QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

- 1. Can a daughter having Power of Attorney over the financial affairs of a member (her mother) who is in a Nursing Home, request a demit for her mother. Her mother does not want a demit.
- A. A demit cannot be granted unless the request is made personally by the member or by a letter signed by the person for whom the demit is to be granted.
- 2. I received a demit from my chapter in 1927 and have lost it. I now wish to affiliate with another chapter. What is the procedure?
- A. A member who has lost a demit must apply to the secretary of the chapter which granted the demit and the secretary may issue a duplicate and collect a fee of \$1.00 for same. See constitution and By-Laws Page 48, Section 23.
- 3. May a Worthy Patron invite another Worthy Patron or Past Patron to preside during the initiation ceremony?
- A. Yes. But the Worthy Patron must remain in the East.
- 4. Our Trustee resigned. Can we elect another Trustee?
- A. Yes, as we do not install a Trustee, he may resign, but a special dispensation must be obtained to hold an election and all members notified at least ten days in advance of the election date.

IRREGULARITIES

Most of the irregularities were due to a misunderstanding of the New Ritual or established rules and regulations.

A few are listed below:

- 1. Officers not holding sign until Pass is given.
- 2. Balloting not kept inviolably secret, and members discussing a rejection even in chapter meeting. This should not be done.
- 3. Members discussing transactions of Chapters in Public Places.
- Officers going to members for instruction instead of Deputies. No one is authorized to issue instructions except Grand Lecturer and Deputy Grand Lecturers.

It has been a most wonderful experience to travel all over our Eastern Star world via the proceedings. There is a lot of time and effort given to make the session in each Grand Jurisdiction inspiring and beautiful. The decorations, pageantry, along with the different colored gowns, gardens and beautiful flowers are just a heaven on earth.

All Jurisdictions are very faithful to the Most Worthy Grand Matron's projects—working with the Masonic Homes, Eastern Star Homes, and homes for girls and children. The main objective is Charity, Truth and Loving Kindness.

I find that some jurisdictions have nominations for election to Grand Chapter from the floor, whereas others have blanks for nominees to fill in and these must be signed by two members before being presented. Still others have a box where each interested person puts in his or her own name and a committee counts them at a specific time and presents them on the floor.

A few Gleanings from the fields of other Jurisdictions:

ALASKA: has a chapter so isolated it can only be reached by plane. The Midnight Sun Chapter is only 57 miles from Russia.

ALBERTA: a Worthy Matron was installed by her 74 year old Mother. Their Associate Patron is 86 years old.

BERMUDA: Eastern Stars in their formal gowns are seen pedalling bicycles to meetings—no automobiles are allowed.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA: The appointive Grand Officers are Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron.

IDAHO: All candidates must take a proficiency examination within 3 months after initiation.

IOWA: A chapter has a Chaplain 92 years old who has served 37 years; a Sentinel 85 years old served 42 years; a Secretary served 43 years; and a Treasurer served 33 years—an organist 27 years.

KANSAS: Has probably the largest subordinate chapter in the world—membership 2135.

MAINE: Must exemplify the work once every 3 months whether or not they have candidates.

MINNESOTA: Has a chapter with 1018 members, another with only 28 members.

MEXICO: Can boast of one chapter where eleven different nationalities are represented among its 96 members.

NOVA SCOTIA: Has 25 members of a chapter that drive 92 miles to attend meetings. It is the youngest Grand Jurisdiction.

SOUTH DAKOTA: has one chapter where every resident Mason is a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

SOUTH CAROLINA: Hopewell Chapter in Ellentown was obliged to surrender its charter as the entire community was destroyed to provide for the construction of an H-Bomb Plant.

WYOMING: The Gavel is made of agatized petrified wood, almost translucent. The only adhesive that would hold the handle in place is used by Dentists.

It is very gratifying to know that all over the world chapters are being constituted and the order growing stronger.

We hope you have enjoyed this journey with us. Many thanks to Sister Mary and Sister Sarah—your reports were wonderful. Thanks to you, Sister Elizabeth Fisher, for getting the proceedings to me promptly.

They are our husbands, fathers, sons and brothers and with the wives, sisters, daughters, mothers and widows make up the great masonic family of which I am most proud. Names Scholarship for her which she awards to Duane Sanford of Olivet.

A double honor came to Olivet Wednesday evening at the 88th annual session of the Michigan Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star in Grand Rapids, when Mrs. Minnie E. Keyes awarded a scholarship, named for her and given by the Grand Chapter, to Duane Sanford, Olivet college senior.

Mrs. Keyes, who joined the Olivet chapter in 1899 and is its most famous member, celebrated her 88th birthday Tuesday, the first day of the three-day annual session. She is Right Worthy Grand Secretary Emeritus of the General Grand Chapter and Past Grand Matron of Michigan. She came to Olivet as a bride in 1893 and was associated for years with her husband, Karl, in a private banking business. In 1920 she went to Washington, D.C., as Right Worthy Grand Secretary of the O. E. S., retiring in 1946. A few years later she returned to Olivet to live.

Duane, her choice as the recipient of the Minnie E. Keyes \$1000.00 scholarship, has been "in the care" of the Central Association of Congregational Christian Churches of Michigan as a preministerial student for the past two years. Duane is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer H. Sanford of Walkerville and attended schools in Pentwater where he played baseball and basketball and was editor of the school paper. As a student at Olivet, he has served as editor of the Echo, sings in the college ensemble and the church choir, and is now vice-president of the Student Christian Association. He plans to do graduate work at Yale University.

Mr. Hart Cooper: I bring you greetings from the A.A.O.N.M.S. and particularly from the Shrine in Wilmington. This is a happy opportunity, for it was my good fortune to receive that check for \$1000 and I thank you on behalf of the unfortunate kiddies who do not even know about it, except that they will receive benefits from its use.

Someone tells us that the Order of the Shrine is 85 years old and that for 50 years of its life it had no soul. But, in 1921 the idea of a Crippled Children's Hospital was born by Freeland Kendrick—We now have 17 hospitals throughout the United States and there is not a penny due on any of them. Many, many children have been cured and many more materially helped. We have a very, very large waiting list. You can visualize what is going on.

In Montana the Knights of Columbus passed an assessment on their members and this is made in payment to the Children's Hospital. Our fund is One Hundred Million Dollars and that has been built in fifteen years. These hospitals will be a perpetual thing for these children.

We thank you sincerely and ask that you keep a little corner in your hearts for these kiddies.

- -The meaning given to the American Flag by American Flag Francis Scott Key, one memorable night while "Old Glory" was giving courage to American Soldiers, is further typified for us today as she flies with the flags of all nations, as we try to effect peace throughout the world by way of the United Nations. No greater tribute could be possible than

REPORT OF SUMMER BENEFIT FOR HANDICAPPED CHILDREN

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished East, Sisters and Brothers:—

It was my happy privilege and pleasure, mingled with a thrilling experience, to have been selected chairman of the Worthy Grand Matron's and Worthy Grand Patron's project—The Summer Benefit for the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children and the Handicapped Children of Delaware, which was held at the Delaware Shrine Club Building on the DuPont Highway, Saturday, July 17, 1954.

It will be a day long-remembered by me, and I am sure by those who helped so faithfully to make (what each member of the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware, will agree) was a big success.

Each member of the committee along with those who attended or gave any assistance whatever, did his or her very best so far as donating, helping and purchasing the various articles which were for sale.

I can't begin to thank each one personally, nor will I attempt to single out any individual or group, because it would be impossible, but I would like to say, there are no finer men in any jurisdiction than we have in Delaware, whether it was in the kitchen, parking lot, dining room, outside stands, collecting money, or various other duties—,THEY WERE REALLY TOPS.

First I want to thank our Heavenly Father for giving us such a beautiful day on which to hold our Carnival and then our thanks to the members of the Shrine Club for the privilege of using the building, the dishes, the silver and utilities, and also for permitting us to use the building on Friday evening in preparation for our Benefit on

Saturday. Also thanks to the members of the Band for furnishing the music for dancing. Also our Worthy Grand Patron for donating the tickets—3,000 of them.

We were complimented on our dinner and the very efficient manner in which it was served. Our baked goods, fancy work, candy, novelties, farm produce and parcel post articles were considered quite a bargain by the customers and they enjoyed learning the Past, Present and Future from Madam Fan Fell.

Our proceeds for the day amounted to \$3,378.42, including \$8.35 received from Sister Marie Burris from the benefit of 1953. Our expenses were \$770.35 making our net profit \$2,608.07.

Included in our expenses was the purchase of a tarpaulin which we had borrowed and when we returned it to the owner it was discovered that someone had put a few small nail holes in it and we were compelled to pay two-thirds of the purchase price. Our share was \$26.20, but now it is our property and can be used each year.

On September 26th it was my happy privilege, accompanied by the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and several members of the Order, to present a check in the amount of \$1000.00 to the Delaware Day School for Handicapped Children at Claymont, Delaware. This was greatly appreciated by the Board members and parents, who served delicious refreshments to those of us who attended.

On October 2, accompanied by the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and several members of the Order, attended the Potentate's Ball in the Gold Ball Room of the Hotel DuPont and presented to the Potentate of Nur Temple, Mr. Hart Cooper, a check in the amount of \$1000.00 to be used for the Shriners' Hospital for Crippled Children and the Certificate of Appreciation received from them is in the foyer on the desk of the Registration Committee.

The Grand Secretary, Sister Elizabeth M. Fisher, under the direction of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, during the Emergency Drive of the Polio Campaign, sent a check in the amount of \$100.00 and at the Annual Drive another check in amount of \$100.00 making our contribution for the year \$200.00. A check in amount of \$100.00 was sent to Sister Ruth Cann for the Society for Crippled Children and Adults, during the Easter Seal Campaign—this check to be used at the summer camp for these children.

In appreciation for all courtesies extended to us in the past and for full cooperation on the part of the members of the Shrine Club in selling tickets for our Carnival, we donated an exhaust fan for the Delaware Shrine Club Building to be placed in the kitchen. A check in amount of \$235.00 to be used for this purpose was sent to them by our Grand Secretary, Sister Fisher.

All the food left from our dinner, which consisted of potatoes, tomatoes, string beans, rolls, butter and pies were taken to the Polish

Orphanage at Glasgow, Delaware by two officers of the Delaware State Police and we express our appreciation to them for their cooperation during the Carnival. A one-hundred pound bag of potatoes was taken by our Worthy Grand Patron and his wife, Sister Ivah, to the Children's Home at Claymont.

We have also purchased three electric grills to be the property of the Grand Chapter, for use at the hamburg and weiner stand, at a cost of \$20.58 each. Sister and Brother Ostendarp have consented to keep these at their home for use at all future benefits. This leaves us a working balance of \$31.91.

We are again indebted to the Shrine Club for our Carnival which will be held this year on July 9 at the Shrine Building and we hope for a bigger and better benefit so that we may again in some samll way, contribute to the comfort of these little children who bring joy to our homes. Let us do our very best to show our Shriner Brothers that we too, want to share in the task of bringing hope and happiness to these many children, one of whom returned thanks in his testimony when he said:—

REPORT OF V. A. HOSPITAL REHABILITATION

May 24th, 1955

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, members of the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware.

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

One can hardly believe that a year has passed since our last report to you, but it has, so here we are and here is our report.

First of all, Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron, we want to thank you for our re-appointment as Chairman and Co-chairman of the Veterans Hospital Rehabilitation Committee, and we trust that we have met with your approval.

Your chairman's first duty was to serve as a page at the New Castle County Medical Association conference held at the V. A. Hospital on Tuesday, May 18th, assisted by Sister Mildred Ouesenberry.

Sister Ouesenberry who was a member of Five Points Chapter 13, passed away on March 2nd, of this year.

On June 17th, an outside Carnival was held. Your chairman was assisted by Sister Helen M. Welsh, Brother William Edmonds and William Preston, a member of Armstrong Lodge, A. F. and A. M. Our booth was shared by the Masonic Lodge. Our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron could not attend due to a "Grand Visitation." The Grand Chapter gave us a check of \$15.00 for prizes.

Your chairman acts as a news reporter for the hospital paper Del-VA-News, collecting items of interest from patients of "7-E" and

"7-W" (the 7th floor) M. P. Ward each Wednesday morning, and works in the afternoon in the Central Service Room and in Recreation. Miss Mary Cornelius, Recreation Director, is a member of our Order in Pennsylvania.

On November 1st, Radiant Chapter 6 held a Game-party for the T. B. patients on the 6th floor and served ice cream, homemade cake, candy and cigarettes. The boys surely enjoyed the games, prizes refreshments and the *girls*. The colors followed the Hallow-een trend.

A beautiful poinsettia plant was presented at the Christmas season by Sister and Brother Benjamin Cooper of Radiant Chapter, and this was placed in the hospital Chapel. A letter of thanks was sent to our Sister and Brother from Dr. Major W. Gasper, the hospital manager.

At Christmas time, the T. B. patients made ceramic Santa mugs and Five Points Chapter No. 13 gave the boys 42 Narcissus bulbs and 20 lbs. of small stones for the mugs. Each of the 40 patients received a mug and enjoyed watching the bulbs bloom. A letter of appreciation was received from the boys, and a 'Thank-you' card with the signature of each boy was received by your chairman. This card more than compensated for having had to carry those bulbs and stones from town and to the hospital.

Your chairman and Sister Welsh were again pages for the Medical Conference, Tuesday May 17th, of this year, making the 6th year your chairman has been honored. Over 100 doctors attended this conference.

ACTIVE LEGISLATION OF GRAND CHAPTER

Approved Recommendations

- 1. That at every semi-annual meeting of a subordinate Chapter the Secretary shall read the Land Marks.__1922.
- 2. That the Warder or Sentinel remain at their stations during recess, otherwise the Chapter must be purged on resuming order.__1922.
- 3. That the degrees cannot be conferred on a candidate the same night that the said candidate is elected for the degrees, unless said candidate is departing hurriedly for foreign jurisdiction.__1922.
- 4. That any visitor desiring to visit a Chapter by examination must show receipt for dues paid, or a year card, before the committee will give an examination.__1922.
- 5. That no member be allowed to vouch for any one unless they have sat in Chapter, or have lawful information from a sister or brother who has sat in Chapter with them.__1922.
- 6. That the Bible shall not be closed at recess,_by doing so closes the Chapter._1922.
- 7. That while a Chapter is in session, excepting during recess, members be required to use the guarded door.__1922.
- 8. That the Grand Chapter furnish Christmas Greetings to be sent to each Grand Jurisdiction, General Grand Chapter, Present Grand Officers and to the subordinate Chapters in Delaware.__1922.
- 9. That for every ten white balls in a ballot box, there shall be one black ball; no ballot box, however, to contain at any time less than six black balls.__1922.
- 10. That the letter "G" be omitted from the Square and Compass in all Patrons' Jewels. __1922.
- 11. That a uniform system of books be adopted by this Grand Chapter consisting of Minute Books, Roll Book, Secretary's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Ledgers, Record Book of petitioners elected and rejected in this State.__1923.
- 12. That the proceedings of this Grand Chapter be distributed in the following manner_One copy to each Grand Officer_to each Sentative of Delaware_to each elective officer of the General Grand Chapter_three copies to each Grand Chapter_six copies to each Chapter in Delaware._1923-1930.
- 13. That the Flag of our Country be required to be placed in the East at the right of the Worthy Matron in each Chapter room and that the Pledge of Allegiance be given at each meeting.__1924.

- 14. That the Grand Secretary send to each Chapter a copy of all legislation enacted at the Grand Chapter Session immediately after its close.__1924.
 - 15. That public installations be discontinued.__1924.
- 16. That once each year there shall be set aside a night known as Obligation Night in which to have a Special Service to renew our Obligation, the matter of the time and Ceremony to be left in the hands of the Worthy Matron of each Chapter.__1925.
- 17. That all approved decisions and recommendations made by this Grand Chapter be printed in the Proceedings under the heading of "Approved Decisions and Recommendations," adding those made and approved each year.__1925.
- 18. That all Sister Officers must be dressed in white at all Chapter meetings.__1926.
- 19. That Officers shall not be permitted to take hand bags or similar articles to their stations.__1926.
- 20. That no one but members be admitted to the ante-room or preparation rooms, except candidates for the degrees, until after the Chapter is closed.__1926.
- 21. The laws of this State forbid gambling, any form of raffling, or chances; therefore no Chapter, or any committee, or individual representing a Chapter, shall be permitted to secure money for any Chapter in this manner.__1926.
- 22. That the sale of anything in the Chapter Room be prohibited ___1926.
- 23. That the Address of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron be in the hands of the Jurisprudence Committee not less than one week previous to the date of the Opening Session of the Grand Chapter.__1926.
- 24. That in the future when a call is sent to the members of any Chapter for a Special Meeting a duplicate shall be sent at the same time to the Grand Matron and Grand Secretary.__1926.
- 25. I have noticed some of the articles appearing in the newspapers concerning the activities of the Order in this State. One recent article gave the names of the candidates initiated in one of the Chapters, while another article stated that only one office held by the officer named would be contested at the election. I would recommend that the members be more careful in giving information outside the Chapter Rooms.—1928.
- 26. That a revised copy of the By-Laws of each Subordinate Chapter bekept on file in the Grand Secretary's office.__1928
- 27. That a special dispensation be required to install officers who are not installed at the regular installations.__1928.

28. That in case of removal from one jurisdiction to another in this Grand Jurisdiction, any sister or brother desiring a demit for the purpose of joining another Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, shall have the right to petition such other Chapter for membership upon first giving notice to their original Chapter of such intention.

Should the Chapter so receiving the petition elect the petitioner to membership and notify their former Chapter, under seal, accordingly, upon receipt of said notice by their former Chapter, it shall grant a demit, which shall be sent direct to the Secretary of the Chapter to which petitioner has been elected. In case of their rejection by the Chapter to which petitioner has applied, their membership shall remain in their former Chapter.__1929.

- 29. That no request be made or granted to confer degrees by courtesy for a Grand Chapter working under a Ritual other than the one promulgated by the General Grand Chapter, and that a petitioner for membership by affiliation on demit granted by a Chapter working under such Ritual, if elected shall be required to take the obligation. __1930.
- 30. That the election of a petitioner, against whom objection has been made, shall be considered void, of the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of the election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the Chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.__1930.
- 31. That each Chapter be held responsible to this Grand Chapter for the number of Rituals furnished them at the time of Institution, as a part of their required Chapter property and that the Chapter shall pay to the Grand Secretary the list price for each Ritual lost, upon receipt of which the necessary Rituals will be sent to the Chapter. That a money value be placed upon the Secret Work and Labyrinth Chart, to be paid to the Grand Secretary by the Chapter in case of loss.—1930.
- 32. That no new edition of By-Laws shall be issued by any Chapter without first submitting a copy to the Worthy Grand Matron or the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, for approval.__1930.
- 33. That the Visiting Card as issued heretofore, be abolished and that the "identification and receipt for dues in card form," as required by our Constitution, be the only card furnished the Chapters to be issued to members, and that the cards furnished by the General Grand Chapter be adopted for this purpose.__1930.
- 34. That in the future all officers appointed to serve Under Dispensation shall be installed at the time of Instituting the Chapter and that no Chapter shall be Constituted until they have worked Under Dispensation at least six months (not including July and August unless stated meetings are held during these months),—1930.

- 35. That all persons signing a petition for a dispensation for a new Chapter be required to also fill out, in ink, individual petition blanks, answering all questions thereon in their own handwriting. Said petition to become the property of the Subordinate Chapter._____1930.
- 36. That a price of \$5.00 (five dollars) be placed on Secret. Work and \$2.00 (two dollars) on the Diagram of the labyrnthi.__1930.
- 37. That no member of a Chapter shall furnish a list of the membership to anyone for the purpose of circularizing tsmembers, e. or soliciting for any purpose other than the Eastern Star.__1931.
- 38. That a space be provided for the signature of the installing officer on the list of officers installed.__1931.
- 39. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be furnished the Associate Grand Matron, and that officers of Subordinate Chapters and any member interested in the work in this Jurisdiction be allowed to purchase them, if they so desire.__1931.
- 40. That a form, for requesting a Special Dispensation from the Worthy Grand Matron, be printed, to be furnished to Chapters, as other supplies, from the office of the Grand Secretary.__1931.
- 41. That Article 5, Section 1, be amended so that this Grand Chapter may meet in any town in Delaware where there is a subordinate Chapter, at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron. __1931.
- 42. That the Grand Secretary be authorized to dispose of all foreign proceedings after a period of 3 years, and that due care be taken in disposing of them.__1931.
- 43. That a copy of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Chapter (marked "Property of Grand Chapter" and with Seal affixed) be given to each member of the Jurisprudence, Constitution and By-Law Committee and to each elective officer and returned to Grand Secretary on their retirement from office. That copies be sold to interested members of the Order for twenty cents each.__1932.
- 44. That the list of names of the members of subordinate Chapters be omitted and that in place thereof a Chapter directory be printed to contain the name of the Chapter, place, and time of meeting, the names of the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Associate Matron, Associate Patron, with the name and address of the Secretary.
- 45. That a Grand Lecturer be required to pass the examination to secure a Grade A Certificate not less than two months after being elected.—1933.
- 46. That the Grand Matron have the power to appoint a member who holds a Grade A Certificate, that the appointment of the Grand Matron shall be effective until the elected officer qualifies or until the

next annual session of the Grand Chapter, when the office shall be filled by election.__1933.

- 47. That no practice meetings be held on Sunday.__1933.
- 48. That the approved recommendation, No. 34, 1930, be rescinded and that the Sentinel see that all members and visitors register in the Register Book.__1933.
- 49. That the Book of Instruction on Page 8—Reception of Grand Officers on Official Visits be changed from "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Conductress and Associate Conductress have finished proving the Chapter" to "they should be introduced and escorted to the East immediately after the Chapter has been declared open". My reason for this recommendation is that Grand Honors should not be given when the Bible is closed and the Chapter not opened.__1934.
- 50. That the names of all Past Matrons and Past Patrons be printed in the Proceedings after the names of the Officers.__1934.
- 51. That the Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee composed of four sisters and one brother to be known as an "Educational Fund Committee". One member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year. Thereafter one to be appointed each year to serve for five years. Said committee to have the custody of all money properly belonging to the fund. All disbursements to be signed by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the committee.__1934.
- 52. That a copy of the Book of Instructions be given members of the Jurisprudence Committee. These books to remain the property of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, and to be returned to the Grand Chapter at the completion of each member's term.__1934.
- 53. That the members be permitted to remain seated during the Opening March in Subordinate Chapters and called up when the position referred to in the Ritual is assumed.__1935.
- 54. That no Life Membership shall be granted by Chapters in this Grand Jurisdiction. (This not to affect those now holding such memberships.)_1935.
- 55. That some ruling be adopted by this Grand Chapter whereby the Associate Patron shall have the same restrictions as the Worthy Patron regarding the Pink Slip.__1935.
- 56. That all petitions for Affiliation from New Jersey shall state thereon the Masonic relationship upon which their Eastern Star Membership is based, and if it does not conform to the requirements of the General Grand Chapter, such petitions shall not be considered.

 1935.

- 57. That the Ceremony used in receiving Distinguished Visitors at this Grand Session be adopted as official in this Grand Jurisdiction. __1935. See pages 37-38.
- 58. That the ceremony of affiliation as used at the Schools of Instruction in 1935 be adopted and incorporated in the Book of Instruction. This is in accordance with the General Grand Chapter. __1935.
- 59. That a sponsorship committee, composed of three members of this Grand Chapter, be appointed by the incoming Worthy Grand Matron to cooperate more fully with the Job's Daughters, which organization has been sponsored by this Grand Chapter.__1935.
- 60. That those portions of the Worthy Grand Matron's report and the Worthy Grand Patron's report which require action by this Grand Chapter be duplicated and distributed to the delegates at the opening of the Grand Chapter Session.__1935.
- 61. That in order to facilitate the making of proper records, secretaries of Subordinate Chapters be instructed to list on their annual reports both the new and old names of members whose names have been changed since the issuance of the latest annual report.__1935
- 62. That all Grand Representative Commissions expire the same Month, December 31st.__1936.
- 63. That our proceedings be bound in book form with stiff backs, four or five in one volume.__1936.
 - 64. That Job's Daughters be added to our mailing list.__1936.
- 65. That Chapters urge their committees on applications to be more particular in their investigation. This is the most important committee in your Chapter.
- 66. That the Associate Matron march to her station when the Worthy Matron says: "The Officers will take their respective stations".—1937.
- 67. That a Membership Committee shall be appointed each year by the Worthy Matrons.__1937.
- 68. That the Worthy Grand Patron make written Report to his successor in office of all outstanding petitions for dispensations and any preliminary work that has been done to create interest in localities where no Chapters exist.__1937.
- 69. That as the Conductress is the only one (except the Worthy Patron) to use the pink slip in her work, that the Associate Conductress be required to pass a Grade B examination.__1938. See Recommendation 100.
- 70. That the Associate Matron be required to pass an examination in the opening and closing ceremony before she is installed as Worthy Matron.__1938.

- 71. That a complete set of our proceedings be bound for the use of the Worthy Grand Matron. That she be held responsible for same and deliver them to the Installed Grand Matron at the same time she delivers the seal, etc._1938.
- 72. That the fourth paragraph on page 28 in the proceedings of 1930 be eliminated and the following substituted: The Associate Conductress must be positive, when preparing the ballot box, that there are as many white balls as there are voting members in the Chapter Room, and the proper number of black balls or cubes. If there be a Chapter that has not in its possession as many white balls as it has members they should be purchased.__1938.
- 73. That this Grand Body give its approval and recognize the sounding of the gavel in the subordinate Chapters as the opening of the Chapter.__1938.
- 74. I recommend that all Chapters requesting Dispensations shall accompany their request by check drawn on Treasury of Chapter requesting same.__1941.
- 75. That the compensation to the Fraternal Correspondent be eliminated for the time being.__1941.
- 76. I recommend that in order to eliminate embarrassing situations, Honorary Memberships in Subordinate Chapters not be proposed or voted upon when the recipient is in the room.__1943.
- 77. That the Grand Lecturer's contingent fund be increased to \$50.00.__1943.
- 78. That the Associate Conductress hand the ballot box to the Worthy Matron from the floor of the Chapter room and not go up on the platform.__1944.
- 79. That we discontinue the use of stoles. The Jurisdiction of Delaware has adopted the use of shoulder ribbons and no officer should wear both.__1944.
- 80. That the outline for Proficiency examinations in Constitution and By-Laws, Rules and Regulations for Class "A" certificates as found on pages 29, 30 and 31 in 1930 Proceedings be mimeographed for the use of those desiring to take the examination.__1944.
- 82. That the Conductress drape the Charter immediately after the Flag Ceremony in all Chapters. This to be incorporated in the Book of instructions.__1944.

- 83. That when a Chapter amends its By-Laws, copies of said amendments be sent in threes to the Grand Secretary, one for the book in the Grand Secretary's office, one for the book held by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee and one for the Worthy Grand Matron's book. These books will then be kept up-to-date.__1944.
- 84. That the incoming Deputy Grand Lecturers receive a copy of the Proceedings. __1944.
- 85. That the Worthy Grand Patron read Article 8, Sec. 1, of the Constitution, on balloting, before the election of officers each year.__1944.
- 86. That the words "Without further ceremony" be deleted from Article 11, Sec. 6 of the Rules and Regulations. This will give the Worthy Grand Matron the privilege of having a ceremony if she so chooses.__1944.
- 87. That the Associate Grand Matron, who according to our Constitution and By-Laws, automatically becomes Fraternal Correspondent, be granted permission to divide proceedings received, with Grand Conductress, and Associate Grand Conductress, each to review and report same to Associate Grand Matron to be included in her report to this Grand Chapter.—1944.
- 88. That the Diamond used in future for Past Grand Matron's jewel be a fine point .18 white stone.
- 89. When it is impossible for the Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron to attend a Grand Visitation, the Conductress and Associate Conductress proceed as though both officers were present and conduct either Worthy Grand Matron or Worthy Grand Patron, as the case may be, to the East._1945.
- 90. Since the Ritual requires the Associate Matron to assume the duties of the Worthy Matron, the Conductress must take an examination in the Opening and Closing ceremonies.__1945. (See Recommendation No. 109).
- 91. Deputy Grand Lecturer is authorized to give examinations in Grade "B" but the certificates be issued by the Grand Lecturer.
- 92. Candidates may be seated during lecture by the Worthy Patron, in initiatory work.__1947.
- 93. Members of a chapter must be notified ten (10) days in advance when voting to change the By-Laws of a chapter.

 __1948. (See Recommendation No. 111.)
- 94. Members appointed on an investigating committee should not visit the petitioner. An investigation should be made thoroughly but discreetly and more or less secretly.__1948.

- 95. Members should not sign a petition unless they are acquainted with the petitioner.__1948.
 - 96. Price of Proceedings shall be \$1.80 each.__1948.
- 97. That we recognize and welcome in subordinate Chapters, the Grand Guardian, Associate Grand Guardian, Bethel Guardian and Associate Bethel Guardian of the Job's Daughters, at the close of regular introductions, by a request to rise. Welcome them at their seats. Our Grand Chapter sponsors the Job's Daughters and we do recognize them in Grand Chapter Session.__1949.
- 98. That all examinations for Grade "B" Certificates and Star cards, be taken immediately after election of officers.
- 99. That a committee of five (3 sisters and 2 brothers) be appointed on a Home Fund Committee. One member to be appointed for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year. Therafter one to be appointed for each year to serve five years. This fund to be kept as a separate fund by the Grand Secretary and known as Eastern Star Home Fund. No money to be withdrawn from this fund without the consent and approval of the committee.__1950.
- 100. That the Grand Lecturer and Deputy Grand Lecturer impress upon the officers and members of subordinate chapters that when a change is contemplated in the By-Laws of a Chapter all members must be notified at least 10 days in advance.__1950.
- 101. Secretaries must put Seal of Chapter on all requests to Worthy Grand Matron.
 - 102. No notices shall be sent out on Post Cards.
- 103. Worthy Patron must give secretary a receipt for Secret Work and Diagram. Associate Patron must give secretary a receipt for Secret Work.
- 104. Associate Grand Patron must pass an examination of 20 questions six months before Installation as Worthy Grand Patron. This examination to be given by Grand Lecturer.
- 105. Time of meeting of Grand Chapter has been changed from 1:00 o'clock to 10:00 o'clock A. M.

Changes to be made in Constitution and Laws:

106. Art. V, Sec. 1 Change to read:

This Grand Chapter shall send the Worthy Grand Matron, then in office, to Triennial Assembly of General Grand Chapter. If she is unable to attend, then a Proxy in the following order—Worthy Grand Patron, Associate Grand Matron, Associate Grand Patron.

- 107. Art. V, Sec. 2. That our Delegate to Triennial Assembly be allowed \$10.00 per day while triennial is in session and 4c per mile traveling charges.
- 108. Art. IV, Sec. 7. Change to read: The ten (10) officers above named shall be elected annually.

This changes the office of Grand Lecturer and Grand Sentinel from Appointive offices to elective offices.

- 109. The election of a petitioner against whom objection has been made shall be considered void, if the objection is not raised and the petitioner initiated within one year of the date of election. That the status of such person be that of a rejected petitioner over whom the chapter shall have jurisdiction for one year thereafter.__1945. Page 76. (Constitution & By-Laws Committee).
- 110. To avoid any question of legality, election of officers be confined to stated meetings (Not Special Meetings).__1947.
- 111. Secretaries do not read the names of rejected candidates in other chapters with concurrent jurisdiction.__1948. (Jurisprudence Committee)
- 112. One member of Board of Grand Trustees be responsible for the flags, staffs and standards belonging to Grand Chapter. (Grand Trustees).__1949.
- 113. Grand Representatives be acknowledged and welcomed at each of our meetings; asked to stand, name the state they represent. __1953.
- 114. Worthy Patron, Associate Patron sign a receipt for Secret work placed in their keeping and that these receipts be kept in file by the secretary of each subordinate chapter.

Approved Decisions

- 1. The election of a petitioner to receive the degrees in a Chapter when another Chapter holds jurisdiction over the person as a rejected petitioner, is null and void.—1922.
- 2. Is it permissible to do crocheting or fancy work in the Chapter during the session? No.—1922.
- 3. The time referred to in the Constitution shall be the time prevailing in Wilmington on the dates the Grand Chapter is in Session.

 —1925.
 - 4. Can we hold rehearsal at member's homes? No.-1926.
- 5. A special election is necessary to fill vacancies in the office of Trustee. This will require a dispensation for that purpose, the members being notified ten days before the election.—1926.

- 6. A petition has been received from a person holding a demit from Pennsylvania, but who now resides in Maryland. Is it necessary to ask for a waiver of Territorial Jurisdiction from Maryland? Yes. —1926.
- 7. What should we do with a visitor who attends our Chapter, and has done so for years and has never shown a receipt for dues? Every visitor must show a receipt for dues or a demit once every current year. If demit is more than one year old, she is refused admission.—1928.
- 8. Can the members of the Chapter stand within the Labyrinth and repeat the Oligation at the same time a candidate is taking the Obligation? No. Members can arise and repeat Obligation when presiding officer calls for it.—1928.
- 9. After a petitioner has been balloted upon and has been declared either elected or rejected and ballot broken, members may be admitted, after which the name of the next petitioner may come up for ballot.—1929.
- 10. A person with a deformity of the hand may be initiated into the Order of the Eastern Star if such deformity does not interfere with their ability to make themselves known as a sister or brother. —1929.
- 11. The ballot shall not be spread on the application of a person who is not eligible to petition for the degrees.—1930.
- 12. A legally adopted daughter may petition for the degrees on the Masonic affiliation of the son of her foster parents.—1930.
- 13. A petitioner for affiliation becomes a member of the Chapter immediately upon being elected. Having signed the By-Laws of a Chapter upon being initiated, the signing of the By-Laws upon affiliation is merely a matter of Chapter record.—1930.
- 14. A petition for affiliation on demit granted by Chapter not using Ritual of General Grand Chapter shall be handled in the usual way, except that in addition to signing the By-Laws, such petitioner shall be required to take the Obligation of the Order as required by our Ritual.—1930.
- 15. Members cannot be admitted to the Chapter room during balloting. The ballot is started when the Report of the Investigating Committee is read to the Chapter. According to our procedure, action on the report is not finished until the petition is balloted upon.—1930.
- 16. By-Laws of a subordinate Chapter are required by the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter and should be classified as a supply, as interpreted in my official letter number one.—1930.



- 17. A duplicate Certificate of Proficiency can be secured upon payment of a fee to cover the cost of affixing the Grand Chapter Seal (See Rules and Regulations for government of Grand Chapter, Art. III, Sec. 1, (4), plus the list price of the Certificate.) (See recommendation of Jurisprudence Committee.)—1930.
- 18. The Worthy Matron or Worthy Patron serving from the time of the Instituting of a Chapter, though not elected at the time of Constituting, is entitled to the privileges and prerogatives of a Past Worthy Matron or a Past Worthy Patron, since she or he filled the office for which she or he was appointed by the Worthy Grand Patron. —1930.
- 19. That in accordance with Constitution and By-Laws, Section 44, when a person applies to a Chapter for the degrees, and is rejected, said Chapter retains absolute jurisdiction over said party for one year.—1931.
- 20. That no member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices at the same time in a subordinate Chapter.—1931.
- 21. That Secretaries do not read the names of rejected candidates in other Chapters with concurrent jurisdiction and that secretaries keep proper record of all said applicants.—1933.
- 22. Page 61, 1929 Proceedings, "do not give honorary membership to anyone." This law rescinded.—1933.
- 23. That this Grand Chapter sponsor the Order of Job's Daughters.—1933.
- 24. That a member who is in arrears two and one-half years for dues and has received suspension notice may visit this Grand Chapter by another Sister of the same Chapter vouching for her. —1935.
- 25. That a demitted or suspended Past Matron has the right to wear her Jewel, because it is her personal property; however, it does not seem to be good taste.—1935.
- 26. That a Grand Instructor be required to pass the examination to secure a Grade A Certificate not less than two months after being elected.—1933.
- 27. Only a brother may occupy the station of Worthy Patron or Associate Patron. (This decision made by Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Easton). If there is no brother present, the Worthy Matron may invite a Past Matron to call the Chapter to order and invite the Worthy Matron and other officers to enter the Chapter room.—1944.
- 28. A dispensation is required to hold a special election, the Chapter members being notified ten days prior thereto. (Constitution and By-Laws, Article 1, Sec. 10, under Rules and Regulations governing subordinate Chapters.)—1944.

- 29. Collection plates shall not be passed in the Chapter room. The By-Laws specify the amount of dues each member shall pay. Voluntary contributions may be put into a receptacle placed in a convenient place, such as Electa's cup or on the Associate Matron's pedestal.—1944.
- 30. There shall be no music while the prayer is being said. (Ritual, Page 34—fine print.)—1944.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

- Question Our Charter is now draped for one of our deceased members. The 30 day period has expired. Another one of our members just passed away. Do we undrape the charter (even though the 30 days period hasn't expired) and then drape it again for the other member?
- **Answer** No. We do not undrape the charter. Have the presiding officer mention the passing away of this other member, thus the drape remaining on the charter for 60 days for the two deceased members.
- **Question** Can a suspended member of Chapter affiliate with another Chapter in the City?
- Answer No. The member must be reinstated in his or her chapter before she can affiliate with another chapter.
- **Question** Can a person join our chapter who is unable to kneel at the Altar due to Arthritis in her knees?
- Answer Yes. I see no reason why a person should be deprived of the privilege of our Order due to her inability to kneel at the Altar. She could stand with bowed head while taking the Obligation.
- Question We would like a special dispensation granted for the purpose of holding our regular meeting on December 26th, as our regular meeting night occurs on December 25th. You will find inclosed \$1.00 for this Special Dispensation.
- Answer It is impossible for me to grant this Dispensation, because regular meetings cannot be changed. Meetings are either regular or special. I suggest amending your By-Laws.
- **Question** Has the Sentinel the right to present a resolution or take any part in the business of the chapter?
- Answer When the Sentinel is invited into the chapter by the Worthy Matron (he or she) has the same right and privilege as any other member.

Question A few days after being elected, our associate conductress elect, found she could not accept this office. When holding a special election to elect another, may we install the same night?

Answer Yes.

Question May we ballot at a special meeting?

Answer No.

Question May officers leave their stations and form a hollow square outside the labyrinth for Obligation, if someone is appointed to fill Warder's chair during Obligation Ceremony?

Answer Yes.

Question May a member from Pennsylvania join a chapter in Delaware by affiliation, if she has a Demit from a Philadelphia Chapter, without a waiver?

Answer Yes. She does not need a waiver with a Demit.

Question May a chapter sell chances on a cake, after meeting is closed?

Answer No. I refer you to paragraph 23 (now paragraph 21) in Active Legislation.

Question Since the law says the officers (Conductress and Associate Conductress) must take examinations before installation should they be installed if the required examinations have not been given?

Answer I would say "NO" in order to uphold our law.

Question The question has been asked in our chapter "In proving a chapter should the Conductress and Associate Conductress use "Lawful Information" as the Book of Instructions tells us, or must they have sat in chapter with them?

Answer

Our instruction is "use Lawful Information". This does not mean that the Conductress or Associate Conductress shall have sat in chapter with them, but "Lawful Information" means they must be vouched for by someone who has sat in Chapter with them.

Question Does the Conductress assist the Associate Conductress when there are two members to be affiliated?

Answer Associate conductress does the work alone.

Question It is necessary for members to be affiliated to wait in the anteroom?

Answer No. They may be present for the opening ceremony and then asked by the Worthy Matron to retire.
