

REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT

SISTER IRMA O. LECOMPTE, Associate Grand Matron

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished East, Sisters and Brothers:

One year ago, I set sail on a friendship voyage, led by the light of our Star. Today I have reached port with a cargo of precious treasures and a log filled with happy memories. I have traveled to each Grand Chapter Session, an unseen guest, and only wish it were possible to bring you the true conception of the magnitude of our Order and its accomplishments. I have discovered how similar we are and yet how different. But no matter how the Grand Juris-dictions differ in their deliberations, the fundamental principles of all Eastern Stars are Charity, Truth, and Loving Kindness.

Many of our members are attending Grand Chapter for the first time, so we will review some of the findings for their benefit.

Today our Order is the largest fraternal organization for women in the world to which both men and women may belong. It is divided into four bodies: The General Grand Chapter, which has jurisdiction over 55 Grand Chapters; The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, which meets twice a year; The Independent Grand Chapter of New York; and the Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey.

Ohio has the largest Grand Chapter membership, but Illinois has the most Chapters. Kansas has the largest subordinate Chapter in the world. Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter, having celebrated its eighty-fourth anniversary in October 1950. Nova Scotia is the youngest, it was consituted in September 1947, and has jurisdiction over Prince Edward Island. Puerto Rico is the smallest Grand Chapter, nine chapters and a membership of 534.

All Grand Chapters under the jurisdiction of the General Grand Chapter meet annually except the District of Columbia, which holds two meetings each year, one in December and one in May. The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland includes the Chapters of England, Ireland, Scotland, Australia, New Zealand, India and South Africa. This Supreme Body meets twice a year; its half-yearly session is held in October, and its annual session is held in March.

Our ritual is translated in Spanish, Chinese, and Italian. All jurisdictions are interested in perfecting the ritualistic work of our Order; some have Deputy Grand Matrons, or District Instructors; others Grand Lecturers as we do here in Delaware, who visit Chapters to give them individual attention, and many have Grand Librarians. Several jurisdictions require proficiency tests, and Iowa requires newly initiated members to pass examinations within six months or forfeit the right to vote or held office.

Our Order is one of the outstanding Christian organizations in the world, having upon the Altar of every Grand Chapter and every Subordinate Chapter the Holy Bible. The Bible is always placed reverently, and often with beautiful ceremony, and is the source of all our lessons and teachings. Many Grand Chapter Sessions have Divine Services the evening preceding their opening, and all sessions are opened with prayer offered by a Brother or guest minister.

Patriotism is closely allied with fraternalism. At all Sessions the first guest of honor is the flag of our country, followed by the Christian, State and O. E. S. flags. In Canada and the bordering States, the Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack are honored together with fitting tributes, exemplifying the bond of friendship existing between the two countries.

For those who have passed on to the Grand Chapter on High, each Chapter pauses in its deliberations with a spirit of reverence to pay tribute. Those memorial services are indeed beautiful and stand as a testimonial to the high esteem in which those who have gone on to their rewards are held.

Since it would not be possible to include in this report all the details from each Grand Chapter, I have selected a few outstanding points which should be of interest to all.

South Dakota reported one Chapter where every resident Mason was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

Indiana's Grand Sentinel advances to Grand Marshal, then to Grand Chaplain, after which he is elected to Associate Grand Patron.

The Florence Nightingale Home for boys and girls in Ontario is the only one outside of the United States. Its doors are open to evacuated children of Europe too.

Utah has two Chapters, each of which has among its members eleven from a family. In one of those Chapters, seven are officers.

Kentucky still has a few Chapters whose date of meeting are governed by the moon.

In Connecticut the Subordinate Chapters are fined for non-attendance at Grand Chapter.

Ohio and Texas have a registration fee of 25 and 50 cents to help defray the expenses of the session.

In closing, may I leave each of you some advice which I found in almost every proceeding which I reviewed. It is this "Please

read the fine print".

I wish to thank the Grand Secretary, Sister Elizabeth, for forwarding the proceedings to me so promptly, and the Grand Chapter for the privilege of serving on this committee. The knowledge I have gained will never be forgotten, and the inspiration always cherished.

Giving shelter to the weary is the mission of the tree; Gathering honey from the flower is the mission of the bee; Gleaning Star Gleams, here and there, is the Correspondent's share And to you I bring the gleanings from proceedings everywhere.

Also a modern milk-house was completed at the Home at a cost of \$7,884.36. 17 chapers constituted, 5 chapters instituted and 6 chapters re-organized.

ARIZONA 1950:

The 50th annual session of the Grand Chapter of Arizona, "The Golden Jubilee Session", was held in Crane School Auditorium in Yuma on Mar. 30th, 31st, and April 1st, 1950. The back drop of the stage represented a Cathedral setting with stained windows and double doors in center, banked by blue drapes.

BRITISH COLUMBIA 1950:

Sunday night before the session opened Divine Worship was held at St. Andrew's Wesley United Church. Much benevolent work is done in this jurisdiction and their cancer project was well supported.

The Grand Chapter attended Divine Services on Sunday, Oct. 15th. Informal opening and Pageant on Monday evening, Oct. 16th. The theme of the session was Harmony. P. 7, Art. V., Sec. 1. Strike out \$5 and insert \$10 in second line and strike out \$1 and insert \$2 in third line. Sec. 1 would then read: The fee for conferring the degrees in this Chapter shall be \$10 and for affiliation \$2, which must accompany the petition.

P. 7, Art. V., Sec. 2. On lines one and two strike out \$3.50 and insert \$4. Section 2 would then read: Each member must pay

the sum of \$4 as annual dues, payable in June and Dec., etc.

P. 9, Art. VIII., Section 2. As amended Dec. 1942. 17th line strike out \$50 and insert \$75. The line would then read: She shall receive the sum of \$75 per year.

P. 10, Art. VIII., Section 3. Last two lines, strike out \$3.50 and insert \$10. These lines would then read: She shall receive the

sum of \$10 per year.

P. 12, Art. IX., Section 4. As amended Dec. 1942. Strike out \$3.50 and insert \$5. This section would then read: For her services the organist shall receive the sum of \$5 per year, and sentinel shall receive for his or her services the sum of \$5 per year.

P. 14, Art. XIV., Section 1. Shall be worded as follows: The jewels for the Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons of this Chapter shall be of essentially the same design and quality each year, as those selected for the first Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron of this Chapter.

Sussex Chapter No. 7 to change the By-Laws to read as follows: Be it resolved that in Article VII., Section 2, that the word three be changed to 5 to take effect on Jan. 1, 1951.

Approved the revision of Adah Chapter No. 5 By-Laws.

Five Points No. 13 to change By-Laws as follows:

Art. XI., Section 1. Under relief, if the case is one of pressing necessity the Worthy Matron may draw upon the treasurer for an amount not exceeding \$10 and the order so drawn shall be sufficient voucher to the treasurer to pay the same. Change amount to read \$25.00 instead of \$10.00.

Article 8, Sec. 2. Salary of Secretary be increased to \$100.00. Article 8, Sec. 3. Salary of Treasurer be increased to \$25.00.

Approved new By-Laws of Esther Chapter No. 17, except Art. 1, Sec. 2, line 3-That no meetings will be held on National holidays, Xmas Eve or the evening preceding the Grand Chapter Session.

We the committee suggest, that Art. 1, Sec. 2, should be

reworded to read as follows:

That the stated meetings of this Chapter shall be held on the First and Third Wednesdays of each month at 8 P. M.; provided however, that no stated meetings shall be held in July and August; and provided further that when a stated meeting conflicts with the annual session of the Grand Chapter, said stated meeting shall not be held; also no stated meetings to be held on Xmas Eve, Xmas Night, New Year's Eve or New Year's Night. Special meetings may be called at the discretion of the Worthy Matron, due notice having been given the members and only such business transacted as may be specified in the notice.

We the committee suggest also that Art. 10, Sec. 2, 3rd line shall read: All bills must be approved by not less than 3 members of the committee.

REPORT OF VETERANS' HOSPITAL REHABILITATION COMMITTEE

May 29, 1951

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Members of the Eastern Star in Delaware:

Sisters and Brothers:

Once again, it is our privilege and pleasure to report to you as Chairman and Co-chairman of Hospital Rehabilitation.

First, we thank you, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, for the appointment as this work is very dear to our hearts.

The Chapter chairmen, working with members of their Chapters, have cooperated in every way which helped to make the work much easier, and to each one of you we say "Thank you."

As in previous years, on the third Sunday of each month, the Chapters served refreshments to the veterans of the Veterans' Administration Hospital at Elsmere, Delaware and to their visitors. The Grand Chapter took part on December 17, 1950 and served Christmas cookies (1500), fruit juice, candy, cigarettes, and salted nuts. On this date, there were added guests to serve (about 125 in all) as the chorus of the Howard High School entertained the patients and they were accompanied by friends. Everyone present thanked the Order of Eastern Star for a lovely party, as they did each day we served. Each Chapter served homemade cake or cookies, fruit juice, candy, nuts, and cigarettes, and Delaware Chapter No. 1 presented each patient with a small gift.

Letters of thanks were received from Dr. Major W. Gasper, Manager of the Hospital, each month and a copy was sent to each

Chapter chairman.

On May 22, Five Points Chapter No. 13 sponsored a "game party" in the Game Room, furnishing refreshments and prizes to the ambulatory patients.

On May 15, Sister Helen M. Welsh and your chairman were asked to serve as pages for 150 doctors attending a Medical Association meeting held in the V. A. Hospital auditorium.

With the permission of the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Edna, and the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Fred, a letter was sent to each Chapter asking for five or more gifts to be used in quiz games and other contests for our boys in the V. A. Hospital, and the response

was marvellous. We received 537 gifts and \$2.50 in cash which we delivered to Mr. J. J. Crowe, Chief of Special Services, who, in turn, placed them in a room provided for such things to be used by Mr. Franklin Holt, Recreation Director. Letters of thanks from Dr. Gasper were received for the gifts, and copies of these were sent to Chapter chairmen, the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and the Grand Secretary. We wish to thank you sincerely for this wonderful cooperation.




