

A banquet honoring the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and other Grand Officers was held in the Fournier Memorial Hall, Wilmington, Delaware at 6:30 P. M.

SUNDAY EVENING

May 13, 1956

Divine Service was held in the First and Central Presbyterian Church, Wilmington, Delaware at 8:00 P. M. The evening message was given by the Reverend Willard G. Purdy.

The Informal Opening of the Grand Chapter of Delaware was called to order by the Sessions Chairman, Past Grand Matron, Sister Elizabeth E. Pierce, in the Gold Ball Room of the Hotel Dupont at 7:00 P. M. Monday evening, May 14th.

The room was decorated in accordance with the theme of the Session—"The Gleaners Session." A picture 6' x 10' depicting The Gleaners was surrounded with Cibotiam Palms and on either side, a mannequin to represent Ruth and Naomi, one in blue and the other in yellow, each holding bunches of wheat. These were the Worthy Grand Matron's colors and also the colors of the State of Delaware.

Across the Grand East were flower boxes of yellow roses intermingled with stalks of wheat and on the north and south side of the room, pictures 6' x 10' of sheaves of wheat.

The Hospitality Committee of which Past Grand Matron, Sister Alice C. Abbott, was chairman, escorted the distinguished guests into the room, after which the Pages, dressed in royal blue with sprays of yellow roses triangularly across their breasts, entered and formed a Guard of Honor, followed by the Junior Past Worthy Matrons and present Worthy Matrons of the subordinate chapters who wore yellow felt bonnets. They formed a human rose while the Junior Past Worthy Patrons and present Worthy Patrons, carrying large green leaves, formed a foliage circle around the rose. After forming a friendship circle of the three groups, the entire assembly sang "She's the Yellow Rose of Delaware."

The invocation was asked by Reverend Willard G. Purdy of the First and Central Presbyterian Church in Wilmington. A solo, "Whither Thou Goest," was rendered by Sister Jeanette Gutzke, Past Matron of Brandywine Chapter No. 14.

Greetings of welcome from Honorable J. Caleb Boggs, Governor of the State of Delaware, and Honorable August F. Walz, Mayor of Wilmington.

Messages of appreciation were extended by Mr. J. N. Williams from the Kutner School and Mr. L. G. Seebach for the Delaware Day School for Handicapped Children of Delaware. Also from Past Potentate Mr. W. Harrison Phillips of Nur Temple, A.A.O.N.M.S., representing the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children, who received gifts from the proceeds of the Summer Benefit, a project of the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star.

Greetings were received from the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons in Delaware, Mr. Haswell Pierce, and the speaker of the evening was Mr. John G. Leach, who spoke on Service for others, especially little children.

After the pronouncement of the benediction by Reverend Willard G. Purdy, the guests were escorted from the Grand Chapter Room and preparations were made for the Formal Opening of the evening session.

Sister Elizabeth Pierce discussed the revision of the Constitution and By-Laws in part to be continued at the afternoon's session.

ARTICLE III.

Powers and Prerogatives of the Grand Chapter

Section 1. This Grand Chapter declares its allegiance to the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. It will use only the Ritual, Signet and Labyrinth promulgated by the General Grand Chapter and will conform to its Constitution and Laws and will make an annual assessment of two cents per capita for the support of the General Grand Chapter, if requested by that body to do so; but this Grand Chapter being supreme in all matters pertaining to its internal affairs, in so far as they do not conflict with Ritual, Constitution and Laws of the General Grand Chapter, has the sole right to superintend and govern all Chapters of the Order within the State of Delaware. It has the power to grant Charters, for forming and holding new Chapters, and to extend and revoke the same; to censure, or suspend Chapters; to enact laws, rules and regulations, issue edicts, and amend or appeal the same; to discipline Chapters for wilful violation or infringement of the Ritual or of the Constitution, regulations, edicts, or proprieties of this Grand Chapter; to decide appeals from subordinate Chapters or members; to assess and collect from the several constituent Chapters such fees and sums as these laws require, or as this Grand Chapter may from time to time order; and to exercise all the rights of sovereignty within the limits of its jurisdiction, subject to the Ritual and the provisions of its own Constitution. All powers not specially delegated to Subordinate Chapters are inherent in and reserved to this Grand Chapter.

The above shall not be retroactive.

ARTICLE III.

Powers and Prerogatives of the Grand Chapter

Section 1. This Grand Chapter declares its allegiance to the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. It will use only the Ritual, Signet and Labyrinth promulgated by the General Grand Chapter and will conform to its Constitution and Laws but this Grand Chapter being supreme in all matters pertaining to its internal affairs, in so far as they do not conflict with Ritual, Constitution and Laws of the General Grand Chapter, has the sole right to superintend and govern all Chapters of the Order within the State of Delaware. It has the power to grant Charters. for forming and holding new Chapters, and to extend and revoke the same; to censure; or suspend Chapters; to enact laws, rules and regula-tions, issue edicts, and amend or appeal the same; to discipline Chapters for wilful violation or infringement of the Ritual or of the Constitution. regulations, edicts, or proprieties of this Grand Chapter; to decide appeals from subordinate Chapters or members; to assess and collect from the several constituent Chapters such fees and sums as these laws require, or as this Grand Chapter may from time to time order; and to exercise all the rights of sovereignty within the limits of its jurisdiction, subject to the Ritual and the provisions of its own Constitution. All powers not specially delegated to Subordinate Chapters are inherent in and reserved to this Grand Chapter.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 2. There shall also be a Board of three Grand Instructors and a Board of three Grand Trustees.

Section 2. There shall also be a Board of three Grand Trustees.

Section 7. The first ten officers above named shall be elected annually. The Worthy Grand Matron shall appoint all other officers. The members of the first Board of Grand Trustees shall be elected for terms of one, two and three years respectively. After the first election these board members shall be elected for a three-year term.

Motion on Art. IV., Sec. 2; also Sec. 7. Made by Past Grand Matron Sister Irma LeCompte, seconded by Past Grand Patron, Brother Thomas C. Rodway, revision be accepted.

Motion carried.

Section 3. The membership of this Grand Chapter shall consist of the foregoing officers who hold until their successors have been elected and installed; the above Boards, all Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons who shall have presided over a duly instituted and constituted Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, provided they are affiliated with some subordinate Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, all Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons (or their legally appointed proxies), all Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons while in office who have been installed, of Chartered Chapters under this Grand Jurisdiction. The Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons cannot appoint proxies or hold office or any committee appointment in this Grand Chapter. The Worthy Matron's, Worthy Patron's (or their proxies'), Associate Matron's and Associate Patron's official characters must be certified to by their respective Chapters under seal.

Section 3. The membership of this Grand Chapter shall consist of the foregoing officers who hold until their successors have been elected and installed; the above Boards, all Past Worthy Matrons and Past Worthy Patrons who shall have presided over a duly instituted and constituted Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction, provided they are affiliated with the same subordinate Chapter over which they presided in this Jurisdiction unless said Chapter is demised. All Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons (or their legally appointed proxies), all Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons while in office who have been installed, of Chartered Chapters under this Grand Jurisdiction. The Associate Matrons and Associate Patrons cannot appoint proxies or hold office or any committee appointment in this Grand Chapter. The Worthy Matron's, Worthy Patron's (or their proxies'), Associate Matron's and Associate Patron's official characters must be certified to by their respective Chapters under seal.

Section 8. The Worthy Grand Matron, Associate Grand Matron, Grand Conductress, Associate Grand Conductress, Grand Secretary, Grand Lecturer and Deputy Grand Lecturer, shall not be installed as an elective officer nor hold an appointed office in this Grand Chapter until she holds a Certificate of Proficiency in Class "A". The Associate Grand Patron

also shall be required to take an examination as provided by the Grand Chapter six months prior to being installed as Worthy Grand Patron.

Motion by P. M. Sister Eliza Crossland, seconded by Past Grand Matron Sister Bessie Warrington, the revision be accepted.

Motion carried.

ARTICLE V.

Section 1. The Annual Meeting of the Grand Chapter shall be held in the City of Wilmington, or at the discretion of the Worthy Grand Matron in any town or city in Delaware on the Third Monday in May at 10 A. M. for two consecutive days. If satisfactory accommodations are not available, Worthy Grand Matron may select any time within a week prior to, or following the above-mentioned date.

ARTICLE VII.

Section 1. Representatives or their proxies regularly appointed, of eleven subordinate Chapters under the jurisdiction of this Grand Chapter or one of the first four elective officers shall be considered to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VIII.

Election and Installation of Officers

Section 1. The election of Officers of the Grand Chapter shall begin at 2 o'clock P. M., Thursday of the meeting week. The election shall be by a majority vote on a separate, secret written ballot, and if there are more than three candidates for the same office, the name of the one receiving the lowest number of votes cast shall be dropped after the third ballot is announced. Blank ballots shall not be counted. If the votes tie for the two lowest candidates then all shall be voted on again, unless one candidate has received a majority of all votes cast. No nominations for candidates for office shall be made.

All other elective offices shall be filled by secret ballot.

Nominations for the elective offices shall be made by any voting delegate of this Grand Chapter representing the candidates' Chapter providing they are signed and office stated and nominee holds an "A" certificate and are placed in a container provided for same on the desk of the credential committee before 10 A. M. Tuesday of the meeting week. No nominations shall be considered from the floor of Grand Chapter.

Motion by Past Grand Matron Sister Helen C. West, seconded by Worthy Matron, Sister Rebecca Hagenbuch, revision be accepted.

Motion adopted.

It is not necessary for Associate Grand Patron, Grand Sentinel nor Grand Trustee to hold an "A" Certificate.

Motion by Past Matron Sister Sadie Conly seconded by Past Matron Sister Eliza Crossland this be accepted.

Motion adopted.

Section 5. Installing Privileges. It shall be the prerogative of the Worthy Grand Matron-elect to delegate the privilege of installing the incoming Grand Officers to the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, any Past Grand Matron, or Past Grand Patron, or any general Grand Chapter Officer.

Motion by Past Grand Matron Sister Alice C. Abbott, seconded by Past Grand Matron, Sister Helen C. West, revision be accepted.

Motion adopted.

ARTICLE IX.

Section 1. Paragraph (3) She shall be a member ex-officio of the Board of Grand Instructors, and shall see that the Ritual, laws, rules and regulations of the Order are strictly enforced, and its dignity maintained under any and all circumstances.

Section 1. Paragraph (12) She may appoint such Special Deputies as in her judgment are needed for the growth and extension of the Order, or whose appointments may be required for the proper transaction of the business of the Grand Chapter, or of Subordinate Chapters, including the appointment of deputies to preside at trials, when deemed expedient by her or when requested to do so, provided such Special Deputies are voting members of this Grand Chapter. In the appointment of such Special Deputies she shall definitely prescribe their powers and duties, which shall not be in conflict with this Constitution and these laws, and their commissions shall expire after said duties have been performed. A Special Deputy may act without having a certificate from the Board of Grand Instructors except they cannot organize or instruct Chapters.

(12) She may appoint such Special Deputies holding an "A" certificate as in her judgment are needed for the growth and extension of the Order, or whose appointments may be required for the proper transaction of the business of the Grand Chapter, or of Subordinate Chapters, including the appointment of deputies to preside at trials, when deemed expedient by her or when requested to do so, provided such Special Deputies are voting members of this Grand Chapter. In the appointment of such Special Deputies she shall definitely prescribe their powers and duties, which shall not be in conflict with this Constitution and these laws, and their commissions shall expire after said duties have been performed.

Motion by Past Matron Sister Sadie Conly, seconded by Past Matron Sister Edith Labour, revision be accepted.

Motion adopted.

Section 1. Paragraph (13) She may appoint Grand Representatives for Delaware near other Grand Chapters, and recommend the appointment of Grand Representatives from other Grand Jurisdictions near the Grand Chapter of Delaware. The first set of Grand Representatives shall be appointed for one-third of the Grand Chapters for one year, the second set for one-third of the Grand Chapters for two years, and the third set for the last one-third of the Grand Chapters for three years and after that for a three-year term. Only voting members of this Grand Chapter are eligible to appointment as Grand Representatives.

The first set of Grand Representatives shall be appointed for one-third of the Grand Chapters for one year, the second set for one-third of the Grand Chapters for two years, and the third set for the last one-third of the Grand Chapters for three years and after that for a three-year term.

(13) She may appoint Grand Representatives for Delaware near other Grand Jurisdictions, and approve the appointment of Grand Representatives from other Grand Jurisdictions near the Grand Chapter of Delaware, at the expiration of their commissions. Only voting members of this Grand Chapter are eligible to appointment as Grand Representatives.

Motion by Past Grand Matron, Sister Helen C. West, seconded by Past Grand Matron, Sister Alice C. Abbott, revision be accepted.

Shall call for report of Credentials Committee and Committee on Nominations. He shall sign in conjunction with the Worthy Grand Matron all charters granted and issued to Chapters by the Grand Chapter. He shall individually issue all dispensations to institute new Chapters, and institute same either in person or by a deputy who must be a Present or Past Patron, and render all decisions for chapters while under dispensation. He shall discipline insubordinate Chapters, officers or members only with the written advice and consent of the Worthy Grand Matron. If both the Worthy Grand Matron and Associate Grand Matron are absent from the State, he shall perform the duties of the Worthy Grand Matron. He shall have a Grand Patron's seal, to consist of the badge of his office surrounded by the words, "Worthy Grand Patron of Delaware," and affix same to all official documents.

New Paragraph No. 2

He shall receive the sum of \$50.00 to defray his expenses while in office and make an itemized report annually to the Grand Chapter. He shall receive an additional \$50.00 if instituting and constituting new chapters.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Can a brother serve as Deputy Grand Lecturer?

- A. YES. Our law does not specify a sister. However, this is entirely the prerogative of the Worthy Grand Matron.
- Q. A motion was made and carried by the members present at a stated meeting. Can the Worthy Matron instruct the secretary to disregard this motion, or hold over until the next meeting?

A. NO. A motion carried is finished, unless the one who made the motion is willing to withdraw it. This must be done in open chapter.

Q. Can one be elected to office if not present?

A. YES.

- Q. Isn't it true that no one can enter or leave the chapter room during the election of officers?
- A. Only by majority vote of the chapter.

Q. Can a prayer be made at the Altar if it is not Ritual?

A. YES. The Altar with our open Holy Bible is the place for prayer.

Q. Can a trustee serve as an appointed officer?

- A. Page 45 Constitution and By-Laws insert reads, "No member can be elected or appointed to fill two offices." But, since the trustee does not fill a station, is not named in the list of officers to constitute a chapter and is not installed, I see no reason why a trustee cannot fill an appointed office.
- Q. Can a person who is not a citizen petition a chapter?

A. YES. The Order of the Eastern Star is an international organization.

Q. I have been asked where a Past Patron of my chapter would get his vote in Grand Chapter after he affiliated with another chapter. What was the decision in the case of Brother Shinn who was a past patron of Adah Chapter and affiliated with Delaware Chapter?

A. I cannot find any law or decision on this matter. However, I am told that Brother Shinn received his vote from Delaware Chapter as a de-

mitted member and a Past Patron of Adah Chapter.

Questions on Funeral Ceremony

Q. Should the officers wear long white dresses?

A. Our Jurisdiction calls for white and since the funeral ceremony is "Ritual", I think the officers taking part should wear white. The length of the dress is optional.

Q. Should the officers wear badges?

- A. According to the "Ritual", this is optional.
- Q. Page 143 in Ritual, paragraph 3—Does this mean all eighteen officers or only the eight who actually have a part in the ceremony?

A. Only eight.

Q. At the end of the prayers, should the response be given?

A. YES. This is "Ritual."

RECOMMENDATION

No business shall be transacted at a special meeting other than that specified in the "call". No Chapter shall be convened on Sunday except for funeral or memorial services.

Such persons may affiliate with any Chapter in this Grand Jurisdiction within one year from the date of demit. No demit shall be considered legal unless countersigned in the handwriting of the holder. There is no time limit to a demit issued by a Subordinate Chapter.

We now serve the needs of 40 children, there are 1000 of them who are not receiving any help. I represent 40 children who cannot speak for themselves. Drop into the school any day and see the expressive faces of children who are doing constructive things.

Mr. L. G. Seebach, Director, Delaware School for Handicapped, Inc.

Distinguished Guests:

As a Director of the Delaware Day School I bring you greetings and sincere thanks for the wonderful contributions—not only this year but previous years—you have given to the children of the School. You have made it possible for these children to receive speech therapy, and physical Your gifts have started a workshop in wood work and metal work. This class has been in operation since last fall. You have also made a contribution to the school at Seaford. This was the first school for children in Seaford and one is forming in Kent County and your check was the first contribution. Please come to see the children and we thank you for them.

ADDRESS - Mr. John G. Leach

Governor Boggs, Mayor Walz, Ladies and Gentlemen:

It has been very inspiring here today to hear the comments from your hearts that are full of gratitude. I am reminded that a year has passed by since I spoke at the banquet. I am pleased with the messages I have heard here this evening. We should always remember that as the years roll by we have advantages that we do not take advantage of and we do not have them the second time. It has been said, "A man is hopeless who thinks only of himself." Your organization is built upon service to others. You have aided the Kutner School and the Delaware Day School. The boundary lines are extending—there is a tremendous growth in this area. There will be little boys and girls who are emotionally disturbed; children who will be physically handicapped. There will be boys and girls who will have what we call mental troubles. I cannot help but think that you have given to the mothers and fathers of those children the great star of hope. You have been the good samaritan. Where others have passed them by we have found a way to take care of those who can learn. We have had an opportunity to take care of emotionally and socially disturbed children, but for a long time nothing was done for these children who could not learn from books and the necessary things in education.

We are taking care of our physically handicapped. We also have to think about the blind. There are more and more blind "Premies" or prematurely born babies. We have 42 blind babies in this state. have this wonderful institution for blind babies. We must start very early in their lives-they must have the opportunity of socialization at a very early age. With the mentally retarded child: they have been hard for us to take care of. There are many children in this state who should be in training day school; they need the love and training of mothers and fathers but must have day schools where they can go. Many of them have many more capabilities than we give them credit for. So, in these two schools where teachers with love in their hearts and understanding of these children preside, they are accomplishing miraculous things in the way of learning and they can feel they are getting the best possible training instead of being hidden away from society. What you have given is not only money but you have given hope and faith. Where hope is gone the man is dead and where faith is gone life is not worth while. You have been pioneers because by your gifts others have said, "We shall do likewise," and others have combined their efforts to help this good cause.

I am happy to be on the platform with our Governor. His sense of dedication is one that every mother and father can understand. We understand the anxiety they have. When a perfectly normal child can't do certain things at the age of 10 or 11 you get concerned. Think, then, of the tremendous burden of worry and anxiety when a mother begins to feel that her child cannot learn like other children. You have rendered a great service to that mother and father of these children.

I remember Brandywine Chapter and Five Points. I can't recall all of them but my mother was a member of Caesar Rodney No. 8. It is a wonderful state in which you live and such service as you render helps many people. Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my children you have done it unto Me.

At this time Worthy Grand Matron introduced her mother, Mrs. Mary Reynolds, her daughter, Ruth Ellen, and husband, Brother Pierce Laws.

I want to welcome them at this time because they have to leave. My husband will be able to stay but I wanted to introduce them all at one time. I would love to have you give them a good round of applause. I am so happy to have you here tonight. I hope, Mother, that I haven't seemed to forget you in this busy year of my life. To my daughter, Ruth Ellen, I have leaned on you for a lot of things and I appreciate your love and your help. I am so happy you are here. Last, but not least—to My Sweetheart, my standby, my leaning post—the one who listens to all my woes (somebody back here says "AMEN"). I would not know how to act if he were not by my side. . . . This is my family—just three of them.

REPORT ON SUMMER BENEFIT

Someone has said:

"The greatest thing a man can do, is to be kind to God's children."

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Guests, Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Sisters and Brothers:

As Chairman of our W.G. Matron and W.G. Patron's project, namely "The Summer Benefit for Handicapped Children" I am given the opportunity to bring to you a record of a wonderful experience for your Chairman.

ON JULY 9, 1955, the Summer Carnival was held at the Delaware Shrine Club Building on the DuPont Highway at State Road, and the proceeds from the Carnival, donations from the Benefit of 1954, and the Past Matrons and Patrons of 1951 netted us \$3,364.41. Our expenses totaled \$548.81, leaving a balance of \$2,815.60 profit.

IN JUNE a check for \$25.00 was sent by our Grand Secretary to the Rescue Mission on East 4th Street in Wilmington to help defray the expenses of a picnic to Riverview Beach sponsored by them for the Handicapped Children of Wilmington. This amount probably doesn't seem much to those of you who are not familiar with this event, but with all the business men contributing to this picnic, this amount was very graciously received by the Mission.

ON OCTOBER 1, 1955, a number of our members attended the ball in the Armory, given in honor of W. Harrison Phillips, Potentate of Nur Temple, at which time your chairman, as the guest of Nur Temple, had the honor of presenting to the Potentate a check for \$1,300.00 to be given to the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children in Philadelphia.

OCTOBER 2, 1955: Accompanied by a group of the members of the order, a check for \$600.00 was given to the Delaware Day School for Handicapped Children, also a check for the like amount, \$600.00, to the Kutner School. This presentation was made at the Kutner School Building with a large delegation of parents and officers from the Delaware Day School, and the members of the Board of Directors of the Kutner School.

On December 15 the Worthy Grand Matron and I paid a visit to the Kutner School and delivered 6 dolls and doll coaches, and received a letter of appreciation from the members of the Board.

ON DECEMBER 15 the Worthy Grand Patron attended a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Delaware Day School held in Seaford for the purpose of starting a school for retarded children in the town of Seaford, and pledged them a check for \$75.00. The school has since started and the enrollment increased from 5 pupils to 14, and the check was used for educational equipment. A check for \$50.00 was also given to the March of Dimes.

April 23, 1956: The Grand Secretary sent a check for \$100.00 to be used for educational equipment for a branch of the Delaware Day School to be started in Dover in September 1956, and so with the proceeds from our Carnival we may say:

"Others? Yes, Lord, others. Let this our motto be: Help us to live for others, That we may live for Thee."

IN APPRECIATION. I wish to extend the appreciation of the Worthy Grand Matron, the Worthy Grand Patron and the Committee to the Melody Makers, under the direction of Mrs. Jolly, for furnishing the entertainment and music for dancing, without charge; to our P. G. Patron, Brother I. Kendall Gibbs, for his effort in the donation of 24 100-lb. bags of potatoes given by Mason Brothers in Hallwood, Maryland; to Mr. Cohen of the Story Printing Company, for the printing of the tickets and posters; to the members of the Delaware Shrine Club for the use of the Clubhouse; and to Justis Brothers for the use of the electric refrigerator.

Friends are like keepsakes, Growing more dear, More precious, more cherished, Year after year.

This is the way I feel about my committee, and those who helped to make our Summer Benefit a success. Without them I could have done nothing. I couldn't begin to mention the names of all, and so may I take this privilege to say, "Thank you," to all of you lovely people and I shall always be grateful to you.

Again this year as in 1954 we had food left over, and this consisted of potatoes and rolls. These were given to the Layton Home for the Aged Colored, Children's Home, Masonic Home, and The Little Sisters of the Poor, and the letters of thanks from these organizations are my prized possessions.

An abstract covering the membership, etc., of the Grand Jurisdiction of Delaware for the last three years was prepared and mailed to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Mamie Lander.

An order was placed for the Jewels to be given to the outgoing Worthy Grand Matron and Patron in 1956.

Due cards for all subordinate chapters were ordered.

400 Copies of Proceedings were compiled and mailed to all entitled to receive them. Proceedings received from Sister Grand Jurisdictions mailed to each Grand Representative and one copy given to Fraternal Correspondent.

Requests for Commissions and Certificates for 17 Representatives of Delaware in other Grand Jurisdictions were prepared for Worthy Grand Matron's signature and mailed with a letter to the Grand Secretary requesting them. Also sent Delaware Badge.

When the Grand Chapter elected me Grand Lecturer last May I was aware of my great responsibility. I entered my duties with a prayer in my heart for Divine guidance, health and wisdom, and thanked my Heavenly Father for His protection and care in the past year.

FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT'S REPORT

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star:

Like Ruth of old, gathering here a little and there a little, we, your Fraternal Correspondents, have completed a most enjoyable journey via the Proceedings of other Grand Jurisdictions. We find that the Order of the Eastern Star is basically the same the world over.

It is difficult to visualize the beautiful settings, pageantry, and Ceremonies: but the common tie which binds us in Christian Love is evident in all parts of the country. The Open Holy Bible, the source of all Wisdom and Strength, rests upon every Altar as a testimony of our belief in Him Whose Star we follow. All meetings open and close with a Prayer. Divine Services precede many Grand Chapter Sessions. An hour of Remembrance for those who have departed from us is observed in Solemn Ceremonies. Welcomes are extended by mayors, governors, and other officials in almost every Grand Jurisdiction.

Our flag is always our most honored guest; it is presented with proper ceremony and tribute, often followed by the State, Christian, and Eastern Star flags. In states bordering Canada, our two flags share honors, symbolic of the friendship and good will existing between our two nations. An International Peace Garden of approximately 2200 acres is located in Manitoba, Canada, and North Dakota. Upon a bronze plaque are inscribed these words—"To God in His Glory, we two nations dedicate this Garden and Pledge ourselves as long as man shall live, we shall never take up arms against each other."

It is with justifiable pride that we point to the fact that from an humble beginning in 1850, our Order has grown into the largest Fraternal Organization in the world with membership open to both men and women. The Order is composed of four governing bodies: The General Grand Chapter, The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, and the Independent Grand Chapters of New York, and New Jersey.

The General Grand Chapter was organized in Indianapolis, Indiana, in 1876, meets triennially, and has jurisdiction over 56 Grand Chapters and Subordinate Chapters in Alaska, Yukon Territory, Hawaii, China, Japan, Phillipine Islands, Guam, Okinawa, Mexico, The Canal Zone, Cuba, Bermuda, and West Germany. The Ritual is translated into Spanish, Chinese, Italian, and German. The Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland was organized in 1904, meets semi-annually for one day only, and has jurisdiction over Australia, and Chapters in England, Ireland, New Zealand, India, and South Africa. The Independent Grand Chapter of New York was organized in 1869, and uses the McCoy Ritual, which admits to membership the Grand Daughters and Nieces of Master Masons. The Independent Grand Chapter of New Jersey was organized in 1870. They use a Ritual formulated by themselves.

Our benevolent work is unsurpassed. Every Grand Jurisdiction is most generous in its response to charitable work, such as Cancer Research and Dressings Stations, Shriners' Hospitals for Crippled Children, Veterans' Hospitals, Maintenance of Homes, Hospitals, Blood Banks, Overseas Relief, and Youth Education. The Order of the Eastern Star recognizes the urgency of constructive Youth Guidance, and nearly all Grand Chapters sponsor youth organizations. 45 states sponsor Rainbow for girls, which is one of the largest youth organizations in the world; 29 sponsor Job's Daughters, and 19 have both. New York has "The Daughters of the Eastern Star", and Florida—"The Beautitudes". These organizations are helping to shape the lives of over 50,000 girls.

Our International Eastern Star Temple in Washington, D. C. is a pride of all members of the Order. It is the headquarters for the General Grand Chapter. Since our Order is international no flag flies over this beautiful building; but a large electric star in a pentagon surrounded by a circle sends forth its shining message of Charity, Truth, and Loving Kindness towards all.

I would like to include a few items, which we feel might be of interest to our members:

In Alberta, Canada, a mother, daughter and aunt were initiated together; grandmother is also a member, making three generations. Conductress and Associate Conductress conducted their daughters, and a mother her son through the Ceremony of Initiation.

One Chapter in British Columbia, Canada, has a hand hooked labyrinth carpet made by the members.

Louisiana has one Chapter, which meets only on Sundays.

Minnesota: The Grand Officers conferred degrees in thirty-five Chapters.

Montana: A piece of furniture was placed in International Temple in Washington, D. C. in honor of Sister Anna Smalley, Past Grand Matron of Montana, and Past Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Only one Chapter in West Virginia meets on Wednesday, and that is the Wednesday after the full moon.

Nebraska: One hundred and two Certificates and Pins were presented to fifty-year members. Grand Organist and Grand Marshal were Brothers.

Pennsylvania maintains two Eastern Star Homes, and is the home state of our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Florence Plummer.

In Alabama the Subordinate Chapters are graded on work at their own request.

The Grand Secretary of Colorado has served 24 years, and was given a Gift of Love (\$1,000.00) as a token of appreciation.

The Grand Session of Connecticut was addressed by the Secretary of State who was a sister and a member of the Worthy Grand Patron's home Chapter.

Florida furnished 33 rooms in the Masonic Home. More visitors than members attended the Grand Chapter Session.

An Associate Conductress in Idaho drives over 100 miles to attend meetings.

At the Supreme Grand Chapter of Scotland, a Brother was presented a gift in appreciation for serving one Chapter as Worthy Patron for 25 years.

Thank you, Sister Sara, and Sister Mildred, for your splendid reports: also thanks to Sister Elizabeth Fisher, our Grand Secretary, for your effort in forwarding the Proceedings to us so promptly. Worthy Grand Matron, we thank you for this opportunity of serving as Fraternal Correspondents for this year.

REPORT OF V.A. HOSPITAL REHABILITATION

May 12, 1956

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, and Members of the Order of Eastern Star in Delaware:

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

Once again, it is our pleasure to report to you of our activities in our Veterans Administration Hospital in Elsmere, Wilmington, Delaware.

It was a pleasure to work with Brother George Ostendarp as cochairman for the short time he was able to serve, and we were sorry he had to resign due to other commitments. Thank you, Brother George for your loyalty.

In December, Brother John Conley was appointed as co-chairman and your chairman is most happy for his appointment. Brother "Jack" is

on hand at most of the meetings and has been so helpful at other times, having been of great service in the entertainment of our "7-W" patients at the party given by Frankford Chapter on April 24th. He also presented a number of pieces of "beaver" board to Occupational Therapy to be used by patients who need the board in their drawings, and has offered his services in many other ways. Thank you, Brother Jack.

Worthy Matron Sister Vera Ellis and Brother Joe Ellis also helped with Frankford Chapter No. 12 V.A. party.

On May 26, 1955, your chairman received a "500" hour certificate which made, at that time, over 1500 hours of volunteer service to our Veterans Administration Hospital. She was also on the Refreshment Program at that time.

The first annual banquet of the V.A.V.S. (Veterans Administration Volunteer Service) was held on June 2, 1955, at the Wanamaker Store, at which time your chairman was the ticket chairman and also a hostess.

On July 19th, Radiant Chapter No. 6 held a party on "6-E", a T.B. ward, and served ice cream, homemade cake, and candy. Bingo was played, as it is permitted in Veterans Administration Hospitals since no money is involved, and lovely prizes were provided. A "Little Brown Jug", filled with after-shave lotion, was given to each patient as a gift. The boys enjoyed the sociability as much as the prizes and refreshments.

The monthly "Refreshment Program" which we had served on the third Sunday of each month from November, 1946, was discontinued due to longer visiting hours, so, with the permission of the Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Ruth Laws, and the Worthy Grand Patron, Brother Norris, a letter was sent to each Chapter asking them to take a party to "6-E", "7-E" and "7-W", or "8", as these wards are T.B. and M.P. wards. A wonderful response was received and, to date, three parties have been given with others to serve in the future. This project is greatly appreciated by patients and staff.

The Worthy Grand Patron asked each Chapter to contribute the contents of the cheer cup to purchasing hobby materials to be used by long-term patients and, at the Grand Visit to each Chapter, this was done. I have listed each contribution and the total amount on a separate sheet. Supplies were purchased at a discount, given to Miss Mary Cornelius (a member of our Order in Pennsylvania) who is the Recreation Director of our Veterans Administration Hospital, and letters of appreciation have been received from Dr. W. Major Gasper, manager of the hospital. Copies of these letters have been sent to chapter chairmen. Brother and Sister Schultheiss of Newark Chapter No. 10 donated 132 pieces of green-ware (ceramics) to the Occupational Therapy service of the hospital, and many other items were presented by other members too numerous to mention.

Your chairman attended a three-way veterans hospital volunteer conference in Baltimore, Maryland, on February 21st. Speakers from the Central Office in Washington, D. C., explained several phases of the work

for volunteers. Mr. J. J. Crowe, Chief of Special Services at our V.A. Hospital, drove our group to the conference.

On April 16th, your chairman had the pleasure of receiving her second 1000 hour certificate, making a total of over 2000 hours of volunteer service, and, also, was greatly honored by being voted the alternate "Outstanding Volunteer" of our V. A. Hospital in Elsmere. The program was in conjunction with 172 other Veterans Administration Hospitals in our nation. Sister Helen M. Welsh also received another 100 hour certificate and, to Sister Helen, I offer my sincerest appreciation for her continued assistance.

We, your chairman and Sister Helen, served as pages for the New Castle County Medical Association conference on April 17th, this being the seventh year that we have served.

Your chairman serves one day each week as a "Welcoming Volunteer" to new patients, and Sister Helen serves two days a month in another capacity.

Hospital Day was observed at the Veterans Hospital on Friday, May 11th, and your chairman was on the committee again, acting as treasurer for the "Hospital Day Booklet" and again making 200 rosebud boutonnieres for the women guests on that day. Sister Welsh was on hand helping in an efficient manner.

The second annual banquet of the V.A.V.S. is to be held on June 7th at the Kent Manor Inn with our Governor and many other State and local officials planning to be present. Again, your chairman is ticket chairman for this affair.

We are so thankful to the officers and members of our Subordinate Chapters for their wonderful cooperation in making this year another one of satisfactory service in our hospital. As before, letters of "Thanks" have been received from the hospital manager, Dr. W. Major Gasper, and copies sent to each Chapter.

Copies of monthly minutes and all other items of important news and invitations were sent to the Worthy Grand Matron.


