



When election night (National or State) falls on our meeting, we shall hold our meeting the following night (Wednesday). Special meetings may be held at the discretion of the Worthy Matron by giving due notice to the members, for such purpose as may be specified in the notice.

### Change to read:

The stated meetings of this Chapter shall be held the first and third Thursdays of each month at 8:00 P.M., except the meet-

ings in July and August and the first meeting in January (if this falls on New Year's Night). Special meetings may be held at the discretion of the Worthy Matron by giving due notice to the members, for such purpose as may be specified in the notice.

April 20, 1971—I approved the proposed amendments to the By-Laws of KENT CHAPTER NO. 11

ARTICLE II-Eligibility, now reads:

Section 1. No person shall be admitted to membership in this Chapter by initiation or affiliation except affiliated Master Masons, their wives, daughters, mothers, widows, sisters, half-sisters and legally adopted daughters. All petitioners must have attained the age of eighteen (18) years.

Change to read:

Section 1. No persons shall be admitted to membership in this Chapter by initiation or affiliation except affiliated Master Masons in good standing; the wives, daughters, legally adopted daughters, mothers, widows, sisters, half-sisters, granddaughters, stepmothers, step-sisters of affiliated Master Masons in good standing, or if deceased, were affiliated Master Masons and in good standing at the time of their death. All petitioners must have attained the age of eighteen (18) years.

Add:

Section 2. Life membership may be granted in this Chapter after said member has belonged to this Chapter for forty-five (45) consecutive years. Courtesy life membership may be granted.

ARTICLE III -Petitions, Section 1, now reads:

Section 1. All petitions for membership shall be in writing, accompanied by the fee, signed by the Petitioner and recommended by two members of this Chapter, which petition shall be read at a regular meeting and referred to a committee of three for investigation, and laid over until the next regular meeting. Demit must accompany petition for affiliation.

Change to read:

Section 1. Same as stated above, plus—"Applicants for initiation shall have resided six months in the state and three months in the jurisdiction of the Chapter. Applicants for affiliation shall have resided three months in the state and may affiliate with any Chapter in the state."

ARTICLE III-Petitions, Section 2, now reads:

Section 2. A Committee of Investigation on petitions must consist of three members one of whom must be a brother, as he alone can vouch for the Masonic standing of the applicant.

### Change to read:

Section 2. A Committee of Investigation on petitions must consist of three members one of whom must be a brother, as he alone can vouch for the Masonic standing of the applicant, and must not have signed the petition.

ARTICLE IV-Officers, Section 4, now reads:

Section 4. All officers except Trustees must be installed on first regular meeting in January or as soon thereafter as practicable.

### Change to read:

Section 4. All officers except Trustees must be installed on first regular meeting in January or as soon thereafter as practicable. No member shall be installed in office who is more than one year in arrears for Chapter dues.

ARTICLE V-Powers and Duties of Officers, Section 2, now reads:

Section 2. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep a true and faithful record of the proceedings of the Chapter and make the annual report to the Grand Chapter. She shall keep strict account of all dues and fees between the Chapter and each member respectively, shall collect all moneys due the Chapter and pay over the same immediately to the Treasurer, taking her receipt therefor. She shall at the annual meeting in January report in writing all money received and paid to the Treasurer; she shall make out and sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer; and shall deliver to her successor in office all property belonging to the Chapter and perform such other duties as may pertain to her office.

### Change to read:

Section 2. Same as stated above, plus—"She shall forward the returns of the Chapter to the Grand Secretary on or before the fifteenth day of February of each year. Failure will forfeit the vote of such Chapter unless excused by a two-thirds vote of Grand Chapter."

ARTICLE V—Powers and Duties of Officers, Section 4, now reads:

Section 4. In recognition of their services to the Chapter, the following officers shall receive as compensation the amount of the annual dues of the Chapter. Secretary, Treasurer, Marshal, Organist and Sentinel. The Secretary shall also receive \$10.00 a year for her services.

### Change to read:

Section 4. In recognition of their services to the Chapter, the following officers shall receive as compensation the amount of the annual dues of the Chapter. Secretary, Treasurer, Marshal, Organist and Sentinel. The Secretary shall also receive \$60.00 a year for her services.

ARTICLE VIII-Fees and Dues, Section 3, now reads:

Section 3. Any member in arrears for one year's dues shall be notified by the Secretary, and if not paid within one year thereafter may be suspended by a two thirds vote of the Chapter. When all back dues have been paid or remitted, such member is restored to good standing without further action of the Chapter.

Change to read:

Section 3. Any member in arrears for one year's dues shall be notified by the Secretary, and if not paid within one year thereafter, may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the members present. Upon payment of dues accrued at the time of suspension and the current years dues, a member may petition a Chapter for reinstatement by majority vote.

ARTICLE IX-Committees, Section 1, now reads:

Section 1. Emergency Welfare Committee. There shall be an Emergency Welfare Committee composed of five members of the Chapter who shall serve a term of five years, one to be appointed each year by the Worthy Matron-elect. The duty of this committee shall be to investigate all cases among the Chapter membership where dire need is known to exist and report the circumstances to the Worthy Matron. This committee with the consent of the Worthy Matron shall be authorized to draw upon the Emergency Welfare Fund to meet such pressing needs of any member. A fund of \$200.00 known as the "Emergency Welfare Fund" shall be set aside for the use of the committee to be taken from the Treasury and replenished from same. The expenditure of any money from this fund shall be made only after a written statement of the case signed by the Chairman and two members of the committee, and by the Worthy Matron.

Since the Section has never been used, we would like to delete it from our By-Laws and the Fund should be added to our Savings Account.

ARTICLE X, Section 1, now reads:

Section 1. No alterations or amendments to these By-Laws shall be made unless the same shall be proposed in writing at a regular meeting when it shall be entered on the minutes, lay over until the next regular meeting when, if two-thirds of the members present vote in the affirmative the amendment shall be adopted.

Change to read:

Section 1. Chapter members must be notified in writing ten (10) days in advance when contemplating a change in By Laws. When a chapter amends its By-Laws, copies of said amendments shall be sent in threes to the Grand Secretary's office; one for the book held by the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, one for the Worthy Grand Matron's book, and one for the Grand Secretary, and these books will then be kept up-to-date.

### **FEBRUARY 23, 1971**

To the Worthy Matron, Worthy Patron, Officers and Members of the Subordinate Chapters of Delaware, O.E.S.

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

The following are excerpts from a letter I received from the Most Worthy Grand Matron. Please note and comply as much as possible.

"You are aware that General Grand Chapter has two projects, voted and passed by the Delegates, which are law. These are the 'Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leadership', or ESTARL, and our beautiful Temple in Washington, D.C.

"ESTARL is, has been, and always shall be, an especial project with me. As the first Chairman of this inspired program, I have watched its growth, knowing full well that it owes its marvelous acceptance to Divine Guidance. A word of caution in the selection of the Theological Schools to which our Trainees are sent. Many professors in colleges are instrumental in causing young people under their instruction to deviate from their chosen fields. I personally have known two fine, young ministers who gave up the ministry, to enter other fields because of doubts planted in their receptive minds by their Instructors.

"Our International Eastern Star Temple in Washington, D.C. is the Priceless Gem of our Order. Those who have gone before us have cherished, and loved this building, and its authentic period, contents of architectural perfection, and wondrous beauty. It remains for us to see that it continues to be nurtured with care, its upkeep and repair assured, while it serves as the Lodestone of our Order. Here, too, are housed the business offices of our vast Fraternal Enterprise. If the 'One Dollar Once in a Lifetime' gift was added, always, to the Initiation Fee, this perpetuation would be confirmed.

"The 'Ella Maude Lander Brady Cancer Research and Education Project' is the name by which we have chosen to call the Cancer Program for our Triennium. In the past we have given generously to Cancer. Since all will benefit equally from the chain of effort instigated by the amount raised, we are asking that all money for this project be sent directly to our Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Mamie Lander. It is in her daughter's name that the Project is entitled. Ella Maude Lander Brady died last year at the age of 43 after suffering for two years from Cancer. Each Chapter under General Grand Chapter, or a Grand Chapter, will be credited with the amount they raised. It is our hope to be able to present to our Delegates, Members and Visitors at the 'Foundation of the World Assembly' in Denver, Colorado, November 3rd - 10th, 1973, the total amount of money which has been sent to the American Cancer Society during this Triennium. The Cancer Research and Education will thus be made available to the world at large.

"Being aware of the needs of our Youth Groups—Jobs Daughters, Rainbow Girls, and the Order of De Molay, the 'Wonderful Youth' Committee has been appointed. We want you to keep tab of the number of times you invite one of these groups into your Chapter Rooms. How many programs are given for them, such as 'Masonic Heritage Nights', or 'ESTARL', or 'Patriotic' themes. How many times you drive or take groups of young people to other visitations. How many Guardians, or Leaders served them? What number of times were groups driven to games, to ballets, to operas, or other cultural events. We want the final tabulation to be impressive so that we shall know that our Youth Groups have benefited from our personal involvement. This is not a money raising scheme. It is primarily, one of helpfulness.

"This next is definitely a matter of delicate concern. I bring it to the attention of our entire membership because we want, in all things, to improve our image with the General Public. Since I first saw an article in the paper concerning this, it has been reported to me to have been observed in the press in many parts of the country. Please bear with me. I have no ulterior motive. My only desire is to follow correct procedure, and to gain public esteem for our Order.

"In all forms of public correspondence, in our Programs, listing of officers, our Proceedings, Year Books, Menus, etc., we have for years been using the title 'Mrs.' with a sister's 'given name', such as 'Mrs. Mary Jones' or 'Mrs. Susan Call'. This is not correct. The title 'Mrs.' was presented to you at the time of your marriage by your husband. It is used only with his name, such as 'Mrs. Tom Jones' or 'Mary Jones, (Mrs. Tom)'. Even if your husband passes away, or has passed away, you should use this title 'Mrs.' with his name until you re-marry and then it will be used with the new husband's name.

"Members of the Order, who have served for many years in high office, whose names are well known, may use their given names, such as 'Mary Jones, Secretary' or, 'Mary Jones, (Mrs. Tom), Secretary', but never 'Mrs. Mary Jones, Secretary'.

"May this be received in the same spirit in which it is offered. We shall be thrilled with those who quickly adopt this correction, as well as those who accept after due deliberation."

As the above quotes are the words of our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mae E. Mickelson, I feel they are worthy of your careful consideration. They are to be observed for the next three years until our next Triennium in Denver, Colorado, in 1973. Please make reference to them whenever a question on these subjects comes up.

Dear Sisters and Brothers:

Greeting you is necessitated by a letter which has come to my desk, respecting business which gravely affects the welfare of our Order.

The letter was sent to the Members of the Grand Chapter of New Jersey, under its Seal, and ordered by the Most Worthy Grand Matron of New Jersey, Sister Peggy Wilkinson. It describes the fact that "an Emergent Session of the Grand Chapter of New Jersey is to be held to Institute Alpha Chapter (Essex County) on Monday evening, March 8, 1971, at 7:30 P.M., at the Elizabeth Masonic Temple, 668 North Broad Street, Elizabeth, New Jersey.

This is in direct violation of the Laws of our General Grand Chapter as stated in the Book of Decisions, voted in the affirmative by the Delegates, and on our Books many years. I refer you to Page 15, paragraph 1-2, also 1952 Proceedings page 70, the recommendation number 1 of the Most Worthy Grand Matron.

In order that you may comprehend more fully, a bit of history concerning the sponsoring Masonic Lodge, should be explained. It is a Lodge which has been in existence since the times of George Washington, and was then composed of slaves, so we are told.

Alpha Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, will be directly under the Grand Chapter of New Jersey at the direction of the Most Worshipful Grand Master of A.F. and A.M. Masons of New Jersey.

The Members of Alpha Chapter of the New Jersey Grand Chapter will only be allowed to visit the Chapters in New Jersey, and New York, which are independent Grand Chapters from General Grand Chapter. They do not use our Ritual, or rather, ours has been greatly changed to suit the whims of the New Jersey Grand Chapter, especially. No Grand Chapter or Subordinate Chapter under the Jurisdiction of General Grand Chapter in the World, may receive these members as visitors, at this time, nor may our members visit this Chapter, Alpha Chapter.

It is requested that the Worthy Grand Matron notify the membership within her jurisdiction of the information contained in this letter.

I would call your attention to the fact that there are many clandestine Chapters. Even in Washington, D.C., where there are four of these Grand Chapters, with their individual corps of Officers and Members, no visiting between these clandestine chapters is allowed.

We must not allow this calculated blow against our Order to have the desired effect. We are not a Political Body. We are a Fraternal Order, each respecting the feelings of our Sisters and Brothers whose hands we have clasped around our Holy Altar. Nothing, absolutely nothing, should be brought into our Chapter Rooms which would tear asunder the Fraternal Bond!

Please re-read the promises I made to the General Grand Chapter then in Assembly, on the night of October 22, 1970 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. They are found on page 103 of the Ritual. On these (Like Martin Luther) I stand!

- 3. Minutes not being read at all. This is an order of business and must be taken care of at the next meeting after the motion is made not to read them on a special night.
- 4. A person not a member of the Chapter interfering with the business of the Chapter.
- 5. Trustees not signing the Annual Report.
- Members appointed to Grand Chapter Committees not being used by the Chairman, but ignored. A Worthy Grand Matron makes appointments to be upheld and all members on a committee should be contacted.
- Dispensing reading the Annual Report of the Secretary and the Treasurer of a Chapter. These reports must be read and spread upon the minutes.
- 8. Refusing admittance to out of state Eastern Stars with the proper qualifications.

- 2. Worthy Matron just returned from hospital and wanted to come to her Chapter's Birthday Party, but Doctor refused to let her participate. Permission given for station to be filled and she could attend.
- 3. All secretaries notified me when Charters were to be taken to be photostated, and when they were returned. I thank them for their cooperation.

4. Officer requested to come to chapter but not take her station as she had just had an eye operation and could not see well enough.

Permission granted.

- 5. Members cannot be suspended at the discretion of the Trustees or not suspended by same. It must come on chapter floor and before December 31 if you do not want to pay another year's per capita tax. The Trustees do not have anything to say on this matter. The secretaries should notify the member of possible suspension and then contact the Worthy Matron who will investigate together with or have one or two of the first four officers take care of investigating, report back to chapter, and action taken.
- I must remind all that the Trustees have duties but they must still come before the chapter before they can act. They cannot do it just among themselves.
- I received a letter pertaining to the hotel bill of a Past Grand Patron.
   As this was Constitution and Laws problem, I referred the matter to that committee.

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question: Which copy of Charter do we use-photo or original?

Answer: This is the property of the Chapter and the Chapter should decide. My personal feeling is that with the problems we are having right now it would be better to put the original Charter in a very safe place and use the photostat. These conditions will improve in time and then when the world is more settled bring out your original. You can always have a copy made, but you cannot replace the original.

Question: How many candidates can be initiated at one time? May we have a double class?

Answer: Not more than 6 at any stated meeting (Constitution and Laws, Page 54, Section 48).

Question: As Worthy Matron I want my officers to do the initiation, but pressure from members not of my chapter are insisting I let others do the initiation. What can I do?

Answer: Worthy Matron is the presiding officer. However, in this case, I as Worthy Grand Matron, request that you, your Worthy Patron, and Officers do the initiation.

Question: May we change our meeting night? There is a conference in our meeting room.

Answer: No. A meeting date cannot be changed. The place of meeting can, and a special dispensation can be granted to change locations.

Question: Why do secretaries have to look up 50 year members? Why doesn't this responsibility belong to the Grand Secretary?

Answer: I have no answer for this question. I think far too much is pushed off on the Subordinate Secretaries and the Worthy Grand Matron that should be handled in the Grand Secretary's office as the Ritual prescribes.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The Grand Secretary be required to inform the Worthy Grand Matron when she is leaving the State on vacation and returning, or being away from her office for any period of time.
- 2. The Secretaries of Subordinate Chapters note in their ledger when an affiliation comes in the date the member joined the Order of Eastern Star originally. It has been a hardship on some secretaries to look up the 50 year members who have affiliated. Some have been overlooked in past years.

### GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER REPORT

With 4c a mile and \$10.00 a day, and lots of Blue Hens and Blue Hen badges, your Worthy Grand Matron set off for the Triennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter accompanied by Bro. Charles, P.G.P. and our daughter Euretta Louise.

### **ADDRESS**

By Mrs. Helen D. Roquemore, P.G.M. of Georgia Chairman,

Ella Maude Lander Brady Cancer Research and Education Committee, General Grand Chapter

Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Sister Euretta and Brother Joe, my Sisters and Brothers of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of Eastern Star:

Please know how happy I am to have this opportunity to speak on behalf of the special project of our Most Worthy Grand Matron, Sister Mae Mickelson. The members of the Ella Maude Lander Brady Cancer Research and Education Committee have pledged ourselves to Sister Mae, to promote in all our Grand Jurisdictions, cancer research and education, which is her special project denoting her unselfish manner in memory of Ella Maude Lander Brady, a devoted member, and the daughter of our Righty Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Mamie Lander, that through combined efforts in the Order of the Eastern Star we may contribute to a cure for this dreaded disease.

Cancer strikes at any age. It affects children as well as adults. Out of the more than three million members of the Order of the Eastern Star there will be approximately 4,000 to die of cancer in the year of 1971. An estimated number of 692,877 will develop cancer if the present rate continues. I ask you then "is cancer research and education not our personal responsibility". We are all touched by cancer, if not ourselves a member of our family or friends have succumbed to cancer. Cancer can be cured if detected early enough, and if no other message I can get across today, I ask you to have a cancer check up.

In spite of the dismal figures I gave you, progress is being made against cancer. Not all of us have the ability to serve in the capacity of medical research, but we can help by giving of ourselves, our contributions, but most of all our sincere prayers and encouragement to those trained in the field of research.

I should like to urge all members of our order to support cancer control as a major national goal of this decade just as a man on the moon was a national goal of the Sixties. What I am saying, is that I believe with combined efforts of individuals the cure and control of cancer are attainable in the Seventies. This view is not mine alone; it is shared by those working in cancer research. I urge you to let the Seventies be a decade of HOPE for the fifty million citizens destined to get cancer in the future.

In a few brief words let me explain how we as a committee shall work together to promote this special project of our Most Worthy Grand Matron.

Your State was assigned to Brother Stuart Hallett, P.G.P. of Virginia, who should have by now contacted your present Worthy Grand Matron and Worthy Grand Matrons for the next three years. If this has not been done I would appreciate your contacting me.

There should be in the office of your Grand Secretary a letter from me as chairman with additional information.

- (a) Each Worthy Grand Matron will be asked to appoint a State chairman for the next three years and each Worthy Matron asked to appoint a subordinate chairman in her Chapter, therefore covering each Chapter in each Grand Jurisdiction. All moneys to go to the Grand Secretary who will, in turn, send to the office of the Right Worthy Grand Secretary, Sister Mamie Lander to be recorded.
- (b) Our theme for the next three years shall be "Light a light against cancer". We shall hope to sell small candle pins in each Grand Jurisdiction. Brother Hallett will be in touch with your chairman in connection with these pins.
- (c) There will be a large map of the United States, Canadian Provinces, Puerto Rico and all subordinate chapters serving under General Grand Chapter displayed at Sister Mae Michelson's Triennial, Denver, Colorado, showing amount of contribution from each state to indicate that by combined efforts great things can be achieved.
- (d) Sister Mae will give each chairman for the next three years an appointment to her Triennial. We will form drills giving Sister Mae the opportunity to see and know those who have worked to make her dream come true.

(e) At the end of the three years all moneys collected from each Grand Jurisdiction will be returned to the state from which it was collected for research. I believe yours will go to the Wilmington Medical Center and the University of Delaware.

Last year in the State of Delaware 800 people gave their lives to the dreaded disease, cancer. There are at the present time 1,600 people who have terminal cancer in Delaware. I again ask you: Is not cancer control our personal responsibility?

- (f) We, Brother Hallett and myself, sincerely hope that the great State of Delaware shall be among those at the top of the list for the Ella Maude Lander Brady Cancer Research and Education Committee.
- (g) Our goal in 1972 shall be for education of our membership. We hope that this will be a tremendous success—through the help and efforts of the American Cancer Society we will be furnished pledge cards asking us to have a cancer test. Thereby, helping through early detecting of cancer, save many of our lives. For early cancer can be cured.

I would like to thank the State of Delaware for every courtesy and act of kindness extended to me and the members of Georgia while in your Grand Jurisdiction. On behalf of the more than 32,000 members of the Grand Jurisdiction of Georgia I bring you greetings and hope in the future that many of you will attend Georgia Grand Chapter.

# REPORT OF FRATERNAL CORRESPONDENT

We render tribute also to the Chapters and members for their financial, material and physical support; to Sister Sadie Conly for her advice; to Sister Lorraine and Brother Irv Putzier for their instructions, support and cooperation.

It was June 10, 1970 before we were able to secure the Veterans Administration authorization and approval for your Representative, Harry Bristow, and your Deputy Representative, Rebecca Welsh, to proceed with the work.

Participation: During the course of the year, 92 different Eastern Star members participated physically in the Hospital. There were 12 members on

the Hobby Cart Team, 9 members on the Lap Robe Team, 3 members on the Open House Committee, and 4 members on the Patients' Carnival Committee. A grand total of 878 hours was served in the Hospital by Eastern Star members during the year.

Hobby Cart: Each Wednesday, the Hobby Cart visited every room in the Hospital. Expanded crews gave more time to stop and chat with some of the patients who were so anxious to talk. We distributed 2,583 major items and 3,252 minor items for a grand total of 5,835 items distributed. We served 2,839 patients and contacted 2,197 others, who did not take anything, for a grand total of 5,036 patients. Purchases, inventories, clearances, etc., were under the control of the Chairman.

On behalf of the patients, we give the Chapters and the individuals our thanks and appreciation for these very vital and necessary contributions to this project. On June 11, 1970 a checking account was opened with the Delaware Trust Co. in the name of "Order of Eastern Star V.A.H. Fund". All disbursements were by check. A voucher system was prepared to better scrutinize disbursements. All contributions of money or material were acknowledged.

Patients Carnival—June 25, 1970: We entertained 65 patients, distributing 70 prizes of which 34 prizes were donated. We expended \$15.19 for prizes which would have cost \$50.74. Our Worthy Grand Matron and her husband, Past Grand Patron, Brother Charles, attended at our booth.

Open House—November 15, 1970: Fifty-five announcements were distributed covering all Chapters. There were 15 Eastern Star members present representing 7 Chapters. We were honored by the presence of our Worthy Grand Matron and her husband, Charles, Past Grand Patron.

Special Activities: On May 19, 1970 Delaware Chapter No. 1 brought to the Hospital the "Sweet Adelines" singing group at a cost of \$50.00. Twelve of Delaware Chapter's members were present and served refreshments.

In December 1970, Caesar Rodney Chapter #8 purchased \$30.00 worth of Canteen tickets for indigent patients.

Two hundred and eight Christmas cards were distributed to 67 patients so they could remember their loved ones.

Distributed to the Library for patients: 40 Dictionaries, 12 pencils, 36 Cross Word Puzzle Books, 10 Magazines, 122 Paper Back Novels.

The Worthy Matrons and Worthy Patrons of 1971 are our Cascades. We hope they will catch a flow of Enthusiasm from our Fountain of Light and pass it on from one to another in the Subordinate Chapters.

We hope that many enthusiastic members will travel with us this year up and down the state seeking the Light. These faithful trailers we shall call the Seekers and together we shall travel the Starlight Trail.

When a pebble is dropped into a pool of water, the ripples go on and on. This reminds me of the influence of our Grand Representatives. As they correspond and travel to different jurisdictions, their enthusiasm sends forth Light and fraternal love as the ripples in a pool. Who can say how far? These Sisters and Brothers play such an important part in extending our Order, that we are dedicating our year to them—the Grand Representatives of other Jurisdictions in Delaware. 




