Due to the fact it was thought illegal for the sentinel to enter the room and present any business, it was laid on the table until the next stated meeting. What disposition do I make of this matter?

Since that time I have received the resignation of three of my appointive officers. Should I declare these offices vacant and obtain special dispensations to install new officers to fill these vacancies or continue with substitutes the rest of my year?

I have never heard of an officer resigning after being installed into office, however, a dissatisfied officer does not make a good one, and I would suggest that you accept the resignations, for "those who assume obligations lightly and forthwith forget them" do not make good members and to be a good officer, one must first be a good member. Therefore, I would fill these vacancies with new officers, obtain a dispensation, and have them installed as soon as possible. 1945.

41. These resignations were addressed to me in care of the Chapter and Secretary. Should I accept them in open Chapter or, should my Secretary send letters of acceptance?

Since these are your personal appointments and were not voted into office by the Chapter members, my answer to this quetsion is, have the resignations read by the Secretary so that they may be recorded in the minutes, and treat them as you would any other communications—Noted and filed. For in America we cannot compel people to serve against their will; this tends to dictatorship, and that is what our boys are giving their lives to overcome. 1945.

42. Can these members, after resigning, attend the stated meetings the rest of this year, or must they wait for a new year?

There is no law that says we can bar any member from attending our meetings, provided that they are in good standing and do not affect the peace and harmony of the Chapter, however, if these officers, because of some personal feeling do not want to take their respective stations after having assumed the officers' obligation around the Altar, upon which rests our Holy Bible, repeating these words, "I will faithfully and impartially perform all the duties belonging to the office for which I have been selected," I would think this evidence enough that they are not interested in the welfare of the Chapter, and therefore should not desire to attend the meetings. 1945.
