IRREGULARITIES

- 1 Secretaries not notifying the Worthy Grand Matron and the Grand Secretary when a special meeting is called.
- 2 Worthy Matrons asking for additions and corrections to minutes. Nothing can be added or rewritten after having been read. Only corrections are asked for.
- 3 Chaplain giving a sign before prayer at the Altar.
- 4 Improper opening of door while chapter is in session.
- 5 Failure to respect the East and the Labyrinth while the Bible is open.
- 6 Sentinel entering the chapter room without an invitation from the presiding officer.
- 7 Members entering the chapter room while it is in session without giving proper sign.
- 8 Members entering the chapter room during balloting.
- 9 Secretaries still making checks for special dispensations payable to the Worthy Grand Matron instead of the Grand Chapter and not using proper form for such dispensations.
- 10 Several prompting in the chapter room. This is the responsibility of the Deputy Grand Lecturer.
- 11 Affirmative vote asked for by the presiding officer, the negative vote omitted, this is as necessary as the affirmative vote.

DECISIONS

- 1 Since New Castle County is now an open jurisdiction and the chapters within this jurisdiction would have no way of knowing if they were accepting a petition that had been rejected by another chapter, a letter bearing my signature and the seal of my office was sent to each chapter in said county stating that a rejected petition in any chapter in New Castle County should be reported to the Secretary of each chapter in that county and be kept on file for the duration of one year, the name of the rejected petitioner and name of the chapter not to be revealed by the Secretary.
- A Worthy Matron serving her chapter for an additional year, if there is no one to fill this station, will serve it with all the privileges and prerogatives of a Worthy Matron but with the status of a Past Matron and is eligible for her jewel at the expiration of her first year. I based this decision on the approved decision of the Most Worthy Grand Matron in the 1964 Proceedings of the General Grand Chapter.
- I received a telephone call from a rejected petitioner of a chapter. She informed me that she knew who was on her petition for investigation and when she was to be balloted upon. She was very bitter and told me of the letters that she intended to write. After listening to her story, I explained that if she ever intended to place her petition in any chapter at a later date, I would advise her to be very quiet about this and at the end of six months or a year, to present her petition again.

I talked with the Worthy Matron and the Worthy Patron of this chapter pointing out the seriousness of this and asked the Worthy Patron to read that portion of our Obligation regarding the maintaining of silence when in the presence of those who are not members of our Order. This was done at their next meeting. Our ballot is secret. No one should reveal the names of the investigating committee and no one should disclose when a ballot is to be acted upon. The Secretary is the only one to notify the petitioner of the result of the ballot. As a secret organization, our strength lies in our ability to keep our own council and maintain our silence with regard to chapter affairs.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

QUESTION: May our Chapter vote to dispense with a meeting if it

falls on a holiday or the eve of one?

ANSWER:

All stated meetings falling on holidays are legal. Such meetings can be omitted only if so provided in your bylaws. The Worthy Matron takes a solemn obligation to see that all stated meetings are held. A stated meeting cannot be cancelled legally.

QUESTION: If a ballot is started, is not clear in the West, declared irregular and after a second ballot is still not clear, can it be tabled before it is declared in the East?

Answer: A ballot once commenced must be continuous without postponement or debate and when completed must be announced. (By-Laws G.G.Chap. p. 52 sect. 32)

QUESTION: If a ballot is taken and is not clear in the West and is declared irregular, how many times can the same ballot be declared irregular by the same person?

Answer: According to our guide book p. 13, it is the prerogative of any member to request a re-spread of the ballot in case a mistake has been made in casting a ballot or any irregularity is noted in the conduct of the ballot, provided the request is made before the result is declared by the Worthy Matron. This does not give a single person the privilege of repeatedly declaring an irregularity unless this irregularity is declared, just because the ballot is not clear. One objection should be sufficient.

QUESTION: Can a Worthy Matron exclude a member of her Chapter because it is believed such member is using the black ball because of spite?

Answer: The Worthy Matron is not invested with such power. The right to ballot is given to all members according to our Ritual. The only control of the misuse of the ballot is in the heart of each member. The unjustifiable use of the black ball does disrupt the peace and harmony of a chapter but this too is a matter of conscience. Landmark #7 might be quoted; at any time there is a discussion on a ballot or one's intention to use a black ball, charges could be preferred and the member expelled or suspended, after having been tried and found legally guilty.

QUESTION: Must a Trustee of a chapter resign to hold an elective office in a subordinate chapter?

Answer: According to approved decisions of our Grand Chapter, this question was answered in our 1956 and 1960 Proceedings; "since the Trustee does not fill a station and is not installed, I cannot find anything stating that an elected or appointed officer cannot hold the office of Trustee."

However, I feel that a Trustee must not hold the office of either Secretary or Treasurer. It does not seem legal to me for one to audit his own books.

QUESTION: Are summer months counted in carrying a petition, that has been rejected, over for six months?

Answer: Chapters are not in session during the summer months in this jurisdiction, so I would say that they are not counted, the same would apply to undraping of Charter or Altar.

QUESTION: Can a petition for affiliation and one for initiation into the Order be combined in the same collective ballot?

A petition for affiliation and one for conferring of degrees cannot be combined in the same collective ballot. (Rules ANSWER: and Regulations of G. G. Chapter p. 52)

QUESTION: What should be done with ballots after an election is held?

They are destroyed by the Secretary.

QUESTION: If a candidate is elected on a second ballot, should the secretary read the result of the first ballot when reading the minutes at the next meeting?

No. The final result is the only one read. (Approved ANSWER: decision 1931)

QUESTION: If the Gov. of our State has declared our State to be in emergency due to a storm, can you grant us the power to cancel our meeting during this emergency?

That power has not been given me, but we are protected ANSWER: by the law which states that unless a quorum is present a meeting shall not be held. Having this law, I do feel that Officers and members should use due caution in traveling during such storm.

QUESTION: Is there any law or reason why a retiring Matron could not have a ring instead of a jewel?

This, I feel is chapter business and not Grand Chapter. ANSWER: You would have to go back in your minutes and find the decision on this, probably in the early years of your chapter.

QUESTION: May a Past Matron of another jurisdiction become a member of our Past Matrons and Past Patrons Association if she is the wife of one of our own Past Patrons?

ANSWER: This is not a question for me to answer, take this to the meeting of the Past Matrons and Past Patrons Assocaition.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1 In five more years, we will be holding our 50th annual session of this Grand Chapter. I therefore recommend that the sum of \$100 per year be put aside or earmarked for this purpose, so that the Chairman of that year's session, with her allotment, will have sufficient money to purchase suitable mementos for the occasion.
- 2 That the incoming Worthy Grand Matron appoint a committee to revise our guide book to conform with that of the General Grand Chapter.
- 3 That a change be made in the placement of introduction of Grand Representatives in Grand Chapter and in the subordinate chapters, placing them right after our Deputy Grand Lecturers.

These are Grand Chapter appointments the same as our Grand Officers and Deputies and should be so recognized. If Grand Representatives of other Jurisdictions to other Jurisdictions are present, they should be introduced and recognized in Grand Chapter.

- 4 That members of our subordinate chapters who attain 50 years of continuous membership in the Order of the Eastern Star within the calendar year, be recognized during Grand Chapter Session.
- 5 That the Worthy Patron or Associate Patron be permitted to allow the Conductress and Associate Conductress or a member studying for a Proficiency test, the use of the pink sheet for a period of one week (7 days). She shall be responsible for same while it is in her possession.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

During my visits to the subordinate chapters, I have had the opportunity to make many observations and to view the officers and their work from many angles. I am pleased to report a spirit of good will existing in these chapters. Sometimes differences arise over small and insignificant things. Let us, as true Eastern Stars, rise above petty things and work together for the good of our Order.

The practise of keeping appointed officers in the same station year after year is detrimental to any chapter and I suggest that changes be made often to maintain new interest.

Although we do have a small gain in membership as a whole this year, many of our chapters have a loss. This is happening all over the country in the face of a population explosion. We need to take a good accounting of ourselves and find if we are making our meetings attractive enough to keep our interest high. Our success depends on keeping our old members active as well as adding new ones.

I have tried to emphasize the importance of being True to our Obligation and Living it; to create a spirit of friendship and harmony; to keep chapter business within the chapter room and not to criticize the work of another unless you are prepared to offer something better. Constructive criticism is helpful, but fault finding only does harm.

THE BALLOT

We, as members of the Order of the Eastern Star, are given a sacred privilege in the ballot. It should be exercised with thought and prayer for it is our Fraternity's gracious shield and as such should be used to guard our membership against undesirables. It is not a weapon with which to even an old score, nor is it a secret shelter for those who seek to avenge a fancied slight or wrong. Our balloting is beautiful

and impressive and at no time should its beauty be marred or its privileges abused.

Each petition is recommended by two members whose interest in our chapter is as great as ours. Every petitioner is related by the same ties to a Master Mason as we are; every man who petitions is a Master Mason in good standing.

The discussion of the ballot within and without the chapter room is doing as much, or more harm as the unjust use of the black cube. We need a better understanding of our Obligation. The all-seeing eye is the one who knows our every thought and it is He who in the final accounting will judge us by the cleanness of our hearts and not by the fulness.

APPRECIATION

You have paved a road of happiness Of friendship most sincere, And in my Rainbow of sweet memories 'Twill live year after year.

The road from yesterday to today has been a short one, but it has also been a happy and inspiring one. I trust that for each mistake that I have made, you will be able to find forgiveness in your hearts. May the good that has been accomplished serve as a stepping stone for the future.

I close this report with the scripture that has been my Prayer throughout my term of office; "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditations of my heart be acceptable in Thy sight, O Lord, my Strength and my Redeemer".

As in springtime, through his will, it may blossom forth in beauty Beauty in trees, and grass, and flowers, so can this world become the beautiful place of harmony, of love, and good will among men, of peace, and of peace among nations, only as his will is done in the heart of Christian people throughout the world.

"Give us this day our daily bread" (yellow candle is lighted) "Yellow stands for the golden grain from which our bread is made. This is a prayer for physical needs to sustain the body. The present home of the soul. God wants to feed the world and give the bread of life—the spiritual nourishment that we need. Can we as little children say 'by his hand we are fed: Give us our daily bread'.

"Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." (silver candle is lighted) "Silver is the color of the coin with which we pay our debts. This is one of the hardest parts of the prayer for most of us at times. How often we need to say-forgive me for my lack of faith, forgive me that I did not trust thee; forgive me that I worried instead of praying -that I had fears instead of confidence-as I forgive.

"Lead us not into temptation" (red candle is lighted) "Red stands for sin-the results of temptation to which we have yielded. resist temptation, we are stronger, and more useful. If God leads us, we can be victorious."

"But deliver us from evil" (black candle is lighted) "Black candle represents the dark and the evil from which we pray to be delivered. Wrong thoughts are seeds from which evil grows. Good thoughts bear good fruit in our lives. So let us think on the things that are pure, lovely, gracious, and worthy of praise."

"For thine is the Kingdom and the Power" (white candle is lighted)
"White represents the great white throne, the seat of God's power.
When all other Kingdoms have failed, this one will remain.

"And the glory forever" (orange candle is lighted) "Orange is the dominate color of a beautiful sunset, and the most glorious sunset is but a faint reflection of the glory of God our father. These things are his handiwork. The last phrase is like a great doxology sung at the close of a prayer like a great organ sounding amen. No prayer is so full of divine radiance as the Lord's prayer. It can be said in less than a minute, and yet it contains within itself every petition that we can ask him, and we can spend hours in prayer without exhausting it. The Lord's prayer is like the chimes of a great Cathedral, calling the world to prayer—Let us heed that call.

Before presenting the Estarl awards perhaps we should briefly explain the meaning of the word Estarl and the significance of this project. The word Estarl literally means Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leadership which simply stated consists of scholarships for students who are preparing themselves in the various fields of religious service, chiefly the ministry. This project was started in October 1952 by the General Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star which is the National governing body of this organization. During which is the National governing body of this organization. During the past 9 years approximately \$2,700,000 has been given by the Eastern Star for religious scholarships. Locally the Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star for Delaware started this project in 1958 and in the past 8 years have awarded 43 scholarships in the

amount of \$13,000. In 1965 seven awards were made for the scholastic year of 1965-66, two of those who received the awards last year will receive their degree in Theology this June. All of the other young men are in college or seminary and are preparing themselves as ministers, are in college or seminary and are preparing themselves as ministers.

All of these scholarships have been financed mostly by funds from the individual chapters. This committee does not have any particular drive for funds, we simply ask each chapter for a generous contribution toward this project. We are pleased to announce that total amount given this year for Estarl amounts to \$3,177.96 which included memorials as well as gifts from twenty individual chapters. This is the largest amount which has ever been raised in one year for this project.

This committee has approved three scholarship awards for the year 1966-67 and we expect to have more applicants before the fall term. We are pleased that two who have received awards last year are present with us this evening to receive their awards for next year. The first award is to Garry Otis Parker a student at Asbury Theological Seminary who is studying for the Methodist ministry. In absentia it is a pleasure to give this award to Mrs. Reynolds the Worthy Matron of Julia M. Story Chapter #3 who sponsored this student. This is his sixth scholarship award.

The second award is for Robert Wall, Jr. a student at Western Maryland College in Westminister, Md. who is preparing himself for the Methodist Ministry. Robert it is a pleasure to have you with us this evening to receive your third scholarship award.

The third award is for Henry Snedeker, Jr. a student at Princeton Theological Seminary who is preparing himself for the Presbyterian Ministry. Henry it is good of you to be with us this evening to receive your award and assist in this informal opening.

THE CHRISTIAN FLAG

Little is known of the origin of this truly beautiful and signif-

icant flag, yet its sacred meaning has been implanted in the hearts of both young and old. It is an international one used by christian churches everywhere, with sincere love of God, country and fellowmen; we reverently salute this glorious symbol of His promise to all mankind.

DELAWARE STATE FLAG

The State Flag of Delaware was adopted July 24, 1913. In accordance with the design authorized at that time the State Flag has a background of colonial blue, surrounding a diamond of buff color in which is placed the coat of arms of the State of Delaware. Below the diamond are the words, "December 7, 1787", indicating the day on which Delaware was the first State to ratify the Federal Constitution. Because of this action Delaware became the first state in the Union and is therefore accorded the first position in many national events.

We are in fraternal relationship and very friendly. Thank you Sister May for being so prompt in giving us the Proceedings as they were received in your office.

The flag of each country always has an honored place in the Grand Chapter sessions and in Canada the Union Jack shares equal honors with our Star Spangled Banner in many Grand Chapters.

We have approximately three million members and about 15,000 Chapters. It is said that the sun never sets on the Order of the Eastern Star.

As in our own Grand Jurisdiction many Worthy Grand Matrons have asked for monetary gifts at Official Visits in lieu of flowers for their Charity projects.

The International Peace Garden is the world's one and only garden dedicated to Peace. Located on the border of North Dakota and Manitoba it commemorates over one hundred years of peace between the United States and Canada. In the midst of the turmoil and destruction going on all over the world what a wonderful tribute that is. A stone tablet located near the entrance bears this Inscription:

To God in his Glory We Two Nations dedicate this Garden and pledge ourselves that as long as man shall live we will not take up Arms against one another.

Our Ritual is published in English, Spanish, Italian and German.

Michigan is the oldest Grand Chapter in the World, having been constituted in 1867, and Nova Scotia is the youngest, constituted in

1947. Three Chapters in Michigan have over 1,000 members each.

Iowa requires members to pass a proficiency examination before they can vote in the Chapter.

In Montana the Labyrinth Star Point rug used at Grand Chapter is hand crocheted and is the property of the Home Chapter of the Worthy Grand Matron. It was made by her Mother when she was Worthy Matron.

Kentucky had the distinction of having the granddaughter of Robert Morris as Grand Secretary for seventeen years.

Oklahoma Grand Chapter was formed in 1889 as Indian Territory. Grand Chapter of Oklahoma Territory in 1902 and the Grand Chapter of Oklahoma in 1909, thus being 75 years old.

Worthy Grand Matron, our "Flying Carpet Express" has come home and we have had a wonderful experience visiting our Sister Chapters. EASTERN STAR HOME FUND REPORT

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Distinguished Guests, Sisters and Brothers:

We your committee present the following report for your consideration: Page 100 of the 1949 proceedings in Sister Dora Fitzgerald's acceptance speech under the title of Projects we find "The question of whether we should have a special project this year is one of which our Worthy Grand Patron (Brother Kumple) and I have given a great deal of thought.

However, since we are organized for benevolent purposes, to protect the widows and orphans, to comfort the afflicted and to relieve the destitute, and the distressed.

Therefore we are having for our project, The Eastern Star Home Fund. I believe that in establishing this fund, it will become a perpetual fund of service.

I ask your support and I feel certain each contributing member will receive a satisfactory reward for their efforts. I am appointing a Project Committee; you will receive a letter soon giving you further information. I hope you will be generous in your contributions to this worthy project."

At the end of the Grand Chapter year as reported in the 1950 Proceedings, page 53, there were contributions from chapters #2, 3, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, 13, 14, 15, 16, individual contributions, and interest amounting to \$1,286.42. The 1951 Proceedings, page 75, the following chapters contributed: #2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17. The total contributions were \$648.00. Chapter #7 pledged to be paid by Dec. 31, and Newark #10 set up a fund to be turned over to the Eastern Star Home Fund when it became a reality.

The balance of Dec. 31, 1965 was \$4,691.19. Interest for year of 1965 through Jan. 4, 1966, \$187.64 making a total of \$4,878.83. This amount, plus the funds of the individual chapters set aside for this project, will give us a total larger than reported. The problem is we have no knowledge of what the various chapters' funds have grown to or if they carried out their pledge.

We the committee recommend that each chapter be contacted to find out if they have made such a pledge and if they did, what is in their special fund either in bonds or cash. In this way we can get a complete picture of the total amount that this fund has actually grown to. We recommend that the incoming committee do this and report back to the next Grand Chapter Session. At that time, with the full knowledge of the amount of the fund, the project be propelled to a more vigorous concentration of effort, or if fund is insufficient to warrant the continuance of same, it be declared by the Grand Chapter to be ended and the money of the contributing chapters be returned to same and the money contributed by individual donors be returned to same, unless they are deceased, and then their contribution to this fund be turned over to the Estarl Fund in their memory, and all interest accrued from this account in the Grand Chapter be turned over to the Estarl Fund also, to be credited to the following Grand Chapter Year as the Grand Chapter Books will already have been closed when this is acted upon.

REPORT OF THE ESTARL COMMITTEE

TO THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON, WORTHY GRAND PATRON, OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER OF THE DELAWARE ORDER OF THE EASTERN STAR.

One of the first duties of this committee was to approve a renewal scholarship for Nicolas Rosella, his fifth. He is a student at Belhaven Theological Seminary in Jackson, Mississippi.

A letter was sent to all subordinate chapters on August 27, 1965 advising them of an Estarl Religious Service to be held in Old Swedes Church on Sunday, October 3, 1966 and asking for their support. This service was held as planned and was conducted by Jack McKelvey a student of Virginia Theological Seminary who delivered the sermon and prayers, and assisted by Henry Snedeker, Jr. a student of Princeton Theological Seminary who read the Bible Lessons and assisted in the prayers. These two men, as you all know, had received Estarl Awards. A coffee hour in the Christina Community Center followed the service. All expenses for this service were covered by the offering and \$30.00 was left over for our Estarl Fund. The Estarl Committee met with our Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron and General Grand Chapter Committee member before this Church service. At this meeting it was decided to present the Estarl Awards at the informal opening, change the application so that a student would agree to return the scholarship if he left the field of religious education, and tentative plans for a meeting with the chairman of the subordinate Estarl Committee of each chapter.

A tea was held at Sister Nancy Morton's Home in Dover, Delaware on October 31, 1965, attended by the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, General Chapter Committee member, a few of the chairmen of the Estarl Committees of the subordinate chapters and members of the Grand Chapter Estarl Committee. There was a general discussion and questions were answered for the benefit of the Chairmen. Estarl leaflets were given to all present.

At the official visit to Delaware Chapter the Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Patron divided their "Pot of Gold" bouquet money in the amount of \$343.60 giving it to the General Chapter Committee member Sister Ruth Laws and the Chairman of the Estarl Committee.

On March 1, 1966 a letter was sent to all subordinate chapters reminding them of the Estarl Project.

On May 3, this committee recommended three scholarship awards in the amount of \$300. each. These awards were approved for Garry Parker, a member of Holly Oak Methodist Church and a student at Asbury Theological Seminary in Kentucky. A second award was also approved for Henry Snedeker, Jr. from St. Georges, a student at Princeton Theological Seminary who is studying for the Presbyterian Ministry. These are the only awards approved. However, we have inquiries concerning these scholarships and have given two applications. The committee gave these awards to full time students who are in good scholastic standing.

The total of all the contributions received by the Grand Secretary amounted to \$3,177.96 which is the largest amount ever given for this project. These contributions included many memorials.

At the informal opening on May 9th of this Grand Chapter the chairman of this committee had the pleasure of presenting Estarl awards to Robert Wall and Henry Snedeker, Jr., in the absense of Garry Parker, the other recipient, his award was presented to Sister Eleanor Reynolds the Worthy Matron of Julia M. Story Chapter #3. Henry Snedeker also gave the invocation and thanked the Grand Chapter in behalf of the students. Robert Wall pronounced the benediction.

In the 1958 proceedings on page 102 the only rule and regulation regarding Estarl reads as follows: "A scholarship award for Estarl shall be \$300, per student per year."

The committee recommends changing this rule to read "A scholarship award for Estarl shall be \$300, per student per year, however an annual award for \$400, may be given to a full time student in a theological seminary."

HOSPITAL REHABILITATION REPORT

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Members of the Order of the Eastern Star in Delaware:

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

This is the end of another year of service as chairman and cochairman of the Veterans Administration Rehabilitation Program. It is a great pleasure for us to serve on this committee. For the chairman this marks the completion of nineteen years as a volunteer and eighteen years as your chairman, and both of us are looking forward to serving again this year, if it be God's will.

Your chairman is very proud to have received a gold pin for having given over 5,000 hours of service to the hospital and your co-chairman will soon receive a pin for 2,500 hours. Both serve on Wednesday of each week from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and each Sunday at the chapel service from 8:00 to 11:00 a.m. Sister Lorraine is organist and your chairman helps Chaplain Paul R. Elliott as the need warrants. We have served on many committees for activities at the hospital and our services are greatly appreciated by the staff and patients.

Ours is a 52-week per year service unless illness keeps us at home. Sister Lorraine had to stay at home for 12 weeks due to a badly shattered bone in her right arm, and bruises, but she kept busy making lap robes for the hospital. She has made 59 since May of 1965 and Sister Viola Lummus has made 44. Both sisters are members of Five Points Chapter #13.

There were six parties taken to the patients this year: Five Points Chapter #13 to seventh floor-west; Radiant Chapter #6, one on October 11 and one February 14, both on seventh floor-west; Ruth Chapter #19, a party on seventh floor-west; and Naomi Chapter #20 took their party to the eighth floor due to the closing of the seventh floor. This party, as were the others, was a huge success. Caesar Rodney Chapter #8 has a party planned for June 13. Letters of thanks were received from Dr. Major W. Gasper, Hospital Director, and copies were sent to participating chapters.

Also, thanks are given to Frankford Chapter #12 for again sending 100 cards and stamps for the patients at Christmas time.

Over 2,000 hours of volunteer service were given to the hospital this past year by Eastern Star members, and books and men's clothing were also donated.

The need is great for financial help, as we serve on an average of fifty patients each week who are referred to us by the doctor in charge. The "Hobby Cart" gave 2,574 articles from the middle of April of 1965 to April 27, 1966, with twenty-five percent of these given by the Hospital. The Hospital furnishes us with our leather work. Through the generosity of some merchants, we were given discounts on purchases and, in some instances, articles were donated. The average retail cost of articles purchased was 60c, so you can dividual contributions, donations from three Masonic lodges, and aid of the merchants, we would not have been able to provide this service each week; so we beg of you again to please give more money.

We have given to, and visited with, many Master Masons and still have five or six on our list. Our Brother Conrad Lewis, Sr., Past Patron, is a patient on the eighth floor and is very ill.

The Grand Master, Arthur G. Craig, is very much impressed with our work and the Grand Chapter of Delaware is receiving all the credit for this "Hobby Cart" program.

This is truly a worthwhile project, a great help to those in need, and of great satisfaction to those who give and to those who serve. There are many Master Masons as patients, and most of the patients are crippled or handicapped husbands and fathers with families to support on small or no income while hospitalized; so if all of us increase our contributions we will receive God's blessing, the patients' thanks, and will know that we truly are "Our Brother's Keeper."

The carnival for the patients will be held in June of this year and, again, \$25.00 for our part is requested.

We do not wish to bore you with a long report; we do wish to plead for **your** project. This is a Grand Chapter project. Please support it.

Thanks to you all.

The Contingent Fund report is on a separate sheet and, as usual, there is no balance, as has been the case for several years. No supplies are on hand, as we have used all napkins and paper cups, all of which were rather old. The report of monies received is also submitted on a separate sheet.

The Grand Marshal proclaimed the 45th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, O. E. S., duly closed at midnight.






