



VADA LOCKERMAN Worthy Grand Matron 1975-1976





IRREGULARITIES

- 1. Members walking through the Labyrinth while the Bible is open.
- 2. Warder giving raps when the Bible is closed.

- 3. Officers not taking their stations.
- 4. Walking in and out of the Chapter room during the meeting.
- 5. Ritual work being written.
- 6. Conductress not making sign before Bible is closed and making it after the Bible is closed.
- 7. Reports given other than the Secretary, Treasurer and Trustees at the Installations.
- 8. Minutes not being read at Installations.
- 9. Secretaries not using proper stationery and forms.
- 10. Dispensing the reading of the minutes instead of postponing them.
- Talk outside the chapter room of chapter business by both members of the chapter and visitors.
- 12. A chapter accepted a letter from a non-member bringing charges against a member. A motion was made and a vote taken favoring a trial. The Worthy Matron set a trial date. As per the Penal Code of this Grand Jurisdiction only a member can bring charges against another member and the charges must be submitted in a prescribed written form. It is not necessary to have a motion to have a trial. If the presiding officer determines there is enough evidence, she sets a trial date.
- 13. Bible being carried into room and placed upon the Altar after the Worthy Patron has assumed his station to open the chapter.

DECISIONS

- The Worthy Patron of Chapter was elected from the floor. I was happy to grant him a 90-day extension providing he does not do an initiation until after he has passed his examination.
- 2. Our Chapter is having an initiation and one of our members would like to give a lecture about our Order afterwards. I advised that if the Worthy Matron approved, the member should do this under the Good of the Order so it will not be mistaken as part of the initiation.
- Our Chapter may be requested that we do not drape our Charter for a deceased member. I advised that they decline the request, this is a

privilege of the Chapter to pay their respect to a deceased member and no one has the right to deny them of it.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1. We have been asked to perform a funeral service for a member from another jurisdiction, does this need the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron?

Answer: No, this is a courtesy handled between the two chapters involved.

2. There is an officer in our chapter who does not want to take her station but would like to attend the meetings, is this permissible?

Answer: No, if she is physically able to take her station then she must.

3. A suspended member for non-payment of dues, who now lives in California would like to be reinstated to affiliate with a chapter there. How can we investigate her character with her living so far away?

Answer: Request the Worthy Grand Matron to write to the Worthy Grand Matron of California and ask for a courtesy investigation.

4. A member has requested re-instatement. What if she is not favorably voted for re-instatement, are the back dues she paid returned?

Answer: I refer you to Decisions of the General Grand Chapter, Page 14, Decision 2 under Dues. If a member suspended for nonpayment of dues, pays back dues and petitions for re-instatement, there is no reason for return of dues if petition is rejected. In the payment of these dues the petitioner was only discharging their legal liability.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- It is essential for the Secretary and Presiding Officer of a Chapter to be knowledgeable concerning the prescribed manner set down in the Penal Code as to the various steps concerning the trial procedure. I therefore recommend that each Secretary of the Subordinate Chapters be required to have a copy of the 1926 Penal Code and that the contents of the Penal Code be incorporated in the Proficiency Test of the B Certificate.
- 2. I recommend that the shoulder ribbons worn in the Subordinate Chapters no longer be required since the Grand Secretary is having a difficult time trying to purchase the wide ribbon.
- 3. The year as Associate Grand Matron is a very busy one for her. She is busy writing letters of appointments and making plans for her year as Worthy Grand Matron. I therefore, recommend that she be taken off of the Fraternal Correspondence Report and it be given to the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress with the Grand Conductress as Chairman.

It is with mixed emotions I submit the following Cancer Report for 1975-1976. First—sadly that the need exists for such necessary funds for cancer research. Secondly—happy that such wonderful response was given to my plea.

Worthy Grand Matron, when you asked me to serve as your Cancer Chairman my first inclination was to decline, since I knew what was ahead of me and was not sure I would be able to perform and withstand the duties this entailed but then I was asked "why" was I declining by my husband and since I did not want him to know how seriously ill he was I decided to accept—so I thank God he never realized his was a terminal illness. Now I thank you for two reasons—first because as I just stated I felt it kept him hoping and planning all would be well and secondly for the fact that in answering all the contributions, as soon as received, I was able to spend many, many lonely hours in communication with all our friends.

Ladies and Gentlemen, you are all aware that this year is our country's 200th birthday. In honor of this special event, we have invited some very special members of the Masonic fraternity to present our flags tonight.

Our first guest was Worshipful Master of his Masonic Lodge in the colony of Virginia. In 1785 he was appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Army. In 1787 he was chosen as President of the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia which labored for 87 days and nights to provide us with the supremely unique document—the Constitution of the United States. He later became our country's first President.

Escorted by Michele Chambers, Past Honored Queen of Bethel No. 1, and Ronald Pena, Master Councilor Newport Chapter, the American flag will be presented by Worshipful Brother George Washington.

The name of our next guest is interwined constantly in the annals of our fight for liberty as well as within the growth of Freemasonry in the colonies. He published the first Masonic book printed in America. In 1765 he was called upon to present the position of the colonies before the English House of Commons. Later he was sent to France to enlist and solicit their support for our fight for Independence. He was a signer of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the United States.

Escorted by Judy Smith, Past Honored Queen of Bethel No. 9, and Mark Krauss, Past Master Councilor, Newport Chapter, our country's bicentennial flag will be presented by the first native-born Provincial Grand Master, and Past Grand Master of Masons in Pennsylvania, Most Worshipful Benjamin Franklin.

Our next guest was a talented 19-year-old Frenchman who joined our ranks from overseas. His name lives on today in the hearts of all Americans for his Dedication at Brandywine, Valley Forge, and other battlefields. His last visit to this jurisdiction was on July 25, 1825, at a special Communication of the Grand Lodge of Delaware.

Escorted by Pam Collins, Honored Queen of Bethel No. 2, and Mark Krauss, Past Master Councilor, Newport Chapter, the Delaware flag is presented by Past Grand Master Honorarious of the Grand Lodge of Delaware, the *Marquis de Lafayette*.

Our next guest was a young Scotsman who engaged the British upon the sea in their own waters. His battles were many, but we best recall him for a fight along the coast of the British Isles with the Bonhomme Richard when he said the immortal words, "I have not yet begun to fight."

Escorted by Pam Cole, Past Honored Queen of Bethel No. 8, and Paul Baich, Master Councilor of Wilmington Chapter, the Christian flag will be presented by *Brother John Paul Jones*.

Our final guest was one of the earliest to speak out and take action against the aggressions that led to the war for Independence. He helped to found "The Sons of Liberty". He used his skill and talent as a pamphleteer and political caricaturist to bring to the public the tyranny of the Crown. A nonsubstantiated, but accepted, historical fact is his participation in the Boston Tea Party. In addition to his serving in the military, he also manufactured gunpowder and cannons.

Escorted by Judy Smith, Past Honored Queen of Bethel No. 9, and David Quillen, Acting Master Councilor of Gunning Bedford Jr. Chapter, our Eastern Star flag is presented by Past Grand Master of Masons in Massachusetts, Most Worshipful Brother Paul Revere.

My sincere thanks and appreciation to the Scottish Rite Bodies of Delaware for sharing its members and costumes with us tonight in the presentation of these flags. Special thanks to Donald Thomas, Grand Lodge Historian, for his information and facts. THE HONORABLE SHERMAN W. TRIBBITT, Governor of the State of Delaware:

Thank you very much, Past Grand Matron, Winifred Hulme and the Sessions Chairman along with Past Grand Patron, Thomas J. Berry, Co-Chairman and to the Worthy Grand Matron, Vada Lockerman, Worthy Grand Patron, Howard Hall and to the Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, Marguerite Kennerdell, to all the very distinguished guests and very specifically, the Most Worshipful Grand Master of Masons, Raymond W. Savage and to the Illustrious Potentate, Paul Spencer and all other guests seated here this evening.

Ladies and Gentlemen, first of all, let me say, that as Governor of the State of Delaware and the Bicentennial Governor, I am indeed honored this evening to have been invited to the Informal Opening of this 55th Annual Session of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star. I have had the opportunity many times to be here in the Gold Ball Room, on many occasions, and tonight like the other times I've had the opportunity to attend the Annual Sessions of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, but tonight it appears to me that it is unusually beautiful. Everybody seems to be properly attired and the women, especially, look tremendously beautiful this evening. This is not an election year is it? And certainly, that tribute to the Emerald Session, that I just witnessed, was outstanding and it came all the way up to my time with "Stardust". "Stardust", all of my married life, ever since I've known and married my wife, has been our favorite piece, and I enjoyed so very much just those few bars of it as it was in part of that tribute.

You know and it has already been referred to, that this is the Bicentennial year. Naturally because we're the first State, we're pleased to participate as we will through this year in the observance of the 200th Anniversary of this great nation of ours. And I also notice that among the things that were mailed to me in respect to this night, that this is the Centennial Year of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, which was formed on November 16, 1876.

I think that this year 1976, as we go through and celebrate the Bicentennial of this great nation of ours, gives all of us the opportunity to rededicate ourselves to the rich, historical origin that this nation has enjoyed all these years. So that tonight we can assemble here at the Hotel DuPont in the Gold Ball Room and as free citizens to enjoy the heritage of this great nation of ours. And to those who will be living to celebrate the Tricentennial, a hundred years from now, and people congregated on this occasion of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, Order of the Eastern Star, whoever these people are, hopefully we'll be able to hand on to them the same thing that our forefathers handed on to us, two hundred years ago, one hundred years ago, so that they can enjoy what we have been able to enjoy on the occasion of this 200th Anniversary. So I salute you and I'm pleased and proud, as I said earlier, to be here, briefly, on this occasion of the Informal Opening tonight. Kennerdell, Most Worthy Grand Matron of the General Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, is here and hereafter shall be declared an Honorary Citizen of the State of Delaware. In witness where-Delaware to be hereto affixed this tenth day of May 1976. Under the signature of Sherman W. Tribbitt, Governor of the State of Delaware." Most Worthy Grand Matron, it is certainly my honor to welcome you to Delaware tonight, the First State, on the occasion of this 55th Session of the Grand Chapter of Eastern Star in the State of Delaware. I welcome you here and hope that your stay is indeed enjoyable. The benefits that come to you by being the distinguished and Honorary Citizen are very few. So you must conduct yourself accordingly.

MARGUERITE L. KENNERDELL, Most Worthy Grand Matron:

Governor Tribbitt, I have had the extreme pleasure of receiving many documents such as this one, but not one will be cherished to any greater extent than will this one. I have been in Wilmington since last Saturday. I've had every opportunity to find out the characters and quality I've been told over and over again what a small State this is, but I keep telling our members not to say small—very large in quality and I'm going to be very, very pleased to place this among my very cherished possessions and remember this very important moment. It is a very kind gesture on your part and I deeply appreciate it and I want you to know that MARGUERITE and KENNERDELL are both spelled correctly and that's an accomplishment.

GOVERNOR TRIBBITT:

Before I conclude my remarks, I just want to tell one brief story. Just a couple of weeks ago, we held the 17th Annual Governor's Prayer Breakfast at Caesar Rodney High School and our guest speaker at that occasion was one Peter Mills who was a member of Parliament from England and very specifically a member of the House of Commons. He told this brief story and I want to tell it to you. I think it's fitting for this occasion. Peter Mills said: "He had a constituent who was raising a family, like a lot of us are, and this constituent, and particularly the father, was going through the period of time where this generation liked the long hair and the beard. It seems as if the father had a son who was coming of age to drive an automobile and very much wanted a car. So the father decided that he'd make an agreement with the son. So he

every one of you here this evening. So at this time I would like to wish, on behalf of all the Masons, a very wonderful and glorious Session and God Bless each and every one of you. Thank you.

It is a pleasure to present Illustrious Paul A. Spencer, Potentate of Nur Temple.

PAUL A. SPENCER, Potentate of Nur Temple:

What an assignment, following those two gentlemen!

Most Worthy Grand Matron, Marguerite Kennerdell, Worthy Grand Matron, Vada Lockerman and Worthy Grand Patron, Howard Hall and our great Raymond Savage, Most Worshipful Grand Master of Delaware, thank you wonderful ladies of the Eastern Star for the opportunity to be here with you at this Emerald Session, this 55th Annual Grand Chapter Meeting. The spirit that pervades this assembly is something wonderful to behold and I am delighted to be a participant entered with you into this same intoxicating spirit.

Being Potentate of Nur Temple, this great organization of ours, is not only an honor, but carries with it tremendous responsibilities, to uphold our great philanthropy—Crippled Children's Orthopedic Hospitals and Burns' Institutes.

You might be interested to know that Nur Temple is 167th of the 180 Shrine Temples that are chartered in North America. So we're relatively young, but we are amazed at our Mosque, being a very useful facility, having had the pleasure of having you there Saturday night, and you will agree with me, is valued in dollars probably at about a million dollars. Much of this is represented by labor donated by our dedicated members, otherwise it would not have been possible.

We are proud to be a part of the First State of Delaware, especially in this Bicentennial Year. Caesar Rodney's horseback ride from Dover to Philadelphia, will be re-enacted with assistance of our Nur Temple Horse Patrol, in which your speaker will participate on July 1, 1976.

Yes, Delaware had another second to none in 1776, the Delaware Blue Hen Chickens won fame during the war through it's actions in the Battle of Long Island. In Nur Temple, we now in 1976, have a first in Shrinedom with two live camels. We believe them to be the only two camels in existence in the 180 temples in North America. (Since of course, the unfortunate death of our Shiek, who just died not long ago.)

Now, just a few parting remarks on our Hospitals. You might be interested to know that there are 19 Crippled Children's Orthopedic Hospitals and 3 Burns' Institutes. It costs over \$30 million dollars a year, in fact it was close to \$35 million a year, to operate. This is where your generous yearly contributions go. Eighty percent of the operating expense comes from our endowment funds which have been accumulating over many years. The balance comes from contributions like yours plus the assessment from nearly one million Shriners each year when they pay their yearly dues.

Now I was given two minutes to talk. I could keep on talking for hours enthusiastically on Shrinedom. We do want to thank you so much for all you have done and are doing so that these wonderful crippled and burned children can once again walk and lead a normal life. Thank you.

The Worthy Grand Matron presented a check for \$15.00 in memory of Sister Grace Moore, to Mr. Spencer for the Shriner's Hospital.

TRIBUTE TO THE FLAGS

HILDA DOWNWARD, Acting Grand Marshal:

OUR NATIONAL FLAG

The first Continental Colors were hoisted on the Liberty Pole at Prospect Hill in Charlestown, Massachusetts, on January 1, 1776, by the order of General George Washington. The flag honored the creation of the Continental Army, a step toward the union of the American Colonies. The thirteen red and white stripes symbolized the new-found unity of the Colonies in seeking redress for their grievances against the British.

The Star Spangled Banner was written by Francis Scott Key when he was detained aboard a British warship for two days during the British attack on Baltimore in September of 1814. Key watched the fierce battle for two days until, on the morning of September 14, he saw the gallant flag still waving over Ft. McHenry. The original flag, with eleven holes shot in it is now on display at the Smithsonian Institution.

Our flag today has grown to 50 stars. From the original 13 Colonies our country has grown to include a diversity of cultures, races, languages and customs. In spite of this diversity, however, all Americans are united in a common belief in the freedom and dignity of man.

In this Bicentennial Year our National Flag waves proudly.

OUR CHRISTIAN FLAG

Our Christian flag is a symbol of Love and Faith, of our obligation to show kindness toward our fellowman. It is also a banner of red, white

and blue. The white a symbol of our Lord's purity, the blue a symbol of Fidelity, and the red a symbol of the blood that was shed so that we could be free to worship in the church and manner of our choice. May it ever wave proudly as a symbol of our Christian Heritage.

DELAWARE STATE FLAG

Delaware has much to be proud of in this Bicentennial Year. You say that you're a small jurisdiction, but again, such a tremendous amount of money that you collected for Cardiac Research—\$3,400; Cancer Research, \$1,850 in contributions and \$406 in sale of jewelry—making a total of \$2,256. Now that takes a big Grand Chapter to accomplish so much-not a small one. Certainly your hearts and the quality of your members-generosity of your members-cannot be equaled anywhere. The projects of the General Grand Chapter are important. You have been for a long time 100% in your giving to the International Eastern Star Temple and I will tell you that if you haven't been there in the last six or seven months, make an effort to go because it has been beautified from the top to the first floor and it is perfectly beautiful and as much as you have given your \$1.00 to the maintenance of it, you can look at it proudly and say "I have a part in this beautiful building."

Estarl, of course, is our No. 1 project. No. 1 before anything else. Tonight you have shown how generous you can be with this project giving six scholarships and there again displaying tremendous generosity. During this Triennium, we have an extension of Estarl called Estarl Phase II. If you were in Denver, you heard me say that we would make an effort to sell 50,000 of these little Estarl Charms, with the Cross attached on the center of which are the letters ESTARL. My ambition was to sell 50,000 of them before the end of this Triennium and to give a gift of a scholarship of at least \$1,000 to each of our 56 Grand Chapters and one in each country where Chapters are sponsored. Someone interested in

continuing education in theology or a post graduate study. When I said I hoped we could do this, I said it thinking positively and with a great hope in my heart that such a thing would be possible. So you must know how grateful I am to each one who is wearing one of these Estarl Charms or singing one of the songs written by Sister Peggy Patrick of Ohio, where we sold her songs and every penny of the dollar for them or any money paid for them has gone into Estarl Phase II. Last Thursday, when I left home our Mail Order Chairman and Secretary of this project showed me our bankbook and the total amount in it was \$108,000 plus and we have ordered the last of our quota of 50,000 charms. We still have charms on hand—we'll be selling them up to and through our Assembly, but week before last, our Estarl Committee of the General Grand Chapter met at the International Eastern Star Temple and I know you'll be pleased to hear that the Committee granted, or approved 64 applications for post graduate study. Delaware gave us one application. Because of the amount of money we have in our fund, the amount instead of \$1,000 was \$1,500 for each one. We're in a unique position of having more money than applications. I know there are many young men in all of our Grand Jurisdictions who are hoping for help with their advanced education, in all the provinces and we're hoping in all the countries. Unfortunately, we were not able to make it plain to our Grand Jurisdictions, or some of them, that unless they sold a \$1,000 worth of music and charms, they were not entitled to an application but they are, and we want each one of them to know that if they can find other applicants, we will take care of them. Just as I have told your Chairman of Estarl here in Delaware-that if she finds more, we have the money and want to take care of them.

I would like to extend my personal invitation to each one of you to come to Cleveland the last week in September and attend the "Art of Living" Centennial Assembly of the General Grand Chapter. We'd like you to come and help us celebrate our 100th Birthday as our Country celebrates its 200th Birthday. I know many of you are coming to take part in the Assembly and I'm grateful to each one who accepted my invitation to take part. We're looking forward to having many of you in Delaware in Cleveland at that time.

Again I say, No. 1 in the First State, the First State in the Country and the first in many, many other directions, because certainly you have proved to be loving and friendly and extremely kind to your guests. I'm delighted to have been here. We'll leave in the morning to go to Rich-

mond for the Grand Chapter Sessions of Virginia and we'll go to Massachusetts for two days and then home for 24 hours.

REPORT OF THE JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE ON THE REPORT OF THE WORTHY GRAND MATRON

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Chapter of Delaware:

We, the members of the Jurisprudence Committee, have carefully reviewed the report of the Worthy Grand Matron and commend her, not only for the care she has exercised in preparing her report but for the earnest and conscientious manner in which she has performed her duties.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS

We do not approve the disapproval of Ruth Chapter No. 19 Amendment to By-Laws, Article IV, Section 2. We question why the Worthy Grand Matron disapproved the addition. We can not find any law in either the Grand Chapter nor the General Grand Chapter which prohibits a Subordinate Chapter from imposing restrictions as to whom they will accept as Life Members.

In the 1974 Sessions, Grand Chapter approved the By-Laws of Adah Chapter No. 5 in which they require 50 years membership. (Page 29 in 1974 Proceedings.)

We approve the Amendments to the By-Laws of Delaware Chapter No. 1.

We approve all Waivers of Territorial Jurisdiction requested.

We approve all Special Dispensations granted.

We approve all Irregularities except No. 7. This is not an irregularity according to the Rules and Regulations for the Government of Subordinate Chapters in Delaware. Page 54, Section 43.

DECISIONS

We approve Decisions No. 1 and No. 2.

We approve Decision No. 3 but would recommend the wording "privilege" be changed to "Ruling of Grand Chapter".

We approve Decision No. 4.

We disapprove Decision No. 4. We agree the Sentinel should vote. According to the 1953 Ruling approved by this Grand Body, the Sentinel is

invited into the Chapter Room by the Presiding Officer after securing the outer door, and permitted to vote.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

We approve No. 1.

We approve No. 2 but suggest the word "should" instead of "Must".

We do not feel qualified to rule on No. 3. We find no precedent or ruling by either our Grand Chapter or General Grand Chapter to cover such a situation and feel it should be clarified by General Grand Chapter.

We approve No. 4.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We approve No. 1 recommendation that each Secretary of Subordinate Chapters be required to have a copy of the Penal Code but disapprove that the contents of the Penal Code be incorporated in the proficiency test of the "B" Certificate.

We disapprove No. 2. We feel that the wearing of ribbons sets the officers apart.

We do not approve No. 3 as it must be referred to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee since it requires an amendment to the Associate Grand Matron's duties.

The committee has carefully reviewed the ESTARL application forms and has updated the format to seek pertinent information and answer questions relevant to the student of today.

Cost of printing 200 application forms was \$31.75.

The original has been stored, so that future printings can be made from the original without paying for the type set again. The printing was done by Small's Associates.

During the year we put forth a great deal of effort on behalf of ESTARL Phase II. We sent a letter to each chapter and I made many personal contacts to churches and ministers seeking applicants for the Phase II award. We sold 35 charms as a continuing effort to fund raising for the Phase II program.

I can account for 107 pieces of mail which I sent out this year and I truly believe that we could have greatly improved the image of Eastern Star and added prestige to our labors by using official stationery.

A motion was made by Brother Charles H. Schultheiss, P.G.P., that the Report on ESTARL be accepted, recommendations be complied with and the money returned. Seconded by Brother Arthur R. Kempston, P.G.P. Motion adopted.

MOTION REGARDING ESTARL ACCOUNT

The accumulated monies in the ESTARL fund have come from direct gifts, wills, memorials and specific ESTARL trips and projects in the subordinate chapters. In addition, many of the Past Grand Matrons have contributed money which they received in lieu of flowers as well as money from their projects and trips. In all such cases the money has been received by the Grand Secretary and recorded in the proceedings as ESTARL money.

In the pamphlet, "Eastern Star Training Awards for Religious Leadership", put out by the Educational Committee of the General Grand Chapter, on page 2, paragraph (c), it reads, "The money raised for this project (ESTARL) in each jurisdiction is to be used to benefit applicants in that jurisdiction. It is suggested that each Grand Chapter forward all funds collected to the Right Worthy Grand Secretary so that proper credit may appear in the records of the General Grand Chapter. This money will

be returned immediately to the Grand Chapter for support of the ESTARL program in their own jurisdiction", end quote.

According to the proceedings of the Grand Chapter of Delaware, 1975, page 310, a motion was made and seconded that \$6,000 be transferred from the ESTARL fund to the General Fund of the Grand Chapter of Delaware for operating expenses. The same proceedings, page 133, shows only \$12,119 in the ESTARL fund.

Aside from the fact that transfer of this money is probably illegal under civil law, the ESTARL Committee believes that the transfer of any monies from the ESTARL fund is against the ruling of the General Grand Chapter as stated above.

In 1975-1975, \$3,499 was contributed to ESTARL; in 1975-1976, \$2,500 was contributed. The committee has heard rumblings that this decrease in ESTARL support can be partly attributed to concern over the \$6,000. To support the students that we have in school today through graduation, at the present rate of support, we will need \$6,150. That figure does not take care of any additional students.

Because of membership concern over the ESTARL account, I make a recommendation that the Grand Trustees audit the ESTARL account and explain what appears to be a discrepancy in the figures shown on pages 132-133 and 209-210 of the 1975 proceedings, and that a copy of the audit be supplied to members of the ESTARL Committee.

To make sure that all money collected for this purpose is available for ESTARL awards, I make a motion that the total \$6,000 as discussed on page 210 of the 1975 proceedings along with all other ESTARL money be reassigned to the ESTARL account.

REPORT OF THE VETERANS HOSPITAL COMMITTEE

To the Worthy Grand Matron, Worthy Grand Patron and Grand Chapter Members:

We thank you for the appointment, honor and responsibility of serving on the Veterans Administration Hospital Committee for the period from May, 1975, to May, 1976. This program has been able to continue only through the material and financial support and cooperation of all the Eastern Star Members and Chapters of Delaware. Our beautiful Star has been a vision of hope and a bright light shining into these unfortunate lives. Each week we contact the patients and distribute free of charge to all certain hobby items to relieve their tensions and give them things to do. Nowhere does our Star shine brighter than in these long, lonely and pain filled rooms.

ORGANIZATION: Our system of organization was severely tested during this past year by the illness of the Chairman. Your Deputy Representative Rose Wright (13), immediately took charge and the Hobby Cart and other activities continued each week to serve the patients regularly. It has been the responsibility of Rose to maintain hospital relationships. serve on the Hobby Cart, schedule workers, prepare load lists and patients records, and to supervise all our operations. She has been ably assisted by Lila Heinel (13) who serves on the Hobby Cart and also has charge of our Lap Robe and Slipper Program. It is in the hands of these two great ladies that the future of our project rests. Our bingo and special parties are controlled by Hilda Downward (4), Chairman, assisted by Virginia Harris (13). They are doing a splendid job arranging and supervising these parties. All members of our group are trained in their duties. The following are specially trained as supervisors on the Hobby Cart: Rose Wright (13), Lila Heinel (13), Virginia Harris (13), and Helen Johnson (4). Our workers include also Gail Reilly (13), Elmer Harris (13), Delores Hamilton (13) and Ann Burkhard (13). The chairman has general supervision over all the affairs of the program, controls finances, does purchasing and maintains public relations with the Hospital authorities, suppliers and Chapters.

LAP ROBES: We received during this period 108 lap robes each of which represented many hours of devoted service: Five Points Chapter No. 13—38, Naomi Chapter No. 20—70, making a total of 108 robes. Sister Lila reports that 128 lap robes were distributed. Twenty of these came from our previous inventory.

SLIPPERS: There were 29 pairs of slippers received and distributed: Delaware Chapter No. 1—20 pairs, Five Points Chapter No. 13—9 pairs, making a total of 29 pairs of slippers.

BINGO AND SPECIAL PARTIES: Five Bingo Parties were held and one Square Dance program was presented for the patients' enjoyment. There were 270 patients entertained. A total of 132 hours was served in the hospital by 66 Eastern Star Members. All prizes and refreshments were donated by the Chapters involved which were Five Points Chapter No. 13—2 parties, and 1 each for Delaware Chapter No. 1, Caesar Rodney Chapter No. 8, Radiant Chapter No. 6, and Naomi Chapter No. 20. Special thanks to the Heritage Square Dancers secured by Fred Bowman of Naomi Chapter No. 20.

CONTINGENCY FUND: The \$10.00 we received for this was not used personally but was put in the Hobby Fund and used for the patients.

PATIENTS CARNIVAL: The format of the Carnival has been changed with new directors of Volunteers. However, we participated in such activity as planned.

CANTEEN BOOKS: Twenty-seven canteen books were distributed to Nursing for patients' use only.

PURCHASING: Through personal contacts we were able to secure items to advantage. We give heartfelt thanks for the many free items we distributed from the "Help Hospitalized Veterans" program in California. The many material contributions we have received from individual Delaware Eastern Star Members have been appreciated. We were able to secure from Grants many items at a minimum of cost. We received a carton of paperback books from New York free of charge. A local supplier gave us a discount of 40 percent to 70 percent on a volume order. Another local supplier gave us free of charge 2 (as new) 20-inch TV sets and 1 (as new) Stereo Radio and these were delivered to the Hospital for use by the patients.

SUMMER FESTIVAL: The Patients Carnival was renamed the Summer Festival and held on June 26, 1975. Five members of Naomi Chapter made refreshments for the auditorium group. Five other members of Naomi Chapter served 33 patients in the hospital. Cost expended was \$29.64.

HOBBY CART: Each Wednesday, the Hobby Cart visited all the patients in the hospital. We distributed 6,391 items free of charge to the patients. These had a retail value of \$6,552.99. We served 2,821 patients and contacted 1,828 others who did not take anything for a total of 4,649 patient contacts. We visited with various patients and rendered services to them as required. We distributed various items to the Speech Therapist for his use with the patients.

PARTICIPATION: There were 94 members participating physically in the program representing 6 chapters. Nine members from 3 Chapters served on the Hobby Cart. The Lap Robe team had 7 members from 2 Chapters. The Slipper team had 2 members from 2 Chapters. Many long hours of service were given outside the Hospital preparing for Bingos, Special Events, Hobby Cart, making lap robes and slippers and also other projects. Different items were donated by members of various Chapters.

REMARKS: Under crucial conditions our system of organization functioned extremely well. Any member is welcome to examine our records. Additional volunteers are always welcome. Rising costs, shortages, economic conditions and illness have all helped make this a very difficult year. We are grateful to each member and Chapter for their financial contributions and donations of material items. We thank the Hospital authorities for their support and cooperation. Thanks also to the Help Hospitalized Veterans program and the various suppliers who have given

us items or discounts. To each of you and your Chapters we give not only our hearty thanks, but ask that God's Blessing will rest upon you all.

The Grand Conductress attended at the Altar.





LEGISLATION ACTED UPON AT GRAND CHAPTER MAY 1976

Worthy Grand Matron's Report:

Amendments to By-Laws—Ruth Chapter No. 19—disapproved by Worthy Grand Matron. Article IV, Section ?—Life membership shall be presented to any member having forty (40) consecutive years of membership in the Order of the Eastern Star of which the last five (5) are in Ruth Chapter and in good standing.

The Jurisprudence Committee did not approve this disapproval by the Worthy Grand Matron and a motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the decision of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Amendments to By-Laws—Delaware Chapter No. 1—approved by the Worthy Grand Matron. Article IV, Section 1—Membership—Add "stepdaughters". This is to bring our By-Laws up-to-date with the Ritual.

Article VII, Section 1 (now reads) Trustees—The Trustees shall have a general supervision of the finances and property of the Chapter and shall examine the books and vouchers of the Secretary and Treasurer from time to time and make an annual detailed report to the Chapter at the first stated meeting in January before Installation and at such other times as may be deemed expedient or the Chapter may direct.

Article VII, Section 1 (Amended to read)—Trustees—The Trustees shall have a general supervision of the finances and property of the Chapter. Such valuable documents as bonds, saving fund books, insurance policies, photostatic copy of the Charter, et cetera, shall be kept in a Safety Deposit Box rented by the Chapter and removed only for the period of time necessary to transact business. Access to same shall be granted to at least one (1) Trustee and one (1) authorized (bonded) officer of the Chapter. The Trustees shall examine the books and vouchers of the Secretary and Treasurer from time to time and make an annual detailed report to the Chapter at the first stated meeting in January before Installation and at such other times as may be deemed expedient or the Chapter may direct.

The Jurisprudence Committee approved these amendments and a motion was made, seconded and adopted.

Waivers of Territorial Jurisdiction

The Jurisprudence Committee approved all Waivers of Territorial Jurisdiction granted by the Worthy Grand Matron.

Special Dispensations

The Jurisprudence Committee approved all Special Dispensations granted by the Worthy Grand Matron.

Irregularities

- 1. Members walking through the Labyrinth while the Bible is open.
- 2. Warder giving raps when the Bible is closed.
- 3. Officers not taking their stations.
- 4. Walking in and out of the Chapter room during the meeting.
- 5. Ritual work being written.
- 6. Conductress not making sign before Bible is closed and making it after the Bible is closed.
- 7. Reports given other than the Secretary, Treasurer and Trustees at the Installation.
- 8. Minutes not being read at Installations.
- 9. Secretaries not using proper stationery and forms.
- 10. Dispensing the reading of the minutes instead of postponing them.
- Talk outside the Chapter room of Chapter business by both members of the Chapter and visitors.
- 12. A Chapter accepted a letter from a non-member bringing charges against a member. A motion was made and a vote taken favoring a trial. The Worthy Matron set a trial date. As per the Penal Code of this Grand Jurisdiction only a member can bring charges against another member and the charges must be submitted in a prescribed written form. It is not necessary to have a motion to have a trial. If the presiding officer determines there is enough evidence, she sets a trial date.
- 13. Bible being carried into room and placed upon the Altar after the Worthy Patron has assumed his station to open the Chapter.

The Jurisprudence Committee approved all Irregularities except No. 7. This is not an irregularity according to the Rules and Regulations for the Government of Subordinate Chapters in Delaware. Page 54, Section

43. A motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the Report of the Jurisprudence Committee on the above.

Decisions

- 2. Our Chapter is having an initiation and one of our members would like to give a lecture about our Order afterwards. I advised that if the Worthy Matron approved, the member should do this under the Good of the Order so it will not be mistaken as part of the initiation.
- 3. Our Chapter may be requested that we do not drape our Charter for a deceased member. I advised that they decline the request, this is a privilege of the Chapter to pay their respect to a deceased member and no one has the right to deny them of it.

The Jurisprudence Committee approved Decisions 1, 2 and 4 and a motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the Jurisprudence Committee's Report on these decisions. A motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the Jurisprudence Report on changing the word "privilege" in Decision No. 3 to "Ruling of Grand Chapter". The Jurisprudence Committee disapproved Decision No. 5. They agreed the Sentinel should vote and according to the 1953 Ruling approved by this Grand Body, the Sentinel is invited into the Chapter Room by the Presiding Officer after

securing the outer door, and permitted to vote. A motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the decision of the Jurisprudence Committee.

Questions and Answers

1. We have been asked to perform a funeral service for a member from another jurisdiction, does this need the approval of the Worthy Grand Matron?

Answer: No, this is a courtesy handled between the two Chapters involved.

2. There is an officer in our Chapter who does not want to take her station but would like to attend the meetings, is this permissible?

Answer: No, if she is physically able to take her station then she must.

3. A suspended member for non-payment of dues, who now lives in California would like to be reinstated to affiliate with a chapter there. How can we investigate her character with her living so far away?

Answer: Request the Worthy Grand Matron to write to the Worthy Grand Matron of California and ask for a courtesy investigation.

4. A member has requested re-instatement. What if she is not favorably voted for re-instatement, are the back dues she paid returned?

Answer: I refer you to Decisions of the General Grand Chapter, Page 14, Decision 2, under Dues. If a member suspended for non-payment of dues, pays back dues and petitions for re-instatement, there is no reason for return of dues if petition is rejected. In the payment of these dues the petitioner was only discharging their legal liability.

The Jurisprudence Committee approved No. 1. They approved No. 2 but suggest the word "should" instead of "must". They do not feel qualified to rule on No. 3. Find no precedent or ruling by either our Grand Chapter or General Grand Chapter to cover such a situation and feel it should be clarified by General Grand Chapter. They approve No. 4.

A motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the decision of the Jurisprudence Committee on Questions and Answers No. 1 and No. 4. A motion was made, seconded and defeated to accept the decision of the Jurisprudence Committee on Question and Answer No. 2 and Question and Answer No. 3 was tabled until further information could be obtained on a motion which was seconded and adopted.

Recommendations

- 1. It is essential for the Secretary and Presiding Officer of a Chapter to be knowledgeable concerning the prescribed manner set down in the Penal Code as to the various steps concerning the trial procedure. I, therefore, recommend that each Secretary of the Subordinate Chapters be required to have a copy of the 1926 Penal Code and that the contents of the Penal Code be incorporated in the Proficiency Test of the B Certificate.
- I recommend that the shoulder ribbons worn in the Subordinate Chapters no longer be required since the Grand Secretary is having a difficult time trying to purchase the wide ribbon.
- 3. The year as Associate Grand Matron is a very busy one for her. She is busy writing letters of appointments and making plans for her year as Worthy Grand Matron. I, therefore, recommend that she be taken off of the Fraternal Correspondence Report and it be given to the Grand Conductress and Associate Grand Conductress with the Grand Conductress as Chairman.

The Jurisprudence Committee approved Recommendation No. 1 that each Secretary of Subordinate Chapters be required to have a copy of the Penal Code but disapprove that the contents of the Penal Code be incorporated in the proficiency test of the "B" Certificate.

A motion was made, seconded and adopted to accept the report of the Jurisprudence Committee on this recommendation.

Recommendation No. 2 was disapproved by the Jurisprudence Committee and their report was accepted by a motion which was seconded and adopted.

Recommendation No. 3 was referred to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee, since it would require an amendment to the Associate Grand Matron's duties.
