

INFORMAL OPENING

MAY 16, 1949

The Informal Opening of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, was held in the Lewes Fire Hall, Lewes, Delaware, and called to order by the Session's Chairman, Sister Sarah E. Riggin, at one o'clock, who presented the Worthy Grand Matron of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Sister Marie L. Roberts.

FORMAL OPENING

MONDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 16, 1949, 2.00 P. M.

Greetings were extended to all by the Worthy Grand Matron

and Worthy Grand Patron.

The Worthy Grand Matron announced that Deputy Grand Lecturer, Sister Lillian Larrimore, a Past Matron of Caesar Rodney No. 8, would fill the station of the Grand Lecturer, Sister Edna H. Watson, who was absent due to illness.

Prayer by the Grand Chaplain and all united in singing "My

Faith Looks Up To Thee."

Roll call of Grand Officers and Constituent Chapters.

Partial report of Credential Committee showed sixteen Chapters and sixteen Worthy Matrons represented with one hundred and twenty-five voting delegates. Motion was made by Sister Riggin, seconded by Sister Alice M. Abbott, that report be accepted. Motion adopted.

Past Matron, Sister Madeline Litchfield, President of the Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association, presented the American Flag

to the Grand Chapter as a gift from the Association.

The Past Matron's and Patron's Association is pleased to present this American Flag to the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star. These stars send forth their rays of hope over the oceans and over the mountains into the valleys of suffering men.

The first star in this flag was placed there by the citizens of the State of Delaware, for we were the first state to ratify the Constitution on December 7, 1789. It was here in Delaware that our flag was first unfurled in battle; and under this banner, thousands of men have died that your home and my home might be safe and free.

This flag proclaims faith in the individual, faith in our country, and faith in our God. We pray that it will always stand as a symbol

for freedom and liberty and that under its standard, "government of the people, by the people, and for the people shall not perish from the earth."

On behalf of our association, I present you with this flag with the knowledge that the traditions and principles which it represents will always be upheld by our great organization.

Tribute was paid the American Flag, Christian Flag, and the Eastern Star Flag by the Grand Marshal, Sister Louise Emory, followed by pledge of allegiance to the Flag and singing of "America, the Beautiful."

September 24, 1948—Frankford Chapter No. 12—Art. V, Sec. 1, be changed to read \$10.00 for conferring degrees in lieu of \$5.00. Art. V, Sec. 2, be changed to read \$5.00 annual dues in lieu of \$3.00.

October 4, 1948—Sussex Chapter No. 7—Art. 7, Sec. 1—that the word Five (5) be changed to read Ten (10), thus reading, "The fee for conferring the degree in this Chapter shall be Ten Dollars, etc."

December 2, 1948—Five Points Chapter No. 13, Article V, Sec. 2—"Each member must pay the sum of Five (5) Dollars as annual dues, payable in June and December. Members initiated or affiliated between regular dates of charging dues shall be charged on a monthly basis for each full month thereafter, until the next regular due period. The Chapter may, by a majority vote of those present, remit the dues of any member."

December 15, 1948—Adah Chapter No. 5—Article I, Sec. 2—
"The stated meeting of this Chapter shall be held on the first and third Mondays in each month at 8.00 o'clock; provided, however, that no stated meetings shall be held in July and August; and, provided further, that when a stated meeting conflicts with the annual Session of the Grand Chapter, said meeting shall not be held. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Worthy Matron, due notice having been given the members and only such business transacted as may be specified in the notice."

January 21, 1949—St. John's Chapter No. 4, Article IX, Sec. 1—reading in part "The Secretary shall, etc., etc., for which service she

shall receive the sum of Seventy-five (75) Dollars per year." Article IX, Sec. 3, reading in part "The Treasurer shall, etc., etc., for which she shall receive the sum of Fifteen (15) Dollars per year." These to be effective January 1, 1949.

February 3, 1949—Georgetown Chapter No. 9—Article V, Sec. 2—On the second line change the word three to five (3) to (5): "Each member must pay the sum of five (5) dollars as annual dues, payable in Iune and December."

February 19, 1949—St. John's Chapter No. 4—Article I, Sec. 2—
"The stated meetings of this Chapter shall be held on the First and
Third Thursdays of each month except July and August at 8.00 P.M."
Rest of paragraph was not changed.

February 22, 1949—Radiant Chapter No. 6—Article I, Sec. 3— "The stated meetings of this Chapter shall be held on the first and third Tuesday evening of each month, excepting July and August."

April 20, 1949—Kent Chapter No. 11—Article I, Sec. 2—"The stated meetings of this Chapter shall be held on the first and third Wednesday in each month, except January 1st, (no meetings in July and August) at 8.00 P. M. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Worthy Matron, due notice having been given the members and only such business transacted as may be specified in the notice."

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article VIII, Section 1, Page 10, relative to a Nominating Committee will be considered for the second reading at this Grand Session.

On April 12, 1949, with Sister Elizabeth Fisher as Chairman, a committee consisting of Associate Grand Matron, Sister Fitzgerald Grand Conductress, Sister Gifford, and Associate Grand Conductress, Sister LeCompte, met at my home to continue the revision of the Book of Instructions to include Active Legislation of the Grand Chapter, Approved Recommendations, and Approved Decisions. Sister Fisher will make this report, but I feel that much was accomplished toward the goal of revising and assembling like things together pertaining to the work of our Order.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Many of the questions asked can be readily answered by reference to our laws and regulations. However, there are a few which I feel should be noted.

Question: May I compile a history of my Chapter, printed with advertising matter, as a means of revenue?

Answer: According to ruling of the Grand Body last May, advertising may be solicited if value received is given. This does not give anyone the privilege of "soliciting prizes" from merchants, it only covers value received from legitimate advertising.

Question: Should one be appointed or elected as O. E. S. Building Corporation representative, although our Ritual says "8 elected and 3 Trustees, all others appointed."

Answer: I do not think we can include the representative under our Ritual as it is strictly a Delaware Corporation. I suggest that the Chapter follow the procedure of the Grand Chapter in selecting a representative on this Board.

Question: ——— Chapter accepted and appointed a committee of investigation on petition from a member of a Pennsylvania Masonic Lodge. Will you kindly advise us what disposition to make of this application?

Answer: Return the petition, with fee, and advise the Pennsylvania Mason that due to a ruling of his Grand Lodge a number of years ago, no man who holds membership in a Masonic Lodge in the State of Pennsylvania can become a member of any Eastern Star Chapter. We regret this but we do not want to put him in the position of being embarrassed.

Question: Is a person eligible to petition a Chapter while maintaining residence in another jurisdiction, even though they may spend

three months in winter within the jurisdiction of first chapter?

Answer: No, legal residence is voting residence. As long as the person merely shuts up the home for a few months in winter, they are not eligible to petition any chapter outside of their home jurisdiction.

Question: Can members rise and repeat obligation with candi-

dates in initiatory ceremony?

Answer: No, that is ritualistic work for candidates only.

Question: Can members be invired into Chapter after the Associate Conductress has prepared the ballot?

Answer: No, balloting has started and no one, except the Sen-

tinel, when invited to do so, may enter.

Question: Can a fifteen minute film of Esther be shown at installation?

Answer: No, we cannot add to the Ritualistic work at installation. It may, however, be used after the meeting as part of a program.

IRREGULARITIES

1. Petitions with initials instead of full given names.

 Secretaries not reading all questions and answers on petitions.
 Chapter programs having "Soloist" in line with regular officers, same size print, making nineteen rather than the required eighteen Soloist" should be apart from officers. officers.

4. A Chapter presenting petition for membership from a widow of a non-member of the Masonic fraternity, using her first husband's Masonic membership as basis for eligibility. As I was present when this happened, I informed the Worthy Matron that it could not be accepted due to the fact that when the widow of a Mason remarries, she ceases to be his widow, and therefore not eligible.

5. Officers having dresses trimmed with gold and silver, also using belts of same. Our law requires white ONLY.

6. While this may not be exactly an "Irregularity", I feel that the reading of the minutes at each stated meeting is the Secretary's prescribed work, and should not be postponed.

RECOMMENDATIONS

No. 1-That all chapters limit radio and newspaper publicity to social affairs, and matter dealing with local and national activities or drives. In many instances Chapters use bulletins, and all members

receive knowledge through this source of Chapter activities. Our Eastern Star business is our very own, and should not be publicized.

No. 2—That we recognize and welcome in subordinate chapters the Grand Guardian, Associate Grand Guardian, Bethel Guardian and Associate Bethel Guardian, of the Job's Daughters, when visiting, at the close of regular introductions merely by request to rise and a welcome at their seats. Our Grand Chapter sponsors the Job's Daughters and we recognize them in Grand Chapter Session.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

We are all striving to better our beloved Order, if possible, and secure uniformity of ritualistic work. I advocate studying the Ritual, especially the fine print, the Constitution and By-Laws, and Book of Instructions more thoroughly as this would eliminate the necessity for too many recommendations. These laws we have, and are pledged to obey, and officers especially should become familiar with them.

In 1938-39 Proceedings you will find an idea that I think well worth bringing to light again in 1949, although ten years have passed. This is the subject of changing the fiscal year of subordinate chapters to conform to the Grand Chapter. With this thought in mind, I mailed thirty-two letters to Worthy Matrons and Associate Matrons on November 22, 1948, requesting an answer to my suggestions, and I received nine written responses; two verbal, to my query. I hesitate, therefore, to propose a recommendation, but I do present the following for consideration at our next Grand Session:

That thought and study be given this year to the idea of changing the time of election of officers in subordinate chapters to the first meeting in May, and installation the first meeting in June, of each year. This will give each Worthy Grand Matron one set of subordinate chapter officers to instruct, whereas at present with election in December and installation in January, there are two groups. It is pleasant to work with the two groups, don't misunderstand me about that, but for the good of our Order, I firmly believe one group with one Worthy Grand Matron, will be a benefit to both. This will take thought, study, and careful consideration, but with weather conditions in January, installations in June would eliminate much dangerous driving over icy roads. Our finances would correspond in both subordinate and Grand Chapter, and I feel that it is feasible.

During the year I have found our watchword "Loyalty" was well chosen as our members exemplify that one word in our Eastern Star life, and I feel are sincerely striving to accept our motto, "Living our Obligation with Courage and Faith." Yet, Sisters and Brothers, may I ask you to STOP and think before discussing Chapter affairs? Sometimes outsiders are heard repeating things that should only be within Chapter walls, and I wonder—"How did they know that?" so I am asking every member to guard well our chapter business.

Too often questions that should be directed to our Deputy Grand Lecturers are asked of those on the sidelines. The Deputy interprets the work of our Order to the officers and members as outlined to her by the Grand Lecturer and the Worthy Grand Matron. Please, may I stress upon you—ASK YOUR DEPUTY ONLY.

CANCER RESEARCH PROJECT

Thank you, members of this Grand Jurisdiction, for the wonderful support you have given to our main project for our year, Cancer Research and Education. Our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Hamilton, selected this for a part of her Triennial Project, and I am very, very much pleased to be able to report that we have contributed \$567.00.

Visiting the various Chapters has always been a pleasure. The work of the officers and members in the Chapter room, also the social hour after the meetings I have thoroughly enjoyed. Our beloved Order is growing numerically and of this we are quite proud. I sincerely hope that the new members will take an active part in the work of the Chapter to which they belong so that they may derive the full benefits of membership in our Order.

May we enjoy a happy Grand Chapter Session this year, and when our deliberations are over may we return to our homes satisfied that we have decided what was best for the Good of our Order and be ready to start on the work of another year with renewed energy.

Worthy Grand Matrons and Patrons Jewels

It will be recalled that at the closing moments of the 27th Grand Session held in Wilmington last year, announcement was made of the presentation to the Grand Chapter of these Jewels, the gifts of the newly installed Grand Matron and Patron. As the Jewels which had been ordered in ample time had not as yet been received, they were accepted in absentia by Sister Elizabeth Pierce, Grand Trustee.

These Jewels, which are to be worn only when visiting in sister jurisdictions were first used while attending the Grand Chapter of Penna. in June, and were much admired by all. They are to be passed on to each succeeding Grand Matron and Patron.

NEW CHAPTERS

No inquiries have been made during the past year regarding the instituting of new chapters. However, thought will have to be directed in the not too distant future to such additions in at least two localities.

CLAYMONT

This section in the northern end of our state is now served by Brandywine Chapter, located at Gordon Heights, just outside the city limits of Wilmington and some five miles removed, and which, in itself is in the center of a fast growing community.

Claymont is in the center of an industrial community and additional housing is contemplated there, and which will no doubt house future and qualified Star members. It is observed that residents of that area are petitioning for membership not only in Brandywine Chapter but many of the Wilmington Chapters, as well. It is for this reason that attention will have to be directed to this section of the state.

MIDDLETOWN

At present there is no Chapter on the west side of New Castle County between Newark and Dover in Kent County, a distance of some fifty miles. At present, residents of Middletown and the immediate vicinity are within the Jurisdiction of Newark while those residing to the east of Middletown, and in Odessa, St. Georges and Port Penn and adjacent villages are within the jurisdiction of Caesar Rodney Chapter at New Castle, which now has a large community to draw from due to the many housing developments east of the Du Pont Highway. These conditions will likewise have early attention.

PETITIONING CHAPTERS OUT OF JURISDICTION

I have observed, particularly in the northern end of our state, where in several instances, prospective members in Wilmington are placing their petitions in rural chapters, and those in the rural sections doing likewise in Wilmington. While it is only natural that friends want to be with friends, I feel that prospective members should unite with, and support the Chapter located in the jurisdiction of their residence. After becoming members they can visit the Chapter homes of their friends and still be able to enjoy the fellowship thus offered. The Grand Chapter has in former years, given an extensive survey and study to the Jurisdiction of the several chapters and I feel that our members when approached by anyone desiring an application for membership should bear this in mind and direct the applicant to the proper place for the presentation of their application.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1:

That legislation be passed that will require all applicants for Eastern Star membership in Delaware to place their application in the Chapter jurisdiction of their residence.

MASONIC RELATIONS

In visiting the various sections of the state, much comment is heard regarding the permissibility of Chapters in Maryland and New Jersey being allowed to meet in Masonic Lodge Rooms and why is such permission not granted in Delaware. While this is a fact and much to be regretted, I feel and have told members of the Chapters who have brought the matter to my attention to be patient as this is something that will take time to work out and will before long be settled to the satisfaction of all.

WORTHY GRAND PATRON CONTINGENT FUND

Several years ago this fund was established in amount of \$25.00. Demands upon the time of the Worthy Grand Patron to attend various functions both in and without the state, and the cost of modern travel make this meagre amount insignificant.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2:

That consideration be given to increasing this fund to \$50.00.

In Newport the Chapter which was meeting in the building occupied by Armstrong Lodge was forced to move to the auditorium of a Methodist Church, due to certain renovations which the Lodge desired to make to their property. To date these renovations have not been started and as the location in the church is perhaps only of a temporary nature, the future location of the Chapter may result in an early problem.

Mention this name and you command the attention and admiration of all Delaware Masons, as they all are proud of this home and what it has accomplished since its inception some 38 years ago. Likewise it is dear to the heart of all members of our Order and which is manifested many times over by the many pleasant and happy times and courtesies shared with the guests from time to time. Your Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron have just completed a strenuous year of faithful service to the Grand Chapter of Delaware and when this faithful year of service is completed, I know they will carry in their hearts always the memory of the delightful associations, not only with the official family of this Grand Chapter, but with all the members of Delaware who have cooperated so beautifully to bring about the accomplishments of this year of service.

It takes the loyalty of the whole Grand Chapter to bring about a successful year of service. These Grand Officers who compose this official family in this state must have worked in full accord in all that this Order stands for. The Past Grand Matrons and Past Grand Patrons have given their efforts to bring about the accomplishment of this lovely year in this Grand Chapter; without their love and cooperation you could not have accomplished all that has been accomplished.

All over the Eastern Star world, the members have responded beautifully and may I thank you for the help you have given to Medical Science in this fine way.

There was a project approved by General Grand Chapter before I was in this office—"Save the Children Project." The children of today will be the leaders of tomorrow and we want them to grow up to be fine cultured members of society. We have not forgotten that it was the youth of the world who sacrificed their lives that we might have peace; that we might have life and have it more abundantly. Anything that we can do for the youth of today, anything that we can do to better conditions in the world today, is not only our duty but a sacred privilege. Let us each one try to do our part to build a better world for those who are to come after us.

I came to the Grand Chapter of Delaware in 1942, it was then I made many fine friends in your Grand Chapter. I was here when you elected your present Grand Secretary. There isn't anything in the world that means more to a Grand Matron, than to have a fine, capable secretary. In all the years I have known Sister Elizabeth she has given faithful service and been kind and helpful in every way.

We pass through this world but once. Any good thing that we might do or kindness we may show, let us do it now. Let us not neglect it, for we do not pass this way again. Let us try to do good to all whom we meet, that we may be worthy to hold membership in an organization whose greatest teaching is that we Love One Another.

When we met in Tampa in 1946, little did I dream that I would be standing where I am today. With the help of the members of the Eastern Star it was my hope that I might be able to do some good; that I might be able to do something that would promote the Order of the Eastern Star. cannot say today that I was not disappointed, because any Matron would say: "Yes, the installation was the highlight of my life," and I did not have that installation, but I am happy that missing the glamour and the tinsel of the passing show did not rob me of any of the real pleasure. If I am able to carry out my schedule, when I return to my own home on June 20th, then I will have been in every Grand Chapter except China and the Philippines, and we have 66 Grand Chapters. I have instructed all the chapters in Hawaii, Alaska, Yukon, Bermuda, Mexico, Canal Zone and Cuba. I have just signed a charter for a second chapter in the Philippines. have one new chapter in Guam and just here in Rehoboth, I signed two charters which I sent to Japan. Brother Cleaver took them to

the Post Office and put them in the Air Mail for me that they would reach their destination this week so that the two chapters in Japan might be constituted.

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished East, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware:

The appointment as Fraternal Correspondent gives an oppor-

tunity of service, which has made each of us grateful.

We are presenting this report of the 1947 and 1948 Proceedings of other Grand Jurisdictions in the hope that it will promote a better understanding of the magnitude and scope of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Its aims and accomplishments and, perhaps the most important of all, the trend in thought, which will influence the future of this

great Fraternal Organization.

To me the survey represents not only an opportunity of service to the Grand Chapter of Delaware, but a personal gain in knowledge and understanding of the vast work of our Order of the Eastern Star.

It has been a most pleasant and instructive privilege to visit the other Grand Jurisdictions through the Proceedings of the Grand Chapter of our State and Foreign Countries and for this great privilege and opportunity we are most grateful.

For our new members and those attending our Grand Chapter for the first time, a certain amount of review is necessary in forming

a background for this report.

As time and space are limited, I will only relate the things that seem of vital importance. Our Order was founded in 1850 by Robert Morris, at La Grange, Kentucky, and he said, I quote: "If it meets a world need and renders a service to humanity it will survive and grow."

His prophecy has been fulfilled, for the Order of the Eastern Star has become one of the largest organizations in the world. There are over two million members, who are governed by four sovereign

bodies.

They are: The General Grand Chapter, The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, The Independent Grand Chapters of New York and New Jersey. Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter, having been

organized since October 31, 1867.

Illinois is the largest with over 800 Chapters and more than 144,000 members. Nova Scotia is the youngest, being Instituted and Constituted by our Most Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Donald R. Steward, on September 24, 1947, in New Glasgow. Chapter has Jurisdiction over Prince Edward Island.

Missouri: President Truman is a member of the Eastern Star, having been the first Worthy Patron of his Chapter in Missouri. His sister, Mary Jane Truman, is a Grand Conductress of the Grand

Chapter of Missouri.

Mississippi owns the little red school house in which Robert

Morris taught.

Kentucky: Ella Morris Mount, present Grand Secretary of Kentucky, is the granddaughter of Robert Morris. The Kentucky Stars, "maintain the home and burial place of Robert Morris at La Grange, Kentucky." Wyoming: The Governor and his wife are members of O. E. S.

Indiana: The Grand Sentinel advances to Grand Marshal, then Grand Chaplain after which he is elected as Grand Patron.

Florida: During a service in the first Christian Church in Miami, the minister had 18 countries represented; one member, a Japanese importer, had become naturalized and converted to the Christian Church and joined the Masonic Order, he became a Shriner and then an O. E. S.; this is the first Japanese in the world to have this distinction-

Ohio and Texas have a registration fee of 25c and 50c per person to help defray the expenses of the Session.

All Grand Chapters report a vast amount of work done for the Red Cross and thousands of Eastern Star dollars are expended in equipping Veterans Hospitals for comfort and cheer of veterans.

Every Jurisdiction reports a gain in membership and many new Chapters are being formed. Youth education is being stressed, more than 45 Jurisdictions have Educational Loan Funds.

Our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Eva H. Hamilton, has honored many Grand Jurisdictions by her presence. There are many more items of interest which time does not permit me to mention.

I want to extend my thanks to our own Grand Secretary, Sister Elizabeth Fisher, for her promptness in forwarding the many Proceedings to me. To the Fraternal Correspondents of other Grand Jurisdictions, we extend Fraternal Greetings in the name of our Grand Chapter; and express a deep appreciation of the splendid reports they have given of our work in Delaware.

Present was our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Eva H. Hamilton and our Right W. G. Secretary, Sister Mamie Lauder. The Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons of Nova Scotia, Herman McMillan, with several of his Grand Officers, honored the assembly

with his presence.

The General Grand Chapter was organized in Indianapolis, Ind., on November 16, 1876; it meets triennially and has jurisdiction over

47 Grand Chapters in U. S., 8 in Canada, 1 in Puerto Rico.

The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland meets semi-annually and has supervision over all Chapters in Scotland, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, India, South Africa, and England. It was organized in 1904.

The Independent Grand Chapters of New York and New Jersey meet annually and were organized in 1869 and 1870. The McCoy Ritual is used in these Jurisdictions; Masons who are in good standing, but who are not members of the O. E. S., are permitted to visit Chapters if they take the oath of secrecy.

Great pride is taken in our International Temple in Washington, D. C. Each Grand Jurisdiction and subordinate Chapter contributes to its maintenance Fund. No flag flies over it, but an electric Star

over the entrance sends out a guiding light.

Of great interest is the International Peace Graden, situated on the "International Boundary" between Manitoba and North Dakota. At the time of the dedication in 1932 a bronze plaque was placed in the Formal Park bearing the inscription "To God in His Glory, we two Nations do pledge ourselves that so long as Men shall Live we will not take up arms against one another."

Each Grand Chapter pauses from its deliberations to pay loving tributes to the memory of Sisters and Brothers who have been called to the Grand Chapter above, the Hold Bible rests upon every Altar.

The Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack are honored guests in their respective countries. In the Grand Chapters along the border they stand side by side.

The Order of Rainbow for Girls is sponsored by 42 Grand Jurisdictions; Job's Daughters is sponsored by 18 States. There are more

than 50 Masonic and O. E. S. Homes for the aged.

In South Dakota many members have to travel 25 or 40 miles to attend their Chapter meetings and one Secretary goes 190 miles and rarely misses a meeting.

From the various Proceedings I find these items of interest. From Scotland, Queen Elizabeth is the daughter of an Eastern Star, and King George is Past Grand Master of Masons.

To all members: Fraternal greetings in the name of our Delaware Grand Chapter and our sincere hope that we may continue united to build our Order upon those enduring principles of Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness.

Now that our imaginary tour is finished, we trust that our report will give you some idea of the work being accomplished throughout

our Eastern Star world.

Worthy Grand Matron, I thank you for this assignment which has been most instructive and a great pleasure to serve you and this Grand Chapter.

ALABAMA 1947

Forty-seventh Session, "Faith and Light Session." Symbols—Bible and Lighted Candles. Flower—Dogwood. Colors—Green and Gold. Objective—to start a Savings Fund to be known as "The O. E. S. Home," also to assist in Cancer Control, \$15,000.00 for a Mobile Unit for Cancer Research was given. Rainbow Girls sponsored. Sixteen Chapters instituted, four constituted, and four reorganized. Red Cross hours and donations generously contributed.

ALABAMA 1948

Rose Session held on October 18, 19, 20, 1948. A pantomime "The Door of Opportunity" was portrayed in the informal opening. Rainbow Girls sponsored. Worthy Grand Matron's objective, Education. Motto—Happy is the man that getteth understanding. Youth program and Masonic Home helped. Two hundred sixteen Chapters with a membership of 20,736.

ALBERTA 1948

The Thirty-seventh Annual Session was held June 1st, to 3rd, 1948. The Acting Worthy Grand Matron called it the "Sunshine Session." The Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mary E. Koehane, passed on to the Grand Chapter above on December 10th, 1947. She took her motto from the 3rd verse of the 1st chapter of Genesis when she was installed, which was-"Let There Be Light"; this was carried throughout the Session by the Acting Worthy Grand Matron. Three new Chapters were instituted. One Chapter, Champion Chapter No. 36, initiated five daughters (two of them twins) of a Past Matron. The mother took part in the ceremony.

ARKANSAS 1947

The 72nd Annual Session, known as "Fellowship Session," was held in Albert Pike Memorial Temple, Little Rock, Arkansas, Dec. 1st-3rd, 1947.

Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Eva Holland Hamilton, was a guest. They have a Grand Lecturer. Twenty-five cents out of each dollar per capita tax received is placed in the Eastern Star Home Fund. Job's Daughters and Rainbow Girls are sponsored. 100% International Temple Fund. Splendid reports on "To Save the Children Project," Red Cross, Cancer Fund, Salvation Army and to a Youth Center. Countless parties and gifts taken to Veterans Hospitals.

British Columbia 1948

The 37th Annual Session, known as "Silver Session" was held in the Crystal Ballroom of the Empress Hotel, of Victoria, B. C., on June 14th, 1948.

This Session was dedicated to the memory of Margaret Risser, Past Grand Treasurer.

The 81st Annual Session, "Anniversary Session", convened in Grand Rapids, Oct. 14-16, 1947.

Chapters-276; Membership-47,226.

REPORT OF REHABILITATION SERVICE

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star:

Your Committee on Rehabilitation conducted their visits to the VA Hospital in the same way that we did the last Grand Chapter year: inviting a different Chapter each month to act as hostess to the Veterans and their guests on the third Sunday of each month.

The Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Marie Roberts, requested each hostess Chapter to furnish the necessary refreshments for their These refreshments consisted of:

500 home made cookies

8-46 oz. cans of orange juice 4-46 oz. cans of pineapple juice

4-5½ oz. cans lemon juice 4 large bottles ginger ale.

Cigarettes, if the Chapter wished to bring them.

Needless to say we always had cigarettes to give to the veterans particularly those who were denied refreshments. An invitation stating the Worthy Grand Matron's request was sent to each hostess

Chapter and their response was all that we could wish for.

It was our thought to have the Chapters in Kent and Sussex Counties make their visit before the roads would become hazardous for travel; but we are very sorry to say that to Georgetown Chapter No. 9 fell the worst day of the winter, December 19, but with their chairman, Sister Mildred Minner, a number of their members braved the elements bringing refreshments, a Christmas tree, Christmas greens, tree trimmings, fifty wrapped gifts for the veterans, red candles with glass holders for the table. We thought our table looked so pretty that day, covered with a Christmas cloth with a very beautiful poinsettia in the center, a gift of P.G.P. Brother Rogers, in the center, surrounded by the red candles, a punch bowl at each end filled with golden punch, a Santa Claus here and there with his bag filled with nuts and candy, and plates of delicious home made cookies. It was always our thought to please the eye as well as the palate.

On September 2, 1948, we were very happy to have the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Roberts, the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Cloud, Brother Archie Ford, Past Patron of Kent Chapter, and a member of this committee, Brother Richard Welsh, Past Patron of Five Points Chapter No. 13, Sister Helen Welsh, Secretary of Five Points Chapter No. 13, with us. Your committee had charge of the refreshments for the executive committee that evening and our guests came to assist with the refreshments and to discuss the buying of a McKesson-Scott Vital Capacity Apparatus which was needed in the hospital.

We decided, on the Worthy Grand Matron's advice, to purchase the equipment, and \$10.00 was at once contributed by one of the committee members. The Worthy Grand Matron advised that she would ask for contributions as she made her official visits in September. This she did and received sufficient to purchase the equip-

ment and a table model radio for one of the wards.

A check for \$29.50 was given to Mr. J. J. Crowe, chief of Special Service, but this was later returned as the Government decided to buy the apparatus. We then, by the Grand Matron's consent, gave the check to the treasurer of the revolving fund, a fund started by the several organizations of volunteer service for the benefit of the veterans only. This fund will furnish stamps to a veteran, send a veteran home for a week-end and only recently it had a veteran's brace repaired, which if it had gone through the Government channels would have required weeks possibly, whereas it was repaired and returned in three days at a cost of eighty cents.


